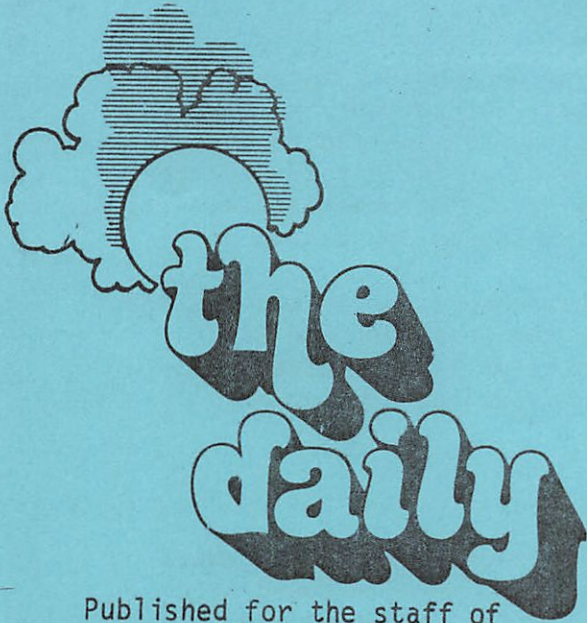

A GRADUATION BANQUET honoring some 450 recipients of degrees and certificates will wind up a week of pinning, capping and recognition ceremonies for LCC graduates. The banquet is replacing the traditional cap and gown affair and is free to the graduates.

Master of ceremonies will be Dr. Robert Hamill, acting president at Lane in 1968-69 and president-elect of Whatcom Community College in Washington. Other speakers are: President Eldon Schafer, Board Chairman Catherine Lauris, and Student Body President Omar Barbarossa. The College stage band and swing choir will perform at the dinner.

Preceding the dinner, the LCC baroque orchestra will present a concert at 2 p.m. in Forum 301-2.

Separate capping ceremonies were held for the Associate Degree Nursing students and pinning ceremonies honored graduating students from the three dental programs. Adult Basic Education students and early childhood education students were recognized at receptions.

SECOND ELECTION SET: Local voters may be balloting on an unchanged college budget July 18, judging from opinions expressed at Wednesday's board meeting. Both board member Richard Freeman and chairman Catherine Lauris appeared to favor re-submitting the same \$894,682 levy which was defeated in the May 23 election.

The board set the date for a second election and asked the administration to bring its recommendations on the amount of the levy for discussion and action at the next regular board meeting, June 14.

The board also ratified with one exception the economic items in the 1972-73 salary-fringe benefits package. It referred back to the president and SPPC for clarification an item pertaining to summer faculty pay when confusion arose over whether it provided that summer faculty be paid at the current pay schedule or the 1972-73 rate.

BOARD/SPPC WORK SESSION SUMMARY, cont. from Thursday

Nine items, ranging from staff evaluation to part-time faculty contracts, were discussed by the Board, SPPC, and other interested staff during a Board/SPPC work session last week. Following is a summary of the SPPC position and reactions from the Board and staff.

- #2 **JOB DESCRIPTIONS FOR CLASSIFIED POSITIONS:** The SPPC pointed out that present classified job descriptions are in many cases sketchy and no longer fit the present job requirements. "Smooth transition by employees from one position to another and valid evaluation are all hindered by uncertainties about skills required by various jobs and training necessary to move from one job to another," it said. The SPPC acknowledged that a classified section committee has been formed to begin developing new job descriptions and proposed that the board encourage the president to allot \$600 to hire a personnel planner to help the committee initiate the study. It also recommended that the board authorize two full days of in-service time so final descriptions can be developed between committee members and supervisors.

REACTIONS: Member Robert Mention said the board had requested that job descriptions be written or re-written a year ago and that he wants to be sure the matter "doesn't get lost again." Dr. Brauer said he couldn't support a \$600 expense in light of the current budget situation. The Board suggested that on-campus personnel begin the re-writing of job descriptions and report their progress to the board.

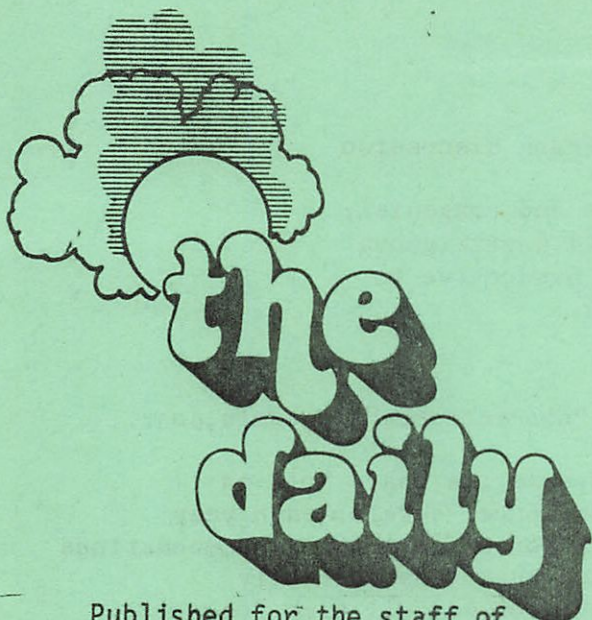
- #3 **TAKING CLASSES DURING WORK DAY:** The SPPC proposed that the board affirm that an employee's lunch hour is his own time and may be used for taking classes. It further proposed that guidelines be established allowing classified staff to take classes at other hours during their work day if the classes directly apply to "on-the-job skills or to skills required for a specific on-campus job for which the employee wishes to prepare."

