HALF A LOAF---Slightly less than a million dollars, or about one fourth of what Oregon's community colleges said they needed to survive this year's surge in enrollment, was the amount the legislature finally decided upon in last week's special session. House Bill 973 (Community College E Board appropriation) never did have much of a chance after both Gov. Tom McCall and the powerful Ways and Means Committee turned their backs on a \$4.5 million dollar request by the community colleges to bail them out of their unexpected money problems. Instead, the legislators approved a \$998,662 package that would reimburse the colleges only for overenrolled vocational programs.

Here's what that means to Lane: Fourth week vocational enrollment figures will be matched with similar reports from the other colleges at the end of the fourth week of Spring term. The money will be divvied up on the basis of those reports. Assistant to the President Bert Dotson that if Lane does well from that allocation (at least \$200,000) there probably will be no need for major cutbacks in services or staff this year.

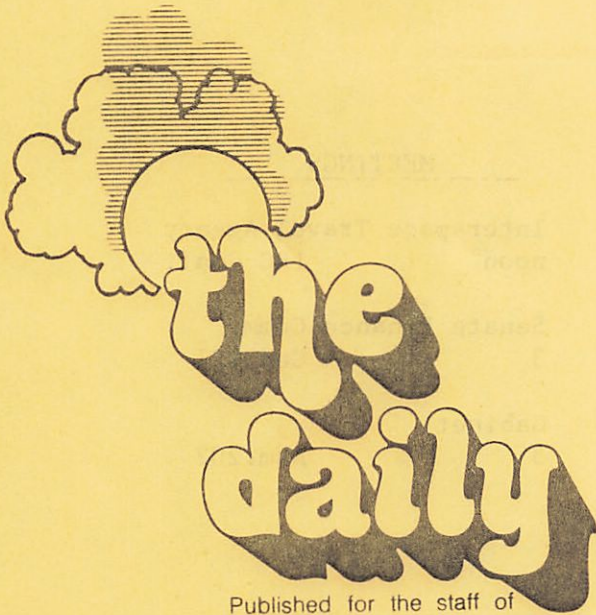

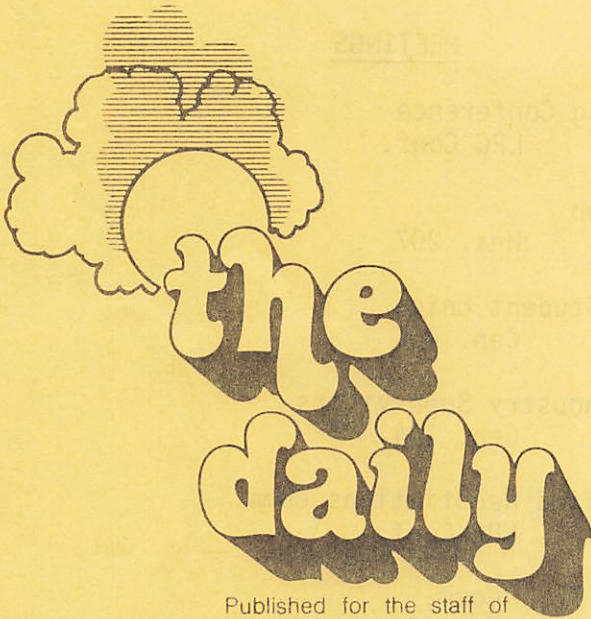

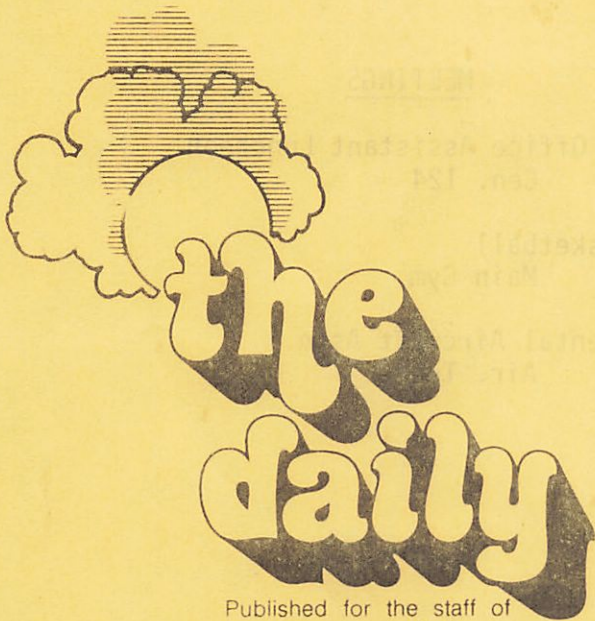

BOARD TO DISCUSS TAX BASE, ASHLANE -- The Board of Education will discuss, and probably act on, the issue of whether or not Lane should seek a new tax base at the May 28 primary election during its monthly meeting tomorrow night in the Board Room. The Board could find such a move attractive because of complications arising out of the first year of collective bargaining: namely timing. The only other alternative to a tax base election is a budget election, and that has been thrown into limbo because of a February decision by the Board to not hold a budget election until all negotiations with the staff are completed.

The Board had originally hoped to reserve a Spring date for a budget election (Oregon law restricted such elections to March 19, May 7, June 18, Sept. 17 and Nov. 5, and a new bill, HB 3312 added the dates of July 9 and Aug. 6) but gave up on that when it discovered that going after a budget without complete salary figures might violate current labor practices. It was, and still is, faced with the possibility of a fall election. A tax base election, on the other hand, does not require a line item budget, merely an idea of what it might take to operate the college over a two-year period. The current tax base of \$2,614,000 was established in November, 1972 and became operational July 1, 1973. The Board must decide on the matter tomorrow because of the 70-day announcement period required by law.

