REHIRING NOTICES

By law, contracted staff members must be notified of Board intent to rehire by March 15 of each year. However, the LCC Board of Education will not be setting individual salaries until after the Budget Hearing on April 5. As soon as the Board has determined individual salaries, contracts will be prepared as rapidly as possible.

The budget provides for an average salary increase step for instructors of \$325; in addition, a provision has been made for \$108 for yearly health insurance coverage for each full-time staff member.

The proposed average salary increase for full-time classified staff members is \$240 in addition to the \$108 health insurance provision for the year. Dean Cox will be notifying classified staff within the next few days of proposed individual classifications and salaries for the coming year.

PROJECT DIRECTOR

Community Action Program Director

1. Nature of the Position

This position involves edministration of experimental, demonstration, and service programs in education, employment, social welfare, and community devalopment directed toward the reduction or elimination of poverty and related social problems in Lane County, Oregon.

The fosition includes direction and coordination of program design, resource development, and program administration. This requires direction of staff from various professional disciplines operating program components and staff services of training, business and central services, and evaluation.

The Project Director has responsibility and suthority for selection and retention of staff within general policies set by the Board. He establishes program and administrative policies for program operation. He is responsible for program conformity and fiscal control and is accountable to the Board and the various sources funding Board programs. This includes certification of payrolls, invoices, and other Project expenditures.

The Project Director serves as the primary lisison person with various funding sgencies. He is directly responsible to the Directors of the Lene County Youth Study Board (Lene Human Resources, loc.)

2. Required Education and Experience

A Master's Degree in some branch of the social sciences or education, plus a minimum of six years of increasingly responsible and successful experience in program supervision, consultation or administration in social welfare, social science or education programs. Two of the six years of experience may be substituted by post-master's education. Prior experience in administration of programs involving multi-disciplinary approaches to human welfare problems will be given heavy weight.

3. Knowledge and Special Abilities

This individual must possess leadership and administrative skills necessary to implement complex programs involving direct service to individuals and those directed at bringing about community change. He must be able to translate program needs and accomplishments to the Board and the community through various means, including effective use of mass media.

4. Salary and Fringe Benefits

Salary up to \$13,000, depending upon qualifications, plus a Board paid 3% retirement annuity; social security. Group medical plan and group life insurance available. Three weeks vacation, 12 days sick leave per year.

The bid submitted by the Morrow Company was \$2,040,000. The contractor has indicated construction will begin within the next four weeks. Completion date for this group of buildings, which includes Apprenticeship, Business Education, Industrial Technology, and Administration buildings, is estimated as June 1968. Seven buildings out of the fourteen in the first phase are now under way.
