LIKE EVERYTHING ELSE, PRICES UP IN RESTAURANT---Restaurant: up. Cafeteria: some up, some not. Snack Bar: about the same. At a glance that's the price situation this year in LCC's three food service operations. It could be worse. With labor costs up dramatically and the wholesale food price index increasing at 14 percent or more in one year, higher food prices are as much a sure thing as death and taxes.

The biggest increase is in the restaurant where prices have been raised an overall 15-20 percent; and there may be more price hikes during the year if such commodities as wheat and sugar continue to go up as expected. "We're already paying higher prices today (Sept. 30) than we were on September first," said food services coordinator Ken Brownell. "There may be more of them (price hikes) as the year goes along. We'll constantly have to be evaluating."

But, said Brownell, even with higher prices the food for sale in the restaurant is still a bargain compared to prices at most commercial establishments in the area. In a study made shortly before school began Brownell discovered that items on LCC's menu were significantly lower in most cases than similar items on menus at other commercial and college operations. Despite the higher costs, LCC's restaurant food costs continue to be lower than its competitors, said Brownell.

Prices aren't the only things that are new this year in food services. Barriers have been placed around the restaurant to control traffic through the area, which should lead to better service, Brownell said. He also said that specials will be introduced into the restaurant menu and that eventually the restaurant should have an entirely new menu. Special dishes will also be offered in the cafeteria, including a line of foreign foods each Wednesday on "International Day".

Restaurant hours are 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.; cafeteria hours are 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. (last year they were 10:30-3); snack bar hours are 7 a.m. to 10 p.m.

UNITED WAY DRIVE UNDERWAY---Slightly more than \$300 have been pledged so far as the annual United Way fund drive begins at LCC. The drive ends in mid-November. LCC's goal is \$2,578, which is down from previous years by several hundred dollars. Contributions are tax and payroll deductible and can be made through your departmental office or at the development office.

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NEW BALLOTS FOR AFT VOTE---A distribution error that sent ballots to the wrong people will force a new vote on the proposed constitutional amendments for the for the Lane Community College Employees Federation, AFT. The first ballot, printed on white paper, reached most of the classified staff by Tuesday and carried a Wednesday deadline for completion and return to AFT. That ballot, however, won't count. (It was mailed to everyone in the bargaining unit and should have been sent only to LCCEF/AFT members.) Instead, a new ballot, printed on yellow paper, will be mailed to Federation members who have until Oct. 9 to complete and return them to the AFT. AFT officers ask that union members who have already voted on the white ballot vote again using the yellow ballot.

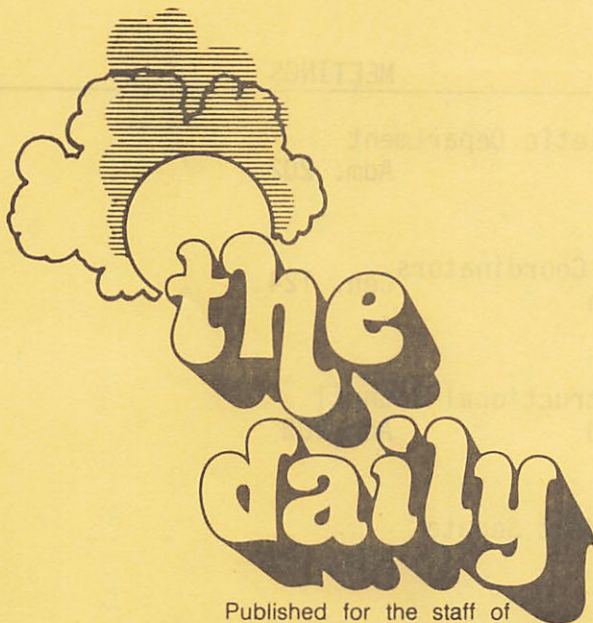

DONATIONS CONTINUE---After a week and a half of active campaigning, the development office reports that United Way donations are nearing the \$400 mark. As of yesterday, LCC staff members had contributed \$385 toward the college goal of \$2,578. Pledges can be made through your departmental office or the development office, and all pledges are tax and payroll deductible. The fund drive ends in mid-November.

