

NOTICE OF VACANCY is being circulated for Associate Dean of Instruction to take the position vacated by Dr. LaGrandeur. The Associate Dean is a major line officer having charge of an instructional division of eight to ten departments. He would be responsible to the Dean of Instruction for delegated functions related to staffing, budgeting, developing curriculum, scheduling, evaluating personnel, reporting and performing a variety of staff functions. The person selected will need to have had successful administrative experience, preferably in a community college; understand the fundamentals of budget development and control; possess at least a master's degree in a field related to programs offered at LCC and preferably related to an occupational area; have a background of training and experience as a vocational educator; and possess better than average communications skills, with ability to relate well to a wide spectrum of people.

Salary will be in the \$15,500 to \$19,500 range, depending upon the experience and training of the person selected. Applications will close September 8.

LCC'S BOARD OF EDUCATION is expected to decide the fate Wednesday night of Prof. Ben Kirk's proposed course, Science in Your Life: Explorations in Survival on a Small Planet. The public meeting will begin at 7:30 in Adm. 202.

The President, Dean of Instruction, and Instructional Council recommend disapproval. Contrary to Prof. Kirk's argument at the July 8 Board meeting, they state that transferability of the course to other colleges was never an issue. Dean Lewis Case summed up the Instructional Council feeling in a June 20 memo to the President:

One basic issue revolved around the problem of adding an instructor to the curriculum rather than a course. Most everyone recognizes that each instructor brings something unique to any course; however, most courses have enough designated content that other instructors can teach it. The developer stated that he wishes to use the course outline requested by the Council as a point of departure rather than as a guide for the content of the course. Judging from reactions to his comments and remarks which I have heard since, Council members concluded that the departure would be along political lines rather than scientific ones. The developer also indicated clearly that he considered himself as one of the learners rather than as their guide. Although those who voted against the proposal did not state their reasons,

it seems to me that their attitudes changed from support for the concept to opposition toward adding a particular instructor to the curriculum.

A second basic issue concerned accountability and a basis for judging the worth or outcome for the course. Council members could not determine how to choose between this proposed course and others which might be proposed course. Neither was there any suggestion that student learning would be measured or that they would be held accountable for any specific content. It appeared that the adoption of the proposed course would allow one instructor and his students to be free from accountability while others are required to teach and learn specific content.

TONIGHT'S BOARD MEETING: A large student contingent is expected to appear in support of Prof. Ben Kirk and his course, Science in Your Life. Also: Continuing appointments are to be part of the executive session. The Daily will try to run the list tomorrow or the next day.

NEED TO BROADEN participation on the various College committees was discussed, Tuesday by the Cabinet. President Schafer suggested that the College should "try to involve as many people as possible," perhaps by limiting staff to membership on one committee at a time, where practicable. A small group of superleaders has in the past found itself serving on several important committees simultaneously.

NO FOURTH ASSOCIATE DEAN this year. In other Cabinet business, Staff Association President Steve John declared himself in opposition to the possibility of a fourth instructional dean, as suggested by an organizational chart to be reviewed by the Board of Education. John said he's not convinced there's a need. Presidential Assistant Bert Dotson explained that the position appears on the organizational chart because the Board authorized it several years ago. But the position never has been funded. "Be assured there won't be one (fourth associate dean) this year," said President Schafer, who indicated he shares John's negative feelings.

SCIENCE BUILDING PARKING LOT has a chain across the entry, the Cabinet learned. Parking will no longer be permitted there, Plant Supervisor Walt Van Orden told the Daily this morning. "It never was a parking lot," he explained. People started parking there during construction of the Science Building and just never got out of the habit. "So much dirt and mud was tracked into the building that it doubled the custodial work," Van Orden said. Plenty of parking is now available in the paved lots.

GOVERNOR TOM McCALL to President Schafer:

Thank you for the important contribution made by you and representatives of your school in educating and informing the public of Oregon's new homeowners' property tax relief law.

