WATERGATE ON KLCC -- Gavel-to-gavel coverage of the second round of Watergate hearings will be carried live on KLCC beginning tomorrow at 7 a.m. The decision was made to carry the hearings after the three major networks announced this week they were dropping coverage of the current session, which is expected to last until the end of October. Earlier, Tom Lichty had opted to discontinue the National Public Radio coverage aired over KLCC but changed his mind when the major commercial networks pulled out. KLCC is at 90.3 on the FM dial.





CABINET MEETING---A surprising enrollment hike coupled with an on againoff again budget affected by legislative decisions about what is and what isn't a reimbursable ceiling highlighted yesterday's cabinet meeting in the Board Room.

The first meeting of them vised President's Cabinet wrestled with money problems as they tied in with the present budgetary process (described by business manager Bill Watkins as "making the best guess you can at the time with the best data you've got") fluctuating enrollment, and the whims of the state political machinery. Watkins reviewed the current budget process, noting that the only known fixed income was from taxes, and that payroll and fixed charges to the payroll accounted for about 85 percent of the expenses. An on-the-nose budget is difficult, if not nearly impossible under such conditions, he said. On top of that, the original budget approved last Spring under a reimbursable ceiling of 5810 FTE was nullified in July when the legislature raised the ceiling to 5893.

Both Bill and President Schafer agreed that LCC would have to go back to the drawing boards and that the instructional areas would be the most affected.

Other business included a report on the Charrette on curriculum development held late this summer. Dean Gerry Rasmussen reported that the Charrette investigated different ways to ease the curriculum development approval process by devising a method that would (a) examine curriculum fully, and (b) be both flexible and fast. Current methods are cumbersome and often bog down in a tangle of red tape. The key element resulting from the meeting was the feeling that a single organization, called the Instructional Priorities Committee, should be formed to work with the staff and with the

Board in establishing a workable system. The committee, which would be a standing committee, would be made up of members from throughout the campus community but primarily from instruction. Marston Morgan pointed out that instructional support areas should also be represented. A full report on the Charrette is available at the office of instruction.

RED FOX TO SPEAK---Student body president David Red Fox will speak today at noon on charges made against him at a July 25 press conference. Red Fox, who will also talk on the National Student Association, the Titan Code (the recently-published student handbook) and a new budget system, will speak in the cafeteria.

A total of 1,612 ex-GI's, up by more than 600 over last fall's total of 1,002, were enrolled by the end of the second week of classes. Of the total, 961 are taking vocational courses (a 100 percent increase), 637 are in degree programs, and 14 are enrolled in high school completion programs. Forty-four of the veterans are women.

ACCREDITATION IN PROCESS---An accreditation team from the American Dental Association is here today and tomorrow to inspect the LCC dental assistant program.

OEA PETITIONS FOR ELECTION---Friday, LCC became the first community college in Oregon to seek an election under HB 2263 to choose a bargaining agent for the college's staff. The necessary 30 percent of the faculty signed the OEA petition asking the state Public Employee Relations Board (PERB) to arrange the election; no date has been set. Steve Kenney, OEA president, and Ted Romoser, president of the LCC chapter, met with the press early Monday and outlined the association's objectives at the college. In a prepared statement Kenney said, "the OEA believes that we can represent community college teachers effectively, just as we represent teachers in public schools. We are ready to represent community college teachers this school year on any campus where teachers want to make substantial progress towards equitable salaries and fringe benefits, protection of basic teaching rights, and improvement of teaching conditions in the classroom."

Neither Romoser or Kennedy included classified employees in the proposed OEA bargaining group, though both admitted that such a possibility exists as a result of the election, particularly if PERB does not split the two groups for bargaining purposes. However, Romoser and Kenney both expect the PERB to do just that and feel that the classified staff should seek its own bargaining representative. Kenney suggested the classifed look to either the Oregon State Employees Association or the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFL/CIO) for possible representation. Both men also said, however, there was room for classified in the OEA and if the Association becomes the bargaining agent for a split campus a cooperative arrangement, perhaps a represent-by-fee system, would be established.



CABINET MEETING---Yesterday's Cabinet tentatively set Monday, Oct. 29 as the first "Brown Bag Lunch" day for administrators and staff leaders to eat lunch informally in heavily-travelled student areas. If the weather is nice the brownbaggers will bag it in the courtyard between the admin and center buildings. If it rains they'll eat in the cafeteria. Idea is, says John Kocher who stole it from UC/Berkeley, is to get students and administrators talking to each other. Brown Bag Lunch Days will continue throughout the school year. In other business, the Cabinet agreed in concept to a Classifed work schedule proposal that would allow flexible working hours (as long as the 40-hour week is met) and decided to make the issue part of the negotiating process. Also, in the eventuality the college must hold a budget election next year a tentative date of May 7 has been set aside as one of two or three we might pick. State law limits the dates an election can be held to March 26, Feb. 19, May 7, June 11, Sept. 24, and Nov. 12.

The new cabinet, by the way, is comprised of elected and appointed section leaders, Staff Association officers, SPPC representatives, and the student body president. The old cabinet was comprised chiefly of line officers and administrators.





STATEWIDE ENROLLMENT UP -- Fourth week reports from all of Oregon's community colleges show a 10 percent increase in students over last year's total and nearly double the increase shown between fall 1971 and fall 1972. Of the 13 community colleges, only Southwestern Oregon (Coos Bay) declined in enrollment. SWOCC went from 2,683 to 2,600. LCC went from 8,300 to 9,500. Portland Community College continues to lead the state with 26,000 students enrolled, an increase of more than 3,000 over last year's total.



CABINET TODAY -- Discussion items for today's Cabinet meeting include a proposed organizational change at the administrative level, a review of the November 14 board agenda, a progress report on the Arthur Young study, and a review of the new financial report format. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. in the Board Room.

CLASSIFIED WORKSHOP -- Saturday's OCCA classified workshop focused, as promised, on the full implications of HB2263 and what classified employees can expect from the over-all collective bargaining picture. One of the bill's authors, Ted Kulongoski, spoke to about 60 classified employees for more than 90 minutes before turning the rest of the program over to Jim Soukup of Pacific Power & Light (who spoke on the Energy Crisis) and Delma Jones of Ma Bell, who talked on personnel policies and related questions. Lisl Fenner, who coordinated the statewide event, has further details including a report on the T'ai Chi demonstration given by David Leung and five of his students.


