Dr. B. Lamar Johnson, Executive Director of the League for Innovation, will be on campus Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. In his visit to LCC Dr. Johnson hopes to accomplish two things:

First, he wishes to communicate to our staff more information about the League itself, the kinds of projects it is undertaking or plans to undertake in the coming year, etc.

Second, Dr. Johnson has heard much about LCC work in developing individualized instruction methods. We plan to sit down together and read over some of the proposals which resulted in projects under the Improvement for Undergraduate Instruction program, such as Evan Alford's Language Labs in Communications Skills, and the grant to develop individualized training for returning Corpsmen on which Bob Boettcher is presently working; and to visit instructional areas employing the new methods.

OPEN HEARING ON HB2263 and proposed amendments will be held Thursday afternoon at 3:30 in the President's Dining Room, CEN124. Jim Ellison and Mike Room, will be present to answer questions regarding OEA and AFT proposed amendments to the bill.

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IN A LETTER TO DR. SHELTON, Executive Secretary of OCCA, President Needham of Linn-Benton CC speaks of having the opportunity to listen to Senator Boe on the Governor's tax package. "He did an excellent job in presenting materials in favor of passage, with which I certainly concur. I feel it is good legislation and I would support its approval. However," writes President Needham, "I do have a concern about the presentations, and that concern is the confusion for the citizens on the method the community colleges will use for taxing in the future. . . .It is imperative that people understand that community colleges are not part of the Governor's plan, and that they will have the ability to tax for operation and bonds in the future."

In a note to all persons working with the media Dr. Shelton asks that newscasters "clarify for citizens that no change is planned for use of property tax to assist in support of community college programs."



Washington Monitor-Education U.S.A. for April 2 is in. Among items of interest:

. . .elementary and secondary schools are being warned by officials from the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and the HEW Office for Civil Rights that they will be required to follow equal opportunity practices and to eliminate sex discrimination in the treatment of students. Until now, with few exceptions, only higher education has been required to meet antidiscrimination regulations.

Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits, for the first time, discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex or national origin in all employment practices in public and private schools and colleges.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 specifies that any education program or activity receiving federal assistance may not discriminate against anyone - employee or student - on the basis of sex. Private nonvocational schools and undergraduate colleges are exempt from Title IX's nondiscrimination admission procedures.

Enforcement of antidiscrimination procedures for employment at higher education institutions has sparked heated controversy, particularly in the area of sex discrimination, according to <u>Washington Monitor</u>. Several white men's groups have charged colleges with "reverse discrimination." And women's organizations complain that federal agencies have been "extremely slow" in taking any definitive action against noncomplying universities. "OCR, caught in the middle, cites successes on both fronts," according to <u>Monitor</u>, "an ombudsman to investigate white male complaints and a study by OCR's Dallas regional office which reports that between July 1971 and June 1972 the 29 colleges studied increased their hiring of minorities and women by 46%."

AT YESTERDAY'S OPEN MEETING for the Classified Section, Jim Ellison and Mike Rose answered questions and discussed the merits of the many amendments proposed for HB2263. This is the law that would define and establish collective bargaining for Public Employees. The three amendments under consideration at yesterday's meeting were the ones proposed by OEA, OFT, and OCCA. All address the problem of procedures to be taken when the bargaining process breaks down. The "work stoppage" provisions of the OCCA amendment are, of course, an extreme case; more likely to be of immediate concern are the provisions for binding arbitration which, in some form, are found in all three amendments.

Copies of the OFT and OCCA amendments are available on Lee Savage's desk (2nd floor, ADM) for study by concerned staff members. The Daily earnestly recommends all members of the Classified Section take a few minutes to read and compare.

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THE OREGON STATE BOARD OF AERONAUTICS issued an airport license to LCC last Thursday - to our knowledge, the first time a community college has been so designated. The license officially states that LCC is a private use airport, to be used only with permission of school administration. A navy. . . an air force. . .what next?

1973 MARCH OF DIMES WALKATHON has been set for Saturday, April 28, beginning at 8 a.m. from Hannum Datsun, with the illustrious Prefontaine serving as Honorary Chairman. The walk route covers 20 miles of territory in Eugene and Springfield.

The idea of the Walkathon, for those who have neither walked nor sponsored walkers, is that each walker is backed by a group of sponsors pledging a certain amount for each mile completed. The walker finds his own sponsors, negotiates the pledge (anywhere from 1c a mile up), and comes back with his certified mileage to collect; all monies go to the fight against birth defects.

Details are posted on bulletin boards in the Center and Administration. And your Editor will start the ball rolling with an offer of 10c per mile to the first two walkers that apply.

