ELECTRONICS DEPARTMENT FILES APPLICATIONS

Staff members in the Electronics Department have been busy the last three weeks preparing numerous applications for new electronic communications facilities for the campus to be filed with the Federal Communications Commission.

Among the applications sent to the FCC for approval was a request for permission to install a microwave studio-to-transmitter link to carry KLCC programs from the control rooms on campus to the transmitter site on Blanton Heights. This equipment was previously purchased and will be installed this summer, replacing the presently used leased telephone lines.

An application was also filed requesting a modified station license of the Lane Community College Radio Club amateur radio station W7ILQ to specify the new campus as its permanent location. W7ILQ operates in the amateur radio bands, 80 through 10 meters, with 1,000 watts of power. Electronics Chairman ROGER HOUGLUM is the club trustee and Electronics Prof DARWIN McCARROLL is advisor.

A third similar request was sent to the FCC to designate the LCC campus as the permanent location of the College's Citizens Band base station. The school's license permits up to 10 fixed and mobile stations under the terms of this license.

Flying saucer expert

to speak at LCC

James Moseley, America's most authorative expert on flying saucers and other unidentified flying objects, will speak at LCC's Jan. 20 public convocation. He will be lecturing in the large lecture room in the Forum Building beginning at 8 p.m.

He is considered to be the most knowledgeable American on the subject of UFO's. He is a graduate of Princeton and is the author of several magazine articles on the subject of flying saucers.

There will be no admission charged and the lecture is open to the public.

night classes

Basic nutrition, working with young children, and adjusting the kitchen to the family cycle are among several courses being offered Winter Term through the Adult Education department.

The nutrition class will deal in meal planning and attractive food service. Class will meet each Tuesday beginning Jan. 14 for ten weeks. Class time is 7:30-9:30 p.m. in Health 115. The cost is \$8.

A study of children from birth through age six will be covered in the child-care class. It will include ways of working with young children--providing creative experiences for them to develop emotionally and physically. The cost and time for this course are the same as the nutrition class except the room is Health 116.

The third course, adjusting the kitchen, is a study of the need of a kitchen organized to meet each phase of the family cycle, beginning with the small kitchen for efficient meal management.

The class meets each Wednesday evening from 7-10 p.m. for five weeks. Tuition is \$6. The class is in Health 115. It began Jan. 8.

Registration for all three courses is at the first class meeting.

The dental hygiene students from the Paradental Department are now holding clinics on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. The students will clean and scale teeth under the supervision of instructors with the latest dental equipment for \$5. After you have once been to the clinic, the charge for return trips for cleaning is \$4. If any staff members or their families are interested, appointments can be made through the Paradental department on the second floor of the Health Building. Children's teeth will be cleaned and given fluoride treatments for \$5.

WALT VAN ORDEN, plant supervisor reports that several donations of water fowl have been received at the college to be placed in the seven-acre sewage lagoon. Walt says, "We have about 10 domestic fowl. One large mallard drake, a white duck, a couple of geese and some other ducks. Several flocks of wild birds have stopped and there are also reports of wood ducks."

The second series of Family Life Discussions presented by the Family Counseling Service for Lane County in cooperation with LCC will begin Jan. 23. The meetings will be held in rooms 102 and 103 of the Health Building and will start at 7:30 p.m. every other Thursday evening through March 6.

Each presentation will be followed by a small group discussion period led by a volunteer, non-professional trained by the Counseling Service for this purpose.

News briefs

According to Dean COX, several of the carpets are beginning to show damage due to smoking in classrooms and not using ashtrays. The staff handbook states "Smoking is not permitted in classrooms when classes are in session, in the library, or in posted areas" (420.1). It seems that many people do not observe this rule. Staff members are among the main offenders.

Dean Cox said, "Large ash urns have been placed in all of the buildings on campus for the purpose of allowing staff and students to dispose of their cigarettes before entering classes."

The official notice of LCC's three-year accreditation was sent to President HAM(LL recently and according to the letter received from the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, the accreditation was effective as of the beginning of the current school year.

