PLANNING FOR LCC'S 10TH ANNIVERSARY observance next year is underway, reports Chairman Larry Romine. Proposed activities to date: soft-cover book on the history of Eugene Technical-Vocational School, with roster of graduates, and alumni banquet at which former ETVS director Bill Cox would present the book; soft-cover book on LCC's first 10 years, with roster of alumni; soft-cover book, Six Shorts by Long John (short stories by John Howard, Chairman of Language Arts) from LCC Press; special 10th year campaign for the Development Fund; special 10th year graphics to be used on stationery and other publications; possible meeting of League for Innovation Board on LCC campus with possible public address by president of AACJC; hosting by LCC of ACPRA meeting in Eugene in late January; possible short film of visual highlights of LCC's first 10 years; some special convocations and other anniversary publications. This is only the beginning; ideas for major faculty, staff, and student involvement will continue to be sought. LR's extension is 349.

AN ENVIRONMENTAL TRAINING WORKSHOP is planned at Portland CC, August 6-17. It will bring together 35 college teachers who will be able to establish interdisciplinary courses in environmental education on their own campuses. It will present many facets of the environmental situation: economic, political, moral, behavioral, anthropological, as well as scientific, and have the participants develop curriculum materials on those topics.

The two-week workshop is funded by HEW. A stipend of \$75 per week will be awarded the 35 participants and another 15 can be accepted without stipend. No academic credit is offered. Deadline for submitting applications to PCC is July 15. Applications forms are available from Dean Case's office; see bulletin board, ADM, for details.

SOME QUOTES FROM COLLEGE MANAGEMENT, April issue. "Adult Education: Where the bread and action are":

... What is really revving up enrollments beyond anyone's expectations are the programs that can be pursued part-time, off-campus and by nontraditional means, yet rate the same credits and lead to the same degrees as the courses requiring full-time attendance on campus.

... The California State University at Chico reports that its 100 off-campus undergraduates in public administration are equaling the academic achievement of their counterparts taking classes on campus.

... Minnesota Metropolitan State College of St. Paul makes a contract with the student, based on an assessment of his education goals and how he proposes to achieve them. "Once we've made a contract, we don't expect to see a lot of our students until they come back and tell us they're ready for their final assessment," says President David E. Sweet. "They are on their own, and when you convince people they've got autonomy and responsibility, they'll kill themselves making good."

DONATIONS OF \$70 SCHOLARSHIPS to the Development Fund campaign may be earmarked for the summer sports program. The 6-week program, which begins June 18, will feature instruction in baseball, basketball, track and field, handball, weight training and badminton for boys from low-income families aged 14-17. Covered by the \$70 tuition are cost of instruction, equipment (except for sneakers, T-shirt, and gym trunks), accident insurance, locker and towels, and a computer print-out of the student's progress. Department Chairman Dick Newell says scholarships would be granted on a basis of financial need.

THE WALL STREET JOURNAL STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AWARD for this year has been won by Barbara Putnam of 3465 Harris Street in Eugene. Miss Putnam is a second-year student in the accounting program. She was selected for the award by the faculty of the Business Department. Her name will be added to the permanent plaque donated by WSJ and she will be presented with a commemorative medal at a ceremony which the Daily will announce later.

A FIGHT OVER LEADERSHIP OF AFT is reported in the current Education U.S.A. President David Selden has accused Albert Shanker, head of the New York United Federation of Teachers (UFT) of trying to take over control of the 275,000-member national union. Selden, in a newspaper interview, said Shanker was trying "to make a run around right end" by gaining support of the AFT executive board for a seat on the executive council of AFL-CIO, the parent union of AFT. Shanker, according to Selden, is strictly an AFL-CIO man, while he reserves the right to question its policies; also, Selden is known to place teacher unity ahead of AFL-CIO affiliation. When the merged NEA-AFT membership in New York is added to AFT in June, New York will have 190,000 members, or slightly better than one-half of the total AFT membership.

Shanker has said that the UFT will not support Selden for re-election.

STANLEY CHAPPLE, former conductor of the St. Louis and Seattle Symphonies, and violinist Charles Heiden will be the judges at the 7th annual Young Artists Competition scheduled for 2 p.m. a week from Sunday here on campus. Mr. Chapple led the St. Louis Philharmonic, Civic Chorus, and Opera Company from 1946 to 1951. He conducted the Seattle orchestra from 1951 to 1954; and, since 1963, has been head of the symphony and opera at University of Washington. Mr. Heiden is concertmaster of the Peter Britt Orchestra and also conducts the Salem Symphony. Following the competition, which is co-sponsored by LCC and the Eugene Junior Symphony, Mr. Chapple will hold a seminar on "the future of the young artist."

