Memo to the staff from President Schafer:

The passing of William M. Bristow, Jr., whom most of us knew as "Bill," reminds us again of the prominent and all-important role played in the development of LCC by our volunteer, elected Board of Education members. Bill was the first Board chairman, serving in that capacity in 1964-65 and in 1965-66, and was the only person ever to serve more than one year as chairman. His was a steady hand at the ship's wheel at a time when Board and Administration were pounding out basic philosophy and doing the long-range planning which in large measure has made the college what it is today. Behind Bill's strength was a quiet, persuasive charm which in Board executive sessions could turn strong differences of opinion into unanimity. He presided with sureness and confidence, yet with a willingness to hear all sides of each question, with a wry wit that inevitably erupted when most needed, and - above all with patrician dignity.

We remember with gratitude his service as vocational advisor for the State Board of Education, his two decades as chairman of the Eugene Apprenticeship Council, and his chairmanship of the Board Section of OCCA. In 1967, he received the Oregon Vocational Award for outstanding service in vocational education; and at the time of his death he was still serving as an Honorary Trustee of the LCC Development Fund corporation.

Bristow Square, the area north of the Center Building, was named for Bill Bristow's great-great grandfather, Elijah Bristow, who was the first white settler in Lane County.

MANY LCC STAFF MEMBERS were disappointed by the error in the Register-Guard news story which prevented their paying their last respects to William M. "Bill" Bristow, Jr. Services were correctly announced as Monday morning in the obituary column; however, the news story was head-lined: "Bristow funeral Tuesday."

The R-G made amends, though, with a splendid editorial, "The community lost a good man." Of course, the paragraph on LCC was particularly pleasing to all of us here on campus: "The real loss that came of his illness was to vocational education, the interest that led Bristow to help nurse Lane Community College from an idea to vigorous adulthood. There would have been an LCC without Bristow, but it wouldn't have been quite the excellent institution that it is had he not spent all those hours with such great concern."

THE COUNSELING DEPARTMENT WILL OFFER a Women's Workshop the week of July 23-27. Class will meet from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. under the direction of Patrick Fraleigh. It will carry 2 credit hours, at a cost of \$20.

AT YESTERDAY'S INSTRUCTIONAL COUNCIL President Schafer spoke briefly with some most welcome news. LCC is to receive \$1,190,000 above what was expected in state allocation monies for construction. This will exhaust monies coming to the college under prior credit for the next (1973-75) biennium; and there is a possibility that this allocation will mark the end of the prior credit monies. However, it is greatly in excess of what LCC expected for the biennium, and the President indicated that meetings would begin soon to discuss priorities for using the additional funds. . American Ethnic Folklore, Seminar in American Ethnic Folklore, Folklore Collecting & Community Study (Eng 211, 212, 213) recommended; Black American Music (Mus 210) deleted.

DISCUSSION OF INTERNAL REORGANIZATION: In a memorandum to various elected staff representatives and OCCA delegates. President Schafer writes: "I have suggested that membership in the College Cabinet be restructured to include the elected OCCA representatives among others ... If we can find a way to build the elected OCCA representatives into the LCC governance structure, we will thereby strengthen the state organization as well as improve our internal communication system." He is calling for an initial meeting of the group for the purpose of discussing the proposed restructuring on Tuesday, July 10, at 10:30 a.m. in the Board Room.

AT WEDNESDAY EVENING'S BOARD MEETING:

. . .the Board and most of LCC's administrators journeyed to Florence and toured the suggested sites for the Siuslaw Education Center. Board negotiations are pending on two potential sites; and with the Economic Development Act people on the possibility of some matching funding for the Education Center.

. . .Larry Murray and Al Owens presented further material on proposed programs for the Siuslaw Education Center for the coming year.

. . .Stephen Reid was elected Board Chairman for the coming year, with John Barber as Vice-Chairman.

. . .and Dr.Charlene Curry, educator presently teaching in the Graduate School at UofO, was sworn in as Board Member for Zone 3, to complete the term of resigned Board Member Bob Ackerman.

INTERNAL REORGANIZATION: At a meeting called by the President this past Tuesday, Dean Rasmussen, Dick Newell, Mike Rose, Ted Romoser, Zita Brevig, Margaret Knutson, Jean Shaffer, Dean Carter, Jim Ellison and Bert Dotson exchanged ideas on what form of organization and representation should replace the disbanded President's Cabinet. Dr. Schafer remarked that one priority would be to make maximum use of the allday visit of Dr. William Hitt, Executive Director of the Batelle Center for Improved Education, next Tuesday. Dick Newell, Mike Rose, and Dear Carter will be attending a League for Innovation-Batelle conference at Peralta in August, where the work done in the first year of the threeyear "Project Usher" on increasing the effectiveness of educational management in community colleges will be discussed and evaluated. The meeting with Dr. Hitt here on campus will be preliminary to that meeting.

