### PRESIDENT PRAISED

Congratulations to President Parnell on being named Springfield First Citizen of the Year. This is not only a personal distinction but an honor to the College as well.

### MORE STUDENTS

LCC's enrollment continues to climb. Latest figures from the Dean of Student's Office show a total of 4234 students enrolled Winter Term as compared to 2923 for the same period last year.

Largest increase was in college transfer courses, with 647 more students this year than last. Adult Education shows an increase of 369; MDTA, 47; and Vocational-Technical, 248.

### VOCATIONAL CONFERENCE

G. R. Bloomquist, Assistant Dean of Instruction and this year's President of the Oregon Vocational Association, has issued a special invitation to LCC faculty members to attend the Association Annual Conference which is being held at the Eugene Hotel Friday and Saturday, January 27-28.
