ELECTION TUESDAY---LCC's financial outlook for next year faces a crucial test Tuesday hen voters will decide the fate of the college's request for an \$800,0004 one-year levy outside the six percent limitation. Approval of the request would mean that the college could provide the same amount of services for about the same amount of students in 1974-75 without facing a possible cutback. It would cost the owner of a \$20,000 home around \$5 more next year in property taxes to LCC.

President Schafer said that inflation and reduced state and federal support make the additional tax money necessary. Lane's request for an increase in its tax base from \$2.6 to \$3.59 million on May 28 went down by a 4-3 margin. A second defeat, said Schafer, "would mean planning for the fall term without a budget, drastic cutbacks would have to be made, and the college would open in an atmosphere of anxiety and uncertainty."

LEVY DEFEATED -- By a 4-3 margin, voters turned down Lane's request for more than \$800,000 in operating funds outside the six percent limitation yesterday and now it looks like the college will have to try again Sept. 17. Less than 30,000 voters marked ballots in yester-day's special election that only had two winners (the Oakridge and Pleasant Hill school districts) and lots of losers. LCC's request went down 15,959 to 12,844 to join about a half-dozen other money measures, including District 4J (Eugene) losing 11,533 to 6,830; District 19 (Springfield) 2,251 to 2,080; the Lane County garbage levy 14,710 to 13,716; and the Eugene city budget 7,288 to 6,748.

BOARD TO MEET -- Decisions on a tuition hike and revised policy concerning student activities will be major items on the agenda for tonight's Board of Education meeting in Adm. 202. After several months of study, the Board will probably decide between two options recommended by the administration on raising tuition. The first would raise tuition approximately 11 percent, keeping a student's contribution at an estimated 20.4 percent of the cost of his education; and the second would raise tuition approximately 5.5 percent, keeping the student's percentage at about 19.4 percent. In another action item, the Board will vote on a proposed addition to Board Policy 5140 (student activities) that, if approved, would state "funding for such programs as ASLCC, athletics, health services, and the Torch will be shared by the general fund and an account in the college budget entitled 'Special Program and Activity Fund' (SPAF). Allocations from both the general fund and the SPAF will be made by the Board." The Board will also vote on a proposed deletion from Board Policy 5141.7 (student extracurricular activities) that would remove from paragraph #4 "Operating costs for conducting these activities (i.e. travel, officiating) are the responsibility of the student senate". That sentence conflicts with the policy of student activities adopted by the Board at its last meeting.

In other business, new Board officers will be elected and Jim Martin, Catherine Lauris and Richard Freeman will be given the oath of office. The meeting begins at 7 p.m. and will recess for awhile at 8 p.m. for a budget meeting.

TUITION GOES UP -- Tuition, which has been held at \$90 a term for two years, will cost \$10 more for a full-time student beginning fall term. The 11 percent increase in tuition was settled on last night by the Board of Education as one of two options recommended by the administration. The other option was a 5.5 percent increase. In voting for the hike (two members, Robert Mention and Jim Martin voted against it) the Board followed Dr. Albert Brauer's suggestion that the new \$100-a-term rate stand for two years. Mention opposed that provision, saying he favored higher education's system of a yearly review. Martin favored the 5.5 percent raise.

The new tuition figure will keep the share a full-time student pays toward the cost of his education at about 20 percent. Five years ago students were carrying around 22 percent of the load but that had slipped to approximately 18 percent this year. Out-of-district students will now be paying \$210 a term for 10 hours or more of credit, while the bill for out-of-state students will be \$520, and for foreign students, \$540. The hourly rate will be \$10 with the 50 cent-per-hour student fees remaining the same.

In other business, the Board approved bids on the community education parking lot (\$13,246 to contractor Dan D. Allsup), revised Board Policy concerning special fees, substituting a policy statement for the old fees schedule, and added to Board Policy 5140, student activities. The addition, designed to give the Board more of a say in student fiscal matters, reads "Support for Board approved co-funded programs shall be shared by the General Fund and an account in the college budget entitled 'Special Program and Activity Fund'. Allocations from both the General Fund and the SPAF shall be made by the Board." Stephen Reid and John Barber were re-elected Board Chairman and Board Vice-Chairman respectively.

At the 8 p.m. budget committee meeting, members completed the first read-through of the proposed budget and discussed some implications of Tuesday's election, arriving at no decisions concerning cutbacks until at least July 24 when the committee will meet again. The Board will meet July 31 to decide whether the college should go to the voters again Sept. 17, the next date available for an election.

INPUT INVITED -- President Schafer asks that recommendations and ideas for the next levy election be channeled to Dick Eymann's office. The Board of Education will meet July 24 to decide the amount of the September 17 levy proposal. The Administration is studying the question of how much money might be saved if the last four weeks of the current summer session were cancelled. That issue also will be decided July 24.

FROM THE BUSINESS OFFICE -- As of next Monday, July 22, a new check cashing policy will be in effect at LCC. NO checks will be cashed by Food Services. The Bookstore will accept checks in the amount of purchase only. All other checks will be handled at the Business Office.

Students may cash checks in the amount of \$5. The \$5 limit will accommodate purchase of meals in the Food Service and will also allow cash for any necessary bus fare a student might need for a day's activities at LCC.

There will be a \$3 handling charge for any and all bad checks cashed.

The new policy applies to both students and staff although the staff is not limited to the \$5 per check limit.

FROM "PROJECT EGYPT" -- Social Science Profs Paul Malm and John Kocher report "a genuine well of warmth", one which "could not have been tapped two years ago." They say that "the organizers in Egypt have developed an informational program ranging geographically from El Alemein and Alexandria in the north to Aswan in the south. Educationally, it has ranged from cabinet members, planners, deputies, and university professors to the physical sites of Egypt's past glories, achievements and defeats. Among the highlights has been a day-long visit to the Suez Canal and Sinai, the site of the greatest tank battle in history. Burned-out tanks and shell casings still litter the shifting sands. Among other sites visited have been the Aswan Dam, Abu Simbel, the Luxor and Karnak temples, the Valley of the Kings, Valley of the Queens, the Pyramids of Geiza, museums, mosques, and a host of industrial projects including the U.S.S.R.-financed Helwan Iron and Steel Works."

NO DECISION YET -- In an emotion-charged but friendly session Wednesday night, LCC's Board and Budget Committee agreed to postpone until next Wednesday, July 31, a decision on the amount of a levy to be placed before voters September 17. Members couldn't agree how much or where to cut the budget proposal turned down by voters on July 9. The Administration proposed a gross tax decrease of \$235,000 but asked for a week's delay to restudy the situation because of last minute indications that some reimbursement may be lower than previously expected.

About \$41,000 of the decrease was proposed to come from instruction. This provoked two motions, both defeated, to cut other costs instead. Jim Martin moved that the contingency be reduced by \$235,000; this lost 4 to 7. Catherine Lauris moved that the vacant dean of business operations post not be filled and Richard Freeman amended that to include that no new hiring be done. This lost 3 to 8. It appears that cuts which must be made this year will come harder than ever before.
