AUGUST 29 BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING: Architects Briscoe and Berry of Eugene will design an LCC classroom building for Florence. They will prepare preliminary drawings for submission in mid-September to the Economic Development Administration, which is being asked to approve a grant to build the structure next to Siuslaw High School. The grant could amount to several hundred thousand dollars. Funding director Dick Eymann is optomistic about the possibility of LCC getting the grant.

LCC proposes to teach such courses at Florence as small engine repair; auto, truck and farm mechanics; marine equipment maintenance; office occupations; health and safety programs; and conservation and planning.

In other business, the Board hired a new chairman (there were 127 applicants) for the Mass Communication Department. John Elliott III, 35, is a 10-year Army veteran whose major assignment was in telecommunications. He played a significant role in the introduction of NBC and CBS radio and television into Vietnam. He has a bachelors in speech from UO, masters in radio/tv/film from Auburn, and has been working toward a doctorate in speech at UO.

And the Board accepted with regret the resignation of Data Processing Department Chairman Floyd Wilkes, effective last Friday. He moved to Salt Lake City to join Xerox, after 6 years at LCC.

IF THE WASH WATER in the restrooms seems cooler these days, it's because it is. To conserve electricity, Bill Cox has cut the water temperature to "warm" rather than "hot". It's just one of the ways LCC is pitching in to help ease the energy crisis.

* Parking lot lights are going off at 11 p.m. instead of 1 a.m.

* Outside air intake to the blowers has been cut slightly, meaning there'll be less fresh air in the buildings.

* Thermostats are being lowered from 71 to 69 degrees.

* Custodians will turn off lights after they have completed cleaning a room, and all staff members are asked to turn off lights when they leave a room or area.

* Those occupying offices where there are extra light tubes are asked to have some disconnected. (Dean Jack Carter is having a whole row shut off: And letting himself in for jokes about being "in the dark" a good deal of the time anyway.)

* Physical education dirty laundry will be done when possible in larger batches. Washers handling 200-pound loads, as compared to small 40-pound washers, use relatively less water, scap and electricity, Bill explains.

He's looking for other ideas for conserving energy. Got any suggestions?

NOTES FROM THE AUG. 31 ADMINISTRATIVE DISCUSSION SESSION:

* The LCC-Six who went to Stephens College, Mo., Aug. 8-18 under sponsorship of the Danforth Foundation came back brimming with ideas. They focused on the problem of stabilizing enrollment, identifying students not being served, how to contact them, programs they need and how to get the programs to them.

Vertical access, the idea of a student entering where he is and working up, was stressed. Ways need to be developed to do this while maintaining standards. Such adjustments are necessary if the community is to be served, it was pointed out.

The committee is to have its written report to Danforth by mid-November. Continuing support (\$\$\$\$) from Danforth may follow.

- * A study of enrollment curves from 1965-73, from Institutional Research, indicates that some college transfer programs which earn much more FTE reimbursement than they spend are experiencing declining enrollment. That "extra" money helps support the more expensive tech-voc programs. This means unit costs will climb. The over-all fiscal situation also is threatened by the apparent desire of some legislators to cut out reimbursements for many of the very popular Adult Education so-called "hobby" courses.
- * The LCC-Three who went to Peralta CC at Oakland in early August heard a Battelle spokesman describe LCC as "closest in the nation to program budgeting." They'll be reporting to staff on participative management and what they learned about writing programmed instructional packages.
- * Lew Case, among 40 deans from across the country meeting in California at Feather River CC, Tearned that LCC is among the Teaders in the nation in individualized instruction. LCC can learn, however, from Coast CC about computer assisted instruction and from Golden West CC about instructional use of open circuit tv.
- * Chemistry Prof Steve John studied techniques for creating self-instructional units at a League for Innovation Institute for Implementing a Systems Approach, held at Colorado University August 5-17. He essentially completed one chemistry unit which he will use this fall term.

Steve says individualized instruction can improve success rates among students. He'll be sharing his enthusiasm for the Institute and the techniques he learned with other science teachers during in-service.

President Schafer commented that League membership will be well worth the cost if other faculty members can also profit from activities such as that in which Steve participated.

- * The Charrette to Evaluate the Curriculum Approval Process, held June 4 & 5 at Gerry Rasmussen's home, came up with several recommendations: that the Board of Education hould delegate curriculum approval to the president, that the president should establish an Instructional Priorities Committee to handle the responsibility, that the Instructional Council should take itself out of the process, and that the Curriculum Committee should be dissolved. The new Instructional Priorities Committee would set instructional priorities for the college (within Board policy), evaluate proposals against those criteria, and serve as an appeal body when necessary.
- * During in-service, announcements will be made concerning the accreditation report which the college must prepare in the coming year. Applicants for the Steering Committee will be sought.
- DR. KEN HILLS, director of counseling, is author of <u>Review and Analysis of Sources of Occupational Information for Career Education</u>, which is just off the press of the ERIC Clearinghouse on Vocational and Technical Education at Ohio State University. The material was prepared under contract with the National Institute of Education of HEW.

Ken wrote the book to help teachers identify and assess the various kinds and sources of occupational information. He presents an overview of the role of occupational information in career education, offers decision-making and career education models, identifies occupational information sources, and offers guidelines for assessment of occupational information.





Tomorrow morning's schedule includes a comprehensive review and explanation of HB2263, the collective bargaining bill. Authors of the bill, Theodore Kulongoski and Lon Mills, will lead the discussion. The meeting is from 9 - 10:15 a.m. in the Forum.