REACTIONS: The board generally agreed that employees may use their lunch hour as they wish but opposed releasing them from work to take classes at other times during the day.

- #5 **WORK LOAD AND CLASS SIZE:** The SPPC proposed that every fall term immediately after the release of the fourth week enrollment report the faculty section submit a report on work load per instructor directly to the board.

REACTIONS: Both the board and administration representatives agreed this is a good idea.

The following report was submitted by Language Arts Chairman John Howard in summary of the informal session of Board members and department chairmen and directors.

The meeting of department chairmen and directors with the Board Wednesday evening did not produce any startling or even conclusive results. Nobody expected that it would. Discussion topics centered around the role of department chairmen, and the respective roles of the Board and the College administration. The feeling that chairmen are expected by different people to perform tasks that are different and sometimes contradictory was generally agreed upon. It is hoped the June 12-16 workshop will help to resolve the problem. One department chairman presented a written statement which expressed a feeling, shared by some others, that chairmen do not have the authority necessary to perform the role expected of them by the Office of Instruction. Several Board members concurred that they often become embroiled in matters that should be resolved by administrative action. For example, there was general agreement that some, if not all, of the 9 items presented by the SPPC at the recent Board work session should simply have been referred back to the President for decision. Several Board members expressed a feeling of frustration and helplessness because of the seemingly unavoidable long hours they spend in fruitless discussion of non-policy matters, or in listening to aggravated persons, sometimes students, who have already had answers to their questions but do not fancy the answers they have received. To this reporter, two conclusions emerged rather clearly: first, the Board is hampered in its effectiveness by a down-the-middle split which most often occurs along the lines of basic philosophical differences. Second, Board members and college personnel are less wary of each other than they have been in

the past and are more willing to engage in frank discussion without a great deal of parrying. The general tone of the meeting was positive and congenial. It is this reporter's feeling that almost all participants thought the meeting useful at the least and productive to a degree that will become more evident later.

SPPC/BOARD WORK SESSION--summary of reactions to SPPC "non-economic" proposals, cont.

#9 FULL TIME FACULTY NOT UNDER CONTRACT: The SPPC proposed the board hold an additional personnel session each year following voter approval of the budget for consideration of contract recommendations not accepted prior to the budget vote. The SPPC asked that "any currently employed full time faculty not under contract who have worked full time for two years (including the current year) be offered contracts if their present positions will be open in the coming year."

REACTIONS: Mechanics Chairman Mel Gaskill commented that the "agony" people in this position (full time faculty without contracts) are often put through "is not really understood." He acknowledged that this situation has resulted from the college's economic pressures. Dr. Schafer pointed out that contracts can be offered only to people the college can afford to hire under the tax base. Dean Case commented he feels all persons being considered for a contract, whether they are new applicants for a position or have been teaching without contract, should go through the faculty selection process and compete with others seeking the same position.

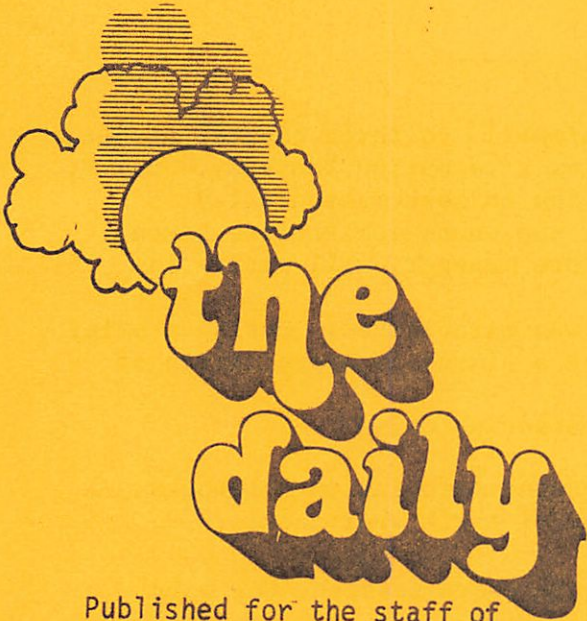
#10 STAFF PARTICIPATION IN CHANGING BOARD

POLICY AND ADMINISTRATIVE RULE: The SPPC presented a proposed policy statement providing for this participation and the Board agreed to put it on the agenda for discussion at a future board meeting.

#11 STAFF REDUCTION: The SPPC proposed that the board direct development of a department by department seniority list as a basic guide for making staff reductions if necessary. It also asked that further guidelines be developed to outline procedures to be followed if an entire program is eliminated and stating "employee options to choose different jobs on campus, guidelines for rehiring terminated staff in proper order as jobs open again, and procedures for explaining why seniority is not followed in terminations if it cannot be for good reason."

