BUDGET CUT, ELECTION SET SEPT. 17 -- Lane Community College's budget committee acted relatively quickly last night in slashing nearly a quarter million dollars from the college's tax requirements for next year, and then just as promptly approved the 1974-75 budget at the total of \$9.9 million. Only Board member Jim Martin voted against the two motions, continuing his stand in favor of cuts from the contingency fund and in opposition to cuts from the general fund.

In all, \$243,660 was trimmed from local tax requirements leaving a balance of \$576,449 outside the six percent limitation to be sought Sept. 17. Reductions in revenues for next year include the \$243,660 in local tax monies, \$45,000 in federal FTE, \$25,300 in net working capital, and \$28,589 in "transfers in". There will be an increase of \$182,610 in tuition. Meanwhile, reductions in expenditures include a little over \$7,000 from the office of instruction, \$44,556 from instructional departments(amounting to one percent), \$22,168 in student services departments, \$20,000 in college facilities, and a total of \$80,000 in reserve for capital outlay (which includes \$45,000 from the veterans' cost of instruction account). The new tax request will mean a tax rate of about \$1.59 per thousand, or a ten cent reduction from the \$1.69 tax level recommended on July 9.

In other business the Board:

* refused to accept either of the two bids on the new maintenance building, agreeing with Bill Cox and the building's architects that the bids were far too high. Instead, the Board agreed to allow the architects to study a variety of options, including hiring a contractor for cost plus a fee and negotiating with contractors item by item.

* listened to architects predict that the Siuslaw Skills Center could run as much as \$65,000 over estimates if modifications weren't made. The Board approved several adjustments, primarily deletion of two bays in the mecahnics area, some storage space, and a switch from a wood floor with crawlspace to a concrete slab. Later, the Board put the possibility of a wooden floor (which would allow more flexibility) back in with an extra \$12,000 in construction funds. * hired a new dean of business operations.

NEW DEAN HIRED -- Anthony D. (Tony) Birch, assistant director of the budget and fiscal policy division of the state department of higher education, has been hired as the new dean of business operations.

He replaces Jerry Fischer who has returned to private business in South Dakota. Birch, 34, graduated from OSU in 1962 with a B.S. in business administration and has received an M.S. from OSU in 1969, and a Masters in business administration from the University of Washington in 1964. He has worked for Boeing, the U of W, Linn-Benton CC, OSU, and has been at his present position since last October. He is included in <u>Who's Who in the West</u> and a member of the state department of higher education computer network planning team.

NEW ESTIMATES LOWER TAX RATE -- County assessors' estimates that the true cash value (TCV) of area homes will increase about 13 percent this year has lowered the estimated tax rate about seven cents per thousand to \$1.52 for 1974-75--subject, of course, to approval of the special levy Sept. 17. Bill Mansell said the increase in TCV is about 5 percent above what had originally been expected this year, and could conceivably go higher, which in turn, could further lower the estimated tax rate.
