

# KLCC OK'd

The call letters KLCC have been officially assigned to Lane Community College's new FM radio station, effective August 7.

Word of the authorization was received from the Federal Communications Commission the past weekend following petition by the Board of Education asking that these letters be awarded the College station.

The station, used as a classroom for broadcasting students, is on the air 6 hours each weekday during the school year, and will be affiliated this year with the Tape Network of National Education Radio, making a wide variety of material available for broadcasting.

KLCC broadcasts on a 90.3 mc, FM Channel 212, with a power of 450 watts. Plans are to start programming on the 25th of September for the 1967-68 college year.

There have been some recent letters to the Editor of the Eugene Register-Guard posing questions about the College operation. It is the policy of the College that any such letters will receive an answer. These answers are written directly to the individual posing the questions. To keep the staff informed the following two letters are reprinted.

Mrs. Mildred Detling 1944 Moss Street Eugene, Oregon

Dear Mrs. Detling:

I am most appreciative of your interest in Lane Community College. May I refer specifically to your letter in the Eugene Register-Guard on the 2nd of August. As Chairman of the LCC Board, it would seem appropriate that I answer your question with regard to the President's salary. I would be most happy to meet with you to discuss this matter, or to furnish you with other information. I am sure Dr. Parnell, our College President, would also be happy to talk with you.

The first assumption in your letter is that people of the College District vote on the budget. This is not so. The voters only vote on the amount of money necessary from local property taxes to <u>balance</u> the budget. In the case of the Lane Community College budget this came to \$490,000 out of a total general fund budget of \$2,501,132 for the 1967-68 budget year. (Incidentally, this is lower than the 1966-67 tax levy.) Oregon local budget law places responsibility for developing the budget on the Budget Committee and for finally adopting the budget on the Board. The law also gives the Board latitude in making transfers within the budget as the year progresses. In the case of the President's salary we will have to make a transfer, but it will not involve an overall budget increase.

The salary of the President is negotiated separately from other staff salaries and was still under negotiation until our July 12, 1967, Board meeting. Quite frankly, we would like to be able to pay our President more than we offered him. We are the second largest community college in the State, yet our President's salary stands in fifth place. However, we endeavor to cut costs wherever possible and this is one place where a few dollars may be saved. Our President concurs with the Board in this philosophy.

The authorization given by the voters when approving the tax levy necessary to <u>balance</u> the budget means that the District may levy up to that amount (\$490,000). It is possible--in fact it has happened in the past--that the Lane Community College Board may not levy the full amount authorized by the voters. As you can see, the Board has considerable legal latitude to adjust the budget within the confines of the local budget law. The dollar amounts shown in the budget document represent a projection that the budget law is clear to point out as "estimates." However, in no case may the total expenditure exceed that which is indicated in the total budget.

Again, I appreciate your interest and concern. You should know we are always available for questions and clarifications as to action taken by the Board. We want to be a responsible and efficient public body in every respect. In the case you mentioned we did not set the President's 1967-68 salary at an earlier date, since the matter was in the negotiation stage.

You should know of our appreciation for your interest in the operation of Lane Community College. I will try to provide you with answers to your many fine questions. Enclosed is a copy of a letter our Board has drafted in reply to a letter on the President's salary. This seems like the best way to answer this question.

In answer to your other questions:

1. This past year we enrolled 9,844 individuals in classes that can be broken down in the following categories:

2. I have enclosed a college catalog and a few brochures which describe the many varied programs. Briefly, our goal is to provide a "higher" education for the common man. LCC, as an open door community college, has been developed primarily to serve those for whom no other post-high school educational opportunities are readily "within reach", either geographically, financially, vocationally, or academically. In fulfilling this function, the College endeavers to provide quality opportunities to meet highly diversified needs maintaining at least one open door for most of the citizens. Our student and counselors indicate that the College is fulfilling this goal to a marked degree.

3. As President, I have one person you can define as an administrative assistant. However, he wears several other hats with primary responsibility for College-Community relations. He holds the Masters Degree and has had many years experience in education. The Board has set his annual salary at \$13,200 (his salary last year was \$12,700, this is slightly less than a 4% raise). Of course, there are other administrators in the College with specific responsibilities for specific areas of the College. In a recent survey here I found that the LCC personnel with administrative assignments are currently devoting an average of 60 hours per week on the job.

4. Your question on intercollegiate athletics is an academic one at the moment for the Board currently has a policy of no intercollegiate athletics. The Mt. Hood Board was discussing with the Lane Board the possibility of changing this policy. Also, this is one of the most urgent desires of the student body officers of LCC. It does not appear that the Lane Board will be discussing this matter again very soon.

You have asked so many pertinent and important questions that I have asked the Eugene Register-Guard to develop a feature story (perhaps progress report) on LCC to be ran in their Sunday Supplement. Any help you can give us urging the Guard to do this will be appreciated. (Perhaps a phone call to Mr. Dan Sellard of the Guard staff would be helpful.)

Feel free to give me a call (342-4931, Extension 32) or better yet perhaps you would like to discuss these matters with me personally. At any rate, I hope this note has been helpful.

