NEW VA BENEFITS

The Veterans' Administration regulation regarding vocational-technical educational benefits has been changed to enlarge benefits to community college students throughout the United States as a result of efforts on the part of LCC officials working in cooperation with Congressman John Dellenbach and other members of the Oregon congressional delegation.

Previously, voc-tech students earned VA benefits based on credit hours in class; now they will earn benefits based on the number of credit hours enrolled, as do college transfer students. This will have an immediate effect on about 400 students at LCC.

Dean of Students I. S. Hakanson, and Counselors Frances Howard and Buck Bailey were instrumental in initiating action on this matter.

FOREST FIRE SLIDES

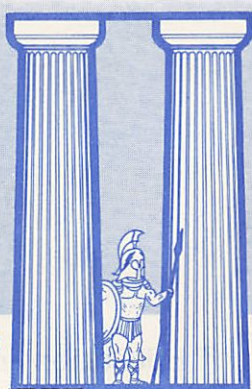

PPC TO MEET

New members of the LCC Personnel Policies Committee will meet with the PPC for the first time on Tuesday, the 11th of October, Chairman Carrol deBroekert said today.

Elected Friday to the Committee were Karen Lansdowne and Jed Merrill, new members; Harry Roberts and Robert Marshall, re-elected members. Others on the Committee are Dena Malliris, Pat Grant, and Chairman deBroekert.

The Committee will consider three major areas of staff interest this year, Mr. deBroekert said. First order of business will be organization of a Staff Association as provided for in the Staff Organization Constitution. Plans are to hold elections of Association officers within the next two weeks. The Committee will also give extensive consideration to all LCC insurance programs, and to the Staff evaluation instrument and procedures.

The Personnel Policies Committee is elected by Staff members to act as a review board and recommending body to the President and the Board of Education on matters affecting LCC Staff members. The Committee has direct access to the Board of Education through the President, who serves as an advisor to the Committee.

STUDENT DIRECTORY

A Student Directory will be published this term at LCC for the first time as a project of the college Publications Committee with Pauline Dixon acting as editor. The Directory will be a mimeographed list and will include names and addresses of Fall Term students, administrators, and counselors; and will be distributed to LCC students free of charge.

DENTAL PROGRAM REVIEWED

Dr. Kermit Knudtson and Annabelle Rasmussen, field representatives of the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association visited the Eugene Campus Wednesday, October 5, to evaluate the LCC Dental Assistant Program for accreditation by the American Dental Association. Accreditation by the ADA will make Dental Assistant graduates of LCC eligible to take the National Dental Assistant Certification examinations.

The LCC Dental Assistant Program has been operating on provisional accreditation for the past two years.

Dr. Knudtson is Director of Continuing Education, Post Graduate Instruction, School of Dentistry, University of North Carolina; Mrs. Rasmussen is a member of the American Dental Assistant Association from Puyallup, Washington.

BOARD MEETING

The LCC Board of Education met the evening of Wednesday, October 6. Items of business considered included:

1. Authorized a Bond Issue sale, to be called December 7, in the amount of \$6.6 million for 20 years.
2. Extended the trial bus service to run through October 21, with final decision on permanent bus service to be made at the Board meeting October 19.
3. Decided to eliminate the Instructor Mileage charge for Adult Education courses.
4. Authorized tuition-free programs for Volunteer Firemen.
5. Heard a report that site grading was 60% complete and ahead of schedule.
6. Approved proceeding with working drawings for the Electronics building. The Architects hope to have the 3 Mechanics buildings up for bid by early in December.

THINK BIG

The immensity of the new campus construction project is illustrated by two statistics reported by Construction Coordinator Walt Van Orden.

