LCC'S COURSE SCHEDULES for Spring Term will be printed in the March 5 issue of the Eugene Register-Guard. Students planning to enroll for Spring classes are urged to get and save copies of that issue of the newspaper to refer to during the registration process. Both daytime and evening credit and non-credit (adult education) courses will be listed in the schedule, which will be printed in a handy tabloid pull-out section of the paper.

The new distribution procedure will put the schedule into 58,000 homes. Fewer than half that number of schedules had beendistributed through the system of printing separate schedules for credit and non-credit classes and handing them out on campus or mailing them. If the course listings can be contained in an 8page tabloid section, there will be a saving of about 1/3 over the old method; if it is necessary to go to 12 pages, cost will be about the same.

Publication of future course schedules in the newspaper will depend on the reception and effectiveness of the March 5 trial issue.

in parks there (about \$7,000) but the rest must come from booking fees and donations.

"MORE RELEVANT PATHWAYS" to graduation are now available to Florida students, according to Education U.S.A.-February 26:

- . . .a "job"entry program"permits 16-year-olds with 10 high school credits to earn more credits for each 288 hours on an approved job
- . . .a "performance program" allows a student to graduate upon "fulfilling previously outlined objectives, as measured by his performance, without regard to credits or length of time in school."

Florida students can also graduate early if they are admitted to an accredited college after completing 10 credits. And in Oregon, the NSPRA newsletter continues, the state board has adopted new requirements that are "goal and competency oriented." Implementation here is set for 1974-75, giving districts two years to identify "performance indicators they will accept as evidence that individual students are equipped to survive in the society in which they live."

"Oregon State Supt. Dale Parnell has suggested," the article concludes, "that graduates should have survival skills, including the ability to read a map, change a tire, and swim."

SPPC/BOARD NEGOTIATIONS: Chairman Daggett refused to make any statement following last Wednesday's negotiating session; therefore, for those who may have missed Mr. Lloyd Paseman's report in Saturday's Register-Guard, we excerpt the major points:

. . .difference over a board proposal to reduce part-time and summer pay rates for faculty remain unresolved, as do opposing plans for replacing the college's traditional salary schedule for faculty and administrators

. . .SPPC asked the Board to allocate \$5,250 for the hiring of consultants to develop job descriptions and pay levels for each classified job at LCC. The Board made a four-part counterproposal and said if SPPC would accept it, the Board would agree to accept the results of the proposed survey as "binding." The counterproposal, which was accepted with the proviso that the committee be appointed and the consultant(s) hired before April 1, was:

The committee that would work with the consultants would consist of three SPPC members and two LCC administrators, with SPPC Chairman Delpha Daggett serving as chairman of the ad hoc committee

The new committee would "evaluate, screen, and recommend" the consultant or consultants to do the survey, the Board and SPPC would mutually agree on the selection, and the Board would pay for the survey.

The committee would "determine its own purposes, guidelines and goals," and would submit them to the Board and SPPC for joint approval

Classified wage levels would be frozen until the survey is implements, and classified employes would be limited to cost-of-living increases until then. Raises dictated by the survey, however, would be paid retroactive to July 1, 1973.

SPPC members, Mr. Paseman's article continues, objected only to the inclusion of administrators on the committee that would work with the consultants preparing the job survey... Board members argued that the committee's role would really be only advisory. Dr. Albert "rauer of Florence said "the administration won't be sitting there making any deci on any classified person's salary."

THE MEDICAL ASSISTANTS of Lane County, at a luncheon held yesterday in the President's Dining Room, announced that the Diana Moon Memorial Scholarship for this year has been awarded to Karen Edmonds. Presentation of the scholarship will be made at the meeting of the Association to be held later this month at the Eugene Hotel.

In addition to a good number of Karen's classmates, the luncheon was attended by nine members of the Lane County Medical Assistants Association, which sponsors the scholarship.

AT YESTERDAY'S CABINET President Schafer reported on his trip to Anaheim last week and, in particular, the initial meetings with the Board of Directors of the League for Innovation in Community Colleges. It was especially pleasing to discover, he said, that when LCC received the invitation to join it was the culmination of an investigation of community colleges of both the mid- and northwest, rather than just the northwest as we had supposed.

The President has already committed LCC to participation in a summer seminar at Batelle Institute, in which a team composed of an Instructor, an Associate Dean, and a Department Chairman will spend a week in the East reviewing a model system of educational management and, on their return, put the experience to use with LCC's inservice.

