ELECTION BRINGS ELECTION

Mr. Richard Williams, Associate Administrator of Sacred Heart Hospital, will become the newest member of the Board of Education after July 1. Mr. Williams was elected in the May 1 election, and will replace Mrs. Olga Freeman in an At-Large position for a four-year term. Mr. Williams is not new to the College operation, having served for three years on the LCC Budget Committee.

Dr. Clifford Matson, Board member representing Zone 2, was re-

elected for a four-year term.

The operating levy necessary to balance the Budget was defeated 10,773 to 9423. By Board action in meetings Wednesday, May 3, and Saturday, May 6, the levy will be re-submitted to area voters on Thursday, June 1, in the amount of \$490,000. This is \$63,828 less than the original amount of \$553,828. Estimated additional revenue of approximately \$27,000 from state sources is anticipated to help offset this reduction.

LANE LEADERSHIP IN OCCA

LCC representatives at the OCCA Convention in Salem May 5-6 scored high in elections for association offices. William Bristow, Jr. will serve as the Chairman of the Board Section; Gary McNabb is Chairman of the Student Section; Dale Parnell, LCC President, will Chair the Administration Section; and William Beals, Assistant Professor of Social Science, will serve as Vice-Chairman of the Faculty Section.

The Convention accepted the resolution on voting procedures which will create a delegate assembly through which all business will be conducted. The Board action also approved creation of the position of paid Executive Secretary for the organization.

"I was extremely pleased at LCC's fine representation at the Convention,"
Dr. Parnell said today. "We had the largest attendance of any of the Colleges in every section, and it goes without saying that our staff members, students, and Board members took a very active interest in the Convention."

6 Board members, some 20 students, and over 50 faculty members from LCC attended the meeting, Dr. Parnell said.

THE JUNE 1 ELECTION NEEDS YOU!

On June 1 a revised property tax levy for LCC will be submitted to the District voters for approval. Help is needed from each staff member to ensure positive voter turnout by contacting at least 6 friends or acquaintances to make them aware of the urgency of the situation.

These points should receive special emphasis:

- 1. The local tax levy for the 1967-68 budget is about 14% less than the current year; and 11-1/2% less than the original levy of May 1.
- 2. The amount to be voted on is projected to cost the property owner about 1.36 mills, or about \$5.44 for the owner of a \$15,000 home. This is about \$1.36 less than the current year's cost of \$6.80. 75.5% of the operating budget is in the area of instruction and staff salaries.

Lack of sufficient concern on the part of positive supporters could defeat the levy. Remember, the best way to secure a favorable vote is through personal contact of as many people as possible.

A MESSAGE TO STUDENTS AND FACULTY from the President

I AM WORRIED.

Everyone tells me not to worry--that the June 1st operating fund tax levy election is going to pass easily. However, my analysis of the various school district !second time around" elections indicates that approximately the same number of NO votes have been cast in these second elections as in the May 1st elections. These subsequent elections have evidently passed only because a larger number of YES voters have turned out. Since we had 10, 773 NO votes in our May 1st election, you can see why I'm worried. We are going to have to produce almost 11,000 YES votes on June 1st if the current trend holds for the LCC election.

In a meeting last Monday with all the Advisory Committee members I was further reassured that there was no reason to worry about passage of this June 1st election. Consequently, my greatest concern is that supporters of LCC, including students and staff members, will become overconfident and fail to work hard enough to persuade positive voters to turn out on June 1st.

This is no time for complacency, nor is this the time for over-confidence--particularly between now and 8:00 pm on Thursday evening, June 1st.

Every friend and supporter of LCC is needed at the polls in this crucial election. Can you help by urging your friends to vote this Thursday?