- * The glu-lam beams in the roof space frames for the airframe, automotive, and machine shop buildings total 436,589 board feet of lumber. Industrial Technology Professor Gene Parro investigated and found this is enough lumber to build 54½ three-bedroom houses.
- * There are 59,895 bolts holding together the beams in the space frame roofs for the same three buildings. "They're all big bolts," Van Orden says. "The largest is 1-1/8 inches in diameter and 18 inches long. Piled together, the bolts would jam the President's conference room from wall to wall and floor to ceiling."

LIST NARROWED

LCC edged nearer to the appointment of a new Dean of Instruction this week as the committee to consider candidates acted to narrow the list from seven to one or two.

The committee was to report its choice to President Dale Parnell by mid-week. He, in turn, is to have a recommendation for the Board of Education for consideration at its meeting October 18.

Chairing the screening committee is John Howard, Chairman of the Language Arts Division.

NEW ALLIED HEALTH DIVISION PROGRESS REPORT

The number of staff and students in LCC's Nursing and Home Economics Division would triple next year under a proposed reorganization and expansion plan being considered by the Board of Education. A decision is expected in the near future.

The division would be renamed the Allied Health Division, says Arlene Underhill, acting chairman, and would have four departments administering a host of new programs.

A medical doctor would be hired to chair the division, and if he had time, the Paramedical and Health Services Department.

In the latter department would be assigned health and first aid classes now administered by the Health and Physical Education Division, and college health services to students. Instructional programs, all new except Nursing Aide, would include: X-ray Technician, Medical Secretary, Medical Records Technician, Physical Therapy Assistant, Inhalation Therapist, Medical Assistant, Lab Technician, Psychiatric Aide, Geriatric Aide, Nursing Aide (presently called Home Health Aide), and perhaps other programs. The courses would range from a few months in duration to one and two years.

A Paradental Services Department would have a dentist as chairman and administer the one-year Dental Assistant program and a new two-year Dental Hygienist program. A dentist could be on the job by early 1968, Mrs. Underhill said.

A Nursing Department would conduct a new Nurse Technician (Associated Degree Nursing) program for prospective Registered Nurses, and the present Practical Nursing (LPN) program.

Already hired to head the Nursing Department starting next July 1 is Miss Edith Larson, holder of an MS from Teachers' College at Columbia University. She presently heads the ADN program, Kellogg Community College, Michigan.

The fourth department would be Family Life. It would have responsibility for Community Counseling Services, a Day Care Center, training Nursery Aides, and conducting Home Economics courses in the areas of family living, home management, nutrition, and textiles and clothing. All would be new except for the present Food Services Technician program.

Studying possible programs for this department, Mrs. Underhill said, have been Dean of Students I. S. Hakanson, Counselor Irene Parent, and Home Economics Professor Gladys Belden.

The Allied Health Division expects its building on the new campus to be ready next fall for the proposed accelerated activity. On the lower of two floors adjacent to the PE complex will be classrooms, a home economics area, a day care facility, and laundry. Upstairs will be a few classrooms, student health services, nursing and dental areas, and faculty offices.

COLLEGE AID FUND

Q. What is the LCC College Aid Fund?

A. It is a fund that has been set up, independent of tax funds and all other college funds, to handle money given to LCC to do things for the college that cannot be done with tax funds. It is the little extra for emergencies, expenses to help the "Get Out The Vote Committee" in our annual tax levy election, the cash to bring a promising instructor prospect to LCC, buying dinner for a prospective supporter-donor, car rental expense for a visiting consultant. It is the little that goes a long way if you have it when you need it. You can't really run a first-class college today without some non-tax funds to meet extra expenses, particularly emergency expenses.

Q. Why can't you use tax money from the general fund to do things like promote getting out the vote at the annual tax levy election?

A. It is against Oregon law to use tax funds to promote any kind of tax levy election. This is only one example of the many things that are borderline as far as use of tax money is concerned.

Q. Who administers the fund?

A. The College President and the Clerk-Controller, with expenditures reviewed by the President's Cabinet.

Q. Who gives the money?

A. People. All kinds: Board members, administration, staff, students, friends. Just people who like LCC. People who want to help LCC get better and better. Often it is the small amount of money that makes the difference.