Competition is open to all Lane County music students still in elementary, junior, or senior high school. Three scholarship prizes are offered; and the winner of first place will have the opportunity to perform a major concerto with the Eugene Junior Symphony in its fall season.

Admission to the program is \$1, with proceeds going to the scholarship fund.

DOUG WHITE, Chairman of Paramedical/Paradental, has announced an extension for registration in the dental assistant and inhalation therapy programs for fall term. A STATEMENT FROM DR. PARNELL, Superintendent of Public Instruction, on the defeat of Measure No. 1 in Tuesday's vote:

Never in the history of Oregon have we seen a greater outpouring of energy to solve a problem than in the work done in Governor Tom McCall's school finance-property tax relief plan. Unfortunately, the plan did not become reality.

So as they say, it's back to the drawing board. I hope the loyal opposition will pick up the chalk and work as hard for an alternate solution as they have in defeating this plan. It always seems easier to pick something apart than to put the pieces together. And I hope the opponents, who said they could live with 50 to 60 percent state support for elementary and secondary education, will not suddenly move out of that neighborhood.

While many must be commended for their effort to get the people to support the measure - among them Senate President Jason Boe and House Speaker Dick Eymann - not enough can be said for Governor McCall, who served as architect, builder, and salesman of a plan which was fair to schools and taxpayers.

Although the plan has been defeated, let's hope the public schools have not lost. The election has ushered in more awareness of school finance and related complexities in the last few months than in any other time in the history of this state. . .

ALLIANCE FOR ARTS EDUCATION: The U.S. Office of Education and the Kennedy Center of Washington DC have joined in a program to "make students more aware of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts when they come to Washington." It is also expected to promote students performances and arts displays at the Center and to inform the public about student talent. Forbes Rogers, formerly of the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, will serve as director, working with Harold Arberg of the Office of Education Arts and Humanities program. Regional meetings are to be held this month, to help states and localities develop projects for the program.

VOUCHER PLANS are very much in the educational news these days. Vermont has in committee a plan which would permit any resident elementary or secondary pupil to elect to attend any public or private school in the state approved by the state board of education and have the school district in which he resides pay his tuition. The OEO is putting an additional \$4.6 million into the test project in Alum Rock Union Elementary School District, San Jose, California. This demonstration project, which went into operation last fall, was initially funded with \$1.8 million for a 2-year program serving 4,000 students in six elementary schools. Under the Alum Rock "regulated" voucher plan, open admissions would be required, and extra money for compensatory education provided; parents are forbidden to supplement vouchers with their own money.

A NIGHT HIGH SCHOOL and an "alternative" elementary school are two of the innovative programs school board Chairman Sam Frear envisions for Eugene. In an interview with Jim Sellers which appeared in Sunday's Eugene Register Guard, Mr. Frear sees the "alternative" grade school as a means of equalizing enrollment among existing school buildings, some of which are now under- and others over-enrolled. "The idea is to take a central school -- Condon or Lincoln, probably -- and come up with a really exciting program that would be so significantly different and have such heavy parental involvement that kids from all over the district would want to go there."

Speaking of the night high school, the Board Chairman sees it as serving "students who have dropped out, are working and realize they've made a mistake. A significant proportion of our high school students are completely disenchanted," he says. "We ought to be looking at that problem, at what we can do."

once put it, seems to be taking some time. However, in 1966, the actual arts/humanities appropriation was just over \$6 million, so some progress is being made."

However, we note now that this Administration recommendation is in trouble with Congress, this time for being too generous. Senator Proxmire, calling for a cutback to \$120 million (the final recommendation from President Nixon called for \$155 million in FY '74) notes that the sum proposed by the President far exceeds his recommendation of \$78 million for the Peace Corps. The Senator's other argument is that too-rapid expansion of funds for arts and humanities could lead to "a government take-over of the arts in this country. That means the dead hand of government and the dead hand of censorship over art."

Oh, come now, Senator! \$155 million spread over 51 states among a people as knowledgeable as modern Americans?

vertently created another state of the Union in yesterday's writeup on FY '74 funding recommendations for the National Endowment of Arts/Humanities. That's us - 101% American.

