JOB PLACEMENT

The LCC Placement Service is now active and students on either campus are asked to contact Mr. Burns, Counselor, if they need jobs. Three jobs are posted on the bulletin boards, and additional jobs will be opening up in the near future.

There will be three basic types of job placement handled by the Placement Service: jobs for Graduates, part-time jobs for students attending LCC, and summer jobs. Employers are compiling information on students for consideration of future needs. Within the next couple of weeks a survey will be conducted among LCC students to determine student availability and experience for jobs in these categories.

Mr. Burns has recently been appointed to the Supervisory Committee of the Lane Teachers Credit Union.

DRAFT STATUS

Approximately 200 LCC students could be affected by the recent tightening of draft deferment regulations, Mr. I. S. Hakanson, Dean of Students, said today. The office of the Registrar is having some difficulty in determining GPAs for students' Draft Boards since many have not had transcripts sent to LCC from prior schools. IT IS SUGGESTED THAT STUDENTS WHO HAVE NOT HAD TRANSCRIPTS FORWARDED DO SO IMMEDIATELY.

Mr. Hakanson called attention to the fact that Counselors are available to talk with students contemplating enlistment to help them make plans for continuing their education later.

Among several items of business considered by the Board of Directors at the February 2nd meeting were the following:

1. Approved negotiation of a lease for additional space in the Labor Temple at 135 E. 6th Street, Eugene.
2. Set up a \$10.00 non-refundable registration deposit for next year's students which will apply toward tuition.
3. Approved submitting a list of additional courses, primarily sophomore level, to the State Department of Education for approval.
4. Approved making an offer to the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare for purchase of 5 radio towers, radio equipment, and one building located at present near the Eugene Airport.
5. Set a special Board of Directors meeting for February 9th at 7:30 pm in KRVN Studio, Eugene Campus.
6. The Budget Committee heard the first presentation of the total budget for the 1966-67 year and will continue discussion of budget items at a meeting February 16th.

BOARD-BUDGET MEET

In the shortest Board meeting on record LCC Directors awarded the printing contract for the 1966-67 LCC Catalog to A.K. Briggs Printing Company of Eugene. The session lasted exactly three minutes.

In the final meeting of the Budget Committee 8 separate schedules were approved. A total budget of \$4,566,180, of which \$573,509 will be submitted to the voters on May 2, 1966, was approved for submission to the LCC Board of Directors. A public hearing is scheduled for Wednesday, April 6, 1966, at 7:30 pm in KRVM Studio on the Eugene Campus, 200 N. Monroe. Although the Budget has increased local millage rates are expected to remain the same as this year.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Nancy Wendt and Karen Moe, Chairmen of the Student Body Voter Registration Committee, have been sworn in as agents of the Lane County Elections Department and have announced plans for setting up Voter Registration booths on both campuses in the Student Lounge areas near the end of March.

Prospective Voters on the Springfield Campus can register from 1:00 - 3:00 pm March 30; registration on the Eugene Campus will be from 9:00 am - 3:00 pm March 28 and 7:00 - 9:00 pm March 30.

All students 21 years of age who are not registered or have not voted in recent elections are urged to take advantage of the opportunity to register.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

I. S. Hakanson, Dean of Students, has issued the following information on Registration Procedures for new and returning students at LCC Spring Term. Complete registration is required for all students; regular registration will end March 28.

Returning students should use the following procedures during the next two weeks:

1. Enter KRVM Studio, pick up registration packet (locator card, fee slip and schedule card).
2. See Counselor for schedule verification and fee card completion. (Counselors will keep locator card and schedule card).
3. Pay fees at Business Office (or sign agreement to do so).
4. Receipt of Student Body card indicates registration has been completed. (Attendance in class will not be recognized without a Student Body card).

New Students should use the following procedures during the week of March 21-25:

1. Pick up three copies of registration form in KRVM Studio; take completed forms to registration desk.
2. Student will be assigned a number, given a locator card, and fee slip.
3. Contact Counselor to plan schedule and complete fee slip.
4. Student takes 1 copy of schedule and fee slip to Business Office.
5. Pay fees or sign agreement to do so. Receipt of Student Body card indicates registration is complete and will allow admittance to class.

All students return to KRVM Studio March 28 to pick up verified copy of schedule.

Students entering for the first time should have the following: a) high school transcript; b) transcript of all work from post high school institutions; c) current TB test record.

Classes will be filled on a first-come first-serve basis.

Summary (Special Meeting)

LCC Board of Directors held a special meeting February 9, 1966. Among items of business considered were the following:

1. Adopted a salary schedule for Certified staff adapted from the State System of Higher Education salary schedule; and adopted a new salary schedule for Classified personnel.
2. Discussed and recommended further study on proposed course additions for next year.
3. Adopted a student calendar for next year's opening dates that conforms to the State System of Higher Education's starting dates.
4. Approved a Division of Nursing and Home Economics and appointed Mrs. Ellene Goldsmith Division Chairman.

INSTANT CLASSROOMS

LCC's three mobile classrooms have been installed on the Eugene Campus, reports Robert Marshall, MDTA Director, with some classes scheduled to be held there next week.

ADULT ED HEAD COUNT

Winter Term figures show a record enrollment in the Adult Education Program at LCC, with 2469 students registered for a total of 80,678 student hours. A breakdown shows 262 students in Apprentice courses, 376 in Business Education, 11 in Distributive Education, 116 in General courses, 313 in Home Economics, 929 in Self Improvement courses, and 462 in Trade Extension.

C. S. Obitz, Dean of Adult Education, reports new classes starting soon will include an Appraisal course for Cottage Grove Realtors Assn., and a Bacteriology course for employed Dental Assistants. Mr. Obitz has also indicated funds for the Basic Education Program have been received and classes will begin in the near future.

The LCC Flying Club has taken off in a big way, with student participation doubled in less than a week. Aviation aids have arrived and work is continuing on the constitution. BOARD OF DIRECTORS - BUDGET MEETING - Summary

LCC Board of Directors met February 16 and considered the following items of business among others:

1. Adopted the 1966-67 School Calendar, with Fall Term scheduled to begin September 26.
2. Approved a working agreement with Sacred Heart Hospital for the Registered Nurse Program.
3. Reviewed progress of an HHFA Planning loan for the new Campus.
4. Approved the Administration to apply for possible construction funds from the Federal Higher Education Facilities Act and the Vocational Act.
5. Approved sending Staff members to an English Conference in Vancouver, Washington; and to the AAJC meeting in St. Louis, Missouri.

The Budget Board tentatively approved the following Schedules from the proposed Budget:

1. Continuing Levy Construction Funds
2. Manpower Development Training Act
3. Matching Funds
5. Student Loans, Scholarships, and Work-Study Programs
6. Planning Loans
7. State and Federal Matching Funds

The Board also began discussion of the General Fund Schedule which will be continued at the March 9th meeting.
