





LCC WON its first track meet of the season Saturday, taking a quadrangular victory over SWOCC, Umpqua, and Central Oregon. Titan strength in the distances racked up most of Lane's 73 points, offsetting SWOCC's strength in the sprints. SWOCC finished second (50), edging Umpqua (47).

LCC won all three distance events, with Dennia Hilliard (880), Bill Cram (mile) and Randy Griffith (3-mile). Tom Martin in the high hurdles and Steve Maryanski, javelin, were Coach Al Tarpenning's other individual winners. The 440 yd. relay team also won for LCC.

IN WOMEN'S TRACK, LCC finished third in a season-opening quadrangular meet at Monmouth last week. Lane (28) trailed OCE (73) and Oregon (53) but beat Williamette (6). Top individual for Susan Cooley's LCC squad was Lorraine Hein, who won the shot and led an LCC sweep in the discuss. Teammates Peggy Sullivan and Molly Read placed second and third, respectively.



FACULTY MEMBERS are invited to attend the first meeting of the Oregon AAUP Committee on Community Colleges Saturday at 2p.m. in Center 124 on campus. A caucus to identify and respond to issues affecting community college faculty will highlight the meeting. Among the committee members is Mass Communications instructor Joyce Harms, president of LCC's chapter of AAUP.

BOARD ACTS ON KIRK'S CONTRACT: Following SPPC and administration recommendations, the LCC Board last night voted not to rehire Science instructor Ben Kirk. The move was made by the Board to set the college appeals procedure in motion and allow Kirk a hearing prior to final disposition of his case.

The controversy over renewing Kirk's teaching contract has centered around the teaching methods and curriculum he uses in his physical science classes.

Kirk and approximately 50 student supporters requested at the outset of last night's public meeting that he be granted an open hearing on the non-renewal recommendation of the administration and SPPC, as provided in the Institutional Bill of Rights. (Personnel hearing are usually conducted in private with only the Board, SPPC, the person involved and his counsel present).

After Kirk asked for an open hearing and a number of students spoke in support of his request, the Board acted on his appeal procedure during the public meeting instead of waiting to discuss the matter in executive session later that evening as originally scheduled.

Following a meeting with Kirk and his representative (among others), Board legal counsel Ed Harms explained the two alternatives open to the Board: to reject the administration and SPPC recommendations (the SPPC voted 4-2 against rehiring Kirk) and extend Kirk a teaching contract for next year; or to notify him that he would not be retained on the faculty. If the latter option is taken, Harms explained, Kirk could request a hearing or the matter could be remanded to the SPPC for further fact-finding.

Following a brief private session, the Board reconvened and announced it had decided not to extend Kirk's contract, according to Robert Ackerman, in order to "raise the issues in the matter." The Board then notified Kirk that an open hearing

had been set for him May 3 at 8 pm in the Board room.

In addition, Kirk was told he must notify the Board chairman in writing by April 17 if he wishes testimony from persons other than himself and his counsel to be heard at the hearing. If so, 45 minutes would be allotted to such testimony, with the understanding that the administration would be given equal time for rebuttal.

However, if Kirk desire, he may exercise the option of foregoing the open hearing and requesting (again in writing by April 17) that the entire matter be remanded to the SPPC for further hearings and fact-finding. Following these additional SPPC hearings, the issue would go back to the Board for final decision.

Ackerman acknowledged that the use of an open hearing was a deviation from the established college appeals procedure but cautioned that it is being done for this case only.

IN ANOTHER MATTER, the Board reviewed a position paper on athletics submitted by the coaches, the athletics director, and Health & P.E. department chairman. It stated their positions on several matters relating to intercollegiate athletics, including the administrative policy prohibiting national competition, soliciting outside donations, and talent grants. Following some discussion, the Board directed the administration to develop a proposed Board policy on LCC athletes participation in national championships and to recommend a minimum funding level for athletics.

The Board also reaffirmed its opposition to talent grants and soliting funds from

the community to support athletics.

The Administration also was directed to return to the Board with a plan for handling other athletics related problems mentioned in the paper. These concerned insurance for athletes, travel arrangements, and coaching contracts. Finally, the Board requested the administration to develop a position paper on the funding of the entire athletics program.

The past couple of years at LCC have seen staff morale quite consistently at a rather low level. While this is, I'm sure, mainly due to the college's economic setbacks, it doesn't appear that the answer to our problems can be a reversal of the economic trend; the day of the 'blue sky' budget has passed. I believe that what the college needs at this point is greater staff involvement in the making of the necessary hard and unpleasant decisions economics has forced on the college. Our Staff Assn. and SPPC have been actively working toward this objective, and as president, I would make every effort to maximize staff participation in college decision making.



LCC STUDENTS PLANNING, BUILDING PICNIC AREA


Thanks to a lumber company and about 50 LCC students and instructors, vacationers this summer will be able to use a new recreation area on the way to the coast.







THE LCC BOARD will be asked to approve Lane's participation in a productivity study and will again discuss students competing in national contests -- this time a jazz festival -- during a meeting Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in the board room.

The two-phased study is being funded by the State Board of Education and will be conducted by management consultant Fred Manasse. Phase I will involve a pilot study of two departments at each of the six participating community colleges. These include Chemeketa, Clackamas, Linn-Benton, Portland, and Treasure Valley, in addition to Lane. Emphasis of the study will be on productivity, organization, and management efficiency.

The question of LCC students participating in national competitions is again on the agenda. The matter is being brought up by the Performing Arts department because of an upcoming regional jazz festival the college jazz band will be participating in. Should the group win the Olympic College Northwest Jazz Festival on May 14, it would be entitled to an all-expenses-paid trip to perform at the Kennedy Performing Arts Center in Washington, D.C. on May 28-29.

The Board at its last meeting generally expressed support for revising the college policy prohibiting LCC students from competing nationally and directed the administration to draft a proposed policy to that effect.

WEDNESDAY is the final day of the paperback book exhibit featured in the Bookstore. Starting Thursday, the 850 books will be sold at a 25% discount, along with a number of hardbound books.

SKILLS FAIR THURSDAY: At 5 a.m. Thursday when most Emerald Empire residents are still asleep, LCC will be hosting its first visitors to the Skills Fair. It's not likely that a swarm of people will be on hand for the 5 am baking demonstration but two persons, a retired cook and an ABE students interested in a Food Technology career, have called to say they'll be there.

The one-day event is designed to give local citizens a closer look at career training at LCC. Over 60 skill demonstrations, special exhibits, and other activities are scheduled during the day and evening to give visitors a first-hand look at the variety of skills students are learning in LCC's occupational training programs as well as the college transfer and evening adult education classes. The fair will run until 9 p.m.

In conjunction with the evening events, the Chicano Student Union will serve a Mexican dinner from 6-10 p.m. and the Swing Choir will perform at 5:30p.m. in the cafeteria. The dinner will feature homemade tamales, enchilladas, refried beans, Spanish rice, and a Mexican dessert, and is priced at \$2 for adults, \$1 for children 5-12, with those younger admitted free. Tickets are on sale at the Financial Aids office and the administration information desk. They also will be sold at the door.
