A BOOK DETECTION system that electronically scans each book removed from the brary and automatically locks an exit gate if the book hasn't been properly checked out. . .what will they think of next?

The new system, installed at a cost of \$17,000, is expected to virtually halt theft from the LCC library. Administration was concerned, however, to preserve the school's philosophy of openness and free access; before accepting the new system, they demanded and got a feature which assures that personal books, and books already processed, will not cause the gate to lock. And a special gate was installed alongside the main exit, to allow wheelchair students access to and from the library.

Book loss from the library has exceeded 4,000 copies during the past four years; estimated list value of the loss, \$40,000. But Del Matheson points out that replacement costs would exceed that sum, because of labor and research costs borne by the college.

IN LAST NIGHT'S meeting the SPPC and Board of Education reviewed what has transpired since the two exchanged packages on November 1, 1972. The SPPC requested the Board to provide specific justification for the items in their package which represented a loss in potential earnings to the college employees. The SPPC expressed its dissatisfaction with the Board's lack of qualifying their responses.

The two major specific items which were discussed pertained to the conversion of the classified employees from an 8-step to a 6-step schedule, reducing the salaries at the top of the respective 6-step schedules; and, second, contracted personnel's part-time rate of pay.

The SPPC also directed questions to the Board pertaining to the Board's position on the summer school term and the Board's philosophy pertaining to the Evening Program. The SPPC indicated its desire for this information in order to prepare a counter proposal. The Board indicated that this information would be discussed in an open meeting, and felt that it was irrelevant to information requested for negotiating sessions.

Dean Case spoke regarding the organizational proposal, which he sees as centering on the two questions of: 1/ summer term; and 2/ evening program.

Regarding the summer term, he raised the question as to whether we should cease considering it the fourth quarter of the regular academic year and recognize that in this term we are actually serving a quite different class of student. Regarding the evening program, he mentioned the frequently-heard complaint that the program is not, as presently set up, meeting the needs of night school students. In the discussion which followed:

- . . .Ron Byers noted that his program had turned students away last summer because his budget simply would not permit him to enroll them.
- . . .John Jacobs noted that, historically, the difficulties encountered were lack of students and difficulty in obtaining qualified instructors.

TEXTBOOK ORDERING PROCEDURES: A special meeting will be held today from 11 to 12 in ADM202 for all departmental secretaries involved with the ordering of textbooks. Georgia Henrickson, Bookstore Manager, Dean Carter, and Bill Watkins, Business Manager, will be present to review current ordering procedures and to discuss ways to handle some of the problems in the process.

AT LAST NIGHT'S Board meeting Marston Morgan presented a progress report on the Long Range Plan, this one on the West Lane, or Florence, project. Points in favor of going ahead with outreach programs in the more remote geographical areas of the LCC district, he said, could be described as philosophical, political, and fiscal. First, there is the philosophical commitment of LCC as an educational institution which offers opportunity for higher education to persons who would not otherwise have such opportunity; second, surveys bear out the observation that geographically remote areas are less likely to be supportive of the college; and last, if the posture of continuing growth is to be maintained, these are the areas from which it can most logically be expected. President Schafer noted that he is holding a series of meetings with the school districts in which the approach is to seek input as to what is desired in education rather than the more usual approach of informing the meeting as to what is offered.

Steve John, Staff Association President, pointed out that the schedule of paid holidays adopted for LCC in 1971 called for the day before and the day after Christmas to be holidays, for a total of ten paid holidays per year; and that this year staff members had been denied the last working day before Christmas as a holiday. He suggested adjusting this (as Linn-Benton has done) by allowing personnel to add a day to their paid vacation. . .such day to be any day of their choice. Chairman Mention requested that Mr. John meet with administration on this question and report back at a later meeting.

Board Member Ackerman noted his intention to question management of AshLane at their dinner meeting scheduled for January 24 regarding the basis for the rent schedule and contemplated increases in it, if any.

At Chairman Mention's request, action on appointments to the Advisory Committees was withheld until the Board can study lists of the complete membership of the committees. Mr. Mention spoke of the desirability to have good balance in the membership, which he defined as participation by students, representative workers in the employment area, middle-management or supervisory personnel, and management. As presently formed, he feels some advisory committees are over-represented with management.

FEBRUARY 15 IS the cutoff date for applications under Title VI of the Higher Education Act. Title VI provides funding for the purchase of equipment and materials to improve undergraduate instruction. Application may be made in either of two categories:

It should be noted that President Nixon made no provision for funding of this program in his budget request for DHEW. The Educational Coordinating Council would like institutions which have participated in previous years to submit applications. They believe Congress will include some funding in its revised budget; and, also, they believe that an indication of institutional need will provide support for funding when appropriations come under consideration.

