STUDENT SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS

Representatives of the Eugene Social Security Office will be on the Eugene Campus January 11th from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon to assist LCC students to file for benefits under the 1965 Amendments to the Social Security Act.

A student who has received benefits from his parents' accounts which were discontinued when he reached his 18th birthday, or a student whose parents have retired, become disabled or died since his 18th birthday may be eligible for Social Security benefits. Specific requirements state that such students must be enrolled full time, be under 22 years of age and be unmarried.

Students having any questions regarding possible benefits should contact Mrs. Mable Kennedy Registrar in the Counseling Center on the Eugene Campus.

STUDENT COUNCIL MEETING



CULTURAL EXCHANGE IN MOTION

LCC's exhibit for Cultural Exchange Program started recently among Oregon's community colleges is being sent this week for display at Central Oregon College in Bend. The exhibit consists of five 30"x40" illustration boards on which are mounted pictures of both LCC Campuses, the Coat of Arms, the Seal, and other representative materials from the College.

Charles Solomon and Dennis Ryan are preparing the exhibit, and report the exhibits will circulate among the nine schools belonging to the Association of Junior Colleges, and will be on display for two weeks at each school.

LCC will receive its first visiting display from Southwestern Oregon College in Coos Bay. Plans have been made to show it on each LCC Campus for one week.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING Summary

LCC Board of Directors met Wednesday, January 19th; among items of business considered were:

- 1. Winter Term enrollment is 1439, up about 50 from Fall Term, and includes 380 new students.
- 2. Approved 24 LCC Scholarships: one to each high school in the District; and 5 Adult Education Scholarships: one to each Zone.
- 3. Authorized a Summer Session in Liberal Arts, Vocational, and High School Exploratory courses.
- 4. Set a Board-Architect work session for Saturday, January 29th, at 2:30 pm on the Eugene Campus.

MOBILE CLASSROOMS MOVING IN

Installation of the mobile units leased for MDTA classroom use has been delayed due to low temperatures this week. Robert Marshall, MDTA Director, does not anticipate any delay in the starting date of the classes involved, however.

The first units will leave British Columbia this week-end and are expected to arrive at the LCC Eugene Campus by Tuesday. Of special interest is the lunchroom unit, which will be used for the Fry Cook class scheduled to begin February 28th and run for 14 weeks.

Merlin Ames, Chef at the Driftwood Restaurant in Springfield, has been tentatively named to instruct the Fry Cook class. The lunchroom unit is designed to serve about 50 people. Present plans call for meal tickets to be sold at the Business Office on the Eugene Campus, good for one week, with the unused portion refundable.

It is planned that the lunchroom will continue to operate as a Coffee Shop after the conclusion of the Fry Cook class in June.

Forestry, Sales Person, Stock Clerk, and Business courses will be offered in the additional mobile units, one of which will house some instructor offices.

POLICY FROM THE STUDENT HANDBOOK Probation

A student failling below a 2.0 cumulative GPA will be placed on probation for the following term. If the culumative GPA remains below 2.0 for the second consecutive term, the student will be notified that he will not be allowed to continue in the same curriculum.

Counseling will be given the student when he is placed on probation. The student will also be counseled following notification of discontinuance in a curriculum to assist him in planning for other eudcation and training or job placement.

Students who have been disqualified are not allowed to remain in a class pending action by the Academic Council on a petition for readmission.

The LCC Board of Directors has approved plans for a summer session program in Liberal Arts, Vocational Courses, and Occupational Opportunity Courses. The program will begin June 20th and run until August 12th, with registration set for the first day.

A special feature of the summer session will be the Occupational Opportunities program. This represents a new idea in community college exploratory curriculum selection. Students in the program will be allowed to schedule up to seven different occupational courses, with a week of guidance and instruction in each. The courses will include information about job opportunities in the field, training requirements, education and training available at LCC, and demonstrations and lab practices.

In addition, Counselors will work with the students during summer sessions to help them make a final selection in an occupational field.

Closed circuit Television made its official classroom debut at LCC this week when John Jacobs, Chairman of the Math and Sciences Division, taught three sections of General Biology from KRVM Studio on the Eugene Campus Monday, January 24th.
