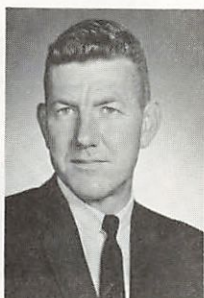
Taking part in the work sessions will be Division Chairmen, members of the Staff Personnel Policies Committee, Summer Committee members, and administrative personnel.

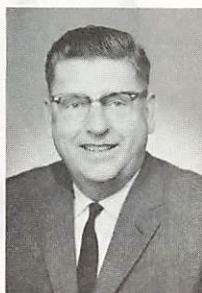

OLD JOBS. . . NEW FACES. . . .



JACK CARTER, Counselor and Coordinator of Student Activities for 1967-68, comes to LCC from 13 years with the Oakridge School District where he has served as Principal of the junior and senior high schools for the past 2 years. He grew up on a farm near Riddle, Oregon; attended high school there; and received a BS from Southern Oregon and an M. Ed. from the University of Oregon. While at Oakridge he served as Director of the Summer Recreation Program for 5 years. With his family (wife Barbara and 2 sons) he enjoys outdoor activities at the coast and in the mountains; and gardening and golf.

BETTY EKSTROM joins the LCC Counseling staff after 6 years as an employment counselor with the Oregon State Department of Employment. She was born in Washington, D. C. , but grew up in the Salem and Portland areas. She attended Colorado Women's College and the University of Colorado, and a BA from the University of Oregon. She has been active in YWCA affairs and served as President of the Eugene YWCA Board of Directors in 1961. Mrs. Ekstrom and her husband are the parents of 2 children.

He has taught 9 years at both junior and senior high levels; was employed as an engineering coordinator for Tektronics, Inc.; served 1 year as special assistant to the Dean of Students at Portland State College; and worked for 2 years as a research assistant with the Division of Continuing Education at the University of Oregon. DONALD OWNBEY joins the LCC staff as a librarian July 1. He is a native of the Pacific Northwest, born in Portland, but spending his early years in Washington, where he graduated from Goldendale High School. He returned to Oregon to enter Linfield College after a year at Washington State College, and received his BA and M. Ed. from Linfield. He served in Korea with the US Army before starting his teaching career. After 3 years at Mapleton High School, where he taught Social Studies, Mr. Ownbey entered the University of Oregon and received a Masters degree in Library Science.

Dr. JUDSON POND, Associate Professor of Chemistry, was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He is a graduate of the University of Minnesota with bachelor degrees in Mechanical Engineering and Business Administration, and a Ph. D. in Chemistry. Dr. Pond comes to LCC from the University of Chicago where he was a Research Associate in the Department of Chemistry. He served 3 years with the US Navy as an electronics technician. 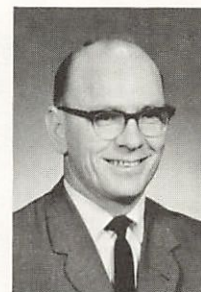

"EXPLOSIVENESS OF CHANGE"

Eric Hoffer, guest speaker at the September 11 staff In-Service workshop, is an unusual man with unique ideas. He is the author of "The True Believer," a comment on the nature of mass movements, which has sold over 200,000 copies.

Mr. Hoffer is a Pacific Coast longshoreman who makes ready reference to such varied sources as Renan, H. G. Wells, the Bible, DeTocqueville, Chaim Weizmann, Dostoyevsky; before 1943 he was a migrant laborer and gold miner in California for many years. A head injury at the age of 7 left him totally blind until his sight returned at 15. Shortly after this his parents died and, with very little formal education and less money, he headed for the West Coast. For years he roamed California as a field worker, leaving little mark except the record of library cards in the towns through which he passed.

In discussing the characteristics common to all mass movements Mr. Hoffer deserts the economic approach to history and sets out to show the relationship of individual psychology to politics.

Mr. Hoffer will speak on "The Explosiveness of Change" at the staff meeting in the afternoon. At 8:00 pm the evening of the 11th he will present a public lecture at Harris Hall entitled "Leisure and the Masses."

OREGON INVENTORS COUNCIL

ORGANIZATION

I. SPONSORSHIP

The Council was organized in 1962 under the joint sponsorship of the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry, and the Oregon Department of Planning and Development. Lane Community College accepted institutional sponsorship in 1968 and now provides the Council with headquarters offices in the Adult Education Department and performs certain staff functions.