At President Schafer's request, Dean Rasmussen spoke on the recent two-day Charrette, organized for the purpose of changing the system as it pertains to curriculum. Dean Rasmussen expressed himself as pleased and impressed with the results of the "Charrette" type of workshop which, briefly, is a method of maximizing results by the employment of a tight time-structure controlled by "facilitators,"

He suggested that such a workshop might be helpful in the identification of goals for the re-structuring of college governance in accordance with the desired objective of making it participative by all segments of the campus.

Agreement was finally reached to adopt a series of "ad hoc" committees at the President's discretion to handle questions of campus governance until the delegation returns from Peralta with its report and recommendations.

A DOOR-TO-DOOR SURVEY that will attempt to point up what Lane County adults want in the way of programs and classes at LCC is being conducted by the Office of Institutional Research. Thirty-six LCC workstudy students and young people hired through the Neighborhood Youth Corps are involved in the canvass, working for Coordinator Earl Barrios, who is back at LCC (Earl is a June, 1972 graduate) on loan from L-CAP. The survey, which will take about six weeks, is scheduled to reach 7,000 to 9,000 post-high school adults.

OREGON STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION announces two openings for vocational personnel from the State of Oregon to participate in a leadership development program for vocational-technical education under Part F of the Education Professions Development Act. The program is designed to develop leaders in vocational education and will emphasize graduate leve study with a short term intern experience. Program will be at OSU start ing September 1973 and running through August 31, 1974. Each candidate will receive a stipend of \$4,200 plus \$500 per dependent for the 12month program. Applications must be received by the State Department of Education by July 20. See bulletin board for details.

MR. AND MRS.VELIE visited campus Wednesday with Superintendent of Public Instruction Dale Parnell and Leonard Kunzman, Director of Career Education for the State of OREGON. Mr. Velie is a roving editor of <u>Reader's</u> <u>Digest</u> here to gather material for an article on career offerings in secondary schools. He is particularly interested in the possibilities presented by close liaison between secondary schools and community colleges; and the community college system of Oregon is, of course, generally recognized as one of those most fully realizing the concept of continuing/career education, and the desired close relationship with secondary school training. Bert Dotson reports Mr. Velie as "tremendous ly impressed" with what he saw here.

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A SPECIAL BOARD MEETING was called Wednesday evening, July 18, for consideration of the proposed building of the Siuslaw Education Center; and for discussion of priority items under the expanded funding now available for construction and re-modeling. In Board action:

. .decision was made to proceed with plans for the Siuslaw Education Center on the site adjacent to the High School. During a site inspection tour with the local representative of the Economic Development Act, it had become apparent that local preference was for the high school site; and, by building there, LCC will have the advantage of sharing the parking lot and sewage facilities already installed for the high school.

. . .a Supplementary Construction Budget totalling \$141,385 was accepted by the Board, calling for:

Restoration of previous deletions to the Performing Arts Building, \$104,175

Remodeling Forum and Industrial Technology Building, \$22,527

Minor alterations in Art & Applied Design, Electronics; and Science Buildings, \$7,100

An uncommitted balance of \$1,049,152 will remain for further remodeling and/or construction.

the autocratic model, operating from the top down and resulting in the institutional "pecking order" - the industrial model

the labor-management model, or "us versus them." Each side tries to maximize its own gains and minimize the gains of the other side. This produces a polarization which is the anti-

the "laissez-faire" model, which may have evolved in education as "a misinterpretation of academic freedom; it is assumed that each instructor should be given unrestricted freedom in the classroom." If this were valid, Dr. Hitt concludes, there would be no need for managers.

Rejecting these three approaches, Dr. Hitt projects the "humanistic management model," which he calls "participative management." Space prevents our going into detail on this new concept, but any staff member who wishes to read the preliminary report on <u>Project Usher-Increasing</u> <u>the Effectiveness of Educational Management in Community Colleges</u> may borrow our copy by called X-339 and asking.

Dr. Hitt was entertained and enlightened by his visit to LCC, as well as vice versa. Mel Gaskill gave a short exposition of the instructional methods and "learning packages" used in the Mechanics Department which caused Dr. Hitt to remark that he had heard much of LCC prior to our joining the League for Innovation and had been curious to know just what had gained for us our enviable reputation as one of education's bestknown innovators. Larry Romine spoke of the open, cooperative style of his small department of four, to which the visitor replied that it was his impression that, if LCC were to adopt the participative management model, it would be a case of building on the existing model, rather than scrapping an old management model for a new.

PRESIDENT SCHAFER will conclude his meeting with the College Presidents today and start on a short vacation - indulging one of his favorits hobbies with a fishing trip to B.C. The President will return to campus on Monday, July 30.