# Lack of Public Interest in Government Cited by Parnell

Lane Community College President  $Dr_{\bullet}$  Dale Parnell expressed concern over the public's lack of confidence in local government and rapped Oregon's constitutional 6 percent limitation method of financing public agencies during a talk Wednesday noon before the Springfield Rotary club.

Parnell told the Rotarians that he was worried that people were losing faith in local government, and he laid part of the blame on the public school system.

"We teach kids all about Eskimos but nothing about planning commissions," Parnell said, pointing out a general lack of stress on local governmental processes by public schools.

"If local government isn't strong," Parnell said, "we're in trouble."

The LCC head said local governments were, from his experlences, "pretty darn efficient," He said he hadn't seen any evidence of waste in local government that could be termed extravagant.

Speaking on tax structures, Parnell called the 6 percent limitaion "the most confusing istue we have" in government. He said "it is a crime for public Agencies to go to the people each year, asking that they vote on something they don't understand.

"Most people vote on blind faith," Parnell said, pointing out that very few understand the meaning of the 6 percent limitation.

Parnell gave Rotarians a rundown of the programs and goals at LCC, pointing to the college's primary goal of keeping higher education within the reach of all, both financially and academically.

He called LCC "a rather dynamic organization, trying to be responsive to the needs of the local community."

Parnell listed five major program goals of the college, including providing quality occupational education, college transfer opportunities, a good development program, good guidance and counselling programs, and a good adult education program.

He said total enrollment during the 1966-67 fiscal year for all types of programs was 9,844, which included 7,862 enrolled in vocational - technical studies, 1,389 in liberal arts, 228 adult basic education students, 115 in special classes under the welfare department and 250 students in miscellaneous categories.

Parnell said this was the equivalent of 2,429 year-around full-time students; "much higher than our early expectations."

He said the new LCC campus, under construction off 30th Avemue south of Springfield, would be a great asset to the contined progress of the institution. He noted that the college last spring term held classes in 41 different locations throughout Springfield and Eugene, creating numerous administrative problems.

Parnell lauded the LCC board of directors, who, he said have spent the equivalent of 60 days in meetings, without pay, since the college was formed.

"We're headed to be one of the outstanding community colleges in the nation," Parnell said, "and you don't do that without an outstanding staff and board," REMINDER: The Round-Up needs individual pictures of all staff members as soon as possible. ### BOND COMMITTEE FORMED

Mr. Dave Williams, Asst. Manager, Main Branch, 1st National Bank, has been named Chairman of a newly formed Citizens Committee for Lane Community College.

Purpose of the Committee is to help prepare and distribute information in support of passage of the \$9.9 million bond issue September 20. The Committee is currently conducting a campaign to secure at least 1000 endorsement signatures to be used in future publicity.

#### MODEL READY

The first public showing of the model of the new Lane Community College Campus is behing held at the LCC booth at the Lane County Fair this week. The model, prepared by Campus architects Balzhiser, Seder, & Rhodes is a 6 foot square, three-dimensional layout showing buildings, parking sites, and other features of the new Campus. First-phase buildings are scheduled for occupancy in the fall of 1968.

Members of the LCC Board of Education have joined LCC administrators and counselors in manning the Fair booth from 10:00 am to 11:00 pm August 23-27 to distribute informational materials and to answer questions about the College.

#### MORE GROWTH

Two new mobile classrooms have been erected on the LCC Eugene Campus this summer adjacent to the existing mobile classrooms and will be ready for use when Fall Term begins September 26. The four classrooms provided by the new buildings will be used for drafting, math, physics, and Adult Education classes.

# LOANS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Federal grants totaling \$40, 366 have been received by Lane Community College, it was announced today by Frances Howard, LCC Financial Aids Counselor. \$16, 986 in National Defense Education Act funds will be used for student loans; \$23, 380 received under the Economic Opportunity Act will make matching grants available to these students.

Approximately 75 LCC students are expected to benefit from the combination loan-grant funds, in amounts ranging from \$400 to \$1000. The loan portion may be repaid over a ten-year period after the student has finished school. The money, credited to student accounts, may be used to cover tuition, books, and supplies; with some apportionment for transportation. The awards will be based on need and individual promise of success in a college program.

Any student wishing financial aid while attending LCC is urged to contact Mrs. Howard on the Eugene Campus, 200 North Monroe. Mrs. Howard has pointed out that several other kinds of scholarships are available, as well as Work-Study Programs, to enable students to finance their educations.

#### PRE-REGISTRATION

Classes are filling rapidly as registration continues at LCC, Dean of Students I. S. Hakanson reported this week. Latest figures indicate about 1000 completed registrations, with 36 sections already filled. Unfilled sections are mostly in the evening and late afternoon classes; however, some openings exist in all curriculum areas.

An enrollment of 2000 students is predicted for the 1966-67 school year. Again, applicants are urged to register as soon as possible. Second-year students are reminded they must complete registration soon to assure places in related classes. Additional sections may be added as soon as registration is completed to a point where enrollment in given areas shows a need for more classes.
