SEVEN leaders from business, industry and labor have pledged themselves as members of LCC's National Advisory Council. They are Mrs. Henry J. Kaiser, Jr. of Oakland California, Mr. Ronald Roley, president of the International Woodworkers of America of Portland, Mr. Don Stephenson, vice president and general counsel Del W. Webb Corporation of Phoenix, Mr. Howard Vollum, president of Tektronix, Inc., Mr. Glenn Jackson, Chairman of the Board Pacific Power & Light, Mr. Henry Freed, president Midwest Furniture, Chadron, Nebraska, and Mr. William Johnson, chief partner of the law firm Johnson, Johnson & Roy of Ann Arbor Michigan.

Because five community colleges in the State are underenrolled, LCC has opened twenty additional class sections to create room for an additional 400 to 500 students. At least one new section is available from each department of the College.

Richard F. McGrath, chairman of Cerritos College Police Science Department, and a police expert from California speaks to students, staff and the public today at 11 a.m. in room 301 Forum Building. At an 3 p.m. lecture, open to the public, McGrath will talk about problems of law enforcement. There is no admission charge.

On the advice of the President's Cabinet President Bob Pickering has decided not to use Lane's name in the film credits of the movie "Getting Straight". A token show of hands indicated that the Cabinet felt that the several hundred dollars necessary to fly to L.A. was not a worthwhile investment for the potential of what was involved.

Chairman of LCC's Open Door Committee, Claude F. Hough, has written a letter to friends of the College asking them to support the Feb. 10 serial levy for \$1.5 million. Other areas of support include a telephone committee, a faculty wives group, and a Student Senate group, who will pledge \$700 according to Paul Noshisch a co-chairman of the student group.

4400 students have registered to date Winter Term according to Registrar Bob Marshall. Of these 1000 are new students. The 4400 figure compares to 3350 students at this time last year. Of those 3350, 653 were new students.

Buck Bailey, Director of student placement, will be leaving Jan. 10 for a three months session at Oakland College in Michigan to work in the area of community services.

Two Lane professors received degrees Fall term. Lloyd Klenke, sociology professor earned a Ph.D. in sociology at the University of Oregon. Eugene Farrer was awarded a bachelor's degree from Colorado State University.

Citizens can influence the development of vocational education in local schools by attending a meeting and voicing their opinions on Jan. 8 at 7:30 p.m. in the Auditorium of the Eugene District #4 Center at 200 N. Monroe St. The Lane County Committee on Vocational Education will consider a number of topics including the Master Plan for vocational education.

## CONSTRUCTION PLANS AWAIT BOARD OKAY

The campus construction and remodeling priorities established by the Long-Range Planning Committee and endorsed by the Instructional Council will be considered by the LCC Board at tonight's work session starting at 7:30 in the Board Room.

The Directors will be advised that a decision on the next phase of campus construction should be made as soon as possible so that the college can be prepared to begin construction when the \$1.7 million state appropriation expected in June is received.

If the Board accepts the Planning Committee recommendations, plans will proceed to: (1) complete the mechanics and transportation building; (2) remodel some areas in science; (3) provide space for flight technology; (4) make additions to health & P.E.; and (5) construct a humanities building which would house the performing arts department and include general classrooms, particularly for social science and language arts.

LCC completed a successful pre-conference basketball schedule, scoring its fourth straight non-league victory, 73-54 over Northwest Christian College last night. The Titans, 4-0 on the year, open their Oregon Community College Athletic Association schedule Friday night facing Central Oregon Community College at Bend.

Lane led all the way against visiting Northwest Christian, sparked by the scoring of Terry Manthley who netted 20 points. LCC scoring and rebounding leader Willie Jones was somewhat below his seasonal average, totaling only 10 points.

The win was the second over NCC this season for Lane. Coach Irv Roth's squad earlier defeated the Crusaders 78-66 in LCC's opening game.

Members of the President's Cabinet, as such, met for the last time yesterday afternoon. A new plan of reorganization will pare the permanent members to nine, including the President, Dean of Instruction, Dean of Students, the Business Manager, Administrative Assistant to the President, one of the Associate Deans, one Department Chairman, one Staff representative and the President of the Student Senate. Other administrative personnel will be ex officio members who will be encouraged to attend when their advice is needed, as will department chairmen. The reorganization is an attempt to speed up Cabinet operations, without eliminating vital advice to the President and eliminating information and coordination between decision-making personnel.

