ELECTION SET

The LCC Board of Education established polling places for the May 1 election and set the amount of the local tax levy necessary to balance the budget at \$553,828 at the April 5 meeting. It is notable that while the head-count enrollment at LCC will have doubled during the third year of operation, the tax millage has remained the same. Millage for the 1967-68 operating budget will be 1.6 mills, down .1 mill from last year, and reflecting a \$19,000 smaller operating budget local tax levy.

Also on the May 1 ballot will be names of the candidates for the LCC Board of Education Zone 2 and At-Large positions. Running for Zone 2 will be Dr. Clifford Matson, incumbent; and Jack H. Clark and Reva M. Sater. Those running for the At-Large Zone include present Board member Olga Freeman, Charles A. Fillebrown,

Mary A. Hall, and Richard C. "Dick" Williams.

Latest in the LCC COLLEGE FORUM LECTURE SERIES is Doctor Paul Jacobson's lecture on the Tongue Point Job Corps Center on Wednesday, the 12th of April, at 8:00pm in Harris Hall. The Sentate Education sub-committee on Work-Study Occupational Funds will hold a hearing Wednesday, April 26, at the Eugene Hotel. Among staff members from LCC testifying at the hearing will be Government Affairs Specialist Richard Eymann and Joris Johnson, Occupational Education Coordinator for the Adult Education Program.

SPRING TERM ENROLLMENT

Latest figures from the Office of the Dean of Students indicate LCC total enrollment for SprinGTerm has increased by 2029 over Spring Term of 1966. Greatest increase was in the Adult Education courses which almost doubled, although there were substantial increases in enrollment in all the categories. Figures now show enrollment in College Transfer courses is 1316; Vocational-Technical courses, 701; MDTA courses, 169; and 2572 for Adult Education. This compares to 1966 Spring Term figures of 809 for College Transfer, 560 for Vocational-Technical, 60 for MDTA, and 1300 for Adult Education.

Total students enrolled at LCC now number 4758 as compared to 2729 for Spring Term a year ago.

LEGISLATIVE

Richard Eymann, Government Affairs Specialist, reports that Senate Bill 99 has been approved by the joint Ways and Means Committee, with \$6,802,791 designated for LCC for the 67-69 biennium. Of this amount, \$2,791,791 is labeled for operating budget and \$4,011,000 for new campus construction. LCC received 27.5% of the total appropriation of \$24,758,941.

It appears likely the bill will be approved and passed in both Houses within the next 2 weeks, Mr. Eymann said.

GROUP COUNSELING SUCCESS

Dr. Kenneth Hills, Coordinator of Counseling, reports the LCC counselors have used group counseling for students on a trial basis for the past several weeks. The small groups meet once a week to discuss problems of interest to students.

Dr. Hills said both students and counselors are pleased with the results. Such counseling enables counselors to reach more people, and some students feel more at ease in groups.
