THE OREGON COUNCIL of Metals Instructors, an affiliate of the Oregon Vocational Trade Technical Association, met at LCC Saturday, January 27. Twenty-five high school and community college instructors from throughout Oregon participated in a discussion of individualized instruction. More than one-third of the instructors are currently using individualized instructional procedures. Tom Denison from Hood River Valley High School was the leader and was assisted by Lee Amans; Owen Sabin, Occupational Skills Center; and Ralph Little, State Department Metals Specialist. John Neely, Machine Technology Instructor, coordinated for LCC and led discussions explaining and showing how LCC uses individualized instruction. The ultimate goal of the Oregon Council of Metals Instructors is to implement the use of individualized instruction in high schools and community college metal programs in Oregon for articulation and improved instruction.

# FEBRUARY 2

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YESTERDAY'S INSTRUCTIONAL COUNCIL, chaired by Social Science Department Chairman Bill Beals, was occupied in great part by a discussion of the recommendations of the Committee for Evaluation of Instructional Council. Dean Case stated that he regretted his absence from the last council meeting which, in effect, gave the council two sets of by-laws. The committee was asked to cooperate with Dean Case to develop a single set of combined by-laws.

Dr. White, Cabinet representative for the Council, reported on Ms. Brandstrom's appearance on behalf of the Status of Women Committee at Tuesday's Cabinet meeting; on the loss of FTE, which it now appears may be as low as 50; and on the President's remarks concerning the impact the present legislature may be expected to have on education. Materials on this last are available in Bert Dotson's office for those who wish to examine them.

# FEBRUARY 5

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WE PROMISED YOU a report on the meeting of the Status of Women Committee with President Schafer and the Cabinet last Tuesday. Jan Brandstrom read a paper on the general question of the working woman in our society, making, among others, the following points:

. . .It is not expected, or even desired, that all women will become "career" women; but those women who do so elect should be assured opportunities equal to those offered men

. . .A need for staff in-service training is apparent, for men as well as women

. . .Unused abilities produce frustration and possible diminution of value to the college; the committee would urge administration to explore the possibility of using the talents of women presently employed and/or training at LCC for the greater benefit of the college.

In the discussion which followed Ms. Brandstrom's presentation, President Schafer told her that it was his goal to achieve a 50/50 representation of men and women employees at LCC, with, ideally, a 10% representation of ethnic minorities in all departments. However, insofar as opening positions at the administrative level to women, he noted two problems: 1/ the very low turnover at this level; and, 2/ the difficulty of finding women trained in top administrative skills. He said it appeared to him, from the investigation he had done, that few women were being trained to step into administrative roles. Dr. Joyce Hops mentioned a program in progress at the University of Puget Sound to train women administrators; and Ms. Brandstrom once more urged that the President look to his own campus for women who might respond to the challenge.

Dr. Hops addressed the meeting on the position of women students; Laura Gauderman spoke on the subject of job mobility for Classified women employees; and Margaret Knutson on the disparity of retirement benefits between men and women under PERS.

There was some discussion of the possibility of establishing a workshop for a Women's Studies program. Bert Dotson mentioned that such a program had been instituted at Foothill College.

# FEBRUARY 7

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AT YESTERDAY'S CABINET the Affirmative Action plan prepared for the Board Meeting of February 14 received initial consideration. In general, it reflects the President's position stated in the Cabinet at which the Status of Women Committee appeared: a goal of 10% participation of minorities in all departments, and a better balance of men/women employees. Among the priorities:

...by September 1973 we will plan that each department or division will establish hiring goals which will include at least one minority employee in each department

...within the Classified personnel section it shall be our goal to fill ten percent of the vacancies or additions with minorities. (Ed.-Exact interpretation of this statement received lengthy discussion and it appears some clarification will be made before presentation to the Board.)

...we shall establish a series of in-service seminars to familiarize staff with the Affirmative Action Plan and its implementation by June, 1973.

AT THE REQUEST of the Chairman of the Classified Section, Jan John submits a brief report on the first meeting of the Classified Council. Jan is Area Representative for the Administration offices.

The first meeting of the Classified Council was held Monday morning and the wheels are in full motion. Procedures and rules for the committee were established. Two committees, Professional Growth and Grievance, were discussed. Regarding the Professional Growth Committee, it was decided that it should be reactivated and volunteer members are being recruited. The question of whether or not Classified staff should have in-service activities separate from the faculty also was brought up. The Grievance Committee was set up to study the proposed changes in the grievance procedures. Committee members were appointed by Ralph Cook as follows: Nancy Paulus, Bob Upp, Cliff Brown, Nancy Belk, Pat Grant. Steve John gave a report on the last meeting between the SPPC and the Board.