Q. How much do they give and who do they give it to?

A. One dollar or one million. It is all tax deductible. Send it to William Mansell, Clerk-Controller, at the Eugene Campus, and designate it for College Aid Fund. (Old oil wells or run-down farms, or a mention in the will, are acceptable too.)

BOND SALE

Immediate sale of another \$3.9 million bond issue for campus construction was recommended Monday by the college's Bond Advisory Committee. The issue is the last of \$9.9 million approved by voters 13 months ago to partially finance the first 14 buildings on the new campus.

Administrative Intern Joe Malik has been assigned to update the bond prospectus prepared last year by Bob Hamill, then Intern and now Director of Institutional Research.

Action by the Board of Education in offering the bonds for sale could come in the next month.

BOARD SUMMARY

The LCC Board of Education will look at new campus construction at its meeting on Wednesday, October 18.

Scheduled for review will be parking lot working drawings and kitchen equipment proposals for the main food facilities on the new campus. A progress report on campus construction is also planned.

Other items on the agenda will include awarding the bid on irrigation equipment for the new campus; establishing the 1967-68 budget calendar and appointment of budget committee members; and discussion of state level government of community colleges.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 pm Wednesday evening in the Studio on the Eugene campus.

HALF WAY HOME

LCC staff members had donated or pledged \$656 for United Appeal as of Monday noon. The goal is \$1200.

"We've been getting a fine response, a very high percentage of donors," said Registrar Bill Wright, who is directing the college drive. "We expect to reach the goal."

The LCC campaign is expected to be completed by October 27.

BOARD POLICY MANUALS AT HAND

The LCC Board Policy Manuals--written policies adopted by the Board over the past several months--are now available. Copies have been placed in the libraries on each of the three main campuses, and one copy is in the conference room near the President's office. In addition, members of the President's Cabinet, including Division Chairmen, either have or will receive copies shortly.

The manual has been distributed to other agencies with which the college works closely, such as the State Department of Education. It is also available at production cost to persons outside the college who are interested in it.

Since most community and junior colleges do not have such a document, it is anticipated the handbook will excite a great deal of interest among other two-year colleges.

DEADLINE COMING UP

This Friday, October 20, is the deadline for returning reservations for Campus Day for Women to Irene Parent, Chairman for the meeting.

The program is now complete, with a full schedule of events planned for the all-day meeting in the Agriculture Building, Lane County Fairgrounds. ADULT BASIC EDUCATION CLASSES

Adult Basic Education classes are currently being held in key locations throughout the Lane Community College District. The classes are open to all persons with less than an 8th grade education; or to those who cannot achieve above that level in reading, writing, spelling, and arithmetic. Books and materials are furnished without cost to students.

The classes meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings at the LCC Eugene and Springfield campuses, the Labor Temple, and Willamette High School, all in the Eugene area; Elmira High School; Cottage Grove High School; and Siuslaw High School in Florence.

These are continuing classes and new students may join at any time. Interested persons should contact the Developmental Education Department, Study Skills Center, Lane Community College.

There are two ways by which LCC credit may be obtained:

- (a) enrollment in and successful completion of a class
- (b) successful completion of "credit by examination."

In "credit by examination", the fee is \$3.00 per credit hour.
(Staff Policy 510.7)

Procedures (Staff Policy 538.1) for "credit by examination" are:

If a student believes he has mastered the material presented in a course by having taken this course or a similar course or having had equivalent work experience, he may make application to be excused from the course and receive credit by following this procedure:

- a. Review with a counselor the syllabus of the course to determine whether or not he has had sufficient background in the content to afford reasonable assurance of success in credit by examination.
- b. Submit to the counselor a transcript or other proof of having had an educational experience equivalent to that offered in the course. This experience must have been gained in a post-high school institution. Work experience may be substituted for formal training.
- c. Fill out a credit by examination request form (available in counselors' offices).
- d. Go directly to division chairman for approval or referral.
- e. Request either a letter grade or a "pass" if the examination is successfully completed. (There is no record made of failure in a credit by examination procedure.)
- f. Appeal to the academic council at any step in this process, if deemed necessary.