REACTIONS: Dr. Schafer said the college is working on this matter through the Priorities Review Committee and that guidelines for "emergency limitation" will be coming from the PRC through the Cabinet and Instructional Council. He commented that "seniority would be only one of several considerations" in determining the guidelines since "the board might set program priorities" and other stipulations that would affect staff reduction procedures.

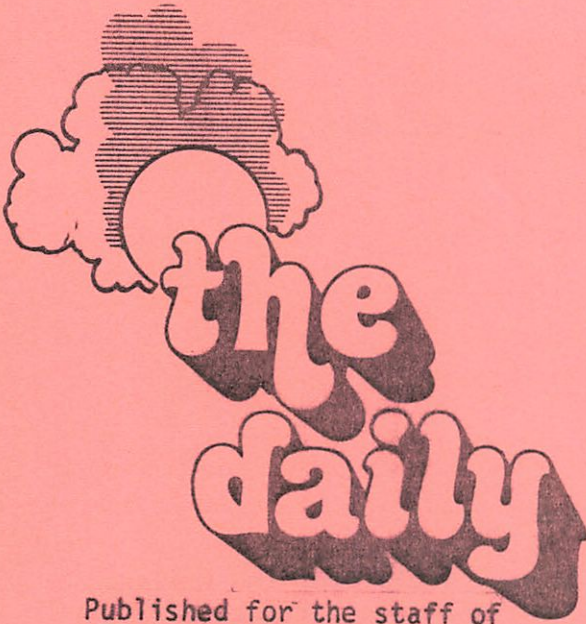
All three have been on the staff since the College was established. During a brief ceremony at 1:30 p.m., Dr. Schafer will present each a plaque in appreciation of their service to the College.

THE FLIGHT training program at LCC has become the first one in Oregon to be granted licensing authority for private pilots by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). This means that students training for a private pilot's license at the College will no longer be required to take a flight licensing test with a FAA examiner. Instead they will be recommended for licensing after successfully completing the College's private pilot training program and passing an FAA written examination. This usually occurs at the end of the first year of the two year Flight Technology program.

The new licensing authority was announced last week by W.L. Hawk, supervisor of the General Aviation District Office in Eugene. At a special ceremony, he presented Flight Technology head Ron Byers with an Air Agency Certificate establishing the program as an FAA approved training school with private pilot licensing authority.

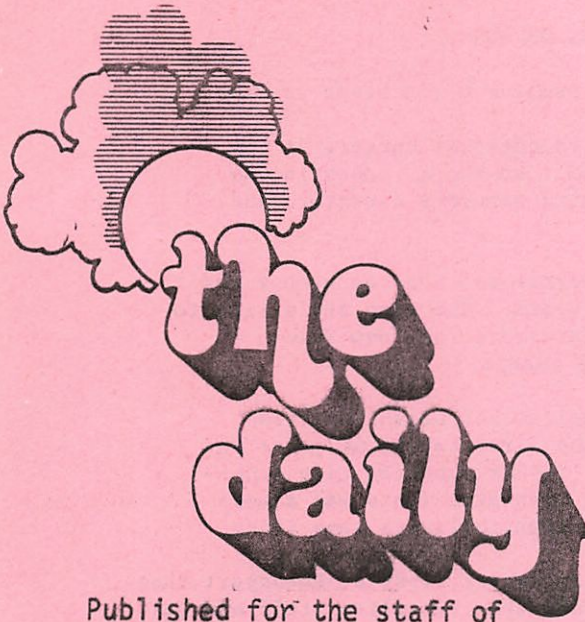

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PAY AT OLD RATE - Summer Term teaching beyond normal contract provisions will be paid at a rate of 33 1/3 percent (up from 30) of the faculty member's contract for the past year, prorated according to credit hours taught. LCC's Board of Education at a special meeting Wednesday night rejected the SPPC's contention that salary should be based on the fiscal year in which work is performed. The committee had pointed out that all except about two weeks of the 1972 Summer Term will be conducted during the 1972-73 FY.

The SPPC held a special caucus immediately after the Board's decision last night. Here is a statement by Chairman Ted Romoser:

The SPPC does not feel it can, in principle, accept the Board's motion of last night indicating that summer pay should be based on 33 1/3 % of the previous fiscal year's salary schedule. (This does not include the step increase earned at the end of Spring Term.) However, the SPPC does not intend to invoke the impasse procedure provided for in the negotiation procedures. The SPPC is not invoking impasse procedures for a number of reasons. First, the committee believes the overall negotiating procedure has produced benefits for staff and a working relationship of mutual respect between the Board and staff representatives. Second, the SPPC feels the Board did fairly weigh the various factors to be considered from its point of view, and under pressure, made its decision. The committee decided that since a formal negotiating situation could not be maintained, that at some point even unilateral Board action should be at least temporary accepted.

