VOTERS SAY YES!

In a light turnout voters approved the LANE COMMUNITY COLLEGE budget by a wide margin. With results in from all but one precinct, figures show the budget passed with 7883 yes to 4479 no votes.

Director Lyle Swetland was returned to the LCC Board of Directors by a vote of 7317 to 3331 over Mrs. Harley Mull. William Bristow, running unapposed, received 9705 votes.

OPEN HOUSE HELPERS

Several hundred visitors were able to see the first model of the proposed new campus site during LCC's annual Open House held April 29. Also on display were two satelite models exhibited by the Eugene Unit of the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry.

STATE JOB FAIR

Purpose of the Job Fair is to acquaint young people with job needs of industry, and to make them aware of job opportunities open to them in the future. The Job Fair is sponsored by the Oregon State System of Higher Education, the Governor's State Committee on Children and Youth, and business and industry throughout the state.

LCC will be represented along with the other Oregon Community Colleges at one of the display booths.

BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

The LCC Board of Directors met Wednesday, May 4. Among items of business considered were the following:

- 1. Accepted a check for \$1,000.00 presented by the Eugene Fortnightly Club to be used for the purchase of books for the LCC Library.
- 2. Received Phase 2 of the Planning Report, and authorized the architects to begin preliminary drawings of 11 buildings and approved development of specifications for site work this summer.
- 3. Planned for several Board, Staff and student members to attend the annual meeting of the Oregon Community College Association in Bend May 13-14.
- 4. Approved an agreement with the Maude Kerns Art Center for Staff and classroom space for the LCC Art courses for 1966-67.
- 5. Offered a contract to William Mansell, Director of Finance for the City of Springfield, for the position of Clerk-Controller for the 1966-67 school year. The Board also offered contracts to 10 additional people for the coming school year.

UMPQUA STARTS CONSTRUCTION

Dr. Dale Parnell, LCC President, represented the College at the groundbreaking for Umpqua Community College Thursday, May 5. The ceremonies signalled the start of construction for the new UCC Campus scheduled for occupancy in the fall of 1967.

STUDENT JOBS OPEN

William Wright, Counselor on the Eugene Campus, has announced there are still job openings under the Work-Study Programs, both in the vocational areas and in full-time college transfer programs. SUMMER OCCUPATIONAL OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM

Seventeen different occupational exploratory programs will be offered at Lane Community College this summer. Each course will last for three hours a day for a one-week period. In this manner it is possible that a student could explore in depth eight different occupations during the eight week summer session. This program will be open to anyone 16 years of age or older. The cost to the student for this program will be \$7.00 per week or \$55.00 for the eight weeks. It is anticipated that individuals will want to explore several occupational areas rather than attend the entire eight weeks. In each occupational area the student will have an opportunity to receive information regarding the job opportunities in industry or business related to the curriculum. Curriculum outlines, actual demonstration and participation in lab and shop activites. etc. will be provided to give the student opportunity to experience activities related to an occupational field. Actual job experiences, and in some courses, field trips, would be provided to explore various careers for which training is offered.

The main purpose of the occupational exploratory courses is to assist the student in arriving at a decision for future training and/or employment.