SPEECH TAPED

Andrew Hanner's speech on drugs and alcoholism presented October 13 on the Bethel campus was taped by LCC technicians and is now available for use by staff members.

Mr. Hanner is past Director of Education of California's Council on Alcohol Problems, and presently serves as a consultant to the federal Department of Health, Education, and Welfare on alcoholic education.

KEY QUOTES FROM PRESIDENT PARNELL'S 10-11-67 SPEECH ON ACADEMIC FREEDOM AND RESPONSIBILITY

Let us remember that we can achieve our objectives only in an atmosphere of trust and mutual respect. As I have said on many occasions, because I believe it so strongly, Lane Community College has charted its course as an institution in which we share responsibility for the decisions that guide us. To put it another way, as an administration we have elected to extend the concepts of political democracy to our college setting. Such a system... can work effectively only if we can work, in good faith, together as partners in an atmosphere of academic freedom and responsibility.

.....

In my opinion it is not freedom that is in peril in this country, or in this community, or in our colleges. It is responsibility... Our freedom will be threatened only if we mis-use it, are not responsible, and our actions turn into license.

.....

The cry 'academic freedom' has been invoked about as many times as the fifth amendment and for about as many sins. The concept of academic freedom has not only been misused; it has in many cases been misunderstood and misapplied.

.....

Society provides freedom for scholars and for institutions of higher learning... because it wants to discover truths about as many things as possible... If society is to assure itself of a new generation trained to understand the world in which it will live, it must leave teachers free to transmit truth as they see it. If a democratic society is to have the benefit of disinterested advice, it must protect teachers who give that advice even when it is unpalatable.

.....

It is not the function of the college administration to go bustling around like some Aunt Polly, censoring a college newspaper here, cutting out indelicacies in a student play there, approving this club or that, accepting or rejecting speakers invited by student organizations, snooping into the private lives of students. These matters are the responsibilities of the students themselves. With freedom goes responsibility and good judgment.

.....

It is indeed unfortunate that many--students and faculty alike--have seen fit to hide behind the shield of academic freedom when their actions did not deserve such protection at all... Academic freedom has never conferred upon teachers unrestricted license to seek to destroy in the mind of youth certain criteria of truth which are recognized as the basis of our free society or to urge illegal or immoral acts.

.....

Academic freedom has no important relation to freedom of religious belief or the freedom of an individual to exercise his right of free speech. Whether I use a swear word in this talk or not is a matter of freedom of speech, responsibility, and good taste. It is not a matter of academic freedom.

.....

The very essence of academic freedom is for those who face each other in controversy to be seeking the truth and be willing to modify their positions. Even when provoked beyond endurance, reasoning faculty, administration, or students must try to behave like searchers for truth--not fanatics intent on seizing power... Someone has said that today we have too many Democratic and Republican Senators and not enough U. S. Senators. The same could be said for institutions--too many administrators, staff, and students and not enough total college citizens and statesmen.

.....

I would not question the right of University of Oregon groups to extend such invitations (to speakers such as Stokely Carmichael), but the wisdom in doing so. Are we sincerely searching for truth or merely waving a flag for the sake of sensationalism.

.....

On many occasions I have been stopped on the street in downtown Eugene and asked if we at Lane Community College were going to permit all of those terrible speakers like the University does... As a President I would have to be politically blind to think that our budget would pass in the spring if we conducted our search for truth only with what some would call the 'lunatic fringe.'

SPPC SESSION SCHEDULED

The Staff Personnel Policies Committee plans to meet with the Board of Education November 1. On October 26 the Committee will meet to discuss materials to be presented to the Board for this meeting.

