A 7-MEMBER STATE CORRECTIONS EDUCATION COMMISSION has been appointed by the State Board of Education to study educational programs at the state correctional institutions and make recommendations for the administration and operation of those programs. This is in accordance with Senate Bill 867, passed during the last session of the legislature.

WOMEN COMPRISE 22.5 PERCENT of the nation's 254,930 full-time college and university faculty members on 9- and 10-month contracts, according to a report from the Office of Education. LCC has about 26% females in this category. "Although community colleges are known to do better than 4-year institutions in percentages of females employed as full-time faculty," says Jan Brandstrom, Chairman of the LCC Status of Women Committee, "LCC appears to be only 3.5% above the national average."
