# OCTOBER 3

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AN AGREEMENT WAS SIGNED Monday afternoon, October 2, transferring ownership of Christensen's Resort, near Florence, to Lane Community College.

Donors James and Lorraine Christensen of Milwaukie, Oregon, deeded the property to LCC for use for educational purposes; or, if it is sold, to endow a scholarship fund.

The resort is located on the northeast side of Siltcoos Lake, about 13 miles south of Florence. The one-acre tract includes several cabins, a storage shed, general store, boat deck, and moorage. Its assessed value is in excess of \$20,000. The College will be studying the educational possibilities of the property in terms of its use for science, environmental and forestry classes.

The original contact for this valuable gift was made through Al Owens, Coordinator of the Florence educational program for LCC. Al worked with Lyle Swetland of the Development Office on the negotiations which were concluded yesterday. "It is an example of the kind of cooperation between staff and Development," said Lyle, "that can bring these exceptional benefits to LCC."

After concluding the legal formalities, Mr. and Mrs. Christensen were given a tour of the campus. They expressed pleasure with what they saw, and seemed to feel that their generous gift would be put to good use by the college.

After the business of the evening was concluded, outgoing President Claude Hough, with Mrs. Schafer's assistance, conducted a drawing for two prizes furnished by the Development Office. When the first number drawn turned out to be held by his good friend, Mr. Bill Bristow, Lyle Swetland did a quick switch and presented him with an electric hairsetter. Lyle and Mr. Bristow were fellow members of LCC's first Board of Education; and old LCC hands will recall that Mr. Bristow's need for help in hairsetting is minimal. However, like a good husband, Mr. Bristow gallantly handed over his prize to Mrs. Bristow. . .who expressed pleasure at the gift. # OCTOBER 6

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A FORMER EUGENE PHYSICIAN now practicing on the East Coast has been hired by students at Lane Community College to augment the present health service program at the LCC campus.

Dr. Thomas Redfield, who once helped lay the groundwork for White Bird Sociomedical Clinic in Eugene, was hired from funds paid solely by the Associated Students of Lane Community College. No tax money will be used for his salary or supportive services, other than the normal funds presently set aside for student health.

LCC currently has a policy of providing for two full-time nurses and a doctor to appear on campus four hours each week. Redfield will be available 20 hours a week.

The coordinator for student health services, John Loeber, said that Redfield was hired "to prevent and control communicative diseases and to help lighten the work load at the county health department."

Loeber emphasized that Redfield's presence is not meant to be in competition with local doctors, but simply to "keep people from missing out on their education because of illness, and to be on hand for bona fide emergencies."

Redfield is scheduled to arrive at LCC soon; in the meantime, a physician from White Bird will be here on Wednesday afternoons.

BADMINTON FANS, you can now play for free on specially scheduled nights. About 10 courts are being opened to the public Tuesday evenings through March in the main gymnasium, for open play in men's and women's singles and doubles. Shower facilities will be available, but players are asked to bring their own equipment, clothing, and towels.

## MONEY IN YOUR POCKET

When you are in the market for a new job, one of the most important factors which you should consider is what the company has to offer in the way of an employee benefit plan. You think of salary in terms of dollars in your pocket, and you should think of employees benefits in the same terms.

When you came to work for Lane Community College, you were informed that you would have (1) Major Medical Insurance, (2) Dental Insurance, (3) Long Term Disability Insurance, (4) Life Insurance and Accidental Death and Dismemberment, (5) Industrial Accident Insurance, and (6) Unemployment Insurance (classified only). You were told that your family could participate in the Medical, Dental, and Life Insurance programs, but you probably did not know what this meant to you in terms of dollars and cents.

