ENERGY CRISIS WEEK---Today begins energy crisis week in Oregon's public schools and apparently most school districts are planning to do something about it. So is LCC. Two democratic candidates for governor will make campus appearances Friday during LCC's ond-day energy symposium. State senator Betty Roberts (D-Portland) and state treasurer Jim Redden will make separate appearances that day in a program that also includes a confrontation panel on the causes of the energy crisis and a special concert by the stage band. Redden will moderate the panel discussion that features representatives from power-related industries, consumer affairs, retail industry and the Citizens Energy Council. The panel is scheduled to begin

at 10 a.m. in the Forum. Sen Roberts is scheduled to speak at 2 p.m. in

the Forum on "What We Can Do To Help" during the energy crisis.

READING PROBLEMS -- Jim Ellison of study skills is currently circulating some information on the reading abilities of the American public that goes a long way toward proving that Johnny can't read his way out of a wet paper bag. Among some of the statistics are the following: 1,443,000 Americans cannot read or write at all; in junior and community colleges 30-50 percent of new students require remedial help in reading; at least 36 of every 100 elementary school children who need extra help with reading do not receive it; if eight years of schooling is the standard for functional literacy, there are 19,000,000 Americans who do not meet it. If the standard is 12 years, the figure becomes 70 million.

Jim points out the need for additional instructional adjustments or learning options if the college is to meet the needs of these potential students. Many of them--more than you might think--live in Lane County, where 40 percent of the adults over 25 do not have a high school diploma.



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



BOARD HIGHLIGHTS---Construction guidelines and priorities were adopted as expected last night, the Center Building remodelling project is nearing reality, and the Board approved a list of goals and purposes for establishing instructional priorities for curriculum development.

- * The new construction guidelines look a lot like the old guidelines adopted in 1970, but with a few new wrinkles. Among them are high priority to projects which have already been committed and to projects which involve health and safety hazards, removal of the distinction between instructional space and instructional support space, and recognition that there may be facilities which impose such a limitation on operations that operation of the college is seriously affected. In all cases, original long-range plans for facilities and services will be honored. In the same breath, the Board also approved a list of some 30 construction priorities topped by the Florence skills center and gave the okay to begin work immediately on six construction or remodelling projects. Some of the six include a hitchhiking shelter near the main exit, improvements in the Industrial Tech building, completion of the baseball field and authorization to seek an architect for the design of the proposed maintenance building.
- * Completion of the Center Building grows ever closer. Bids will be taken in the near future to begin work on the basement of the building, and later, the fourth floor. Plans call for the basement to house Printing & Graphics, Audio Visual Services, and Information Retrieval, plus four classrooms. The fourth floor then will be remodelled to house Study Skills, Language Arts and Social Science.
- * The instructional goals and purposes the Board approved are actually refinements on already-approved instructional policy. Some of them include: providing career education opportunities in which job entry levels can be reached in short-term units; ex panding course offerings that do not overlap existing programs; offering courses that apply toward fulfilling major discipline course requirements; and developing credit courses that serve the individual needs of the student.

PERB HEARING---Representatives of the AFT, OEA and the LCC Board haggled over the issue of whether there should be one or two bargaining units at the college yesterday during the first of two Public Employee Relations Board hearings on collective bargaining. An account of the hearing will be published as a special Daily edition later today.



This is a special edition of the Daily concerning yesterday's public hearing by the Public Employe Relations Board. At issue was whether the LCC staff should be split into two groups or kept as a single unit in the collective bargaining process.

A week. Maybe two.

That is how long it will be before PERB Hearings officer Darrell Smith hands down his recommendation on the future of collective bargaining group(s) at Lane Community College; and after that it could be another couple of weeks before the Public Employe Relations Board makes it official.

The recommendation -- when it does come -- will be based on nearly four hours of testimony gathered yesterday during the first of two public hearings held by PERB to determine a crucial collective bargaining question: will there be one or two bargaining groups on the LCC campus?

Everybody has an opinion, including representatives and witnesses speaking for the Oregon Education Assn. and the American Federation of Teachers--the two labor organizations going after the job as bargaining agent for the LCC staff.

Testimony revolved around a handfull of key issues:

- * historical precedence.
- * occupational differences between classified and instructional staff.
- differences in attitudes and desires of the two groups.
- * occupational goals.
- conflicts of interest.

Local #2417 of the AFT argued that historically speaking, classifed and instructional staff have been getting along just fine over the years via the Staff Association. Former Staff Assn. president Steve John based his claim of cooperation on experience in the Association and working closely with the Staff Personnel Policies Committee in previous negotiations with the Board.

