## STAFF PERSONNEL POLICIES

The following staff members were elected to the Staff Personnel Policies Committee in an election held December 1st: Patrick Grant, Roy Rushing, Dena Malliris, Carrol deBroekert, Clarence Obitz. Harry Roberts and Gale Tycer were tied for a place on the Committee. Mr. Roberts was chosen by a flip of a coin to fill the position.

These Committee members will meet with LCC Board members Robert Ackerman, Lyle Swetland, and Dean Webb to discuss salaries and other economic considerations in preparing recommendations for the Board of Directors.

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

### Summary

The LCC Board of Directors met Wednesday, December 1. Among several items of business considered were the following:

1. Accepted the bid of General Mobile Accomodation, Ltd., of \$7.05/sq. ft. to provide 3 portable classroom units for use by the MDTA programs. They will be placed on the Eugene Campus.
2. Approved submitting application to the State System of Higher Education to teach Anatomy, Micro-biology, and Physiology which will enable LCC to provide a Registered Nursing Program in cooperation with Sacred Heart Hospital School of Nursing.
3. Appointed Advisory Committees for the Health Division and the Mechanics Division.
4. Appointed Mr. W.W. Cox Budget Officer for preparation of the 1966-67 LCC Budget.

A real Titan Missile II will be on display December 14th and 15th at the Lane County Fairgrounds. The Missile, a duplicate of the missile which will be used in Saturday's Gemini space shot, will be open to public viewing from 10:00 am to 8:00 pm both days.

### BASIC EDUCATION PROGRAM

LCC is formulating a program, unique in this area, called Basic Education. Cooperating with the Oregon State Employment Service for testing and screening enrollees, this MDTA class is designed to enhance a person's employment possibilities and improve his learning potential.

Presently conducted at the Labor Temple, 135 E. 6th, Eugene, with Mrs. Cora Pirtle coordinating the teaching program, the class numbers over 30. Each student attends as long as necessary with instruction designed to meet his individual needs. Further expansion is anticipated.

### FROM GREEK MYTHOLOGY

Several historic decisions were made on November 29th when the LCC Student Body approved the Constitution by a vote of 180 to 24 and selected the Titan\*(Greek) as their mascot. The Titan won over its closest competitor by a three-to-one majority and by its selection assured the student newspaper's name as the Torch.

## HAPPY BIRTHDAY

LCC's Radio Station KRVM celebrated 18 years of FM broadcasting on December 8th with the same Manager-Director who presided at the first broadcast in 1947. KRVM was Eugene's first FM broadcasting station and fourth radio station; and was the first educational station in the Pacific Northwest to use frequency modulation broadcasting.

Listening audiences have grown during the past 18 years, but the principal objectives remain the same: to provide programs for the Eugene Public Schools and to serve as a training lab for young men and women interested in commercial broadcasting as a career.

Director Roger Houglum founded the Radio Department in the former Eugene Technical-Vocational School in 1939, and has taught radio, TV, and electronics during his 26 years at ETVS. He came to LCC when ETVS became Lane Community College on July 1, 1965.