II. PURPOSE

The Council's primary purpose is to promote the economic development of Oregon by encouraging and assisting the development of ideas and inventions with the objective of creating new products, new or expanded industries, and payrolls.

III. ORGANIZATION

The Council will operate through an executive committee and a technical committee. Appointed by the Board of Education of Lane Community College, the executive committee is the steering body. The technical committee is the Council's "action" division. Organized to evaluate and report on inventions submitted to the Council, the technical committee will also meet with the executive committee from time to time to assist in implementing policies, programs, and procedures.

PROGRAMS AND PROCEDURES

1. HOW ARE INVENTIONS SUBMITTED?

Inventors desiring the Council's assistance will submit information on the forms which the Council will provide: Invention Disclosure, Invention Submission to the Oregon Inventors Council. These specially developed forms ensure maximum protection for inventors. Inventors will also be provided with a booklet on patent information.

2. HOW ARE INVENTIONS EVALUATED?

The executive committee and staff will review and screen inventions submitted, and refer each one accepted for evaluation to an appropriate member of the technical committee. This member may call upon other members of the committee as he deems necessary to assist in the evaluation. A report will be prepared covering, insofar as possible, the potential for development, product uniqueness, practicality and marketability, along with any recommendations they may want to make.

3. HOW ARE INVENTIONS REFERRED FOR DEVELOPMENT?

Evaluated inventions will be listed on an information sheet which will be distributed periodically to Oregon industries which have indicated a desire to receive this information. In cases of inventions which are especially promising, the inventor may be referred directly to several companies, or may be given other assistance in proceeding with the development of his invention.

4. WHAT IS THE COST TO THE INVENTOR?

A filing fee of \$10 will be charged to cover the costs of handling and review by the Council.

5. ARE OTHER ACTIVITIES PLANNED?

From time to time the Council may consider other activities to contribute to its objectives, such as sponsoring Inventors' shows.

OREGON INVENTORS COUNCIL

OREGON INVENTORS COUNCIL

Lane Community College has accepted sponsorship of the Oregon Inventors Council and has moved the Council's headquarters from Portland to Eugene.

The Oregon Museum of Science and Industry, which handled the administrative and clerical duties during the Council's first five years, was unable to continue because of the press of other responsibilities.

LCC will continue the OIC tradition of encouraging inventors by arranging to have their ideas evaluated by representatives of business, industry, and education, as well as offering procedural advice about marketing and promotion.

Business and Industry are built on inventions; most Americans can trace their jobs directly to inventions put into use by producers. And as one fertile idea finds application, it in turn lays the groundwork for a chain reaction of inventive ideas, further spurring the economy. Because of LCC's belief that inventors should be assisted for their own protection and because of their potential contributions to the economic development of the state, the college has stepped forward to accept administrative responsibility for the Council.

In return for a small administrative fee, an inventor will have opportunity to have his idea evaluated by a panel of experts in the invention's area of application. He will receive counsel as to its practicability, cost ratio, purchaser

acceptance, marketing, advantages and objections, profit possibilities, and a recommendation regarding its development.

It is expected that inventions of merit can find productive application in Lane County and Oregon. Thus inventors, by helping themselves through the OIC, can help their fellow citizens and the region by stimulating the economy.

The OIC was founded in April, 1962, at the request of then-Governor Mark Hatfield. Initial co-sponsor with OMSI was the State Department of Commerce's Division of Planning and Development.

In the Council's first five years, more than 350 inventors and would-be inventors were served. Some were counseled to abandon unpromising ideas; others were shown how to develop and market their inventions. At a minimum, applicants were exposed to a close-up scrutiny of inventors' pitfalls and procedures.

An Inventors Fair was held in 1965. A brief listing of the inventions exhibited shows the range of ideas which the OIC has encouraged: steam cooking casserole, rifle sight, bench clamp, boat trailer, escape ladder, sewing machine vacuum, device for locking toilet seat and cover, steam puff iron, lawn areater, overload release coupling, fishing rod holder, cigarette filter, drill bit sharpening jig, painting roller, toy jumping horse, invoice addresser, magnetic anchor for seat belt buckles, ironing board, folding trailer jack, and a toy lunar exploration vehicle with self-contained bridging device.