Among other things the President saw, heard, and discussed at the meetings:

- . . .reports of a six-month study of the "open university" system in England. Although participants run better than 80% from segments of the population who would ordinarily not enroll in the conventional style institution, the long range effect seems to be to increase college enrollment the explanation being that the desire for learning is either instilled or revived by exposure to media education
- . . .a pilot project,"Increasing the Effectiveness of Educational Management in Community Colleges;" is now in effect in three League member colleges in the East and the President has entered into correspondence with these colleges to determine what benefit might be available to LCC
- . . .a League representative must be appointed for LCC, to act as communication link between the League, the member institutions, and the college. Dean Rasmussen suggested obtaining and possibly disseminating some type of "job description" for the position before undertaking selection of any staff person(s) who might fill it. His suggestion will be acted upon.

THE LIONS TALE: Lyle Swetland, a long-time Lion, turned over to us the most recent newsletter, in which their "Fourth Estate Lion" gives an account of the presentation made by the ADC Association of Lane County at their February 28 meeting:

Shirley Caffing spoke to us representing the ADC Association of Lane County and told about their self-help scholarship program. Shirley had with her three other girls on the program and they all told that same basic story: Divorce or illness found them long out of school with a family to support and they didn't want to stay on the welfare rolls. nder a federal OEO program, which is ending 1/74, the government matches their funds on a 1:3 ratio, which pays for their tuition, books, incidental expenses within pre-set limits, so that they can get the education they need to enable them to seek gainful employment.

Their living allowance from the ADC program (welfare) is minimal and their medical coverage doesn't cover eyes or teeth. Consequently they are dependent upon the Elks for teeth and Lions for glasses, but even with that, it is far from easy..

They raise funds by selling \$5 "nothing" tickets, speaking, and anything else they can legitimately do to raise money. The scholarships are awarded by a board which is made up of a cross-section of the business-professional and academic community. Since funds are limited, not all applicants are recipients.

He closes with a plea to the membership for support of "the only working program in the U.S." "Since OEO is being eliminated by Administration fiat and in theory is to be replaced by 'revenue sharing'" Fourth Estate Lion suggests they may wish to write their Congressmen.

Thank you, King of the Jungle. You gave a good account of a self-help program and a group of courageous, hard-working women that all of us on LCC campus feel a great admiration for.

THE DANFORTH FOUNDATION has selected LCC as one of 20 colleges in the nation to participate in the Foundation's second annual Community College Institute. Six LCC representatives will go to Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri, next August 8-18 to work under the guidance of a faculty skilled in the organizing of educational programs for diverse student bodies. The study will be to identify and meet local post-high school training needs.

In a letter to the Foundation in January, President Schafer said that answers will be sought to questions such as these:

- . . is continued enrollment growth essential to the economic existence and philosophy of LCC?
- . . . who and where are the students in the college district that LCC has not yet served?
- . . how can contact be made with potential students who are not aware of the training available?
- .what kinds of educational activities will best reach these students?
- .how can LCC coordinate and cooperate with the 16 local school districts, the two 4-year institutions of higher education, the proprietary schools, the park and recreation districts, social service agencies, and community school organizations?

The Danforth Foundation will pay tuition, transportation, lodging, and meals for the LCC contingent, which is expected to include a Board member and representatives from administration and faculty, in addition to President Schafer.

- . . .described the intent of the summer Institute as the seeking out, identifying, recruiting, and then serving and supporting the non-traditional student the one who, as things are, would not expect to pursue his education beyond the postsecondary level.
- . . .spoke of the meeting of Community College Presidents in Salem Friday and Saturday of this week, at which such topics as ABE, FTE, and PERB will be discussed; and on Sunday evening and Monday, the meeting of all college Presidents in the state public, private, 2-year and 4-year.
- . . .told the meeting that it was anticipated LCC would have the capability of broadcasting from campus by cable TV this fall.
- . . .commented on what appears to be a wave of reaction to the original Affirmative Action proposals and the growing feeling that the plurality of educational alternatives in this country is an asset not to be sacrificed without careful consideration of the consequences. He mentioned as a case in point the decision by the President of Wellesley to discontinue co-education and return to its original intent.

The balance of the meeting was given over chiefly to a discussion of a memorandum written by Social Science Chairman Bill Beals advancing the idea that LCC drop its posture of developing statistics and giving them to the reader without conclusions or editorializing in favor of what he called "hard sell." We quote some of the points Mr. Beals made in his memorandum:

I would suggest that we disentangle ourselves from the graduate school syndrome; i.e., Lane is not a graduate school and its students are not employed. . . . I refer you to the study. . .which shows that the liberal arts graduates who did not go on to a four-year institution. . .are employed at a higher rate than those who graduate from vocational schools. I believe it is time that we use this information to our advantage.