LCC's ANNUAL FUND campaign is under way among the business and industrial community. Volunteers are approaching prospects in person and by phone. In addition some 1700 alums are receiving a mailing to elicit support. Some staff members have inquired regarding their role in the campaign. Today's campus mail contains a brochure and pledge envelope which explain the opportunities of participating. Two faculty members, Howard Bird, SSLC director and Counselor Helene Stadler, have already pledged membership in the Leadoff/Century Club.

THREE STAFF MEMBERS RETIRING

'EASY LIFE' NOT FOR PAULINE, ELLENE, OR ADA

FROM LCC COUNSELOR to LCC student. That's the route Pauline Dixon plans to take following her retirement this month.

She is among three female staff members ending their educational careers at the college this year who will be honored at a reception from 1 to 3 p.m. today in the cafeteria. The others are Ellene Goldsmith, Student Health Services director, and Ada Zinser, Bookstore manager.

Pauline's plans to enroll at LCC next fall are no surprise to those on campus who know her as an "eternal optimist" with a variety of interests. She says she'd like to take anthropology and body conditioning and is looking forward to her new role.

"I'm always tickled to do something different. I like change."

A native Oregonian, Pauline started out to be a journalist but began "drifting toward education" during her senior year at the U of O. She first taught 44 years ago at Prairie City. Following her marriage to Homer Dixon (former Junction City superintendent who died in 1968) she continued teaching along with him. (This was almost "unheard of in those days," she recalls.) Then family responsibilities came along and she "retired" to raise a son and daughter.

Twenty years later, she resumed her teaching-counseling career, first at Reedsport, then at Elmira High School. When LCC opened in 1965, she joined the counseling staff and has been here since.

"I think more exciting things have happened in my lifetime than in centuries before," she commented, recalling the introduction of radio, TV, and "talking movies." She has seen new strides in medicine developed and changes in American morality. How has the latter affected her? "I look at it as progress. Some things may be wrong, but if so, we'll find out. When I'm able to change, I feel pretty good about it."

NOT SO OPTIMISTIC about retiring is Ellene "Goldie" Goldsmith, Student Health Services director. "It's just killing me to leave. It's like leaving my home."

She has had a key to this "home" since 1957 when she was a practical nursing instructor at the Old Eugene Vocational School, LCC's predecessor. When the college was established, Ellene became division chairman of Nursing, Home Economics, and Dental Assistant training. Two years later, she set up the associate degree nursing program and became its acting director for a year before assuming her current position.

Since graduating from the University of Minnesota nursing school 40 years ago, Ellene has worked as a nurse all but four years (the time it takes to deliver four babies). One of those years was at the start of World War II. She smilingly recalls her husband being called into duty and she taking over his job. "I probably was the first and last pregnant principal in Roberts Wisconsin!"

One of six children of Icelandic immigrants, Ellene hopes to find time during her retirement to travel to Iceland and translate children's stories. "There's a vast library in the Icelandic language that has never been translated into English."

But for the immediate future, she'd like to remain active in nursing. One possibility she's investigating is an association of retired persons in medicine that sends its members around the country to assist schools starting medical programs.

ADA ZINSER is not quite ready to think of packing up her LCC bags since she's not retiring until Sept. 15. But she probably feels a bit nostalgic already when she looks at her fine facility today and recalls first operating the bookstore through a "pass through" window on the Monroe campus and later sorting books in the "dope" (painting) room in the Mechanics building on the present campus.

Although Ada has worked in bookstore operations for 28 years, she originally trained to be a teacher. However, after teaching third and fourth grades in Coburg for two years and first grade in Albany for 13 years, she became interested in a business career and left teaching to attend Northwestern School of Commerce. From there she took a job at the University of Oregon Co-Op, working and then managing the textbook section for 21 years. When LCC needed to establish a bookstore, she was picked for the job.

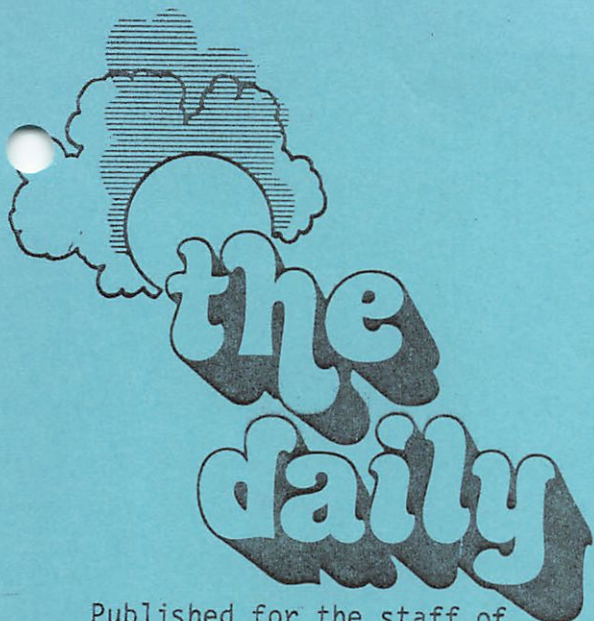
Will she be sorry to leave LCC? "Yes and No," was her reply. "It has been exciting and rewarding to start a bookstore from scratch. But it will also be nice to be relieved of some of the pressures of the job."