In its visit to campus on Monday, the Bloodmobile received donations of 22 pints of good LCC blood - which represents complete replacement, plus a little. New donors, in addition to Morgan the Merciless, were Deans Piercey and Rasmussen.

DR. DOUG WHITE received a letter of apology from the Oregon Foundation for Dental Research and Development. Through some misunderstanding, applications made on behalf of Allison Brion and Gail Kipp were assumed to be loan applications; this has been corrected, and the girls are recipients of scholarships totalling \$700 for pursuit of their studies in the Paradental Department.

PAINTINGS BY SANDRA McKee is the new exhibition at the LCC Art Gallery. The show will open February 9 with a reception from 8 to 10pm and run through March 2.

BOB MARSHALL, LCC Registrar, has been appointed to the eight-member task force composed of Oregon school and community college officials for the purpose of assisting the State Department of Education in implementing advanced placement programs which would allow students more options to complete schooling in less time. Two State Department of Education staff members will work with the task force: William G. Loomis, director of special community college programs, and Martin Birnbaum, advanced placement specialist. Initial meeting was held Friday, January 19, at the Department of Education office in Salem.

DR PARNELL, IN giving his support to the governor's school finance proposal, said: "Local school boards and staff should be freed to exercise their local control in the area of education, spending a predominance of their time on teaching and learning issues. The struggle for funds to operate the schools should be resolved at the state legislative level rather than in each local community."

THE INITIAL MEETING of the Classified Section Area Representatives has generated a good bit of what a recent committee report called (in choicest Educationese) "feedback on the input." A letter from one member of the Section puts it all together rather well:

It is my belief that in setting up a Classified Council as indicated by the "Procedural Rules for Classified Council Operation, 1972-73" you are only further fragmenting any type of "togetherness" hoped for. When this was first discussed, I understood--and maybe (evidently) I wasn't listening--that a representative would be picked from each area to keep the area informed of what was taking place in meetings when all personnel were unable to attend. This, to me, was a good idea as meeting dates and times are not always workable for all staff.

Can an area representative really speak for all? In a vote for something is each area evenly represented?

When attendance and membership is low, is it any fairer to appoint a representative to vote on something that will affect all personnel than to have a paid member only vote?

As long as only paid members are voting members--which I feel is very unjust--how do you figure a "representatives" vote? By the way, do the representatives have to be paid members?

One of the biggest rumblings I've heard all year (and I admit I don't get around much so maybe I'm speaking of one building plus a few others) is that the same people are "running" the classified section and making policies, problems, etc. I do know that there wasn't enough interest, but maybe that tells us something too. Isn't a voting group of officers and representatives getting it down again to a small group?

Issues of college policy and procedure should be discussed and voted on by all of those interested. Feelings can change about a subject when discussion takes place and a "vote" sent in one way could change by listening and debating different sides of an issue.

Can "busy" classified personnel take the time to go to both all-classified meetings and regularly scheduled Council meetings, let alone all the other committee meetings the same people all seem to be on?

There is nothing--NOTHING--that should be discussed and voted on by any small group of classified employees.

That ad was run by Miami-Dade Junior College of Miami, Florida; but we understand that both Mt. Hood and Portland CC face much the same situation.

FOLLOWING LAST NIGHT'S Board we are at liberty to announce that LCC has accepted an invitation to membership in the League for Innovation in the Community College, a consortium of the most innovative two-year institutions in the nation. The prestigious organization, which limits its membership to 16, unanimously chose LCC in a mail poll early this month, following the visit to campus of League President John Dunn on January 17. Said Dr. Dunn, in a letter to President Schafer following his visit: "You certainly have a great potential to make a fine contribution to the League...I was very impressed with your program."

LCC becomes the first League member in the Pacific Northwest. Other members include: Brookdale CC, Lincroft, N.J.; Central Piedmont CC, Charlotte, N.C.; Coast CC District, Costa Mesa, Calif.; Cuyahoga CC, Cleveland, Ohio; Dallas CC District, Dallas, Texas; Delta College, University Center, Mich.; Foothill CC District, Los Altos Hills, Calif.; Junior College District of St. Louis, St. Louis, Mo.; Kern CC District, Bakersfield, Calif.; Los Angeles CC District, Los Angeles, Calif.; Los Rios CC District, Sacramento, Calif.; Maricopa County CC District, Phoenix, Ariz.; Moraine Valley CC, Palos Hills, Ill.; Peralta Colleges, Oakland, Calif.; Santa Fe Community Colleges, Gainesville, Fla. Jointly, League members serve about 350,000 students.