I would suggest very strongly that we use the information we have. . .in any and every way possible to show that it is not bad to be educated, that it can be both good for citizenship and for the employment picture. I would further urge that the administration and Board move away from the vocational fetish and show the consumers of our products, both tax payer and student, that regardless of what field a student enters into here they have a better than normal chance of employment.

MUCH OF LAST night's Board meeting was occupied with a discussion of the report on goals, priorities, resource requirements, and recommendations for the Siuslaw Education Center prepared by Marston Morgan, Larry Murray, and Al Owens in consultation with Dean Case.

Marston Morgan and Otto Poticha spoke first on the physical requirements for the Center. Mr. Poticha strongly recommended that every effort be made to retain and continue the rapport which has been established between the collegé and the community, building only those facilities needed to supplement the present working arrangement aimed at developing round-the-clock use of schools, churches, gyms, etc. Supplementary facilities needed now and for the foreseeable future he believed need add up to a total of no more than 5,000 sq. ft., not necessarily all at the same location. They would offer space for offices, conference rooms, and, most needed of the three, storage facilities.

Larry Murray and Al Owens presented the report, which details objectives and recommendations through 1975. The budget, in addition to the \$65,000 which would maintain the present program, is estimated at \$101,000. The recommendation is divided into curriculum development activities, which would absorb most of the estimated cost; community services; support services (a half-time counsellor was the chief item here); and facilities.

Mrs. Huntington of the Pioneer Museum Association of Florence, appeared to speak on behalf of a cooperative arrangement between the college and the community in developing a museum. The Association has a site chosen which, if the college were to indicate its intention to work cooperatively, they would purchase with a grant of \$5,000 made to it by the Jaycees.

In conclusion, the Board indicated its interest and appreciation; they asked that some further study be made of the human needs which might develop from a further extension of LCC instructional programs in the West Lane area - such things as transportation, housing, and child care.

DETERMINATION OF RESIDENCY FOR TUITION PURPOSES

5116

In-District

A student is an in-district student if at least one of the following conditions is met:

- Married and a resident of the College District at least 90 days prior to first* registration.
- 2. Age 18 or a high school graduate and a resident of the College District at least 90 days prior to first* registration.
- 3. A veteran who has established his permanent address inside the College District within 90 days of his separation or discharge from the service.
- 4. A student who establishes the 90 day residency requirement during a term will be granted the in-district residency status the following term.

All other students are required to pay a non-residence fee either out-of-district or out-of-state. (Definition of terms and appeal procedure are contained in administrative guidelines.)

NOTICE OF INTENT to renew went out to all contracted personnel yesterday. Contracts will be forthcoming, as usual, when the budget for the coming school year is finaliz

A FIRST READING was given Wednesday night to a proposal for Board policy change in health services for the students. Dean Carter addressed the Board on the subject of the proposed policy revision which would bring it into line with practices which have developed as a consequence of the financial support given to Student Health Services this year by the Student Senate. John Loeber spoke to the need for expanded health services for the students. The Board expressed sympathy with the objectives and, with the proviso that any health service requiring extensive treatment would be inappropriate, asked that a summary of costs be developed. The second presentation will be made at the April 11 Board meeting.

A LETTER WAS sent yesterday from President Schafer's office to various representatives in the federal government opposing a section of the proposed new federal regulation which would reduce the amount of federal aid to ADC students on campus. Under the proposed regulation, it would no longer be possible to use private funds to make up the required local match money (the federal government puts up three parts to every one part matched locally in what is popularly knowa as "3 to 1" funding"). Since its inception, the ADC Association of Lane County has sponsored more than 700 students at LCC.

NEW COMERS INFORMATION KIT: A supply of the Newcomers Information Kit prepared by Citizens Bank of Oregon has been made available to LCC staff by the bank. Extra! Extra! Extra!