The following proposals will be discussed at that time:

1. Base salary.
2. The percentage increase accepted by instructional and administrative staffs, including a 5 percent cumulative step increase.
3. Added classifications and re-classification for classified personnel.
4. Addition of a level III for instructional staff who are eligible for level II and who have shown exceptional achievement. The SPPC will discuss a proposal which states that no staff member be placed on level II for 1968-69 and that no new staff member may be hired at this level. The proposal is that staff members on level II could apply for level III on the basis of a Master's degree plus 45 graduate quarter hours or exceptional achievement for professors, or level II qualification plus exceptional achievement for occupational professors. The applicant would be required to accompany his application with a year's evaluation of his teaching along the guidelines suggested by the Evaluation Committee. He would submit the results of the evaluation to the Professional Growth Committee--to be elected by the instructional staff. Members of this committee would recommend acceptance or rejection of his proposal to the Dean of Instruction. The staff members who submitted proposals for level III this year would, if they chose to be evaluated, be considered for placement on level III in 1969-70, since the amount budgeted for salaries for this level can only be determined after approval of the proposals.

Editor's note: We asked LCC's new Dean of Instruction, Lewis Case, how he views the function of the Office of Instruction. Following is his response.

THE OFFICE OF INSTRUCTION

The Office of Instruction is concerned with the process of guiding and supporting learning. Our interest and concern encompasses promoting the learning process in all programs of the college--adult education, occupational curricula, basic education, developmental education, lower division collegiate programs, and even individual study programs. All are important, and we are committed to supporting and coordinating them into a Lane Community College program.

The process of guiding learning comes about through curricula, courses, assignments, and the structuring of various learning experiences. A key factor in this process is the student-staff Curriculum Committee which reviews and makes recommendations concerning all curricula and courses. One of my primary functions as Dean of Instruction is that of helping this committee so that it can effectively improve the quality of LCC curricula and courses.

The process of supporting learning comes through workable schedules, comfortable teaching stations, adequate teaching equipment and materials, meaningful instruction, and learning resources of various kinds. Much time, effort, and money have already gone into supplying these supporting elements. We of the Office of Instruction are also concerned that maximum possible support be given to learning.

You faculty members are vital to the learning process. Without you, the whole process dissipates its energies and comes to a halt. With a well qualified, enthusiastic faculty to stimulate, instruct, question, and challenge the student body, the learning process becomes an exciting and rewarding experience for the entire college. As members of the Office of Instruction, we feel that supporting and coordinating the work of the faculty is our primary function.

The office is organized to render this service as quickly and efficiently as possible. While we deans are selected to give specialized service, through consultation and communication we are well enough informed on all phases of the college to assist faculty members from all divisions. You should not hesitate to consult with any of us.

Specifically, I am directly responsible for coordinating and supervising the work of the Associate and Assistant Deans, for recruiting and supporting effective faculty members, for supervising and coordinating the work of division chairmen, and for assisting the Division Council and the Curriculum Committee.

Dean LaGrandeur is directly responsible for adult education, basic education, and the Man Power Development Training Act programs. He is available to consult with faculty and division chairmen in all areas of occupational education.

Dean Rasmussen is directly responsible for the Learning Resource Center, scheduling, and radio and television broadcasting. He is available to consult with faculty and division chairmen in all areas of general education.

THEME SCHEMES

Suggestions for building and entrance names for the new 30th Avenue campus are being sought by the Campus Planning Committee. Ideas may be sent to committee chairman Bill Cox, Dean of Administration, on the Eugene Campus.

"We want unity, something that will give us continuity for now and into the future," commented LCC President Dale Parnell.

One idea under consideration centers about a "learning village," with the Library-Learning Resource Center dubbed "The Center," and a "Cracker Barrel" snack bar and "General Store" inside.