Undoubtedly, hundreds of homeowners who might not have otherwise learned of this new law benefited as a result of the informational sessions which you conducted in your area.

To my knowledge, our program to inform the public was unique, not only in the comprehensiveness of the involvement of all the news media, organizations, and volunteer groups, but also in utilizing the resources of the community colleges.

I am certain that the homeowners who benefited through your efforts appreciated the public service furnished to them by their local tax supported community colleges and that they would join me in saying, "Thanks a lot for a job well done."

Governor McCall is referring to the series of "homeowners property tax relief clinics" given by the LCC Office of Community Services working jointly with the Lane County Tax Assessor's Office which ran through January, February, and early March of this year. In all, 38 clinics were held, at such locations as Jasper Grange, Oakridge High, Celeste Campbell, Swisshome Evangelical Church, Empire Kiwanis, Sheldon Meadow Community Center. . .in fact, anywhere the local communities requested. A group leader from the assessor's office (usually Mr. Parkhurst or his assistant, Mr. Bishop) and one from LCC conducted the meeting, and a student from LCC went with them to handle the showing of the explanatory film supplied by the state.

PROF. BEN KIRK will teach five sections of Science in Your Life during Fall Term, under scrutiny of evaluators from both inside and outside LCC. The Board of Education last night approved offering the new course by a 4-2 vote. Board members Lauris, Ackerman, Reid, and Freeman voted in favor; Barber and Mention voted against. Dr. Brauer was not present.

Those on the prevailing side argued that the course should be offered on its own merits, regardless of who teaches it, and that it should be considered separately from the personality of its originator. The counter argument was that the course proposal was personalized to the extent that the course and its originator-instructor could not be separated.

Evaluations from an outside person or persons (perhaps science educators from 4-year State System institutions), along with those from LCC Administrators, are to be reviewed by the Board at the end of Fall Term. Both the course and its instructor are to be evaluated, the Board said.

Board member Ackerman predicted that the course "will be a popular one," and that it should be given its chance. Board member Lauris argued that "one can't judge a course before it has been offered" and that every new course is offered on an experimental basis.

In other business, the Board approved five-year continuing appointments for 39 faculty members and hired three faculty members for the Paradental/Paramedical Department. Douglas G. White, 31, from the U. of Houston faculty, will be department chairman. He has a D.Ed. from the U. of Oregon and has taught for 9 years. Matthew P. Schubert, 24, a Sacred Heart Hospital therapist, will teach inhalation therapy. Charles H. Selleck, 39, a dental service coordinator at the Oregon State Penitentiary, will teach dental courses. He taught part-time at LCC this past year.

SPPC CHAIRMAN BILL SOLOMON reporting on his committee's meeting with the Board last evening:

The requested changes in the wording of Board Policy 4123.3, <u>Staff Personnel Policies</u> <u>Committee Organization Procedure</u> were adopted. The new wording will be:

In the event that a persistent disagreement develops over salaries or economic policies affecting personnel services, either the Board of Education or the Staff Personnel Policies Committee may request the appointment of consultants. Such a request shall be in writing and delivered to the other party. The consultant panel shall consist of a Board arbitrator, an SPPC arbitrator, and a third arbitrator chosen by the other two. If a consultant panel is appointed, they shall consult and report to both parties. The payment for such consultants shall be equally shared by both parties.

The Board has not made the decision as to whether they will hire a professional negotiator to negotiate for them, but SPPC will continue to develop its package and be ready to negotiate with whomever they appoint.

BOARD POLICY ON Executive Sessions was amended at last night's meeting as follows:

LAWRENCE MITCHELL of the Math Department has received an Oregon System of Mathematics Education (OSME) grant to spend the next year working on a statewide project to help improve the teaching of math. He will head a communications effort to help provide for a better exchange of teaching ideas among educators at elementary, secondary, and college levels. The project is also concerned with improving communications between the public and the mathematics education community. The Oregon Council of Teachers of Mathematics (OCTM) and the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (OMSI) are cooperating in the project.