TRUCKS MAY CREATE TRAFFIC HAZZARD--Construction on the new maintenance building is scheduled to begin Oct. 14 and that may mean driving to and from school will become slightly more hazzardous. A fleet of dumptrucks will be hauling dirt excavated from the construction site at the northeast corner of the campus to the landfill on the west side of Gonyea Road--meaning that the trucks will be forced to cross the median several times each day. The workers should be finished within a week, but in the meantime please be careful.

SAY AH--More than 2,000 more patients were seen by the nurses and doctor at the Student Health Service last year than were treated in 1972-73. In a report issued by Laura Oswalt, a total of 9,965 patient visits were recorded in '73-'74, compared to 7,902 the year before. The report also states that 159 communicable diseases were diagnosed and treated.

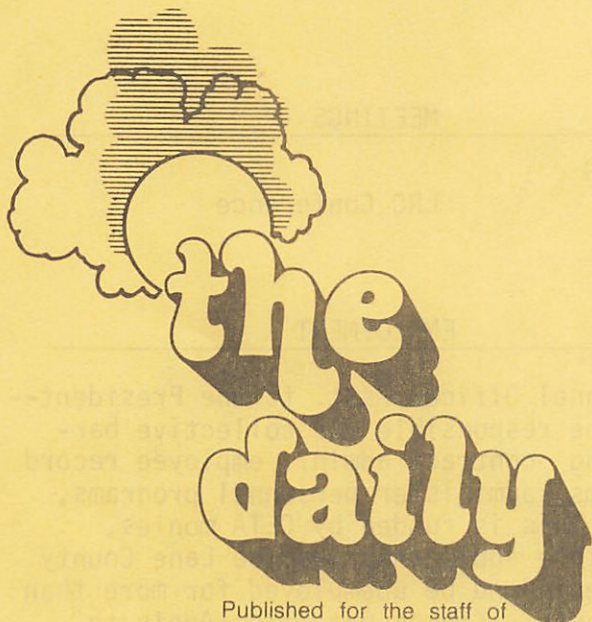

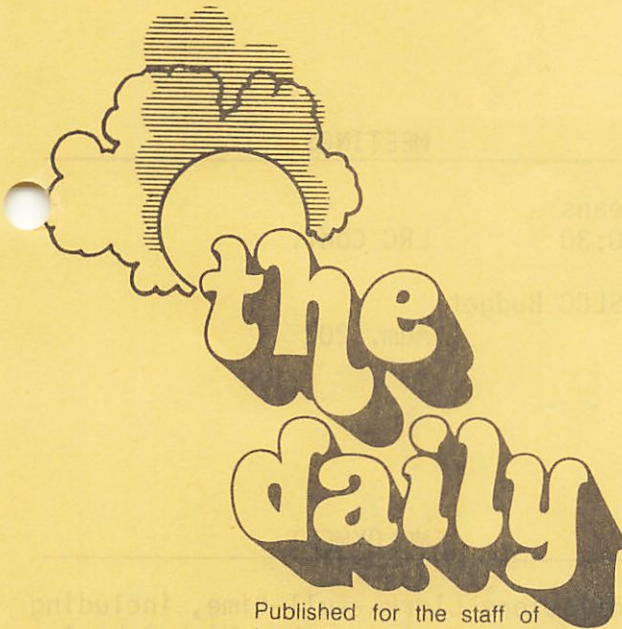

PLANETARIUM TOPIC WEDNESDAY--The possibility of LCC joining with several other county agencies in development of a new planetarium and science museum will be discussed Wednesday evening during a meeting of the Board of Education. Preliminary proposals have Lane joining with the University of Oregon, Lane IED, the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry and local school districts in forming something called variously the Cooperative Science Institute of Oregon, Lane Cooperative Science Institute, Lane Science Museum Commission and others.

Although completely in the discussion stage, the cooperative venture could lead to construction of a new planetarium and museum, probably at some place like Alton Baker Park. Currently, OMSI has a small planetarium at its museum on Fifth Ave. and Willamette Street. The Board will also adopt the \$16.5 million budget (including a \$9.9 million general fund) for the college's 1974-75 school year, and will discuss budget planning for 1975-76. The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. in Adm. 202.