The January 14 agenda to the Board meeting will include: a presentation to William Bristow, who is resigning; alternate financing for phase 2 and 2b, test core samples and landscaping for campus construction; the appointment of 35 election boards; the budget calendar; staff reports on the serial election, the alumni association, Columbia Pictures, and Senate Bill 144.

Lane administrators and faculty members will be speaking to a number of service clubs and other organizations to inform them of the College's need for additional monies. A slide presentation and a film "Itself", produced by John Haugse, a professor from Fine & Applied Arts Department, is available to service groups. School district #4 and Lane are working together to set a date for a public forum discussion. Paul Nosbisch, Dave Spriggs, Senate President, and John Hill are putting together an information campaign which will reach all the students presently enrolled.

Bill Watkins, Business Manager, will be attending conferences with U of O representatives to review the finance related elements of the WICHE financial system for determining its suitability to large community colleges. The meeting Jan. 8 was organized by Dr. Floyd Starns of the Educators Coordinating Council. Watkins will be the only representative from the large community colleges throughout the State.

The Oregon State Bar Association is sponsoring a "call-in" program designed to let listeners ask the experts questions on law. Campus administrators may soon begin to wonder what has happened to the rising influx of students expected at Lane this term. The FTE for this term 1227 is down from last term's 1267, and the headcount is down right along with it. With a 4,400 headcount the student breakdown is 1,850 occupational and 2,550 collegiate.

Friday, Jan. 9 a fact sheet on the college will be available to staff, so that they can answer questions about the serial levy and the College. They will be distributed through the campus mail.

Charlene Edmunds, secretary to the Administrative Assistant Bert Dotson, is scheduling speeches to service groups throughout the Lane County area for school administrators and faculty members who have volunteered to speak in favor of LCC and the serial levy. President Bob Pickering, Robert Smith of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, and ASB President Dave Spriggs spoke to the Springfield last night. Dr. Pickering will address the Springfield Lions Club on Jan. 12 and Paul Malm, SPPC President goes to Veneta Jan. 14 to talk with the West Lane Chamber of Commerce.

30 Paradental students will be capped at ceremonies tomorrow evening Jan. 9 at 8:00 p.m. in the Forum Building. President Bob Pickering will give the welcome and the address to the students will come from Dr. Jack Brinkman of the Lane District Dental Society. 16 dental assistants from one year programs and 14 dental hygienists from two year programs will get their caps. The capping ceremony symbolizes the beginning of their careers in dental work and a relief from last term's academic probation. John Dickson, director of the Paradental-Paramedical Department and the faculty will attend the ceremony.

Two LCC students registered President Bob Pickering to vote yesterday afternoon in the President's office. Gordon Groat, ASB Senator Mechanics Division, and D. Stephen Pickering, ASB Senator Industrial Tech. Division will be registering students and faculty who are Lane County residents and 21, so that they can vote supporting LCC in the serial levy election. The two students were sworn in, and instructed in voter registration and the laws applying on Wednesday morning. There will be two registration booths on campus; one at the west entrance of the cafeteria and one at the Student Senate offices, second floor of the Center Bldg. Students who have moved recently must register in this county to be able to vote.

A current report on student registration headcount and FTE will be published Monday Jan. 12. According to Registrar Bob Marshall, Lane's headcount and FTE are down from what they were last term at this time. However, he is sure that this figure will level off at the same FTE as last term because registration is reporting fewer dropped classes. The 4,400 headcount includes only the students who have registered through Marshall's office. Other figures have not been tallied from Adult Education, Adult Basic Education, the Special Training Programs or Developmental Education.

The biggest check ever received in the history of Lane was reimbursement for last term registration. It was a quarter of a million dollars, over \$775,000.

To improve incoming traffic Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings the West entrance of campus will be changed to one-way traffic between the hours of 6-10 a.m. After 10 a.m. the traffic will assume two lane movement again on into the evening hours. Signs to this effect will be posted. The change is effective Jan. 19, ten days away.

Additional members have been added to the National Advisory Council, a group of outstanding leaders from many fields of work across the United States. These leaders will be on campus once a year to advise LCC on major planning and future trends in their specialized area. New members include: Mr. Fred Veach, Regional Vice-president of Montgomery Ward of Oakland, Calif.; Mr. Tom Bolger, President of Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone; Mr. Marvin Feldman, Consultant from the U.S. Office of Education, Washington D.C.; Mr. Vincent Gregg, General Manager of the Appliance Control Department for General Electric of Fort Wayne, Ind.; Mr. Cecil Drinkward, of Hoffman Construction Co.; and Mr. John Paul Jones, Vice-president of Motorola Inc. of Phoenix.