A proposal was developed by Marston Morgan, Director of Institutional Research and Planning, working with Dr. Loomis of the State Department of Education, with the tentative title, "Improving Efficiency in Educational Management Based on the Educational Renewal Approach." When we showed the draft of Marston's paper to Dr. Johnson, he became so interested in the possibilities demonstrated that. . . well, my Administrative Assistant, Bert Dotson, and Marston Morgan are on their way to California as I dictate this for a meeting with representatives from seven or eight member colleges; Dr. Loomis and Mr. Manasse will join them and I expect the result of their conference to be the final draft of a proposal to the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education.

THE HUMANITIES FILM FORUM, produced by KCET of Los Angeles and funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, will present its initial program Thursday evening. In a release put out by NEH and available in the Office of Community Services the Film Forum is described as including ten outstanding films from Italy, Russia, France, England, and the U.S. Each film will be shown without interruption and followed by a discussion among distinguished humanists of issues and ideas that bring historical perspective into the present. The common theme of the Forum will be "Man and Authority" - the problem of people coming to grips with powers they did not create and cannot control.

"The discussion that conclude most segments of <u>The Humanities Film Forum</u>," the brochure states, "are designed to illustrate both the time-bound and time-less qualities of the films. Scholars from various humanistic disciplines, including history, philosophy, drama, anthropology, and comparative literature, address themselves to a number of questions that may also prove instructive to teachers considering the use of fictional films in their own courses."

This Thursday's presentation will be the film version of "Hamlet" made by Tony Richardson in 1969, with Nicol Williamson in the title role. On succeeding Thursdays we will be given the opportunity to see Sir Laurence Olivier's "Richard III"; Vittorio De Sica's "Umberto D"; and the famous production of "Alexander Nevsky" made by Sergei Eisenstein in 1938 with the Prokofiev score. 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A PROPOSAL IS BEING SUBMITTED to the U.S. Office of Education to fund a project on performance-based educational renewal. This is an expansion of a consortium of six Oregon community colleges that have been participating in 12 course areas during the past twelve months.

At the present stage of development, interest has been shown by eight other League for Innovation community college districts in California, Arizona, and Texas. LCC is to be the contracting institution, and therefore is seeking to identify the Project Director.

It is anticipated that this will be a half-time responsibility. The Project Director would be responsible for conducting workshops (probably early fall); and the position will necessiate several trips to other districts of at least two-to-three days duration. Anyone interested in serving in the capacity of Project Director would have to be able to restructure his current assignment to be flexible during the period of the project, which will be between two and three years.

Being proposed is funding for 19 courses or programs to be developed for the ensuing year, of which 6 will be at LCC, 3 at other Oregon community colleges, and 10 in the League districts; additional work would be done in '74-75 and evaluation made in the '75-76 year.

A memorandum from President Schafer to the Board of Education:

Re: Reorganization Report

Effective July 1, 1973 are two major reorganizations. First, the programs within the Industrial Technology Department will be dispersed in the following manner:

- a. Drafting and all allied courses, and faculty, will be merged with the Electronics/Electricity Department.
- b. Forestry and all allied courses, and faculty, will be merged with the Science Department.
- c. Welding, Construction and Cabinet Making, and all allied courses, and faculty, will be merged within the Community Education Division.
- d. Clerical and other support staff of the Industrial Technology Department will be reassigned based on the need for additional services in other areas of the College.

Secondly, the Learning Resource Center and Study Skills Center will be merged and provide for one Director of the Learning Resource Center, Keith Harker. Dr. Howard Bird will become the Educational Technologist and work essentially with multimedia uses, individualized instruction, independent study and proposal writing for the LRC and related areas.

Jim Ellison will assume responsibility for the instructional portion of the Study Skills program. The attached LRC organizational chart clearly depicts the new structure which is, in my opinion, a far more effective and efficient use of available resources.

STATE SUPERINTENDENT DALE PARNELL, during his recent trip to Washington, asked a Congressional subcommittee on education to amend proposed federal legislation aimed at helping educationally disadvantaged students so that 75% of the appropriation be earmarked for preschool and elementary school program, with stress on prevention rather than remediation. "If we are to have zero rejects in our school systems, we must zero-in on prevention measures at the primary level," Dr. Parnell told the committee. "The way we have downgraded our lower grades indicates our upside-down priorities."

There are beautiful campuses; there are small, cozy, homely campuses; there are colleges with the atmosphere of an expensive Connecticut prep school; and there are colleges that feel and even smell like what one remembers of one's high school days: BUT THERE IS NOTHING SIMILAR TO OR EVEN RESEMBLING LCC. There are big-city colleges, and colleges that boast of and succeed in resembling educational super-markets. THAT'S NOT LCC'S STYLE.