A small staff at the Los Angeles headquarters coordinates the efforts of members to work together to strengthen teaching, curriculum, student services, and management techniques. The League has conducted national and international workshops, conferences, and study projects, and shared its findings with non-member colleges across the country. It is supported by membership fees and other contributions by its members, by foundation grants, and by government and other contracts. Governance is by a board of directors which includes the chief administrator of each member district.

Following LCC Board of Education approval of the membership, President Schafer said the College is "highly honored. I can personally think of no higher honor that could be bestowed upon LCC."

OSBA ISSUE JANUARY issue asks, pertinently, "Have you thought what schools will be like in 1985?" According to Education USA, educators at a Miami Beach Seminar sponsored by the American Association of School Administrators' National Academy for School Executives asked themselves the question. . . and this is their answer:

- 25% of all high schools will base promotions and graduations on the attainment of measurable skills, abandoning the Carnegie unit system of credits.
- 50% of all public schools will be operating year-round.
- 75% of a student's time will be spent in independent or individualized instruction in 50% of the nation's high schools.
- High School students will spend more than one-third of their learning time outside of school.
- 50% of all school districts will utilize differentiated staffing.
- 75% will open school to 3 and 4 year olds.
- 30% will have replaced the principal's decision-making role with policy-making bodies of teachers.

## The President's Corner...

This year's National Convention of AACJC (American Association of Community and Junior Colleges) will take place in Anaheim (Calif.) next week. It will be of particular interest to LCC people this year, because I expect to attend several session of the League for Innovation...and I think it is clear by now that I approach this new phase of College activity with considerable anticipation.

In addition to working cooperatively with AACJC, the League has established good working relationships with the Center for Improved Education of Batelle Memorial Institute (Project on Efficiency in Community College Management - funding to come from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation) and with Sutherland Learning Associates, producers of multimedia instructional systems. I expect to get out a memorandum within the next week which will give all the departments an idea of the sorts of project the League concerns itself with, and where LCC might fit into the picture.

CAREER EDUCATION, ACCORDING to Education USA, February 12 issue, is about to undergo its third major change since it began two-and-a-half years ago. USOE sponsored the development of a series of occupation role vignettes for preschool children which will be seen on a children's TV program this spring, as part of its effort to instill attitudes about career preparation at early ages. The newly-formed NIE (National Institute of Education) takes a different view. They plan to begin with the 13-to-25 group, stressing the relationship of education to economic benefits for the individual. "You can't teach a work ethic," says Corrine Rieder, head of NIE's task force on career education. "If something is wrong with career training, the problem isn't going to be solved in the kindergarten."

NIE's plan for career education, soon to be announced, will be limited to the "relationship of education to career entry and career progression." Emphasis will be on the information people need to have about jobs and careers, and linking people with job opportunities. In addition to young people, another target group will be mid-career adults, with initial attention paid to the problems of working women.

Also reported by Education USA was the extreme reluctance exhibited by ethnic minority groups at a recent conference on career education to endorse any program that didn't include minority participation from the start. All of the seven ethnic caucuses at the conference demanded an official advisory role for minorities in career education development.

AT ITS FEBRUARY 16 meeting the Board of Education adopted a long-range plan for development of Oregon community colleges which "informally designates all territory in the state to certain community colleges for purposes of student attendance." The plan, which has the general approval of board members and presidents of the state's 13 community colleges, covers nearly all aspects of operation, including proposed accomplishments and activities in areas relating to instructional programs, personnel management (and affirmative action plans), student guidance and counseling, dovetailing of high school career education programs with community colleges, open enrollment policies, and transfer of credit. The following account is given in the issue of OBE News received yesterday:

The State Board's action does not change the legal boundaries of the existing community college districts, which were formed by vote of their residents. Nor does adoption of the plan have any affect on the taxing powers of the existing districts. Property not within the legal boundaries of the existing districts cannot be taxed to support the community colleges without further action as prescribed by law, according to Carrol deBroekert, associate superintendent of instructional services.

Basically, what the plan does is recognize the so-called "natural flow" of students from areas not within existing community college districts to community colleges in neighboring geographic regions. Such students would continue to pay out-of-district tuition to the community college they attend until other arrangements affecting tuition may be made.

