

SPECIAL OLYMPICS HERE SATURDAY -- Nearly 1,000 mentally handicapped children and adults will be competing at LCC Saturday in the annual Oregon Special Olympics track meet. The meet, sponsored by the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Foundation, the Special Olympics committee and LCC, is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. with opening ceremonies and a parade and will be followed by competition in the 50 yard dash, the 300 yard and mile runs, high jump, standing broadjump and softball throw.

LCC coordinator Sue Thompson said the state meet will resemble as closely as possible the regular Olympics, including awarding of Olympic medals and ribbons for winners in all four divisions (divisions are based on age, ability and sex). Competitors will be eight years old or older--with the oldest a 55-year old woman. Each competitor in the state meet had to qualify in a county meet. Admission is free.

LIBRARY DISPLAY -- Ten oil paintings utilizing unusual techniques are currently on display in the main reading area of the library. The paintings are by local artist Maxine Hogan (Mike Hogan's wife) and include a "Triptych" (three paintings-in-one) and several "limited palette's", paintings using only three colors. EXAM TODAY, TOMORROW -- Approximately 25 secretaries from firms and institutions throughout the state will take the Certified Professional Secretary examination here today and Saturday. The six-part exam is held each year by the National Secretaries Assn. at about 150 locations in the U.S., Canada and Puerto Rico to certify more than 3,500 secretaries. Secretarial certification is similar to certification for accountants and usually is accompanied by job advancement.

Areas covered during the two-day test include environmental relationships in business, business and public policy, economics of management, financial analysis and the mathematics of business, communications and decision making, and office procedures.



TORRES/RICHARD WIN---In the largest voter turnout in three years, more than 600 students went to the polls Thursday and Friday and elected a 28-year old pre-med student and her running mate as ASLCC president and first vice-president. The two new top executive cabinet officers are Sallie Torres, currently ASLCC publicity director, and her first vice president-elect, John L. Richard. The new president and VP will serve for the 1974-75 school year.

The Torres/Richard ticket, one of five on the ballot, received 216 votes, with the closest challengers being Craig Geary/Paul R. Frassetto (174) and Mike Rogers/Peter Hale (127). Other officers elected include Julie Elliott, second vice president; Gloria Wells, treasurer; Robin Tappan, publicity director; and senators David Gordon, Jerry Edin, Ginger Switzer, Michael Trevino, and Cindy White.

Students also defeated one and approved two ballot measures that proposed raising the \$5 per term student body fees. Voters narrowly passed a measure to raise fees 50 cents per term to finance 15 cent bus tokens (295 yes, 269 no), and elected to recommend to the Board of Education that student fees should be increased to maintain the current level of services of the student health service, to expand dental and family planning services, and that the increase should not exceed 20 cents per credit hour (311 yes, 250 no). A measure to raise fees to a maximum of \$6, with all lesser fees raised proportionately so bus tokens could be purchased for 10 cents each, failed 335 to 215.



KOCHER TO TOUR EGYPT -- Law enforcement instructor John Kocher will join Paul Malm and 20 other U.S. community college teachers this summer in an eight-week tour of Egypt to help write two college-level courses on the country's culture and history. Kocher was notified this week that, as first alternate, he had been selected to join the group after one of the original 22 dropped out. No other community college will be represented by more than one faculty member on the visit, which is sponsored by the League for Innovation.

He has been teaching at LCC since 1970 after four years as a professor of air science at the University of Oregon, several years as a parole and classification officer, and a military police career in the U.S. Air Force. At one time, Kocher was in charge of all U.S. Forces police in England and Thailand.

He graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in criminology and political science from the University of California at Berkeley in 1947, then received a masters in criminology from Berkeley in 1951 and a masters in political science from the U of O in 1964.

He and Malm will be in Egypt from June 12 to Aug. 3, and will be based most of the time at American University in Cairo.

AT TONIGHT'S BOARD MEETING -- Tuition--how it should be charged and whether and/or how it could or should be hiked--will be a major topic for discussion at tonight's meeting of the Board of Education. The tuition issue, first discussed at last month's meeting, has been researched by Dean of Students Jack Carter and has resulted in a recommendation by Carter that the college maintain its current tuition policies at least until after the May 28 tax base election. The Carter study compares several options concerning the way in which tuition can be charged (for instance, charging more for credit hours over ten and less for under ten, changing definition of full-time student from 10 to 12 hours, or charging a flat rate per credit hour with no maximum) and follows with proposed tuition targets and their options for next year.

The Board will discuss student government procedures, hear reports on ASHLane and the Siuslaw project, and act on a recommendation by the administration to revise Board Policy 8330, use of college facilities. The meeting begins at 7:30 in Adm. 202 and is open to the public.



VOTES IN---It was Freeman by a landslide and Martin by a hair in Tuesday's LCC Board of Education election. Precinct tallies showed that in the at-large race, Richard Freeman captured 11,350 votes (nearly 43 percent) compared to 7,195 for Irv Fletcher. In the Zone 3 contest it was closer: Charlene Curry lost by 202 votes to Jim Martin---6,248 to 6,450. Catherine Lauris, who ran unopposed, will also return to the Board.

It is significant that many of the 26,413 voters (only 20 percent of the 128,780 registered voters in the county) did not make a choice at all in the Board seat elections. Nearly 8,000 voters refused to vote for either Fletcher or Freeman in the at-large race, and nearly 9,000 didn't vote at all in the Curry/Martin/Sparks contest in Zone 3.

WILLIAMS ELECTED---In another election outcome of interest, dean of community education Nile Williams was elected to the Lane Intermediate Education District Board, representing Zone 1. Nile was unopposed.

