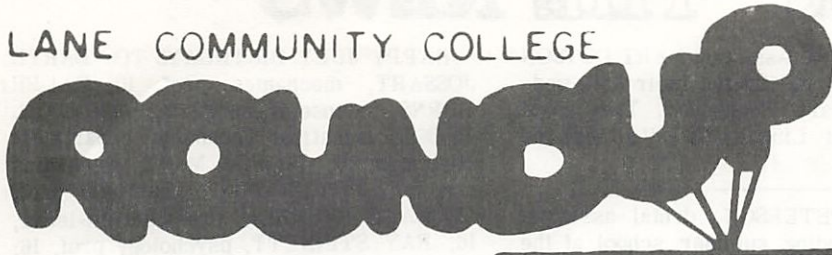

Registration nears

Registration for Fall Term classes is supposed to get underway Monday, July 15, in the Health Building on the new campus. Workmen promised Dean of Students BUD HAKANSON this week that the future English and Foreign Languages Department space on the lower floor will be ready for registering students.

Counselors will be available from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Summer Term enrollment head count is up to 816 and should climb to 850 or 900 as late-starting classes get underway. The estimated full-time equivalent is 200.

The total is slightly above the number expected. An abbreviated list of about 120 courses, two-thirds college transfer, is being taught. Most of the classes are being held at the Springfield campus.

Shift approved