UW MOVES AHEAD--Depending on how you look at it, the campus United Way campaign is either about 25 percent along the way or about 75 percent from its goal of \$2,578. As of yesterday, a total of \$602 in pledges had been taken by the Development office, or a gain of about \$130 over Friday's total. The annual fund drive will continue until mid-November.

JEFFERSON SCHOLAR TO SPEAK--Theodore Fred Kuper, the man who was largely responsible for the restoration of Thomas Jefferson's home Monticello, will speak at LCC Oct. 25 to kick off the college's observance of the U.S. bi-centennial. Kuper has been director of the Thomas Jefferson Memorial Foundation for more than 50 years and is a recognized Jefferson scholar. His appearance is co-sponsored by Phi Theta Kappa and the social science department (history) and is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. in Forum 301.

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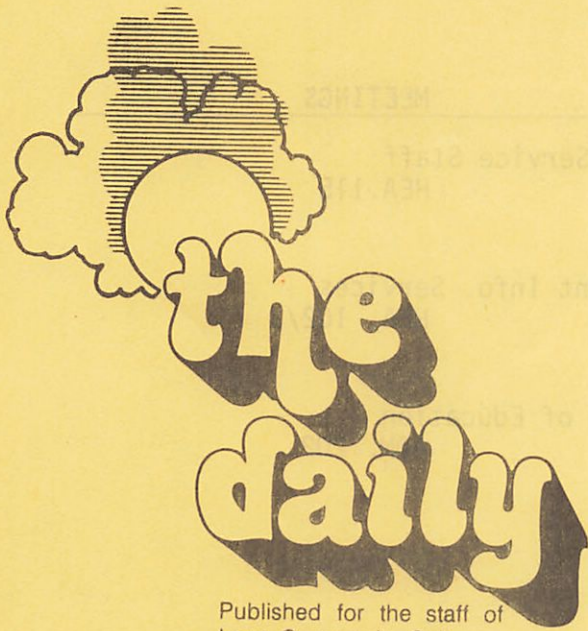

BOARD MEETS TONIGHT---On the agenda: a budget committee appointment (Mary Krenk's term expired in July), discussion on next year's budget, discussion on the possibility of LCC joining with several other public agencies in developing a planetarium and science museum for the county, a final review of the self-study and discussion of next week's accreditation team visit, and appropriation of this year's budget. 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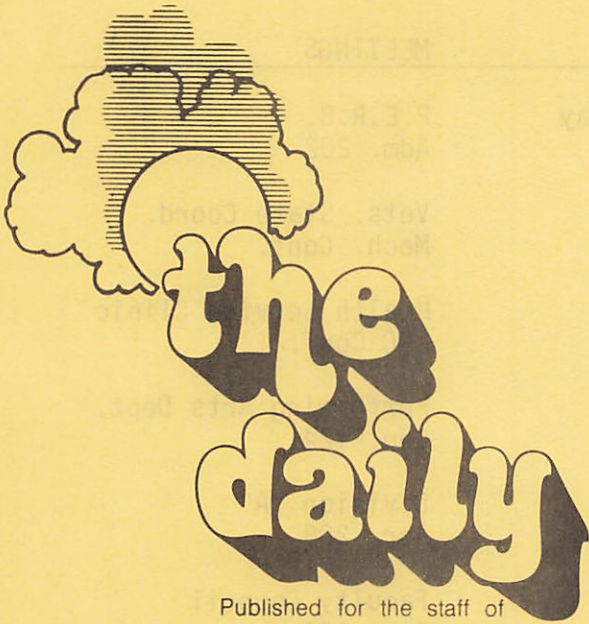

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BOARD NOTES--At a glance, here is what happened last night at the Board Meeting:

* Following Robert Mention's motion, the Board voted unanimously to endorse the concept of a county-wide commission for the establishment of a planetarium and science museum, also implying that if and when such a commission is formed, LCC would appoint a representative to its Board of Directors. In the same breath, the Board said that any future funding requests would have to be looked at very closely and that before the college set any money aside for a planetarium or museum, the projects would have to go through the same priority-scrutiny that every other program goes through.

*Architect and contractor Larry Beggs was named to the budget committee. He was nominated by Mention to replace Mary Krenk, whose term expired in July.