AT YESTERDAY'S CABINET meeting the question raised by Staff President Steve John regarding paid holidays received further discussion. Bert Dotson stated that research of the Board Policy appeared to bear out Steve's contention that the intent of the policy was to give staff 10 paid holidays per year; and President Schafer suggested that a recommendation be made to the Board that, in future years, the Christmas Holiday be scheduled:

- . . .when Christmas falls on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, or Saturday: Wednesday-Thursday-Friday be taken as paid holidays

Prior to last night's SPPC/Board session, Chairman Mention and Debbie Daggett agreed to confine the discussion to clarification of items, implementation. and cost per item.

The first part of the session was spent discussing and suggesting ideas pertaining to the terms "educational increment," "productivity," "arithmetic mean," and "median." PEOPLE AROUND CAMPUS are talking about the excellent job David Butler did with his first issue of <u>Feathers</u>. He's pulled together a lot of bright, newsy articles about staff, students, and events on campus, and combined it with a lot of information about the college which will make the paper valuable to just about anyone in the education district.

In an article on "Nadine Hack: Grease Monkeyette" David speaks of LCC as "an institution known for encouraging career training for both sexes in all programs."

Leaving a meeting at UofO campus, where we were briefed on the recently enacted amendments to the Higher Education Act of 1965, we thought of that; and of Marston Morgan speaking to the Board at the meeting of January 10, and saying that LCC was "developed primarily to provide educational opportunities not readily available elsewhere. ." And to tell the truth, your Editor was just a bit depressed. Federal support of education, particularly the kind represented by LCC, looks just a bit bleak at the moment. So much funding authorized, and so little appropriated!

Bob Wynia, who has joined the State Department of Education as Coordinator of Federal and Temporary Programs, was here to describe changes in the structuring of DHEW (Department of Health, Education and Welfare) and to analyze those provisions of interest to postsecondary education. Particularly, he recommended that all of us with an interest in education be aware of and follow the actions taken by:

- . . . the National Institute of Education, which will comprise the National Center on Educational Communication, the National Center on Educational Research and Development, the Experimental Schools program, and some components of the Career Education Program. Under the Education Amendments of 1972, the NIE "was established to provide leadership in the conduct and support of scientific inquiry into the educational process."
- . . .the Postsecondary Education Commission. Under the new amendments, each state is required to set up a Postsecondary Education Commission to serve as the adminisering agent under the law. Governor McCall has designated the Educational Coordinating Council to fill this role in Oregon.
- . . . the federal Appropriations Committee, on which that tough fighter and courageous friend of education, Edith Green, is now serving.

The news item concerned the appearance of Eleanor Meyers, director of Oregon's Women's Equal Employment Opportunity Division in the Bureau of Labor before the Senate Committee on Consumer and Business Affairs. A bill before that committee would change the present law to use the same life expectancy figure for both men and women employes. Senator Keith Burbidge, sponsor of the bill, notes that actuarial tables presently in use lump; women workers with non-workers; and may for this reason be presenting a false picture of life expectancies.

AT LAST THURSDAY'S Instructional Council, Larry Murray presented a memorandum on the Process for Program Evaluation, Addition and Deletion developed by the Program Evaluation, Addition and Deletion Committee. In part, his report read: "Program evaluation is difficult, and as a consequence, programs should be evaluated in the most objective manner possible. To do this would require that an appropriate process be established." Suggested alternatives, to be selected by the department, were listed as:

- . . . an independent lay advisory committee(s), each including 2 professional staff appointees of the President, for every vocational program (class) and/or college transfer course.
- . . .a program or course departmental self study, similar to the process used for the College's accreditation.
- . . .a departmental request of peers from other departments to establish an internal evaluation of the program or course.

Criteria for program evaluation, once the process was identified, would include: employment needs, salary considerations, comparison with the programs and/or courses offered at other institutions, and such economic factors as revenue generated cost per FTE over 3 academic years, program/course break-even point, and direct and indirect costs involved.

And the message is well taken. Shame on those of us who failed (yes, and even sometimes refused) to recognize the share community college people are taking in the vital role of relating higher education to the public. I for one would like to hear much, much more from community colleges at upcoming ACPRA functions.

The organization has done a disservice by giving the community colleges a "poor relative" treatment. Your edition of The Relator should forever dash any such attitudes and should foster enthusiastic inclusion in future ACPRA affairs. . .

YESTERDAY'S CABINET meeting was given over almost entirely to a discussion of what appears to be a downward trend in college enrollment throughout the country and, in particular, what such a trend portends for LCC. Dean Carter noted that, at this time and at LCC, there seems to be a leveling process taking effect: as interest in transfer programs declines, the career education programs are showing a corresponding increase in enrollments. President Schafer noted that, much as he appreciated this trend, it could not be expected to show a favorable reaction in the college's fiscal picture. Staff Association President Steve John wondered if the college were sufficiently responsive to the needs and desires of prospective students; and, following this train of thought, Larry Murray suggested it might be desirable to speed up the process of changing curriculums.