Following her retirement, Ada plans to remain in Eugene, "loaf awhile," and perhaps "dig out" some of the projects she's wanted to do but hasn't found time for in the past.

ALL THREE RETIRING staff members said they would be leaving LCC with many fond memories of their association with the school and its staff. Perhaps Ellene summed up their feelings best: "I remember Bill Cox asking me back in 1968: Goldie, do you think this (LCC and the new campus) is really going to be what we expect of it?"

"Yes. Absolutely."

In this age of impersonality, attention from a teacher means a great deal and in many cases may make a difference in the student's future.

Ralph Cook, Chairman of the Classified Section of LCC Staff Association, has this to report on the meeting with the Board of Education Wednesday evening, June 7:

Classified representatives met with the Board members in an informal discussion Wednesday, June 7, in the Staff Lounge. The talks mainly involved operational problems of the college that the classified staff must work with. Most prevalent item was maintenance of the overall campus - specifically, the manner in which budgetary matters are handled and in maintenance areas, and the fact that most departments are under-staffed. The Board members listened and were receptive to the problems existing in these areas, especially in light of the fact the college, by virtue of age, has an increased maintenance problem each year (i.e., aging building, equipment, etc.). At the present rate, maintenance is starting to become less effective as the present staff attempts to keep pace with the increased work load and limited materials budgets. The Board members felt the taxpayers should become more involved with the campus, so as to become acquainted with not only the instructional areas but also the immense inventory of equipment and buildings that must be maintained, to get a clearer picture of the budget costs of the school. In this light it was suggested and accepted by the Board members that the Board later this summer take a tour of various maintenance areas and see the facilities and equipment which are representative of campus: i.e., tunnels, T-V studio, building deterioration, maintenance shops, etc.

Other items that were discussed were poor working conditions (i.e., heating, office equipment, etc.) in some areas of campus, and increased workloads for some personnel on staff with no relief apparently in sight.

In closing the meeting a unified discussion of the entire group took place and general conclusions were made; although no solutions were offered by the Board they agreed to look into the problems presented. Both staff and Board members thanked each other for these discussions and stated they felt they were beneficial and looked forward to next year's meeting.

From Keith Harker, Director LRC

In order to help the Learning Resource Center increase the availability of materials to the students and staff of Lane Community College, your cooperation with the following procedures will be most appreciate:

- 1/ Unless special arrangements are made, all books will be on a loan basis of two, three, or four weeks..
- 2/ Special arrangement materials are due on or before the end of each term.
- 3/ Any books or materials not acceptably accounted for will be billed (at full cost) to the person or department responsible, whichever applies. This billing will be handled through the main Business Office.

From Bill Cox, Director College Facilities

I have just analyzed the telephone bills and have found that we are making an extremely large number of person-to-person calls. Again, the telephone company tells us that this is an expensive way of doing it. A station-to-station direct dial will cost approximately 1/3 the amount that a person-to-person call will cost, considering the time and the rate. You could make three station-to-station calls for the same amount of money as one person-to-person call.

Pre-commercial Art Program will be offered at LCC beginning with fall term 1972. Plans are to coordinate the program with the curriculum of the Oregon College of Art (OCA) in Medford, the only four-year commercial art school in Oregon. Students could complete the first two years of their commercial art training at LCC before transferring to OCA. The Medford school has been housed in temporary quarters since its establishment about a year ago, but a permanent campus is being built in Ashland.

"Brown Bag College": PRESIDENT SCHAFER received the following communication from Mr. R.B. Phillips of Weyerhaeuser Company. This is only one of the complimentary responses received as a consequence of the "brown bag" classes offered during the academic year just ended:

Dear Dr. Schafer:

Several of Weyerhaeuser Company's employees have recently completed one or two accounting courses which, as you know, were taught in our conference room at lunch time. To have taken these courses on LCC's campus would have been a hardship for most of these students; so much so that few would have been able to complete the courses.

The excellent quality of instruction and the enthusiastic attitude of Mr. Jim Evans certainly insured the success of the courses. Our employees had numerous compliments about Mr. Evans. Personally, I liked his businesslike approach to the students--this will beneficially affect the attitudes of most toward their present and future jobs.

The employees who completed the accounting courses are much better qualified in most instances to handle their current and near-future jobs. Their present and future earnings potential has been increased, too. Some will now continue more advanced courses on the campus. (In this respect, the number might be increased with acceptable class scheduling. Jim Evans has some ideas on this.)

We have also held some exploratory discussions with Mr. Evans about other courses which could be taught at Weyerhaeuser's office in the fall or winter term.

On behalf of the students and myself, I wish to express our sincere appreciation to Mr. Evans, to you, and to Lane Community College for making these courses so conveniently available to us. We also appreciate and respect the instructional excellence of LCC and your sincere interest in meeting the needs of your students and the community.

Cabinet Meeting of June 13 was cancelled in order to permit administrative work on a revised budget to be presented to the Board at tonight's meeting. The next meeting of the Cabinet will be June 20.