*There was a great deal of budget talk last night. The Board will have to make some decisions soon about budget elections for the coming year because if it should pick an early date for a levy request, a budget might have to start preparation as early as the first of next month. The dates provided by the legislature that are being considered as "better" dates are March 18, May 6 or Sept. 16. The discussion will continue.

* Bids on the Siuslaw Skills Center will be opened Nov. 6.

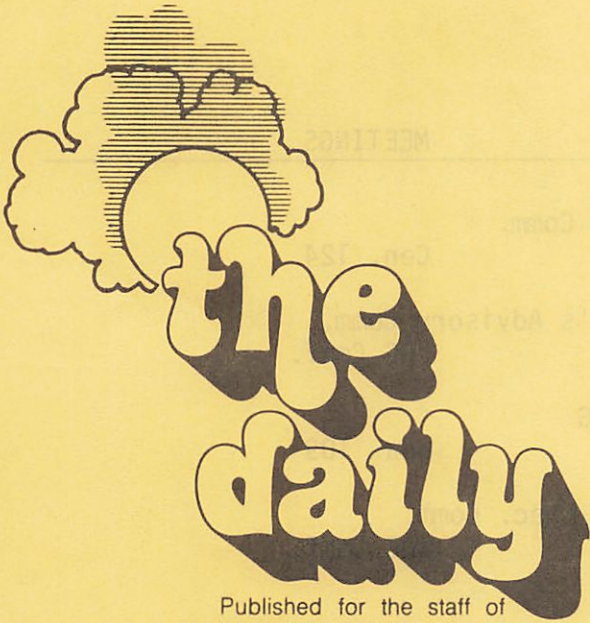

NATIONAL MEET SCHEDULED FOR EUGENE---About 200 of the nation's best junior and community college cross country runners will be in Eugene next month for the National Junior College Athletic Association championships at Shadow Hills Country Club. The race, the first ever held west of the Rocky Mountains, is scheduled for Nov. 9 and is hosted by LCC. Shadow Hills Country Club is located north of Eugene on River Road.

LCC was selected as the first western college ever to host the annual championship race last year after it finished fifth in the nationals at Tallahassee, Fla. Lane was the national champion in 1972. Meet director Al Tarpenning expects between 175-200 runners from the nation's 21 regions to show up for the meet and compete on a five-mile, figure-eight course.

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Voters Okay College 5 to 1

New Board Already Faces Organizational Fund Lack

It has neither operating expense money, a name nor a president, and only the promise of a campus and student body.

But a community college exists today in Lane County.

Voters overwhelmingly approved establishment of the college Monday by nearly a 5-to-1 margin. Preliminary tallies showed 5,944 votes for and 1,282 against the college.

Named to the initial board of directors were Dr. Albert Brauer of Florence from Zone 1, Dr. Clifford Matson of Junction City from Zone 2, Kenneth Schmidt of Springfield from Zone 3, Dr. Dean Webb of Cottage Grove from Zone 4, William Bristow Jr. of Eugene from Zone 5, and Olga Freeman and Lyle Swetland, both of Eugene, as at-large representatives.

The board has weighty problems awaiting it, the immediate one money. What will the college use to finance its organizational throes between now and a budget election, perhaps next spring?

"It's a problem the board members will have to solve," said Bert Dotson, community college study committee executive secretary. "We have no ready solution, believe me."

"They will have to get it somewhere," he said, "because we would hope to have a fairly good program operable next fall." The initial curriculum will be mostly technical-vocational courses, he said.

"The Eugene School District has agreed to make Eugene Technical-Vocational School facilities available for a temporary campus," said Lloyd Millhollen, a School District 4 official and also a member of the study committee. "A rental agreement probably will be drawn up."

ELECTION TEN YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

Ten years ago Saturday it was Tuesday. And Tuesday in Oregon often means election day. On that specific Tuesday, October 19, 1964, about 7,000 voters in a newly-formed community college district turned out and voted Lane Community College into existence.

The turn-out, which was light everywhere but in South Eugene where lines kept the polls open until 9:30, resulted in an overwhelming 5-1 vote to establish the two-year vocational and college transfer college that eventually was to be named after old Joseph Lane, one of Oregon's first major politicians and a Southern sympathizer in the Civil War.