President Bob Pickering was a guest speaker for a Northeast Christian College convocation Tuesday morning Jan. 6. He addressed between 400-500 students on "Renewing Your Mind".

Dick Eymann and Dave Spriggs will be talking with an OEA group from Cottage Grove at Harrison School Jan. 20 on the serial levy. Lyle Swetland, director of development will travel to Harrisburg to speak to the OEA group on Jan. 21.

Only 60 persons have registered to vote in the serial levy according to a report from the Student Senate at 9 a.m. this morning. This Saturday the 10 of Jan. TOMORROW, at 8 p.m. is the last day to register to vote. Most people will want to register before 5 p.m. either at the two polling stations on campus or at the Lane County Courthouse. Registration booths on campus are located at the west entrance of the cafeteria and in the Student Senate offices in the Center Bldg. Saturday registration can be done at the Eugene fire station or by calling the elections department at the Courthouse for the registrar nearest you.

Bob Mention, a member of Lane's Board of Education, was elected Chairman of the Lane County Advisory Committee for Occupational Education. Final registration figures will reach 5,200 easily according to Registrar Bob Marshall. Presently the College has 4,700 headcount this term with a number of students yet unrecorded. Special programs and Adult Education registration is not in yet either. Last terms headcount was 4,900 at this time. The FTE for these two terms is the same at 1,321.6. The 4,700 students registered during Winter term this year, compares to 3,893 headcount registered at this time last year's Winter term.

The idea of the rap session initiated with a faculty member and was set up by the President so that he could meet informally and periodically with a group of faculty members from each department. A slide show which visually tells the people about the programs and policies of Lane is available to groups who are interested. The series was put together for use in projection of the serial levy.

This may be the last time the Bloodmobile will come to LCC's campus, unless the staff-student participation is much higher, reports Steve John, chairman of the LCC Blood Donor Club. The College's December financial report is highly favorable, according to Business Manager Bill Watkins. "At the halfway mark budgetary expenditures of the General Fund are at the 43 per cent level."

Dick Eno is working a split shift for three months. He operates as a part-time placement director and a part-time instructor for the Business Education Department.

The Eugene Junior Chamber of Commerce has invited President Bob Pickering to serve as a judge for the Distinguished Citizen Award.

A group of Oregon school administrators are sponsoring a business management panel on which Business Manager Bill Watkins will represent Oregon community colleges. Jan. 19-20 the statewide representatives from all levels of education, elementary school through higher education, will talk about program planning and business systems at their meeting in Portland.

**OUT-OF-STATE INCREASE:** Under consideration by the Cabinet is a recommendation to increase out-of-state tuition to bring this fee up to the \$469 per term set by the State System of Higher Education. According to Bert Dotson, Administrative Assistant to the President, approval of this \$139 increase would need Board consensus, if the Administration makes the recommendation. The College doesn't receive federal or state reimbursement for out-of-state students. Limited enrollments at the U of O may lead to an influx of out-of-state, college transfer students who could upset the voc-tech-college transfer balance at Lane.

**FACULTY WORK-LOAD:** A study on space utilization and faculty work-load has been given top priority so that administrators can fit the work-load into a realistic budget. The space utilization study is being done partially by the Department of Data Processing and partially by the Office of Institutional Research. Figures from departments escalating the operational costs and reflecting the implementation of the faculty work-load appear too general. The space utilization study will lead to a closer examination of escalation in terms of a practical budget. Department budgets reflect a difference in projected FTE, some say 18 per cent, others 36 per cent.

**SENATE BILL 144:** Dr. Robert Peck of the Educational Coordinating Council will meet with interested staff regarding new proposals for Senate Bill 144 monies, today. PROFESSIONAL LEAVE: An SPPC policy on professional leave of absence, which sees a leave as a privilege which staff are eligible for but not necessarily entitled to, is being reviewed by Cabinet. The policy suggests that in order to increase his knowledge and skills an LCC staff member can become eligible for a maximum of three quarters, one academic year, leave. He will receive 2/3 of his regular salary for the period of the leave, after he has qualified by three years of full-time employment and has been selected by a committee screening applicants. According to the present proposal, the maximum number of leaves granted in one quarter will be 10 per cent of the total eligible staff members. Administrators are considering the financial implications of this.

INSURANCE BENEFITS: Specialists in group insurance are making applications to the insurance committee to serve as agents of record for LCC. The committee will review current accounts of each specialist and then select the best possible agent. Rick Fraga, insurance committee chairman, reports that the plan will probably be worked out by the end of Winter term.