Symposium on Chemistry: The chemistry staffs of Lane and Linn-Benton community colleges will co-host a symposium on chemistry in the two-year college Friday and Saturday, June 16 and 17, at the Oregon State University campus in Corvallis. The symposium, which is offered in conjunction with the Northwest Regional American Chemical Society meeting, is expected to attract more than 100 attendees from 8 or 9 western states. The symposium will open formally at 2 p.m. Friday afternoon and continue through the evening and Saturday morning. STEVE JOHN and CHARLIE BENTZ will chair individual sections; and MABEL ARMSTRONG is General Chairman for the symposium.

Exemplary Career Education: LCC will be mentioned in a coming AAJC journal article as an institution having exemplary career education programs. The article is being prepared in the U.S. Office of Education under the supervision of Marie Y. Martin, director of community college education, and is an outgrowth of conversations Dr. Martin had with President Schafer here and at Dallas, Texas.

Amount of the Levy to be put to voters July 18 will be set at tonight's Board meeting. A budget cut of \$100,000 has been discussed as a possibility by the President and line officers. Besides various housekeeping matters, the Board will hear reports from JOE SEARL on geography instruction, TOM LICHTY on KLCC-FM, DICK EYMANN on July 18 budget election plans; and will discuss a Food Technology Advisory Committee report which suggests that the second year Foods Craftsmanship program be started or the first year discontinued. The meeting starts at 7:30 p.m. in the Board room.

Student Housing: 80 units of the apartments built exclusively for students of LCC will be ready for occupancy June 17. The 160-unit complex is located at 475 Lindale Drive, Springfield. Rent rates are: \$95.50-one bedroom; \$116.50-two bedrooms; \$131.50-three bedrooms, and are available furnished for as low as \$12/month for a one-bedroom set. Recreation facilities, playground areas and equipment, and appliances are among the features attractive to young student families.

Position Vacancy - Specialist, Agribusiness Education: The Division of Instructional Services/OBE is accepting applications for an Education Program Specialist in Agribusiness Education. This position is to replace the one held by Curtis Leowen and being temporarily filled by Burr Fancher and a decision must be made by July 1. The committee has until July 1, 1973 to develop guidelines for community college personnel policy formulation. This committee is the outgrowth of a 1971 legislative directive to the State Board to adopt guidelines for the orderly development and management of community colleges, including guidelines for formulation of personnel policies and the filing of same with the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Last Night's Board Meeting: A levy of \$787,514 will be placed before voters at the July 18 LCC election. Board members Wednesday night approved the cutting of \$95,916 from the earlier budget request to get the estimated tax rate for LCC down to \$1.60 per \$1,000 true cash value. The rate is a nickel below that nixed by voters May 23, but a dime above this year's rate. It represents an increase of \$2 next year in total LCC taxes for the owner of a home assessed at \$20,000 - or only 80¢ more than the \$20,000 homeowner paid three years ago.

President Schafer told the Board that the May 23 request "was a sound and accurate reflection of the funds needed to maintain a quality and diversified program." At the same time, the reduced request will permit "the basic integrity of college operations to remain intact."

Cuts included: 1/ \$4,185 from campus liability insurance, in line with the insurance agent of record's lower estimate of funds needed; 2/ \$10,000 from institutional loan interest costs, in recognition of sounder college cash flow conditions this year; 3/ \$3,231 from an overestimate of the president's salary and money that will not be paid to the director of institutional research during a leave of absence, plus a capital outlay item deletion from the office of institutional research; 4/ \$18,000 from funding for the VIP project, since this amount will now be paid by the State Board of Education; 5/ \$5,500 from publicity and printing for part of the catalog, campus color post cards, and Torch postage; 6/ \$12,000 from curriculum development, in recognition of recent awards under the program for the improvement of undergraduate instruction; 7/ \$7,000 from Adult Basic Education in recognition that state reimbursement can now be expected to meet this cost; 8/ \$36,000 for three instructional positions, in expectation that Emergency Employment Act funds will be available to fund these positions.

President Schafer will be off-campus today and Friday, June 15 and 16, attending a seminar on higher education in San Francisco. He will be in his office again on Monday, the 19th.

