EDUCATOR DIES

Homer Dixon, husband of counselor PAULINE DIXON, died Friday, July 26, of a heart ailment. He was 62. Dixon had recently retired from his position as superintendent of the Junction City school district. He had previously been superintendent of the Reedsport school district for several years. He was one of nine on the countywide committee of superintendents who urged the establishment of LCC six years ago. He was also a member of the presidential screening committee which selected the finalists for the appointment of LCC's first president.

College Aid fund finishes in black

The College Aid Fund ended the 1967-68 fiscal year \$205.39 in the black, reports BERT DOTSON, assistant to the president. Revenues totaling \$2,018.25 came from 10 percent of the vending machine profits, reimbursements, contributions and honorariums. Seventy expenditures totaled \$1,812.86.

The fund is used to defray expenses of items for which use of tax monies might be questionable. Largest expenditure last fiscal year was \$515 for postage for mailing tax base campaign literature.

ED HAS WORK CUT OUT

ED RAGOZZINO, chairman of the Performing Arts Department, has a tougherthan-usual job ahead of him in giving life to the new department.

It will be his duty to develop curriculum and to work on the design of a proposed drama facility which he hopes will be included in the next phase of construction of the campus.

Described by some as a "dreamer of big dreams," Ed has already begun to make this dream come true. To get things going at Lane he entered college thespians in the first annual American College Theatre Restival, to be held in Washington, D.C., in the spring of '69.

As a part of the curriculum for the coming academic year, Ed said the department will perform plays, dances, give concerts and combine all three in extracurricular functions.

Courses offered include: Drama, Theatre, Orchestra, Chorus and Dance. The latter will be offered through Adult Education. "Introductory Speech will not be included," said Ed, "we will be strictly performing arts."

Coming to LCC from South Eugene High School, he has more than 70 productions to his credit. Among these are: "Dark of the Moon", "No Time for Sergeants". "South Pacific" and "Carousel."

In an effort to raise funds to finance an auditorium complex for the Lane County Auditorium Association, he produced and directed "My Fair Lady" in the summer of 1964. Following in '66 was "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" and last summer, "Half a Sixpence." This summer he produced and directed "The King and I."

Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., he was raised in San Francisco and attended San Mateo Junior College before coming to the University of Oregon. Ed was active in University Theatre and won the best supporting actor award for his portrayal of Jigger in "Carousel."

Assisting Ed with his dream at LCC will be NATHAN CAMMACK, BOB NORMAN, and NICOLA CRAFTS.

Nathan will be in charge of the orchestra, as he has been for some of the productions directed by Ed for the LCAA. He too comes from SEHS and is currently director of the Eugene Junior Symphony. He hopes to start a concert band at Lane.

Bob Norman will direct the chorus and will also instruct a Theory class. Bob appeared in "The Music Man" at the university of Oregon Carnival Theatre last week.

Nicola Crafts has worked with Ed Ragozzino in several productions as Choreographer and has also performed in them as a cast member. She will instruct the Dancing course to be offered through Adult Ed. It seems as though the Performing Arts

Department should have no trouble making its dream come true.