The October 19 vote did little other than officially establish the college and create a Board of Education. It had no operating funds, no student body, and no campus. The accompanying article (written by Information and Publications director Larry Romine, then a Eugene Register-Guard reporter) presents a detailed account of the election.

Classes at the new community college began in July, 1965.

"We expect an opening enrollment of a thousand, if not more," Dotson said.

No immediate meeting has been scheduled by the board. It cannot, in fact, meet officially until Monday's vote is canvassed by the State Board of Education.

The state board next meets formally in December, although it might be persuaded to call a special meeting in November. And an even earlier telephone canvass has been mentioned.

The college board in the meantime will have to meet

unofficially Millhollen said. They must talk about choosing a president to direct organizational efforts and assist in such duties as picking a name for the new school. The directors can pick a name out of the air or hold a contest.

"It's up to the board," Dotson said.

A first consideration of the board when it meets will be to draw lots to determine the length of term each director will serve. There will be two four-year terms, two three-year terms, two two-year terms and a single one-year term.

Subsequent terms will be for four years. The directors will serve without compensation.

The board, whatever tribulations it encounters in the future, will begin its duties knowing the college has a solid backing among voters. Every one of the 22 polling places voted for establishment of the college.

"I thought it would be closer," said Dale Parnell, superintendent of the Lane County Intermediate Education District and a member of the college study committee. "People are backing this more than I thought."

"I never for a moment thought it would fail," insisted William Jones, assistant superintendent of Bethel School District and chairman of the college study committee. "People knew it was needed," he said.

Only in the Monroe Elementary School District in Benton County was the voting close, 27 for and 26 against. The narrow split was attributed to rumors of a "plot" that the college vote was part of an effort to shift the area from Benton to Lane County.

Slightly more than eight per cent of the college district's 85,000 registered voters—7,226—cast ballots and 82 per cent of them said "yes" to establishment of the college.

The vote, while seemingly fairly light, was termed "large" by Dotson. "I'm extremely pleased to see this many for a special election," he said.

Several of the new board members won easily while others had to settle for narrow victories.

In Zone 1, Dr. Albert Brauer tallied 2,738 votes to 1,791 for Glen Jensen of Central and 617 for S. Carl Traegde of Noti. Brauer captured 16 polling places and Jensen, six.

Dr. Clifford Matson received 2,705 votes to win the Zone 2 seat. Carroll Groshong of Eugene trailed with 1,660 votes and Wanda Casper of Junction City had 838 votes. Matson won in 19 polling places and Groshong in three.

Kenneth Schmidt won a close race in Zone 3, gathering 1,867 votes to 1,779 for Jay Hicks of Springfield and 1,373 for Robert Mealey of Blue River. The polling places were split 11-7-2 with four ties.

Dr. Dean Webb ran away from A. K. LaFon of Fall Creek in Zone 4, winning 3,582 to 1,418. Webb prevailed in 21 of the 22 polling places.

William Bristow Jr. captured 18 polling places and tied in another to amass 1,924 votes and the Zone 5 seat. William Madron of Eugene had 1,679 votes and the remainder of the polling places. Other votes went to: Eugene Herlocker of Eugene, 600; R. Glade Shimanek of Eugene, 490; Melvin Hess of Eugene, 441; and DeWitt McGhehey of Eugene, 275.

Olga Freeman and Lyle Swetland had tight competition from Francis Nickerson of Eugene for the two at-large seats. Mrs. Freeman won 14 polling places and 2,583 votes to 17 polling places and a tie in another for Lyle Swetland who had 2,560 votes.

Nickerson was right behind with 2,509 votes. He won at 11 polling places and tied in another.

Trailing the top three were James Weaver of Eugene, 1,521 votes; Paul Purvis of Harrisburg, 840 votes; and George Pyle of Eugene, 633 votes. Purvis won at one polling place while the other two were shut out completely.

The election was conducted with only one known hitch. Nearly a third of all the voters cast their ballots at South Eugene High School, resulting in block-long waiting lines at times during the evening.