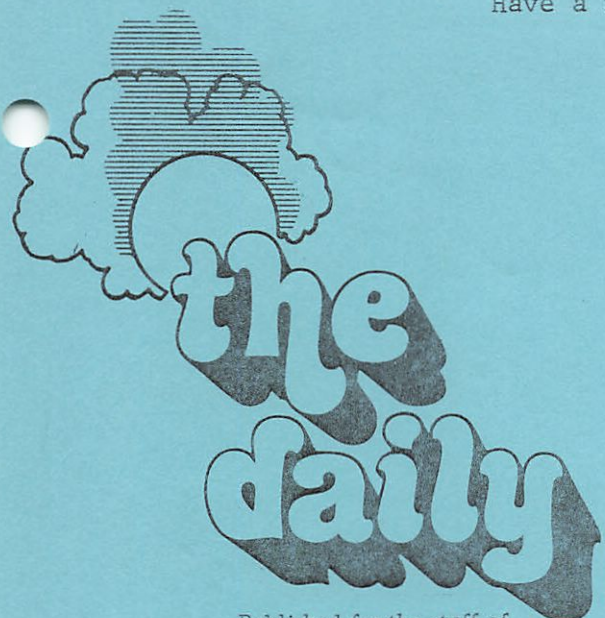

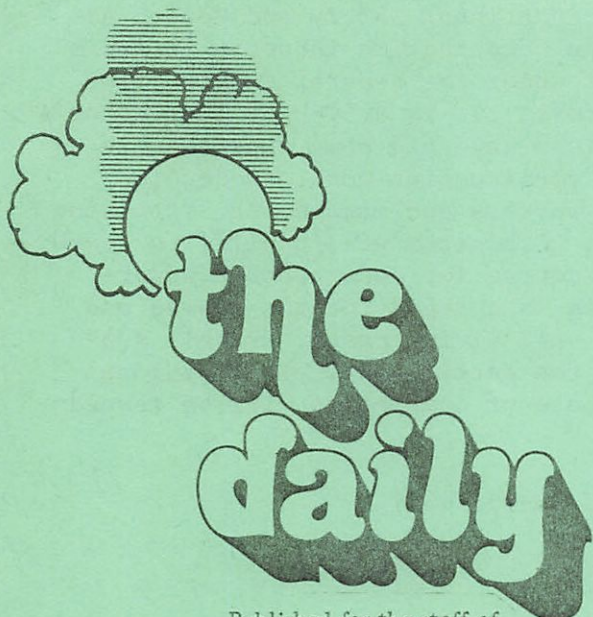

Review of Guidelines for Issuance of Incomplete Grade: Bob Marshall suggests it may be timely to review the administrative guidelines controlling issuance of "incompletes":

An "incomplete" is used:

- 1/ to replace the lower grade when a student elects to repeat a course. In order to implement this option a student must initiate a petition in the Registrar's Office requesting the change.
- 2/ when an unavoidable absence occurs near the end of the term and arrangements have been made with the instructor to complete the work during a pre-determined period of time not to exceed one year. Incompletes should be student initiated. Incompletes that are not made up in the time and manner prescribed by the instructor remain on the transcript as an I.

The Veteran's Administration will pay for an incomplete but the student would be expected to complete the work and change it to a grade as soon as possible; the GI Bill pays for class attendance for a grade.

If the student does not expect to get a grade in the class at a later date, it would be better to get a withdrawal from the class so he would be free to re-take the class. (The GI Bill will pay for a class only once when credit has been received, regardless of the grade.)

A student is paid for a class up to the date of withdrawal, so it is necessary that this date be on file in the veteran's folder and then the VA can be notified accordingly.

The Department Chairmen's Workshop will re-convene in the Board Room on Wednesday, June 21, at 1:30 p.m. to finish consideration of the rough draft of the proposed job descriptions for the chairman positions.

Announcement from the U.S. Department of Labor: The Occupational Safety and Health Administration conducts a Safety and Health Course for the construction industry in implementing the responsibilities of the Department of Labor under the Federal Construction Act. The course is now available for Academic Instructors. It is a 40-hour Instructor's Course, topically and substantively designed for those who have had some expertise in training, inspection, safety, or similar activities in construction work, to develop their ability to present safety and health training to workers and management, stressing the importance of recognition and reduction of hazards. Graduates will qualify to teach the Department of Labor 30-hour course as an extension course for construction supervisors or it could be included in the curricula. No fee is charged for the course and no personal facilities are provided by the Department. All living costs, travel, subsistence, and other expenses are the responsibility of the participant. Instructional materials will be available for purchase and a certificate of completion will be issued to each graduate.

PURPOSE: This tax levy will allow Lane Community College to meet operating expenses above its lawful tax base of \$1,786,524. The levy will enable the College to operate at approximately the same level of enrollment as that experienced during the 1971-72 college year.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECTS: If this measure is approved the operating budget to be financed by local taxes for the tax year 1972-73 will be \$348,655 greater than the operating budget financed by local taxes for the preceding year.

State Superintendent Dale Parnell has named a Klamath Indian with 16 years teaching experience to assist the Oregon Board of Education's effort to improve Indian education in the state's public elementary and secondary schools and community colleges. He is Morrie Jiménez, 39. In naming Jiménez, Parnell said one of the Board's top instructional priorities is improving education for the economically and culturally disadvantaged. "As sincere as we are in this area, we found the best way to take leadership in developing Indian curriculum and programs was to ask one of their own to lead the effort." Jiménez also will serve as a resource for the State Intergroup Human Relations Commission established by the State Board of Education in 1968 to assess the special educational needs of minority groups; determine how well existing programs are meeting those needs, and recommend alternatives for further improvement.

Jiménez spent the 1971-72 school year on the faculty of North Salem High School, teaching social studies and coaching gymnastics and football. He has also taught, coached, and counseled at Lincoln Elementary School, Medford, 1955-57; Glendale High School, 1958-60; Oakridge High School, 1960-61; Judson Junior High School, Salem, 1961-65; Whitaker Junior High School, Salem, 1965-66; McNary High School, Salem, 1966-69, and Chiloquin High School, 1969-71.