"Historically, one set of committees in the House and Senate creates programs and another set actually provides the money for them. The political incentive for a member of an authorizing committee is to pass bills with big price tags—and much publicity—to show he 'cares about solving problems,'" said Elliot L. Richardson, former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, in a final report on his stewardship (he has been nominated Secretary of Defense).

Richardson explained that the figures on the authorization price tags are higher than anything the President can in good conscience request, and higher than appropriations committees are willing to provide. He said that this results in an "authorization-appropriation gap."

"For the public, the authorization-appropriation process has become, in a sense, a shell game. Hopes are raised by attention to the authorizing hoopla, only to be dashed by the less flamboyant hand of the appropriations process," Richardson noted.

Secretary Richardson might have added that the name of the third walnut shell is "impound." It works like this: Authorize \$20 million, appropriate \$3 million, and "impound" \$1 million.

ANOTHER QUOTATION OF interest to all of us involved with education, this one from Leon Contos, senior editor of Saturday Review, which was recently split into four separate publications devoted to Education, Art, Science, and The Society: "During the past two decades, the U.S. has increasingly become a knowledge society," he said. "One half of the output of U.S. society will be in the knowledge industry. How do you communicate to a society that is increasingly interested in knowledge and its acquisitions? How does a knowledge-hungry society get satisfied? Audiences have become increasingly differentiated, and so," Mr. Contol concludes, "publications have to change to appeal to the different interests of society."

A SYMPOSIUM ON Large Group Instruction is to be presented at De Anza College, Cupertino, California, on March 2 and 3. Outstanding LGI instructors from the California Community College system will be present demonstrating techniques that work; and there will be discussions of such topics as media utilization in LGI, cost effectiveness of LGI, stage presence, and small groups and individualization. KEN OMLID, LANE County Commissioner, will appear as Moderator for the two programs on "Project Foresight" to be presented next Tuesday. There will be a morning program, starting at 9 o'clock, in FORum 309; and an evening program, starting at 7, in the Board Room.

In his kick-off speech at the Portland-Sheraton last October, Secretary of State Clay Myers said:

I agreed to accept the assignment as Chairman of the Council Steering Committee. . .for three basic reasons: 1/ I believe in the need for land use planning. . .; 2/ I knew that Project Foresight was going to attempt a revolutionary approach, never tried anywhere before, with an effort to get people actively involved in an "alternative futures" approach to planning; 3/ I have made my home for most of my life in the Willamette Valley, and I recognize that if we are to succeed in "saving" Oregon, that success will have to be centered in the Valley, our great heartland where 70% of us now live, and which is the certain target of future immigrants to this state.

Through the "alternative futures" approach, the Secretary said, the people of the Willamette Valley will be actively involved in deciding for themselves how they want the Valley to look in 30 years. Two basic tools were prepared, a slide show and a book, and teams of Council members and staff have been touring the Valley since October presenting the alternative futures approach, hoping by this means to stimulate public awareness of the problems and decisions involved in planning the growth and development of the Willamette Valley for the next three decades.

The morning program is planned primarily for students and staff; all members of the community concerned with the problems of unplanned growth are invited to the evening program.

READING MR. PASEMAN'S account of the somewhat heated discussion of the proposed Skills Center in Florence which occurred at Wednesday evening's Board Work Session in the AshLane student housing complex reminded us that we had still to correct a rather serious misstatement in Mr. Paseman's report in the January 12 issue of Eugene Register-Guard. Mr. Paseman's article concludes:

From an analysis aimed at developing a "specific strategy for identifying the needs of the college district," Morgan said it was determined that the western Lane County area seemed "to be getting the least educational services or...had the most critical unemployment and other social problems."

Thus," he said, "it was decided to recommend that area form the first planning priority." He noted that the federal Overaline conomic Development Program is studying the same area "for these same reasons." (LCC has a grant from that agency to help finance an educational skills center in the Florence area.)

When LCC was consulted by L-COG in January 1972 for its input into the Overall Economic Development Program proposal for Lane County, we wrote a proposal for a construction grant for a Skills Center to be built on a 20-acre site adjacent to the high school facility of the Siuslaw School District in Florence. Out proposal reads: "Upon completion of the Florence project, similar proposals might be made for the cities listed (in the title) 'subsequent centers.'" Subsequent centers were listed, in order of priority: Oakridge, Junction Ctiy, Cottage Grove, McKenzie Valley, Downtown Eugene, and Downtown Springfield.

Contrary to Mr. Paseman's statement, there has been no announcement of any grant award under OEDP.