A reminder to staff members and other persons outside the college who would like to use the campus facilities or classrooms for non-instructional purposes, you must check for clearance through MARGARET KNUTSON, secretary to BILL COX. This includes the scheduling of the Board Room. Unless you have cleared the use of rooms through Margaret, the facilities can be scheduled for other use.

PLANNING POSITION OPEN TO STAFF

Staff members who wish to apply for the short-term position of Facilities Planner should contact personnel clerk DOROTHY KELLOGG in the Office of Instruction.

The job, created by the Board of Education on Jan. 15, will run only until July 1, 1969. The planner will work out of the President's Office to develop educational specifications for the second phase of campus construction and to do the analysis necessary for the establishment of construction priorities.

President BOB HAMILL said staff members need only "indicate their interest" rather than make formal application. Interviews will then be arranged by the President's Office.

Selection of a present staff member would hinge on the availability of someone to fill the staff member's present assignment during the approximately five-month period of the planning job. The staff member would retain his right to return to his old job.

Salary would be "at least at the Director level," President Bob said. That is around \$1,000 monthly.

Applications for the planning position also are being accepted from non-staff personnel.

Dental Students Capped

Capping ceremonies were held last Frtday for the dental assistant students and the dental hygiene students. President HAMILL was the guest speaker for the 8 p.m. program, which was held in the Lecture Hall in the Forum. Other staff members participating in the ceremony were Dean of Instruction LEW CASE, offered the invocation and benediction, Associate Dean RAY LaGRANDEUR provided the welcome and Paradental Director JOHN DICKSON introduced the students and the speakers. There were 16 dental hygiene students capped and 19 dental assistants. The capping of the dental students signifies that they are now able to accept patients.

Following the ceremonies, refreshments were served in the dental classroom and parents and friends were taken on a tour of the new dental facilities. There were 175 people attending the capping.

LCC receives grant

The Law Enforcement Program received a \$15,600 grant under the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration to use for loans and grants for law enforcement students. Most of the grant money will be made available to employed law enforcement officers who are attending classes. The remainder will be used for student loans to those students majoring in Police Science.

January 15, 1969 Board Summary

Contracted employees whose duties primarily involve student contact (teachers, librarians, counselors) are now eligible for five-year continuing appointment in the spring of their third year of contracted employment.

The Board of Education adopted the policy at its meeting Jan. 15. Several dozen employees will be eligible for application this spring.

Those who do not receive the five-year contract at first eligibility may be employed an additional year. If the five-year contract is not given at the second application, their employment will be terminated.

The new policy was developed by the Staff Personnel Policies Committee, which is chaired by English Prof EVAN ALFORD.

In other business, the Board:

* Awarded a \$167,700 contract to RCA to install hardware for the LRC information retrieval system. RCA's bid was \$6,000 higher than A-V Electronics. The decision to accept the high bid was based on "quality and probability of performance on time." The system should be in operation next fall.

* Heard a report from Dean BILL COX that the construction of the LRC building is a month to six weeks ahead of schedule. Occupancy might be possible by mid-March, though the kitchen equipment won't be ready until later.

* Awarded a contract to Metropolitan Printing Co. of Portland to print 10,000 College catalogs for \$6,225.

* Approved \$600 for travel for Mechanics Department staff to search for an aircraft for the flight technology program.

* Approved travel for President BOB HAMILL to San Jose Feb. 17-21 to a computer orientation for presidents; BERT DOTSON to San Francisco Feb. 27-28 for a AAJC community services meeting; ART SCHAEFER to Las Vegas Jan. 26-29 for an American Alumni Council meeting.

* Agreed to hold budget committee meetings on March 5, April 2 and 16, May 7 and 21, and June 18.

*Heard Dean BUD HAKANSON report that Winter Term headcount enrollment is 4,031 in the credit programs and 1,401 in Adult Education. Comparable Fall Term figures were 4,188 and 1,854.

* Noted that Siuslaw School District and the City of Florence have offered the College a 20-acre tract of land adjacent to the new Siuslaw High School. The Board is expected to discuss the offer at its Jan. 29 meeting.