Following are the amounts Lane Community College pays per employee per month in insurance premiums:

Major Medical	\$10.50
Dental	3.04
Long Term Disability	7.00*
Life Insurance and AD & D	3.50
Industrial Accident	.31
Drivers add	\$2.50
Aircraft personnel add	\$9.95
Custodians and Maint. add	\$3.52
Unemployment Insurance	6.98*

Therefore, if you are an average classified employee the monthly premiums paid for you would be \$31.33

If you are a faculty member the monthly premiums paid for you would be \$24.35

This is an additional non-taxed \$24.35 or \$31.33 in your pocket per month.

Should major illness befall you, the savings which the medical insurance plan provides for you could be phenomenal. The following are examples of the amounts saved by two employees on major medical expenses incurred in a one-year period:

Total Expenses	\$10,630.30
Total paid by insurance	\$8,858.59
Total paid by employee	\$1,771.71

The employee was saved \$8,858.71

Total expenses	\$7,604.37
Total paid by insurance	\$6,336.98
Total paid by employee	\$1,267.39

The employee saved \$6,336.98

For those employees whose medical expenses do not exceed the \$50.00 deductible per calendar year, or whose dental expenses do not exceed \$25.00 per calendar year, the maximum outlay which might have to be taken from their pockets for insurance would be \$75.00

Below is an example of benefits paid on Long Term Disability:

Classified employee off 16 mos. (and still receiving benefits of 2/3 salary)	\$4,551.28
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There are others, but space does not permit a complete listing.

Our Life Insurance policy has paid two claims of \$10,000 each on employees and three claims of \$2,000 each on dependents.

In addition, classified employees received \$17,594.00 in unemployment insurance benefits.

All this is dollars in your pocket.

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AGENDA FOR TODAY'S CABINET meeting includes discussion of criteria for salary placement; the Board meeting of October 11; and the re-written versions of the Board Policies on Personnel (4000 Series).

WALT VAN ORDEN is District Governor of Lions International District 36-R for 1972-73. Walt is one of four District Governors in the State of Oregon for the service club dedicated to sight conservation. His district can be pictured as the area bounded by Mt. Angel-Yoncalla-Reedsport-Lincoln City.

Walt informs us that Lions International is the largest service club in the world.

WE HAVE REACHED our goal of \$3,100 for the past two years," said President Schafer in his kickoff to the 1972-73 United Appeal drive on campus, "proving that Lane Community College is a true member of the community.

"By continued support of the United Appeal, LCC demonstrates its acceptance of responsibility in a time when many of our fellow citizens need help the most.

"I urge you all to join me in giving to the 1973 United Appeal campaign."

The President reminds all staff members that contributions are not only tax deductible, but are also payroll deductible. Arrangements have been made with Ida Lehmann, LCC Payroll Clerk, to make payroll deductions of up to six installments, running January through June, 1973. Thus, if you wish to contribute \$30 to this year's drive, and do it with as little financial pinch as possible, you simply check "payroll deduction. . .monthly. . .\$5" on the yellow pledge card, and Ida will take \$5 out of the paychecks for January, February, March, April, May, and June. Or she will take it out in one, or two, or three deductions; but no more than six. LCC's final report must be rendered at the end of the six-month period.

Pledge cards will be delivered to each department sometime today or tomorrow. As in the past, you may accompany your pledge with payment; you may indicate your preference for the payroll deduction; or you may specify your wish that UA bill you directly. Lyle Swetland is coordinating the drive, which will run through November 19.

AT YESTERDAY'S CABINET MEETING President Schafer presented the recently developed position paper bearing on placement of personnel on the salary schedules. Discussion centered on the establishment of clear definitions of "professional," "para-professional," "aides," etc., along with the concept of paying for the job performed, rather than the degrees earned.

Agenda items were reviewed for tonight's Board meeting. These were given in The Daily of October 4.

The proposed revision of Board Policy Series 4100 (All Personnel) was presented. This is being circulated for final review before presentation to the Board. Since it concerns all personnel, it will be readily available for review and comments by any staff member prior to its submission to the Board.

WAYNE MORSE will appear as guest lecturer today before LCC's first labor history class. Time, 9a.m.; place, Room 213 of the Apprenticeship Building.