These discussion are open to the public without charge and include such intriguing subject titles as: "Do We Feed Our Pets Better Than We Do Our Own Children?" and "What Is the Difference Between Biological and Chronological Age?"

Economies of Education, a report made by the New York consulting firm of Cresap, McCormick and Paget, Inc. for the President's Commission on School Finance, asserts that the nation's schools could cut the total school bill by as much as 11% by implementing cost-saving measures now used successfully by many local districts. The report pinpointed differentiated staffing as a major way to reduce costs while maintaining high quality education. Under this arrangement, senior and master teachers work with teams of teachers, beginning teachers and aides to help the student proceed at his own individual pace. Adopting the differentiated staffing technique nationwide could reduce salary costs by more than 12%, the report said.

Other possible economies cited: Centralized or cooperative purchasing of supplies and equipment, and annual contracts with suppliers; more effective use of supportive services; and wise use and construction of school facilities. Basic to all the report's recommendations is firm state and federal action to help implement the economy measures.

Curriculum Committee Retreat: A report of the retreat just come to our desk indicates the following actions taken:

Review of committee's functions - no changes suggested.

New members for 1972-74 term, Milt Madden and Henry Naessens, were introduced. A member suggested that in cases where a current member could not attend meetings, a replacement be appointed from the previous year(s) membership. To this the committee agreed. The associate deans agreed that they themselves should make every possible effort to attend committee meetings.

Chairman Leland Halberg urged members to do more backup work before coming to the meetings. He commented that the report from the Priorities Review Committee contained statements which indicated they were not familiar with the Guidelines for Curriculum Development handbook. Concern was expressed that not all department chairmen and faculty were perfectly familiar with the procedures in the handbook. A suggestion was made "that there be some in-service training for department secretaries on the curriculum process, since they are the people faculty usually go to for information."

In other action, policy of the Oregon Board of Education calling for three letters of acceptance from four-year institutions for all new LDC course proposals was discussed; clarifications of Board Policy 6133, particularly interpretation of the words "reviewed periodically" was recommended; and the committee concurred that "it should be the Curriculum Secretary's responsibility to keep updated course descriptions in the course approval files, and once too many updates have been made the secretary should bring it to the attention of the associate deans." The committee and the associate deans saw a need to have a routing slip on curricula proposals and the Curriculum Secretary was asked to develop such a slip for the deans and the committee chairman's approval.

Dean Rasmussen presented retiring members Leland Halberg, Rick Romanek, and Margaret Milne with plaques of commendation for their effort and hard work on the committee.

"Taming of the Shrew" has been done locally in the musical version by Cole Porter, known as "Kiss Me, Kate". . .and that's a good show too.

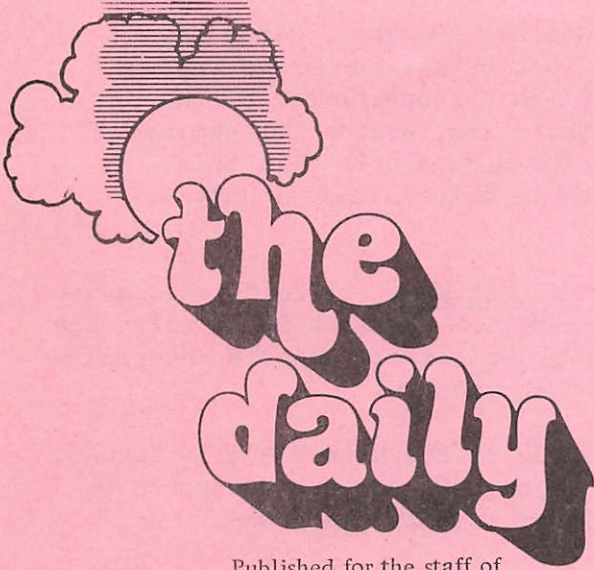

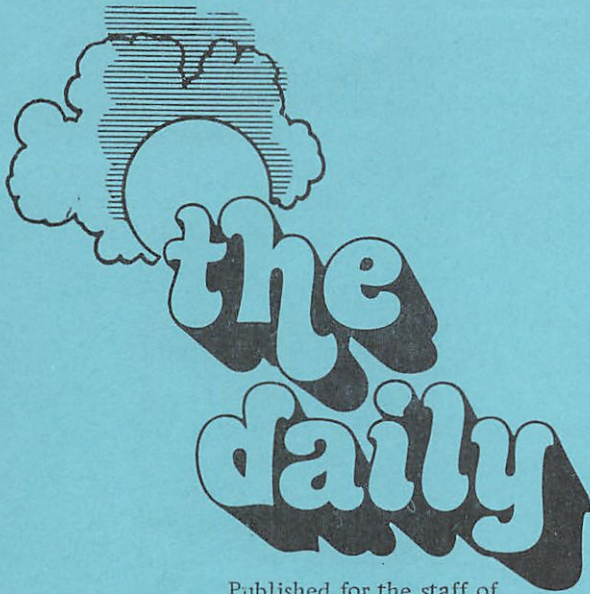
