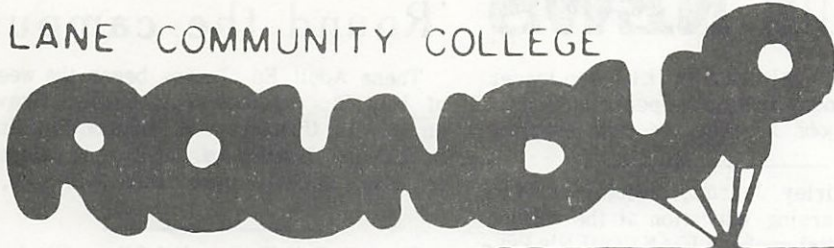

Change asked

The Curriculum Committee will recommend to the OCCA that it change the requirement of a high school diploma or equivalent before admission to requiring a student to obtain the high school diploma or equivalent before completing the program.

The committee also has recommended to the LCC administration that the present requirement of 51 college transfer hours, among the 93 required for the A.A. degree, be retained. There has been discussion of requiring 93 transfer hours for the A.A.

Retention of the present policy was urged for four reasons: 1) it provides opportunity to explore other curriculums; 2) it still maintains the basic group requirements; 3) the A.A. is not a transferable object; 4) the A.A. does not guarantee transferability.