When the polls closed at 8 a waiting line of 292 voters was moved inside the building and continued voting until about 9:30.

"We had \$1,000 to spent on this election and it was only enough to pay for 22 polling places," Millhollen said. The money came from contributions of county school districts and sales of college advertising buttons.

But if the heavy turnout at South inconvenienced voters, it did that and more to election workers. They did not finish counting the flood of ballots until 5:10 a.m., Tuesday.

SEPTEMBER BUDGET ELECTION DATE SET---By a 4-3 vote, the LCC Board of Education decided "to put all its eggs in one basket" last night and set Sept. 16 as the date the college would go for a one-year levy outside the six percent limitation. Board members Catherine Lauris, Richard Freeman, Jim Martin and Robert Mention voted for the fall date, stating that more facts (resources, student enrollment outlook, state funding figures and so forth) would be available then than would be available in the Spring. The administration, backed up by staff members Karen Lansdowne and John Howard, had argued for a May 6 date.

The state legislature restricts school budget elections to eight dates during the year; earlier discussion with the Board had ended up with its members leaning toward the May or September date and asking the administration to come to last night's meeting with a recommendation. The May 6 recommendation by President Schafer was based on meetings with the administrative council and the college Cabinet in which many staff members felt a spring election would allow more planning by the faculty and administration. If the Sept. 16 election fails, the only other date left for an LCC vote would be the general election on Nov. 4.

The Board also joined with Lane IED, the University of Oregon and Lane County in forming the Cooperative Science Museum Commission, which may eventually build a science complex--including a planetarium--in Lane county. Many sites for the potential complex have been discussed, but Alton Baker Park seems to be the most popular.

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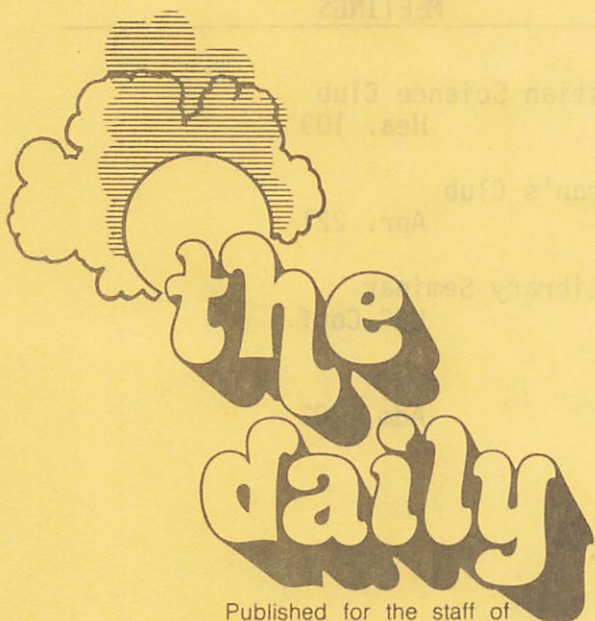

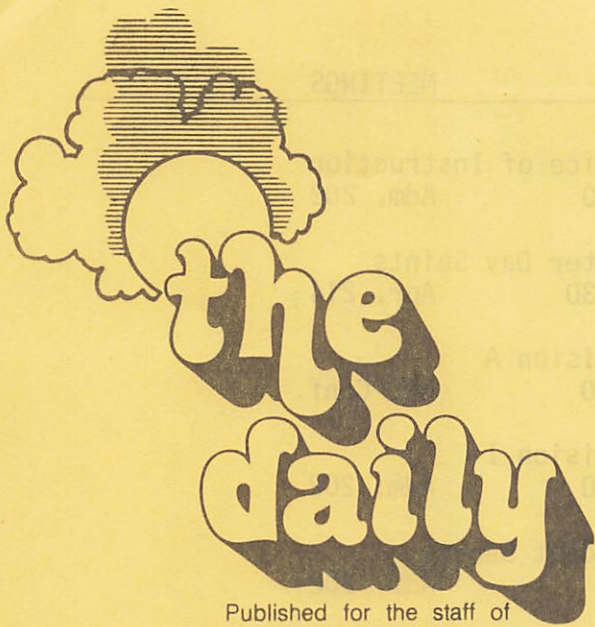