The effort is part of a new cooperative approach involving state, local, private, and federal agencies. The Oregon System is being partially supported by \$1 million of National Science Foundation funds during the first year of a five-year program.

To Mrs. Gladys Belden, Chairman of the Home Economics Department, from Ruth Edwards, Community Resource Coordinator, Springfield City Council:

I cannot allow the 1971-72 school year to close without expressing my sincere appreciation to you and your department for the many instances of cooperation with community affairs.

From the time I began to serve on the Advisory Committee for the Child Development Center, I became aware of the unusual experience of working with your department. Your continual efforts on behalf of "4 C's" have been most productive; and the Child Development Center is becoming well-known for its high quality of training.

The special luncheon which introduced women in community leadership to the varied programs of your department was also my introduction to the "kits," which were prepared for use as home instruction for low-income mothers who cannot get away to attend college. My inquiry regarding use in the Oregon Women's Correction brought immediate response, and the volunteer aide's further prompt response allowed us to restore some waning interest to individualized instruction for women prisoners.

Previous to this experience, only men's programs were obtaining support. DCE funds had been withdrawn and the Newgate program was serving men only. Staff members in the Women's Center had been reduced to paths of least resistance. In my efforts to obtain college-level education classes for a Springfield inmate, your specialized program allowed me ingress for very profitable discussions. We were able to obtain the appointment of an Ad Hoc Committee to investigate conditions in general and expect to see their recommendation include emphasis on continuation of such education programs.

Now that the education needs and interests of women prisoners have been demonstrated, and Lane County's willingness to assist with educational endeavors has been likewise documented, a grant has been approved to provide . . .more and better rehabilitation programs . . .to replace long-term incarceration. The Newgate program may now include women also.

IN 81 TRAINING PROGRAMS over the past seven years, LCC has taught vocational skills to 2,256 clients of the Welfare Commission and Employment Service. Training programs have included: clerical, forestry, nurse aide, welding, basic education, gardening, gas engine repair, sales clerk, waiter, dental assisting, electrical appliance repair, home health aide, bookkeeping, fry cooking, building maintenance, optical tooling, carpentry, engineer aide, caster plastics.

In a news release, President Schafer estimated that LCC's work with economically disadvantaged persons "may well have saved over a million dollars in welfare and unemployment benefits." Dr. Schafer said that follow-up contacts with former students by LCC's Special Training Programs Department and the State Department of Employment indicate that "approximately 70 percent of all persons trained in these programs are still employed."

LCC's COOPERATIVE WORK EXPERIENCE program enrolled 173 students this summer, with earnings totalling \$231,533, as compared to 80 students earning \$72,000 during the summer of 1971. THE HONORABLE MARY RIEKE, who will speak at in-service on "Quality of Community College Teaching: Mediocre" has much to communicate on the subject of community colleges, their philosophy, and the kind of education to be offered by the community colleges. Mrs. Rieke served as Chairman of the National Advisory Council on Education Professions Development, established by Public Law 90-35 in June, 1967, which reported its findings and made recommendations to the President and to the Congress. The published report of the committee, called: "People for the People's College: Community-Junior College Staff Development Priorities for the 70's," has this to say:

This report will have served a useful purpose if general agreement can be developed concerning its major thrusts:

- . . .the community-junior college is a unique institution and has unique requirements.
- . . .chief among these requirements is that the training and development of personnel be designed with the special needs of these colleges in mind.
- . . .while there is a need for improvement in both the pre-service and inservice training of personnel for community-junior colleges, priority attention must be accorded in-service training.

AMERICAN EDUCATION August-September issue is now in print, carrying Dr. Marie Y. Martin's article, "Advancing Career Education," is which she cites LCC as one of six U.S. community colleges "illustrating the increasing interest in the career education concept." Dr. Martin commends LCC for its emphasis on individual instructional help, vocational instructional packages, open-entry/open-exit programs, and on-the-job work experience opportunities. "American education," she says, "is undergoing a major shift in direction" toward career education, but believes that the impact will not become apparent for some years.