Territory cited in the plan includes: Tillamook and portions of Columbia counties assigned to Clatsop and Chemeketa Community College attendance areas; Lincoln county to Linn-Benton and Chemeketa; Curry county and Ash Valley to Southwestern Oregon; Jackson county to Rogue; Sherman county and portions of Hood River and Wasco counties to Mt. Hood; Gilliam and Grant counties to Blue Mountain; Wheeler county to Central Oregon; Harney county and portions of Baker and Malheur counties to Treasure Valley; Union and Wallowa counties to Blue Mountain; Lake and portions of Klamath counties to Central Oregon.

AT YESTERDAY'S CABINET meeting, President Schafer reported on his trip to Salem of February 19. He said, "by and large, things look good," and on at least two points the President feels education in Oregon may be about to achieve a "major breakthrough."

...the proposal for the Legislature to appropriate a bulk sum to the State Department of Education, which will be responsible for making allocations to the community colleges of the funds available to them for the biennium.

...the proposed 2-step system for FTE reimbursement (Step 1: 1-1,100; step 2, over 1,100) which the President feels will be of greater aid to the smaller colleges, but a valuable improvement overall.

He also reported that the Legislature expressed its intention of making good losses incurred by colleges reporting under-enrollment in the last academic year. If done, this will bring an additional \$66,000 in revenue to LCC.

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IN LINE WITH his promise in the last "President's Corner," President Schafer sends some information on a project in which the League for Innovation is working with the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems of the Western Interstate Commission of Higher Education (WICHE). "Operationally," the President's memorandum states, "the project involves four sub-projects which are of major interest to us at LCC":

A Development of Management Model

The model is being built on the concepts and methods of Management by Objectives (MBO). It incorporates scientific principles of management and a humanistic approach to management, which stresses participative planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation.

B Development of Management Training System

The purpose is to find effective means for teaching personnel how to implement the management model.

C Development of Management Guide

The aim here is to develop a set of written guidelines for implementing participative management by objectives in the community college.

D Dissemination

The intention of Project D is to disseminate the results of the total project on a national basis.

In addition, there is Project Multiplier, in which five League districts are developing a plan for producing and exchanging packages of innovative instructional materials. Additional districts will be added in the fall. And under a working relationship between the League and the Language Institute of Japan, staff members from League colleges may be employed at the Language Institute.

"IF THAT PICTURE is re-run many more times," writes Bob Hamill, "I'll expect to be paid residuals." Dr. Hamill is referring to the photo of four ex-LCC people in Washington community college presidencies which appeared in AACJC Journal and many other publications.

DR. DALE PARNELL has been appointed by President Nixon to head the new National Council on Equality of Educational Opportunity. He has named Jerry Fuller, director of compensatory education for the State Department of Education, to the post of Executive Director of the NCEE staff.

NCEE has been charged by the President to make a two-year study of the effectiveness of program to assure equality of educational opportunity for all Americans.

THE STATE BOARD of Education celebrated its 100th anniversary on February 16. Board Chairman Francis I Smith noted that the first item of business of the newly-formed State Board was to appoint a group of professors as "professions teachers to act in conjunction with the Board as a State Board of Examiners in conducting examinations of teachers as provided by law."

"When one thinks about how much public education in Oregon has improved in the last 100 years," said Smith, "it is hard to believe that the first State Board was confronted by the same kinds of problems we face today. Maybe people don't change as fast as the institutions they create."

GRADUATE AND UNDERGRADUATE programs in Allied Health Teacher Education and Administrative Leadership are announced by the San Francisco Health Professions Council. California State University, City College of San Francisco, University of California, and the University of San Francisco are working in cooperation with the San Francisco Health Professions Council to create this unique method of cross registration. The student's degree program is the product of joint planning between the student, Project Central Staff, and allied health specialists. Eligible health fields are: Dental Assisting, Dental Hygiene, Dental Lab. Technology, Inhalation Therapy, Medical Record Technician, Medical Technology, Medical Record Administration, Orthopaedic Assisting, Physical Therapy, and Radiologic Technology.

Approximately 40 full-time students will be enrolled in the program, which will begin with the Fall Semester, 1973. Funding is through the W. K. Kellogg Foundation and participating institutions. Stipends ranging from \$2,400 to \$3,600 per year plus tuition and fees may be available through the Bureau of Health Manpower Education of the National Institutes of Health.
