LCCEF wants to represent all staff, classified and faculty and administrators other than line officers, who work half-time or more. OEA/NEA would represent full-time faculty. Mike Rose, language arts professor, is LCCEF president; Ted Romoser, also a language arts professor, heads the LCC OEA group.



TO BE OR NOT TO BE -- Instructional Council will decide at its next meeting on November 15 whether it should continue to exist. It will choose between two recommendations made by a subcommittee: (1) to take itself out of the business of approving courses and programs, or (2) to dissolve the Council and assign its informal and formal functions elsewhere. The subcommittee, chaired by Gerry Rasmussen, included Gladys Belden, Darwin McCarrol and Douglas White. They responded to a recommendation of a summer study group which suggested that curriculum decisions become the responsibility of a yet-to-be organized faculty committee.

At Thursday's meeting, the Instructional Council voted to approve a series of second-year courses for pre-electronics engineering and the use of the "CJA" (criminal justice) prefix for some Social Science law enforcement courses. The new electronics courses may eventually require the addition of up to one FTE instructor, it was announced, if expected enrollment is realized.





ORGANIZATIONAL CHANGES---Discussion on possible sweeping changes in the college's organizational structure will be covered for the second straight week in today's Cabinet meeting. Preliminary talk last Tuesday made public some tentative proposals that would shift the organizational chart dramatically. Among some of the moves being discussed are the establishment of two major councils (called, for discussion's sake the Administrative and Legislative councils) and a new post called Dean of the College, heading an office of educational development. Today's 3 p.m. session (in the Board Room) will be informal and is open to the staff.



TO REORGANIZE OR NOT TO REORGANIZE---Whether Lane Community College ends up with a new organizational structure (and a new dean) or not is still anybody's guess. At yesterday's Cabinet meeting, Cabinet members and members of the audience made little progress in deciding whether there really is a need for organization, and if there is, in what direction it should go.

The proposed change (see chart) would create two new councils, administrative and legislative, and a new deanship, Dean of the College. Lossely, the legislative body would be, as Dean Case said, concerned with the quality of the college, setting and deating with overait planning. The administrative council would implement the decisions of the legislative body. The college president would chair the administrative council, and the Dean of the College would chair---well, that's where a lot of people parted company.

Social Science department chairman Bill Beals, Mike Rose and others see the proposed Dean of the College as an officer of the legislative council, a coordinator, while Deans Rasmussen and Case see the position as "not just an executive secretary of the legislative branch" but a line officer "with administrative muscle". Under the present proposal it is not clear exactly what the relationship is between the DofC and the legislative council, but it is a crucial question that needs to be answered in further discussions before many of the people present at yesterday's meeting are willing to move any closer to reorganization.

Another crucial question, raised by Jim Ellison, is whether there is a need for reorganization at all. Ellison, fearful that the present system might be junked without investigating its strengths and weaknesses, asked the Cabinet for a rationale for making a change. Dean Case answered that the present system, without an official goal-setting body, is inadequate. But, he said, "if we collectively set goals with an official group (the legislative council) priorities

fall in line and implementation follows." The formation of a legislative council, he said, would confine debate to goals and priorities and smooth out the ways and means of implementation, carried out by the administrative section. However Ellison, backed by Beals and business department chairman Jack Kreitz, pressed the "need" issue further and asked that before further discussion is held, a return to "ground zero" be made to review the current process. Discussion will continue on that subject at next Tuesday's meeting.





Anyone objecting to those exclusions or anyone wishing to add another candidate to the coming election has until Nov. 16 (Friday) to file a written notice with the PERB. The four locations of the notice of election are the bulletin boards in the cafeteria and administration buildings, the outside bulletin board in front of the Center Bldg., and the hallway of the Health and PE building.





In other business the Board set May 7 as the earliest possible date for a budget election if we have to have one this year, heard a report that LCC has slightly over 10,600 students this term (up 14% over last fall quarter), banned smoking during Board meetings, and heard Evan Alford say that PERB is dragging its feet and we probably won't see an election for a bargaining agent before January. Seems the Public Employee Relations Board is understaffed.

From now on, OSU will accept <u>at any time</u> 108 hrs. of lower division transfer credit toward a degree, (2) lower division credit for specific voctech courses may be awarded for equivalent OSU course work, (3) Up to 45 hours of voc-tech credit can be transferred as block credit without a grade for students in certain majors, (4) In determining admission and graduation status, only the last grade earned in a course shall be used in computing the grade point average. Details of the new changes are posted on the bulletin board in the administration building.





MOORE VISITS TODAY -- William Moore, former president of Seattle Community College and an advisor at last summer's Danforth Institute, visits LCC today and is scheduled to meet at least three times with various campus groups. Moore's schedule includes an 11 a.m. meeting with representatives from several instructional areas (that meeting, in the Board Room, is closed), a noon luncheon in the President's Dining Room with representatives from each department, and a 2:30 meeting in the Board Room with department chairpersons. All staff members are invited to attend the 2:30 meeting. He will also take an informal tour of the campus from 1:30-2:30 p.m.

Moore is scheduled to speak in Portland Monday to the Northwest Accreditation Assn. on the topic of "Community College Responsibility to the Educationally Disadvantaged". He is currently a professor at Ohio State University.

WEDNESDAY'S WORK SESSION -- A revised but still-basically-the-same set of quidelines for construction priorities, plus the priorities themselves, were discussed Wednesday during the open work session of the Board of Education. The Board agreed in principle to the new guidelines, the first drawn since 1970, but will not formally approve or disapprove of them until the Dec. 12 meeting. Among the deviations from the 1970 guidelines were the addition of two special categories to account for projects which have already been dedicated and for projects which involve hazards to health and safety, (2) removing the distinction between instructional space and instructional support space, and (3) recognition that there may be facilities which impose such a limitation on operations that it seriously affects the operation of the college.

The current construction priorities (there are 36) hammered out over several weeks of campus-wide meetings were also looked at by the Board and will be subject to implementation after the board approves a set of guidelines. Paul Colvin also said that the priority list is by no means final and that interested persons can still make a pitch for their favorite projects. A complete list of the current priorities can be picked up at the office of institutional research in the administration building.

OPENINGS TONIGHT -- Two openings are scheduled tonight: "The Hostage", the first play of the season, begins at 8 p.m. in the Forum Theatre, and LCC's basketball season gets underway at 8 p.m. with Northwest Christian College at Marist High School.

SPEAKING OF BASKETBALL -- Tickets for next weekend's Christmas Seal Classic are on sale at the information desk in the administration building. Prices are \$2 general admission, \$1 for students and 50 cents for children. The two-day tournament features teams from Treasure Valley Community College, Feather River Junior College in Quincy, Calif., Northwest Christian College and LCC.
