STICKER SYSTEM STARTED

A bumper sticker system is being initiated at LCC to facilitate parking for employees. The special blue and white stickers may be secured at the Main Office on either campus by signing up and supplying information on the make of car and license number of the vehicle for which it will be used. School officials have asked that the stickers be applied to the rear bumper on the driver's side.

Among items of business considered by LCC Board of Directors at their March 2 meeting were the following:

1. After an inspection tour of the mobile units recently installed on the Eugene Campus, approved acceptance of all three units as MDTA classrooms.

3. Approved LCC membership in Chambers of Commerce in the College District.
4. Approved addition of a Farm Mechanics Program to begin next fall.
5. Approved provision of compensatory time for classified employees.
6. Set work session for March 25-26 for Campus Planning.
7. Hired William Hein, Dean of Instruction; Robert Hamill, Administrative Intern; Joris Johnson, Adult Education Coordinator - Occupational Education; Nile Williams, Adult Education Coordinator - General Education.

3. Heard a report on the two-man accreditation team from the Northwest Accreditation Assn. that visited LCC March 16th.
4. Authorized participation in the Joint Purchasing Program with IED, Lane County, and/or other local districts.
5. Authorized LCC cooperation with local school districts in establishing polling places and ballot boxes for the May 2nd elections.
6. Authorized offering contracts to Wm. Dellinger, Assistant Professor of Health and PE; and to Irene Parent, Counselor.
7. Set work sessions of the Board for 7:30 pm March 30, Eugene Campus; April 1, Eugene Campus, 6:00 pm.

VOTER SERVICE

LIBRARY-LEARNING RESOURCE CENTER

The LCC Library-Learning Resource Center, Room 66, Springfield Campus, will be open from 8:00 am - 9:00 pm Monday through Friday of each week.

Students wishing to borrow books or use the Resource Center facilities must present a current student body card.

Fiction or non-fiction books that are not on reserve may be checked out for a two-week period. Books may be renewed for two-weeks, providing a 'hold' has not been placed on them.