The Board will also discuss outreach goals and will meet with ASH, Inc. director Phil McLennan to investigate student complaints concerning ASHLane housing. The meeting is at 7 p.m. and is open to the public.

BOARD VOTES FOR TAX ELECTION -- In a six-to-one roll call vote last night, the LCC Board of Education decided to seek a new tax base at the May 28 primary election. The Board voted after about an hour's deliberation to ask for an 11 percent increase in the college's current tax base which would, the Board felt, allow LCC to maintain its current operations without having to cut back on enrollment or services for at least the next two years.

A new tax base would also ease the financial dilemma caused by the uncertainty of the first year of collective bargaining. The Board was reluctant to seek a budget election without a finalized budget in hand and that might not happen until this summer or even next fall. By law, community college's can only seek a tax base during general elections and budgets on specified dates (those remaining are May 7, June 18, July 9, Aug. 6, Sept. 17 and Nov. 5) so the Board opted for the May 28 primary.

If accepted by the voters, the current tax base of \$2,614,320 would be raised to \$3,590,000 or a hike of 11 percent. That means the tax rate of \$1.41 per thousand dollars of assessed value would increase 28 cents to \$1.69 per thousand for 1974-75 and then drop to \$1.65 in 1975-76.

The question of a proposed tuition increase was discussed but not tied directly to the new tax base issue. Most Board members agreed a five percent tuition hike would probably be implemented but went along with administration requests to investigate different ways to administer it. One proposal being discussed, for example, would have students carrying more than 12 hours pay a larger share of the load, leaving straight full-time or part-time students paying the current tuition rate.

In other business, the Board directed the college to form a committee to investigate student complaints about ASHLane housing complex after listening to Adult Student Housing director Phil McLennan speak on a variety of problems at the Springfield site.

McLennan admitted that one of the major problems since the complex's construction has been water damage. "We do have leaks," he said, "and it seems to have been coming through the tongue and groove siding, down the walls and into the apartments themselves. Some of it has caused damage to drapes and tenant property." He said that \$16,000 has been spent

since last summer trying to stop the problem and that soon some new plywood siding will be tried to halt the leaks.