FRANCES HOWARD APPOINTED -- HEW's regional officers have appointed Frances Howard to the advisory council on student assistance programs. Frances joins a council comprised of 24 members from throughout the Northwest (Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska) which serves as a watchdog overseeing application processes, evaluation and funding of applications, plus the evaluation and auditing of funded projects. The council also serves as a liasion between the schools and region headquarters.

BOARD MEETING TOMORROW -- Wednesday's board meeting will include discussion on a wide variety of topics including: the Arthur Young study, the Siuslaw project, the proposed student budget, the "open meeting" legislation (SB 15) and the collective bargaining bill (HB 2263). 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
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WEDNESDAY SEPTEMBER 12, 1973

TODAY'S IN-SERVICE -- Today In-Service continues with two major meetings concerning the collective bargaining bill (HB 2263). The first, from 9 - 10:15 a.m., features the bill's authors, Theodore Kulongoski and Lon Mills. Kulongoski and Mills will be speaking in the Forum. Immediately afterward, still in the Forum, there will be a panel discussion on how the bill affects the college, the National Education Association and the American Federation of Teachers. Included on the panel are Evan Alford, moderator; two state representatives of the NEA and the AFT; Jack Kreitz, chairman of the SPPC Hearings Committee; and Mike Foy, chairman of the SPPC Bargaining Committee. The panel discussion is slated to last until 12:30 p.m. Departmental meetings will complete the day's activities, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

Tomorrow morning's session is a presentation by one state and two local officials who will explain new high school graduation requirements as outlined by the last legislature. Included in the discussion are David Fretwell, from the State Board of Education, William Worrel, Dist. 4-J, and Ron Burge, Springfield Dist. 19. The meeting begins at 9 a.m. in the Forum.

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

BOARD MEETING -- The Arthur Young classified study and the proposed student budget both brought heated discussion last night during the LCC Board of Education meeting. Bill Watkins and two representatives of the company briefed the Board on progress made since the report was made public last month and fielded several remarks from the audience. Jon West, noting that most of the subjects of the study are women, stated that "there are still some very glaring things in this report" concerning equal opportunity and affirmative action. Arthur Young's Roger Pringle replied that the company was hired primarily to write a job and salary study and that the practicalities of time and resources prevented them from going deeper into the subject of affirmative action. Counselor Jan Brandstrom echoed Jon's concerns about certain inadequacies in the study. Board member Charlene Curry asked both Jon and Jan for a report soon about specific points in the study that bother them. All the Board members agreed that it was too early to ratify the report until adjustments are made. Bill Watkins said that progress is being made on the supervisor hearings asked for by 33 classified personnel and that everyone will have plenty of time to appeal decisions made by the inhouse committee.

Redfox's budget proposal was discussed at length, particularly by Debbie Daggett and Dr. Brauer who were concerned by rumors that the students may cut the \$25,000 athletic budget severely. Some student leaders, those eyeing the budget cut, point to an agreement made two years ago to fund the athletic program for a five-year period and say that agreement is in violation of the ASLCC constitution. The \$102,000 student budget will be up for approval by the Board soon.

Other discussion included a progress report on the Siuslaw project, talk about HB2263 and SB15, and a slide report on the Danforth seminar. A full report to the staff will be made next Tuesday during In-Service.

The 1:30 mini-course on writing grant proposals has been cancelled. However, at a future time and date (to be announced in the Daily), Lyle Swetland and Dick Eymann will hold a round-table discussion on proposal writing for all interested staff members and students.

Tomorrow morning's meeting will concern long-range planning, with Marston Morgan leading the discussion. It begins at 9 a.m. in the Forum. Ed Ragozzino's Thursday mini-course will be held will be held in Forum 301 instead of the performing arts department.

YESTERDAY'S DANFORTH REPORT -- The non-traditional student is in for a lot of special attention during the next several years from higher education in general and Lane Community College in particular. That was the word yesterday from all six members of the Danforth Team that spent ten days this summer at a community college institute sponsored by the Danforth Foundation.

The six--Jim Ellison, President Schafer, Jay Jones, Gerry Rasmussen, Joyce Hops, and Board Chairman Steve Reid--noted that the non-traditional (or "New") student has ironically been left out in the cold by most of higher education, including the community college. Both Rasmussen and Jones said that the "open door" of Lane and other community colleges has often been, in reality, a "revolving door" through which many New Students come and go without ever really being served. Worse, they added, most New Students never even enter the door in the first place.

To get them through the door, and then to stay, is one of the major priorities set forth by the LCC team's proposal "to serve the common man uncommonly well". Marston Morgan, irector of institutional research, called the steps proposed by the Danforth group "the first step toward a new approach, a new attitude concerning long-range planning at Lane."

President Schafer told about 100 staff members that in outlining its proposed objectives before being invited to the institute, the team asked itself five questions. (a) Is a constant posture of enrollment growth really necessary to the college?, (b) Who and where are the students not yet being served?, (c) How can we contact them?, (d) What educational activities best serves them?, and (e) How can LCC best cooperate with other educational and community agencies with similar goals?

Joyce Hops, citing educator and writer Pat Cross, pinpointed at least the educational personality of the New Student (which she called "do-ers") with four basic generalities: They generally have a record of low academic performance, they often feel threatened and are motivated to avoid failure, they have little confidence in their ability, and are vocationally oriented--except for women who often don't know what they want to do. Joyce felt that one of our major priorities was finding a way to motivate and reward this non-traditional student. Others agreed and followed up with the real guts of the Danforth findings: a need on the part of the college, the entire college, to review the entire educational process. That includes instruction, student services, and recruitment. How all that will be done will be spelled out later in a full written report to the staff.

MEET DR. FLOYD -- There will be an open house and official welcome tomorrow from 1-3 p.m. for Dr. David Floyd in the student health service. Dr. Floyd replaced Tom Redfield as the physician at the health service.