OFT spokesman Tud Kulongoski tried to counter John's testimony by stating that the Staff Assn. and the SPPC were created by the Board of Education and therefore the everyone-is-in-the-same-boat type of membership was dictated and not voluntary. John responded that the impressive number of staff members voting to approve the Assn. constitution implied overall approval by the entire staff.

Other issues the AFT and OEA clashed on were the basic differences between classified and certified employees and whether there had ever been, in fact, collective bargaining on the LCC campus.

AFT witnesses and spokesman Robert Crosier acknowledged there were some occupational differences between the two campus groups but added that there were even more similarities and that a single unit--even with a variety of goals--would be more effective under one umbrella.

Kulongoski disagreed, testifying that the differences between the two groups ran quite deep. With assistant to the president Bert Dotson on the stand, the OEA spokesman established such differences as hiring practices, contracts, salary guides, personnel services, recruiting techniques and working schedules. He also attempted to establish that many personal and professional goals of the two groups were incompatible. No classified employees testified at the hearing.

But perhaps the major point of departure between the AFT and the OEA was on the issue of prior collective bargaining. Crosier and witnesses John and Mike Rose claimed that past negotiations with the Board were in fact collective bargaining within the framework of the law. Until Oct. 5 Boards were not obliged to enter into binding bargaining.


However, for several years, particularly during the past two years the SPPC has been the negotiating arm of the Staff Assn., the AFT representatives claimed that bargaining did exist and that it existed in a single-unit situation.

The OEA sharply disagreed, calling the "negotiations" of the past "consultation" and that the only true collective bargaining is the system spelled out in HB2263. The OEA was backed up by Board spokesman Lon Mills.

It will be around that issue more than any other, perhaps, that will help determine what happens in a week or two.

Smith will submit his recommendations first to the parties involved and they will have 10 days to object if there is any disagreement. Following that the recommendation will be turned over to the Public Employe Relations Board for a final decision.

Then: Hearing Number Two. In that hearing testimony will be taken to determine who and who should not be exempt from the bargaining unit. A date for that hearing has not been set.



INSTRUCTIONAL COUNCIL MEETING which was cancelled on December 7 - due to the Great Storm - will be held on Thursday, December 21, treating the same agenda.

THE OHIO DEPARTMENT of Education has just finished tabulating 12,500 written recommendations from a statewide "Search for Consensus" in education; and a recent issue of TRENDS comments on the results. Heading the list of the 10 top citizens' concerns was improving communication between the school and the community. Dick Grosenbaugh, administrative assistant for public information, concluded: "more emphasis should be placed on stressing to each individual in the school system the important role he or she plays in the overall relationship of the school to the community." If any employee can't, or won't, answer a question, a citizen may feel the entire school system has the same attitude. High on the priority list, he feels, must be "educating the entire staff about the entire system. . .so that they will be informed communicators when communicating."

TEACHERS "TRUTH SQUAD": TRENDS further notes the formation of a "truth squad" by a group of teachers in the St. Johns (Mich) Education Assn. Disturbed by apparent misconceptions in the public mind, the teachers formed a voluntary organization which operates year-round to "create some credibility with the public by countering the confusion about what a teacher does, and why."

In New York City, citizens attending Board of Education meetings can ask questions of experts at special tables set up in the room adjoining the board room. Employees of various offices such as Instruction, Special Education, Planning & Research, man the tables to field whatever specialized questions are asked.

Another interesting experiment is being tried in Richmond, Va., where a telephone "Fact Center" has been established. Any citizen with a question about the schools may receive an answer by calling the "Fact Center" number. In line with conclusions noted in the Ohio Department of Education survey, the service has turned out to be a boon to school employees who did not know where else to turn for reliable information.



"THE PROSPECT FOR HUMANITY" will be the topic of a talk to be given by R. Buckminster Fuller in his appearance at SWOCC on Sunday, January 7. In his presentation. Fuller will illustrate how existing modern technology is capable of eliminating waste of manpower and human resources, and of solving problems of need on the one hand and oversupply on the other.

World Magazine describes Buckminster Fuller as "probably one of the most trusted and loved human beings now alive. He has a philosophy that human intelligence is equal to humankind's most complex needs. He is aware of all the dangers of unlimited growth and technological expansion, but he is even more aware that humankind has hardly even begun to direct its brainpower to its major challenges. Fuller sees our planet as a spaceship with infinite possibilities for creative human development, social justice, human betterment, and the full release of the joyous spirit."

Mr. Fuller's presentation will be at 2 p.m. Sunday, January 7, in Upper Prosper Hall, Southwestern Oregon Community College. Admission is \$1 for adults, 50¢ for students; all sales at the door.

"CLUSTER CAREER PROGRAMS," a general course on career education, will be offered in the Eugene-Springfield metropolitan area during winter term.
