# HAPPY ANNIVERSARY!

Friday, July 1, marks the 1st year anniversary of Lane Community College.

At the end of the first year of operation the total enrollment had reached 1484 day students and 3758 Adult Evening students.

Staff rosters had reached a total of 137 regular staff members and 160 part-time Adult Education staff members.

## HELLO THERE

Several new faces will appear on the Eugene Campus July 1 when new administrative personnel take over their duties for the 1966-67 school year. Reporting on Friday will be William Hein, Dean of Instruction; William Mansell, Clerk-Controller; Keith Harker, Director of the Library-Learning Resource Center; Joris Johnson and Nile Williams, Coordinators of Adult Education; and Robert Hamill, Administrative Intern.

Some 30 additional and replacement instructional staff members have been hired for the 1966-67 school year.

# STUDY SKILLS CENTER

The LCC Study Skills Center is in operation during Summer Session in Room 56 on the Springfield Campus and is available to all students. Mr. Donald Gabbert of San Mateo, California, will serve as the summer Director for the Center. Mr. Gabbert is with the Special Education Division, San Mateo Union High School. Any student interested in improving basic skills or developing learning techniques should check with one of the counselors.

# 1976 ENVISIONED

A long range plan of projected facilities, enrollment, and curriculum, spanning ten years, recently developed by LCC Board of Education and Administration was accepted by the State Board of Education in Salem Tuesday, June 28.

# FARM EQUIPMENT SERVICE

One of the new programs that will be offered Fall Term at LCC is the Farm Equipment Service Program. This course was requested for Oregon by the farm implement industry because of a serious shortage of trained personnel in this field. This will be a two-year program with an Associate of Science degree awarded upon completion. The summer between the first and second year of the program will be scheduled for supervised work experience with a farm implement dealer or serviceman. Staff members will assist in placement on an entry job after completion of this training.

Instructor for the new program will be Mr. Paul Patrick, who recently completed 25 years in agricultural education. Mr. Patrick comes to LCC from McMinnville where he has been an instructor in agricultural courses. Farm Equipment Service classes will be held at 1504 West 2nd Street in a building recently leased for that purpose.

## COUNSELORS AVAILABLE

Counselors will be on duty daily to assist summer school students and help with preregistration for next year from 8:00 am to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm all summer. Counselors will be available on either campus.

#### SUMMER ENROLLMENT

Approximately 800 students are enrolled in LCC Summer Session classes, Mr. G. R. Bloomquist, Assistant Dean of Instruction, reported today. Approximately 450 are enrolled in Adult Evening programs, and the remainder are in credit programs. Summer Session will continue through August 12 on campuses in Eugene, Florence, Junction City, Oakridge, and Springfield.

#### AFTER 21 YEARS

Roger Houglum, Manager-Director of KRVM since 1945, will leave that post July 1 to devote full time to the position of Chairman of the Electronics Division of Lane Community College. He will also serve as Director of Broadcasting, and will have responsibility for developing the radio and television facilities on the new LCC campus. Mr. Houglum is a member of the Engineering Committee of the National Association of Educational Broadcasters and the author of many magazine articles dealing with radio and television in education. He was a co-founder of station KERG in Eugene.

KRVM is owned and licensed to the Eugene Public Schools and will be operated next year by District #4.

#### LIBRARY OPEN

The Library-Learning Resource Center on the Springfield Campus will remain open from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, it was announced recently. The new hours will remain in effect for the duration of the LCC Summer Session.

## BUSINESS MOVING

June 30 was moving day on the Eugene Campus for the LCC Business Office. The 9 members of the present staff worked all day to move equipment and supplies to the new location in Rooms 25 and 26 in order to have the offices ready when new Business Office personnel report on July 1.
