An all day Vocational Education Workshop for high school administrators and vocational personnel was held Saturday, April 2, on the Eugene Campus. Dr. Wm. Loomis, State Dept. of Education Director of Vocational Education spoke on "Suggested Patterns for Occupational Education in the Oregon high schools"; LCC President Dale Parnell led a discussion of recommendations from the Cooperative Research Study on Technical-Vocational Education in Lane County.

Workshop groups talked of ways to implement the Study recommendations by cooperative curriculum planning between District high schools and Lane Community College. General Chairman for the event was G. R. Bloomquist, LCC Assistant Dean of Instruction.

HOSTING HIGHER ED

Five members of the Community College Committee, State System of Higher Education, made a one day visitation to LCC on Thursday, March 31. Other out of District guests were Stanley Brown and Alan Goodell, Deans of Southwestern Oregon College and Mt. Hood Community College respectively; and Dr. Earl L. Klapstein, President of Mt. Hood.

The visitors toured both campuses and held meetings during the day-long visitation.

LCC BOARD MEETING

LCC Board of Directors met Wednesday, April 6th. Among many items of business discussed were the following:

- Held the public Budget Hearing at 7:30 pm. The Budget was approved by the Board, with final adoption scheduled for a later date.
- Adopted a Resolution calling for a May 2nd election on a \$573, 509 tax levy, and filling two expiring positions-Zone 5 and the At-Large position.
- 3. Changed the date for the next meeting with Campus Planners from April 20 to May 4.
- 4. Called for bids on 2 mobile units to house the Business Office and related occupational classes on the Eugene Campus for the 1966-67 school year.
- 5. Approved holding Summer Sessions in Cottage Grove, Florence, Junction City, and Oakridge if community surveys indicate student interest is sufficient.
- 6. Set the 1966 graduation date for Sunday afternoon, June 5th, with the location to be confirmed later.
- 7. Employed 14 additional Staff members for 1966-67.
- 8. Set salary schedules for 1966-67 for presently employed Staff.

Two main issues will be resolved at the May 2nd LCC elections: 1) Whether or not to exceed the 6% limitation; and 2) Election of Board members for the Zone 5 and At-Large positions on the LCC Board of Directors.

A tax levy of \$573, 509 in excess of the 6% limitation is required for operation of the Lane Community College District for the 1966-67 school year.

Board Chairman William Bristow, Jr., is unopposed for reelection to the Zone 5 position on the LCC Board. Director Lyle Swetland and Mrs. Marie Mull are seeking election to the At-Large position currently held by Mr. Swetland.

Polls will be open throughout the District from 2:00 - 8:00 pm Monday, May 2nd. All persons interested in the welfare of Lane Community College are strongly urged to go to the polls and vote in this election.