AT YESTERDAY'S CABINET MEETING a lengthy discussion was held on the proposal for a student-sponsored cooperative effort with BRING. Student representative Bernie Pinney and Business Manager Bill Watkins presented the proposal, which is, briefly, that students will design, construct, maintain, and arrange for BRING pickup from, two large collection boxes of the type presently situated around town by the Eugene Mission. LCC people will be encouraged to deposit discarded paper of all kinds, except for coated papers. Bill Cox, Superintendent of College Facilities, expressed some concern about the appearance and maintenance of the two collection boxes. After receiving Mr. Pinney's assurances as to the design and maintenance of the receptacles, the President approved the plan on a trial basis, possibly to run through Fall term.

Bert Dotson addressed the meeting on the results of his first session on proposal evaluation as LCC representative to the League for Innovation. Besides numerous idea papers, he took with him to the meeting two fully-developed proposals, one submitted by Allan Gubrud and one by Gary Rholl. Both received the League's C-1 rating, indicating: "Recommended for action, with League commitment to assist." We hasten to add that League commitment is in expertise, not money; still, it is a favorable evaluation, and complimentary to LCC's own expertise.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE FOURTH ANNUAL MDT CONFERENCE has been received:

"Perspectives for Planning," to be held at Inn at Spanish Head, Lincoln City, June 10-15, is a workshop designed for planning teams of administrative, vocational, and supportive personnel. ACTION TO RE-STRUCTURE OCCA was initiated at the annual convention last Friday and Saturday. Discussions held in the Friday meetings resulted in a near-unanimous decision to suspend rules at the final Delegate Assembly on Saturday. Grant Levins, Board member from Umpqua, read the following position statement from the Board Section:

1. The Board Section is in complete support of a revised Oregon Community College Association.
2. With this continued support, desire a re-evaluation or re-structuring of the present OCCA.
3. During the past years, considerable time and effort has been spent in adopting various resolutions which are of little value as state-wide policy. Many of these resolutions are not adopted by individual members because of area or size differential of the various colleges. The Board section believe that this time and effort can be better spent in other areas.
4. Convention activities should include workshops for all sections, exchange of information and problems. Each of the sections might meet to share information of their areas of particular concern. Thereafter, each section may present a position paper or summary of their concern before the entire assembled convention. The proceedings of the convention should be recorded and summarized for eventual distribution to all interested people.
5. The Board Section earnestly solicits the participation of the various sections and schools for further revisions of the activities of the OCCA. We further believe that this must be accomplished with the utmost haste.

Dean Rasmussen then presented a rough-draft motion from the Administrative Section, the three points of which were:

1. That the Coordinating Committee take steps to strengthen its rule in OCCA.
2. That the relationship between the Delegate Assembly and the Coordi-

HB3209, CREATING THE OFFICE of Commissioner for Community Colleges, came before the House Education Committee last Thursday, and President Schafer went to Salem to testify in its favor. As amended, the bill reads:

The Department of Education shall function under the direction and control of the State Board of Education.

The Department of Education shall consist of: a/ the State Board of Education; b/ the State Textbook Commission; c/ the Office of the Commissioner for Community Colleges...

The State Board of Education shall appoint an executive officer for community colleges who shall be known as the Commissioner for Community Colleges, and who shall serve at the pleasure of the board. The board may appoint one or more assistants as may be necessary...

Any reference in ORS chapter 341 to the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be considered a reference to the Commissioner for Community Colleges. For the purpose of harmonizing and clarifying statute sections published in Oregon Revised Statutes, the Legislative Counsel may substitute for words designating the Superintendent of Public Instruction wherever they occur in ORS chapter 341, words designating the Commissioner for Community Colleges. There are transferred to, imposed upon, and vested in the Commissioner for Community Colleges all the duties, functions, and powers of the Superintendent of Public Instruction under ORS chapter 341.

We have quoted just those parts of the amendments having special interest to LCC. Anyone interested in seeing the entire amendments or the original bill may consult the legislative printouts in OCS.

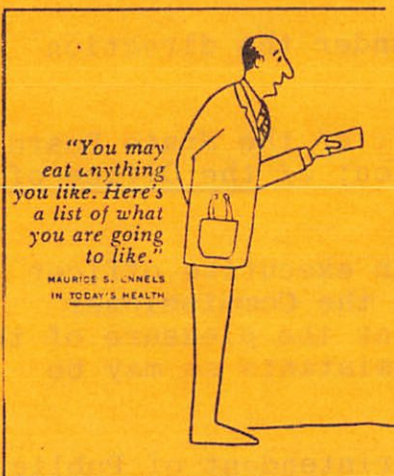