Labor History is one of three new courses requested last spring by the Lane County Central Labor Council. The other two, scheduled for winter and spring terms, are Labor Today, and Sociology of Work.

"EXTERNAL DEGREES" have been awarded for the first time in the nation's history. Seventy-seven students received Associate of Arts degrees from the State of New York for fulfillment of the requirements normally earned in a two-year college program. Four had never been inside a college classroom.

The external degree program accepted its first students only four months ago. More than 1,000 students are now enrolled, including some who will eventually receive a four-year degree in business administration. The program, developed with grants of \$400,000 each from the Carnegie Corp. and the Ford Foundation, has spread to several other states. The concept is also used in other countries, particularly by the University of London, which has had an external degree program for more than 100 years.

## AT LAST NIGHT'S BOARD MEETING:

...The Board approved recommendation to install Tattle Tape security system in the library. Two other systems were considered, but didn't meet LCC's needs. Tattle Tape allows free access to and from library once a book has been checked out. Book is desensitized when checked out, and remains so until officially checked in. This allows a student to pass checkpoint as many times as he likes without the gate automatically locking. In the other systems considered, the gate locked every time a book was carried from the library, whether it was checked out or not.

...Science in Your Life was reported as having 74 students, rather than the 68 previously reported. The independent evaluation committee set up for this course will meet this evening for the first time.

...The Board voted to support national competition by LCC students. The concept of national events participation and the recommended funding procedure for 1972-73 was approved. Following is the suggested budget for this year's funding:

Athletic Dept. Carryover Student Body Funds . . . . .	\$2,148
Student Body Support. . . . .	1,000
Outside sources (raised through supporters of LCC athletes) . . . . .	1,000
General Fund Resources. . . . .	1,000
LCC Foundation Resources . . . . .	500
TOTAL. . . . .	\$5,648

Statements from the Performing Arts and Mass Communications departments that they did not anticipate requesting student body funding for national events during the 1972-73 year caused the committee to devote major attention to the problem at hand - that of providing funding sources for possible national competition for LCC athletes during the current college year.

...Official concern was expressed over rights to and impact on the sewage lagoons resulting from construction of apartments west of campus. Motions passed on this subject included: 1/ legal counsel to investigate LCC's authority as a public body (under right of eminent domain) to condemn 3/7 use of the lagoon. The 3/7 figure has been used to define the amount that would be used by the new apartments.

OREGON COMMUNITY COLLEGE ENROLLMENT has reached a record high, according to Carrol deBroekert, Associate Superintendent of OBE. "Early trends seem to say that more students are carrying lighter loads while working at a part-time job," deBroekert said. He added that heavy increases are evident in vocational-technical career education programs.

Estimated figures reported this week are: Blue Mountain, 1,350; Central Oregon, 1,700; Chemeketa, 5,300; Clackamas, 3,900; Clatsop, 2,000; Linn-Benton, 4,200; Mt. Hood, 10,500; Portland, 22,000; Rogue, 1,000; Southwestern, 2,250; Treasure Valley, 900; and Umpqua, 2,050. LCC has no established head count available at this time; the figure for last year was 8,755 head count.

AT YESTERDAY'S INSTRUCTIONAL COUNCIL, recommendations on Physical & Mental Illness I & Lab and Supervised Field Experience were accepted. It was decided to call a special session of the Council, same time and place, on Thursday, October 26, for consideration of the proposed Welding Technology Program.

Jim Ellison introduced the recommendation of the Faculty Evaluation Committee and, following the meeting Dean Rasmussen directed a memorandum to all Council members:

**EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE:** In those cases where an individual on campus is in need of immediate medical assistance due to sudden illness or accident, the procedure to be followed is:

## Between 8am and 5pm

Call Student Health Services (X268) and report the location of the ill or injured person and the nature of the accident or illness. If it is judged advisable, Student Health Services will call an ambulance, refer to hospital, etc.

## After 5pm

Call Security and make a similar report. Security will make the determination regarding referral or ambulance, etc.