AND NOW THERE ARE THREE---Nursing director Estelle Singleton has become the third LCC faculty member in as many weeks selected to study overseas this summer as part of a nationwide program to write college courses on specific areas of foreign cultures. Estelle will leave in June for New Delhi, India to study that country's health services and nursing education program. Afterward she will write a college course on the results of her visit.

Earlier, political science and law enforcement instructors Paul Malm and John Kocher learned they would spend the summer in Egypt on a similar program. Malm and Kocher are among 22 community college teachers in the country going to Egypt, while Mrs. Singleton is one of 20 assigned to India. She will spend four weeks at the University of Bangalore, then will spend the next four weeks until Aug. 12 touring the country with stops in Bombay, Calcutta, Agra, Madras, Hyderabad and Banaras. Areas of study include India's philosophies and religions, science and technology, and social and behavioral sciences.

BE A SPORT THIS SUMMER -- Three separate sports programs for young people will be offered in the Eugene-Springfield area this summer by LCC. Three-week and four-week sessions for girls and boys will be held beginning June 10 and 17 on campus, and a two-week program for boys is schedule to begin June 10 at Thurston High School. Materials on the boys' program are being circulated today, while information on the girls' program will be published Monday.

Here are details on the boys' course: It is open to youngsters 10-17 and will include instruction in weight training, track and field, basketball and baseball. Cost is \$50 (\$85 for two from the same family) which covers instruction, equipment (except for shoes and gym clothes), locker, towel and insurance. Each student must also provide a release from his family doctor. Hours are 9 a.m. to noon, Monday-Thursday from June 17-July 12. A similar course offering more activities will be held for two weeks at Thurston High School (June 10-21) but is limited to boys 10-13 years of age.

TIPS ON GRANT WRITING---Some of the mysteries of grant writing and administration were de-mystified yesterday in the special grant writing workshop sponsored by the business office. Here are a few do's and don'ts for the prospective grant writer:

* Just because the grant is on the way don't think you can start spending money. The business office cannot let you spend a single dime before the starting date specified on the grant proposal, nor can you spend after the closing date. If you only specify a school year, 1974-75 for example, the business office is going to assume you want to start on July 1 and end June 30, and there is no way you can start spending grant funds until July 1.

* Overhead. You might as well get used to it, there's going to be an overhead figure amounting to slightly less than 19 percent.

* Keep a diary, not for posterity but to help you figure out your in-kind contribution. Also keep records of materials purchased from the general fund (if that is permitted by the granting agency) for in-kind contributions.

* If, in your proposal, you ask for a certain piece of equipment, buy that piece of equipment. Not something else. The granting agencies are very fussy about this.

* If you hire a classified staff member (such as a secretary) who is already working a full 40-hour week, you have to pay him or her time-and-a-half when he or she works for you.

* All full-time classified employees must have a job description. Period.

* Employees must be put on the payroll in the business office.

* If it looks like you are not going to spend all your money, write the granting agency about 60 days before the grant's expiration date and ask for an extension.

Both those who attended the workshop and those who presented it voice concern that the grant writer/administrator not get mired down in red tape. There was a general agreement that a routing procedure, clearly spelling out who has to see what, should be available to the writer when the grant proposal process begins. One of the best methods to avoid confusion is to see Zita Brevig or Verne Whittaker before starting anything.







1974-75 BUDGET UNVEILED -- Characterized by fluctuating and, in some places, disappearing state and federal funding sources, a still-unanswered question about local tax support, and some inflationary facts of life, the 1974-75 LCC Budget got its first inspection last night by the budget committee and the Board of Education. They got a good look at what President Schafer and Jerry Fischer call "a bare bones budget", a document that will ask for slightly over \$10 million next year to support basically what the college is serving now on \$8.5 million.

In his message to the committee, Schafer noted that while enrollment continues to climb (both in Oregon and across the country) state and federal support is not keeping up. This year, for example, LCC will be reimbursed for approximately 6,254 FTE although the college's total reimbursable FTE will be closer to 6,669. Worse, said the President, our 1974-75 state operational funding figure is 6,150, more than 100 FTE less than this year.

The nation's economy isn't helping either. Inflation has progressed at such a rate that the college will have to lean more on local tax support and student tuition if it is to continue as an "open door" institution. Even a fairly bright prospect of \$179,000 in federal support of the various vocational, handicapped and manpower programs will not be enough to prevent LCC from looking toward these two sources for more help. A tentative five percent hike in tuition that would keep the student's share of their education around 19 percent has been discussed, and a \$3.5 million tax base will go to the voters next week.

On the need for more local and student help Schafer added, "the 1974-75 budget represents no growth projections but because of declining percentage of federal and state support, and unanticipated excessively high inflation, the local share of the costs of operating LCC will of necessity have to increase if we are to maintain current levels of service."

The budget reflects the times.







LCC TAX BASE GOES DOWN---LCC's attempt at winning a new tax base went the way of almost every other money measure in the state yesterday: down. Less than 50,000 voters cast their ballot on the college measure, but it was enough to defeat Lane's proposal 28,166 to 21,337. The Board of Education will meet on June 5 to canvass the vote and decide what happens next, including discussion on the possibility of having a July election for an amount in excess of the 6 percent limitation.

Other races of interest: there will be a runoff between Verne Duncan and Jesse Fasold for the state superintendent of public instruction post vacated by Dale Parnell. Fasold has served as interim superintendent since Parnell's departure, and Duncan, a former UofO instructor, is director of the Intermediate Education District in Clackamas County. The governor's race came up with a major upset when Senate Minority Leader Victor Atiyeh easily beat Clay Myers for the Republican nomination. Atiyeh will face Democratic winner Robert Straub in the general election next November. James Weaver won the Democratic nomination for Fourth District congressman; he will face John Dellenback in the fall, and Wayne Morse outpolled Jason Boe to win the right to run against Bob Packwood for the Senate in November.
