

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



PROPOSAL APPROVED -- Nearly \$200,000 in federal funds will be awarded to LCC for construction of an 8,000 square foot Skills Center in Florence, it was learned yesterday.

Rep. John Dellenback said the Commerce Department had approved an LCC request for matching funds to build the Florence facility which has been on the drawing boards for several years. A total of \$195,000 was approved, although the original request was for \$216,000 in funds under Economic Development Administration provisions for Public Works and Development.

Assistant to the President Bert Dotson said the next move is up to the Board of Education before actual work can begin on the building. The Board will probably discuss—and possibly act on— the matter at tomorrow's meeting. A proposed time schedule calls for about five and a half months of preliminaries (drawings and bids) before construction begins. Currently college officials are expecting the building to take about 8 months to finish.

When it is completed, the Skills Center will hold both day and evening classes and a variety of student services. Director of Special Training Larry Murray said that as many as 900 students are expected to be enrolled in classes at the Siuslaw center by 1976. Last fall term 405 students were enrolled. The building will be built on 20 acres of land donated by the school district and the city of Florence seven years ago. The land is located north of the high school.

WOMEN'S LUNCHEON MEETING -- A no-host lunch and discussion for staff members interested in the women's movement is scheduled tomorrow from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the President's Dining Room. Several staff members, including Patrick Fraleigh, Mabel Armstrong, Jan Silveira and Linda Danielson and Karen Lansdowne, will speak or lead discussions on a variety of topics concerning women. The lunch is informal and open to anyone.

USING THE FACILITIES? -- Staff members involved in outside activities or organizations that wish to use the school's facilities are reminded that all requests must go through Wendy Westfall at the information desk. Centralizing requests insures that rooms will be clean, heated and unlocked.

FIRST AID RECOMMENDED -- Staff members are urged to take one of the free one-day first aid courses offered through the apprenticeship program on Saturdays. Doing the urging is the Safety Committee which notes that the first few minutes after a student or coworker has had an accident or seizure can be the most important. The Saturday classes are from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and, while there currently are no evening classes, Bill Cox will arrange for some if they are requested.



The revision would allow alcohol to be used in cooking or instruction but would still prohibit its general consumption on campus. Currently all alcoholic beverages are barred from the campus. The board meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. in Adm.202 and is open to the public.

Here is what the committee said: "With the Dec. 13 meeting of the Job Rating Committee the initial objectives of the Committee have been accomplished. If any employee is still dissatisfied with the point rating and level placement given by the committee, he/she may file a formal grievance request with the staff grievance committee.

From this time on the committee's charge is to review new position descriptions for <u>new positions</u> and place them on an appropriate level by their job descriptions. All other matters dealing with personnel requests (title changes, step placements, upgrading of present positions, affirmative action, career mobility, etc.) should to to the business manager and on to the administrative council if necessary."



BOARD MEETING -- Highlights of last night's Board meeting include: Architects Amundson & Associates were selected to draw plans for the proposed maintenance building...The green light was given to drawing up plans for the Siuslaw Skills Center...Ditto the remodeling of the data processing center which will go as scheduled...Estimates on the completion of the Center Bldg. were \$53,000 over budget and Bill Cox vowed to look at ways of cutting costs, including use of materials on hand and use of false beams to run conduits from one area to another. Cox said no attempt would be made to tamper with instructional costs such as room size, etc...Dean Case is now officially Dean of Academic and College Planning...Alcoholic beverages can now be used in instruction and in cooking, but are still prohibited for general consumption on campus...And LCC is attempting to get a gas allocation of its own.

ELECTION SCHEDULED -- LCC's two employee groups, classified and faculty, will vote on a key collective bargaining issue Feb. 20: representation or no representation. Spokesman for the American Federation of Teachers, the Oregon Education Assn. and the LCC Board of Education agreed yesterday to hold a special consent election in which both groups will decide by separate ballot their collective bargaining futures.

The agreement, subject to approval by the Public Employee Relations Board, states that all "regular full-time and part-time (half-time ore more) classified staff" and all "full-time and part-time (half-time or more) instructional staff employed under contract" are eligible to vote in the election, except supervisors and confidential employees covered in Oregon Revised Statutes 243.711(14).

