Men students far outnumber women students at Lane Community College according to latest figures on registration. As of Wednesday night 1031 men students had completed registration as compared to 287 women. Of the 1318 total registered students, 1170 live within 30 miles of the Campus; 26 live from 30 to 50 miles from the Campus; 19 live more than 50 miles away. To date we have 87 out of District students, 2 out of State students, and 1 foreign student registered. Registration will end October 8th.

Several changes have been made in the Springfield Campus parking set-up the past week. Problems created since the beginning of classes have made it necessary to ban all parking on either side of the street between the faculty house and the main building, and to limit the use of the two spaces in front of the faculty house to 20 minutes for loading and unloading materials. A Springfield patrolman will help with parking at the Springfield Campus until further notice. Improvement of the surface and entrance to the Quarry Street parking area will make student parking easier. Remember, there is adequate space available in the parking lot donated by Mark's Tradin' Post.

LCC Board of Directors met Wednesday, October 6, on the Eugene Campus. Among many items of business considered were the following:

1. Received a report of tentative approval of a National Defense Education Act grant of \$10,000 for increased guidance and counseling services.
2. Adopted a policy regarding staff travel as stated in the staff handbook provided it is within budget limitations.
3. Directed the Administration to pursue the possibilities of obtaining State and Federal grants for programs and buildings, and Federal loans for students.
4. Authorized the Administration to make application for membership to the Northwest Accreditation Association. This will make transfer of credits less complicated.

Latest enrollment figures indicate 1371 students have paid fees to date. Friday, October 8th, is the deadline for registration in the Fall Term classes at Lane Community College.

The Work-Study program announced earlier has been approved by the State Department of Education to start immediately. Mr. W. Wright, Counselor, has asked Division Chairmen to submit their lists of needed personnel as soon as possible indicating special skills necessary for the work. Please include names of interested students and pertinent background information.

Students wishing to participate in the Work-Study program may contact Mr. Wright in the Counseling Center on the Eugene Campus. Eligible students are those between the ages of 16 and 21 whose family incomes do not exceed \$6000 per year.

Final registration figures for fall term enrollment at LCC show a total of 1391 students; 804 in lower division college classes, 517 in technical-vocational classes, and 72 in MDTA classes. We have approximately 1500 students registered in Adult Education evening programs at the present time.

A student is expected to be in attendance at all times in classes, laboratories, and assemblies unless there is a compelling reason for the absence. "Cuts" for recreational purposes are not permitted. Instructors will set an attendance policy for each class, and it is the student's responsibility to know and comply with each one. All Instructors are required to drop a student from class when the number of absences exceeds the number of times the class meets in a two-week period.

It has been requested that Instructors issue in writing to each student a statement of the attendance regulations and other requirements for the course. Especially, those enrolling late should be given such information to avoid arguments and unnecessary petitions to the Academic Council.

Generally, absences for the first two or three class meetings of the quarter are disregarded in applying the attendance policy.

## SUMMARY, BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING (October 20, 1965)

1. Accepted a statement of policy on academic freedom and responsibilities.
2. Discussed ultimate student population for the new campus, mentioning figures ranging from 4,000 - 10,000.
3. Appointed a committee from the Board to meet with Staff representatives to form a committee to study salaries.
4. Suggested naming of the subdivision area on East 30th Street College Park.
5. Accepted the NDEA grant for Guidance and Counseling to establish a Placement Service for LCC students. The Board also hired another counselor.

Mr. Mel Gaskill, Mechanics Division Chairman, reports three new quick change lathes have been installed by Machine Shop students while replacing and adding to present equipment. A fourth lathe has been mounted on castors to be used in the classroom for demonstrations. A large mirror mounted above the lathe will bring classroom presentations to total visibility.

Diesel students are working in chassis and alignment on heavy equipment. Body and Fender students are doing preliminary body damage repair and preparation for painting. One group of Auto Mechanic students are working on chassis and alignment; the other with internal combustion engines.

Airframe and Powerplant mechanics are working in three groups: one with basic machine operations; one with magneto and ignition; the third in electrical study and experiments.

Planes used for weighing in basic study have been moved out of the shop to make room for engines used in the course.

## POLICY FROM STUDENT HANDBOOK Dropping a Course

A course may be dropped at any time during the first five weeks without penalty providing official drop procedures are followed.

A student may drop a class at any time until examination week and receive a "W" grade providing he is doing "C" or better work on the last day of attendance. For less than "C" work on the last day of attendance an "F\*" grade should be recorded for that course. (An "F\*" grade indicates unauthorized withdrawal from a class, or withdrawal after the fifth week with below "C" work in the course.)

A student has not been dropped from a class officially until the instructor has received a drop card from the Registrar and has submitted the individual enrollment card properly signed with grade indicated.