A REPORT ON the status of various bills of interest to educators, as reported in Speaker Dick Eymann's House Hotline:

KEEPING UP WITH THE COMMITTEE ACTION:

The EDUCATION COMMITTEE, having before it five bills relating to the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission (TSPC), agreed that in addition to responsibility for recommending policy, the TSPC should certify and decertify teachers and approve teacher education programs. On a tie vote, the Committee refused to allow appeal of TSPC actions to the Board of Education. All of these proposed statutory changes constitute a transfer of power from the State Board of Education to the 16-member board of professional educators. A bill to modify the composition of the board is yet

HB 2147, placing three students on the Board of Education, was the subject of opposing testimony at a recent hearing. The Committee was impressed by the competent and extensive testimony of student leaders emphasizing the role of students in revitalizing higher education. No action has been taken at this time. Upcoming business includes discussion of extending veterans' benefits to conscientious objectors who have done alternative service (HB 2540) and several bills dealing with the relationship of employees to their school district board.

Favorable action was taken by the ENVIRONMENT AND LAND USE COMMITTEE on three bills to make public buildings more accessible to wheel chair citizens. Two have subsequently been adopted by the House. HB 2308 brings non-governmental public buildings within the State Fire Marshal's standards for ramps, properly designed bathrooms and convenient drinking fountains. HB 2310 specifies use of the international symbol of access to mark facilities that have been made available. HB 2301 - pending before the Revenue Committee -would give a property tax advantage to businesses which remodel buildings for the convenience of wheel chair users.

The Committee also began consideration of HB 2497, a revision of current law creating a Willamette River Park System. More than 200 citizens attended a night hearing, March I. L.B. Day has appeared in support of HB 2152, a bill to prevent storage or disposal in Oregon of radioactive wastes produced outside the State, but asked the Committee to consider including all environmentally hazardous wastes. On March 22 there will be a hearing on HJR 53 directing state agencies to recycle wastes and use recovered products.

The HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE reported out HB 2193 which brings Oregon into line with Federal law by providing medical assistance for four months after removal from the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program and extends benefits to certain other classifications as well. During the week of March 12th the Committee will decide the fate of three measures designed to reinstitute the death penalty in Oregon.

MAYNARD FERGUSON will be making a rare appearance in the Eugene-Springfield area on March 25.



DR' PARNELL, Superintendent of Public Instruction, State Department of Education, has issued a statement in support of the school finance plan:

The 1973 Legislature must be commended for sending to the people an innovative school finance proposition that places the entire wealth of the state behind the basic education of each child and maintains local control by writing into law a bill of rights and responsibilities for local school districts.

All of us who want to improve and strengthen public education in Oregon should work for passage of this measure on May 1.

With little change in principles since its earliest form, Governor McCall's school finance plan still embodies the following objectives.

- 1. Equalize Oregon's education offerings and balance Oregon's taxation load.
- Eliminate the local property tax as a method of financing operating expenses of primary and secondary education.
- Eliminate homeowners property tax insofar as school operating costs are concerned.
- Attempt to minimize the shift between income-producing (business) and nonincome-producing (residential) property.
- Adopt, as much as possible, the ability-to-pay principle in financing education.
- All districts will have at least their current level of resources and low spending districts educational offerings may increase up to a \$900 level.
- 7. Maintain local control of public schools.

It is true that the Supreme Court's decision on the Rodriguez case may signify the retreat of the federal government from a historic commitment to equality of educational opportunity. Yet this landmark decision does not deter our Oregon effort to overhaul our 'bailing wire' school finance system. Our chief concern is to bring stability and fairness to the Oregon system.

Oregon should continue to legislatively carve out an exemplary school finance program of its own design and volition. The action of the 1973 Legislative Assembly is mute testimony to the fact that we have not been relying on a court decision to spur Oregon to action.

This funding is available for two basic programs: research grants and editing grants; however, the Endowment sets very specific limits on the actual areas of study they will consider. They cite as examples; the definitive biography of Thomas Jefferson, a complete edition of the letters and journals of Lord Byron, and an archaeological excavation of a pre-Columbian site at Chaco Canyon, New Mexico. DIANA TAYLOR, STUDENT HEALTH NURSE, has received the good news: she has been chosen as one of ten nurses in the U.S. to attend an 11-week family planning course at the University of New Jersey this summer. This course is part of the program of Planned Parenthood-World Population, Inc., of New York. The full-tuition scholarship is valued at about \$4,000; and Diana, who will be on unpaid leave for the duration of the study, will also receive a stipend of \$250 per month to cover her personal expenses.

Presently only four nurses in the state have received family planning training. Laura Oswalt, director of Student Health Services, says Diana's training will fit guidelines currently being drawn in the state legislature to allow nurses extended responsibilities, including certain family planning duties now performed only by physicians. The addition of a trained family planning specialist on campus, she believes, will help shift some of the load from the county health department and open the door for more comprehensive health care for students.