If there is a true comprehensive two-year college in the State of Oregon, we have it here. Here is where people communicate. Here is where people speak out. Loud and clear. Anytime the spirit moves. Students, staff. . . even the President has his say.

And thereby hangs the tale: LCC people work and plan furiously for themselves and their college, loudly complaining all the while that, while they may have achieved improvement, things just aren't perfect. So the LCC delegation, asked to "rap" offers: "There is some feeling that staff/student communication should be improved" and a delegate who couldn't name a student on his/her campus looks smug and says, "we don't have that problem." LCC throws all its weight behind the move to obtain overtime pay for Classified workers; and when someone raises the question, "do any of the colleges have a policy on overtime pay?" guess which delegates raise their hands. "Do any of the colleges have an unemployment compensation benefit?" - "Yes, LCC, we know you do." "Medical and dental?" "Holiday schedule?" And so it goes.

We don't want to sound like the bloody rich kid, but we're proud that LCC is first with the most - even complaints. And we'll continue to be the college heard from and about because: 1/ we're willing to recognize a problem; 2/ we're willing - nay, eager - to wrangle endlessly toward improvement of a problem area; 3/ we expect and intend to have to try harder.

CHINA TODAY: Dr. Len Sampson of the Vancouver B.C. school system will visit campus next Wednesday to give an all-day program on Lodern China. 

From $\hat{2}$ to 3 p.m. he will give a talk on "Education in Modern China" which will be open to the entire campus. The all-campus meeting will be held in the Staff Lounge, second floor of the Center Building.



REPRESENTATIVES ON CAMPUS: Mr. Swinney of Southern Oregon College will be on campus today from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. to talk with students. On Monday, a representative from UofO will be here 9 a.m. to 3:30.

AT LAST NIGHT'S SPECIAL BOARD MEETING purchase of the 10+ acres of land on the opposite side of Gonyea Road was approved. This acquisition will both protect and gain control of the sewage lagoon for the college.

The purchase price of \$232,000 will come from funds set aside for construction and land acquisition, and will not dip into the operating budget. President Schafer noted that the purchase not only provides immediate protection and control of the lagoon, but will also save about \$50,000, which would have been a necessary expenditure this summer to prepare the lagoon for extra use by the apartment complex planning to build there. He said this purchase will support 1990 plan objectives to limit growth in the valley surrounding the college. Lane County Commissioners Ken Omlid and Nancy Hayward, and Larry Rice, Executive Direct of L-COG, all hailed the purchase as supportive of community growth objectives. President Schafer, in praising the Board for "its vision in seizing this opportunity," noted that the purchase is important for at least 6 reasons:

- . . . avoids a \$50,000 outlay for lagoon expansion by aeration
- . . .removes a thorn from the side of Lane County Commissioners who, because a zone change for the apartments was approved in 1968, were put in the position of supporting a violation of the 1990 plan
- . . . avoids the possibility of a condemnation proceeding
- . . . controls development at the entrance to the college
- . . . acquires land which some day could be very valuable
- . . . allows the institution to serve additional students

CHINA TODAY, the all-day program given by Dr. Len Sampson in which he discussed various aspects of the life of the 800,000,000 people in the People's Republic of China 4 was fresh, fun, and informative. Dr. Sampson's enthusiasm for his subject is contagious. Some nuggets of information your Editor recalls:

- . . .Mao Tso Tung has cut three years from the basic schooling (K-12); and upon completion of secondary school (called "middle school") all students must go to work. After three years in the work force, they may apply for admission to the university, where their acceptance is dependent upon the kind of recommendation they receive from the peer group with which they are working. The average entrance age of university students is 21.
- . . .schools are required to be at least partially, if not wholly, self-supporting. One high school we saw pictured has a flourishing pharmacy business; another markets chemicals. The students first perform work in the classroom, then put it to practical use in the commercial annex.
- . . .food is critical to this over-populated, over-farmed land. Everyone shares in the production of food. Most non-urban schools have farms where the students share in the work of producing their own sustenance. At harvest times, schools close and students and teachers flock to the fields to help bring the crops in.
- . . .in China there is no litter, no problem of disease-carrying house flies (literally! They were wiped out by a concerted government campaign), and no pets to share the alw -valued food. However, Dr. Sampson reported that although meat is scarce, the diet is adequate.

However, they note that for the year earlier, community colleges had experienced an 11.9 per cent increase.