Employees can vote during one of three time periods--7-9 a.m., 11 a.m.-1 p.m., and 2-4 p.m.-in the Staff Lounge. PERB will supervise the voting. Classified staff members will vote on representation by the American Federation of Teachers vs. no representation at all, while faculty will choose between the AFT, the Oregon Education Assn. or no representation. Although all staff members covered by the agreement can vote, some may be challenged and will be asked to place their votes in a separate ballot box; those votes will not be counted unless the outcome of the election is in doubt.

Other issues--such as the fate of certain supervisory part-time employees--will be hammered out in discussions and hearings both before and after the election.



RECLASSIFICATION PROCESS DISCUSSED---A proposed five-step job reclassification process for classified employees was discussed at length yesterday during the weekly meeting of the college Cabinet. Along the lines proposed, a classified employee would (1) submit her/his request to her/his supervisor, (2) work on an "appropriate" job discription with the supervisor, (3) forward the job description through administrative channels to the Administrative Council, (4) the description, after review by the Council, is sent to the Classified Job Rating Committee, and (5) the supervisor and employee are notified of the action taken.

The proposal is still in the rough draft stage but Cabinet members had no strong objections to the suggested five steps. Classified Section chairperson Jean Shaffer initially felt that Step Number Four (action by the Job Rating Committee) should precede Step Number Three (review by the Administrative Council) because she feared the Council might be in the position to make the actual job ratings. She removed her objection, however, when assistant to the president Bert Dotson pointed out that the Council was essentially a "grand jury" and merely reviewed reclassification requests and then forwarded them to the rating committee.

A complete description of duties for both the Administrative Council and the Job Rating Committee will be included in tomorrow's Daily.

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

AMPUTEE TO HITCHIKE TO SALEM -- An LCC student who is a double amputee will hitchike to Salem early Friday to protest gas allocation priorities for handicapped persons. David Edgeman, 33, will leave from the northbound lane of I-5 across from the Thirtieth Ave. exit at 8 a.m. Friday for a journey he estimates to take three hours.

In Salem Edgeman will present a petition signed by 600 Lane students asking the state to place handicapped persons high on the gas allocation priority list in spite of a lower rating handed down by the federal government. Edgeman will give the petition to David Piper, assistant to the governor for Energy Conservation and Allocation.

The petition calls for the state to ignore federal guidelines that place handicapped twelfth on a list of fuel allocation prirorities and to place them third instead. A third place priority would have handicapped persons sharing the same gas used by mass transit. Edgeman's petition asks the state to make the priority shift only until local mass transit companies install lifts in their buses.

Edgeman, who has no legs, is an industrial secondary education major and is married and the father of one child. His wife, Karen is a business major at LCC.



PROPOSED TASKS OF ADM. COUNCIL & JOB RATING COMMITTEE -- The Administrative Council and the Job Rating Committee both play important--although separate--roles in the proposed five-tep job reclassification process being discussed by the administration and the college labinet. Proposed duties include:

Administrative Council: "serves as the review committee for all requests through appropriate channels from classified personnel for changes in job classification. ...the Council will:

1. Act on all classified personnel requests for reclassification and assign those approved to the appropriate rated job classification.

2. Act on all requests for new positions for which no rated classification exists

and forward those approved to the Classified Job Rating Committee.

3. Act on all requests for positions which have so changed that new job descriptions are necessary and forward those approved for rating to the Job Rating Committee."

Classified Job Rating Committee: "is charged with maintaining a set of rated job descriptions and classifications into which all classified positions at LCC may be placed. ...the Job ... Rating Committee will:

1. Rate only those job descriptions which have been approved by the Administrative Council.

2. Rate all new positions for which no rated classification exists.

3. Rate positions which have so changed that a new job description is necessary and for which no rated classification exists."

The proposed job reclassification process is just what it says it is--job reclassification. It is <u>not</u> a new salary guide nor is it a repeat of the Arthur Young report as some people have asked.
