SHAKE BILL COX'S HAND TODAY -- He's a happy man because the Board of Education Wednesday night approved construction of a \$461,500 maintenance building. It will contain 23,000 square feet of space and be located to the north of the Air Technology Building. Occupancy could occur in early 1975. Themove of Bill's departments to the new structure will open up space all over campus and permit a host of other remodeling and moving projects. And, we'll get rid of those not-so-pretty portables now marring the beauty of the northeast entrance.

LCC's Food Services will not longer serve non-union lettuce and grapes. The Board voted unanimously to get that so-called scab lettuce out of those salads and cheezeburgers. The ban was asked by the Chicano Student Union and the Student Senate and was supported by the Lane County Labor Council. They support the United Farm Workers, who are striking against non-union farmers to get improved working and living conditions. LCC in the past has bought union lettuce when it was available, but had bought the non-union variety when it was the only kind around.

In other Board action, thematter of a tuition increase was left to further study. The Administration talked of a possible 5 percent hike, but Board member Al Brauer of Florence suggested that the amount should be tied to the proposed new tax base and might have to go above 5 percent.

A \$14,000 project to make the Community Education office more visible and accessible was approved. Signs will be installed and 50 parking spaces will be created on the north side of the Apprenticeship Building.

The Board unanimously voted to approve a continuing membership in Lane Council of Governments, though the dues will go up next year from \$220 to \$3,080.

TELL YOUR FRIENDS -- Establishment of a new tax limitation base (Ballot Measure 7) at the May 28 election will limit the property tax rate for LCC to no more than 10 percent over the rate approved by the voters in 1969-70.

Passage of Ballot Measure 7:

- * Will limit property tax support for LCC, for the owner of a \$20,000 home, to an estimated \$33.80 in 1974-75 and an estimated \$33.00 (an 80¢ reduction) in 1975-76; it was \$31.00 in 1969-70.
- * Will continue an enrollment at this year's level of approximately 6,800 full-time equivalent students.
- * Will limit property tax rate for LCC to approximately \$1.69 per \$1,000 true cash value in 1974-75 and approximately \$1.65 in 1975-76.
- * Will permit staff to plan ahead regarding number of students to be served and programs to be offered.
- * Will limit the LCC tax base to \$3.59 million in 1974-75. It is \$2.61 million this year.
- * Will permit students to plan ahead regarding courses and programs.
- * Will provide no funds for construction of new buildings.