More importantly, however, McLennan revealed that ASH, Inc. has made some changes in its philosophy. Noting that outstanding rents had climbed to \$11,000 a month by February, ASH fired its student managers and brought in a professional manager for ASHLane, and announced an intent to seek what McLennan called a "new type of tenant". He told the Board that an energetic public relations and advertising campaign will be launched in the Eugene area soon to attract, in most cases, more well-heeled students that McLennan feels would be more likely to pay the ASH rents and less likely to damage the property. McLennan cited several instances of property damage and neglect by the tenants.

The Board also heard advisory committee reports and reviewed goals for the outreach programs.

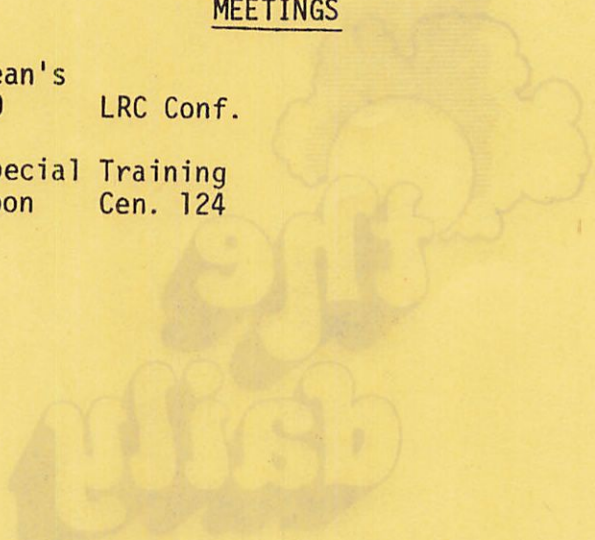

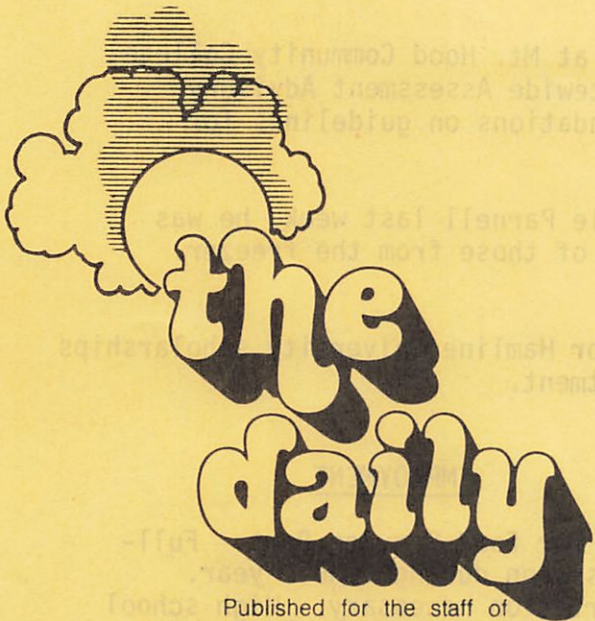

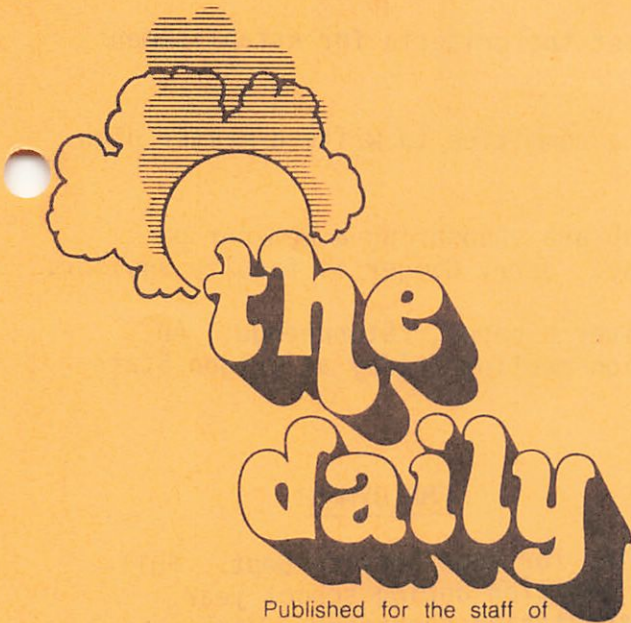
