CONTRACT RATIFIED---Faculty members voted 185-13 yesterday to ratify the work agreement reached between the Board of Education and the LCC Education Association. The Board approved the contract at its last meeting. While voting to accept the contract, the fauculty also decided to receive its retroactive pay in one lump sum (retroactive to July 1) in the Nov. 29 paycheck.

Some highlights of the contract, which features an overall 11.3 percent salary and fringe benefit increase, include:

\* increasing beginning teacher pay from \$7,070 to \$8,367 \* addition of an eleventh step in the salary schedule \* reducing the percentage gap between annual steps from about five percent to four percent for the top four steps and three percent for the remaining steps \* a no-strike, no-lockout" clause. The contract is good until June 30 and will automatically be renewed unless one side or the other wants to modify it.

STRAUB, PACKWOOD, WEAVER WIN---Bob Straub will be the next governor of Oregon; Bob Packwood will continue as Oregon's junior U.S. senator; Jim Weaver will be Oregon's congressman from the Fourth District. And Bob Wood squeaked by Archie Weinstein in the late hours and will be e newest county commissioner.

Voters turned out in moderate numbers and elected a largely Democratic slate of candidates (with some Republican surprises and hold-ons), rejected almost all money measures, and saved the steelhead trout as a game fish. A total of 82,960 voters, or 68 percent of the registered electorate, showed up at the polls in Lane County to join a little less than a million voters statewide in yesterday's vote. Here are some of the tallies:

Other results of interest: Jason Lee appears to have won his spot on the Court of Appeals despite a heavy write-in effort for Jacob Tanzer; Eric Haws, the attorney retained by the students for their legal services program was elected to the Eugene City Council; Bill Rogers upset Dick Eymann by about 1,000 votes; Jesse Fasold lost to Verne Duncan for state superintendent of public instruction; Fern Ridge finally passed its school budget on the fourth try by 12 votes; The Emerald PUD proposal was defeated; the anti-obscenity measure was voted down in Lane County but passed statewide; and the District 4-J recall attempt failed.

The two groups agreed on the list of supervisory and confidential employees early in the day, making the hearing that was scheduled unnecessary. Members of the newly-designated group of supervisors will now make their own salary and fringe benefit package and present it to the president and the Board. TRAVEL POLICY TO BE DISCUSSED BY BOARD---Authorization and reimbursement procedures for travel expenses while on college business will be discussed tomorrow as the first of several Board policy items that will be reviewed and perhaps modified over the next few months. One of the major changes in current policy that the Board will be discussing is removing any reference to dollar amounts entirely and placing reimbursement figures under administrative rule.

The purpose for that is to allow flexibility in the rapidly-changing price ranges for gas, food and lodging. The Board will also talk about the possibility of seeking a three-year serial levy in May to help provide cash for replacement of equipment, capital, library materials and supplies, and accumulation of funds to finance a secondary sewage treatment plant. The facility is required under the college's discharge permit granted by the DEQ. The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. in Adm. 202.

The LCC Board of Education, faced with a bid of about \$84,000 more than it expected on the Siuslaw Skills Center, took a wait and see position last night before awarding a \$400,000 construction contract to R.A. Chambers of Eugene. LCC officials will now appeal to federal administrators of the Educational Development Administration for \$56,000 in additional funds to help bail out the Florence project.

The EDA has been a partner in the Center all along and has matched \$195,000 in construction funds with LCC up to this point. Late yesterday EDA officials in Seattle tentatively denied a request by the college for the extra money--which LCC will match with \$36,000 in current construction funds--but Lane will ask the administration to review its request next week. If denied the project may have to be re-bid in total or in part. Architects say the main reason for the high bid was an unexpected overrun in the mechanical and electrical portions of the whole bid.

In other business, the Board discussed the possibility of a three to five year serial levy sometime this year--possibly in the spring--to help in replacement of library materials, instructional equipment, and financing of a secondary sewage treatment facility that is required by the Department of Environmental Quality by 1977. The Board gave the administration the go-ahead to research what would be needed for such a levy. The last five-year serial levy ended in 1970.

UFW OFFICIAL TO SPEAK---United Farm Workers second vice-president Phillip Vera Cruz will speak here today at 1:30 p.m. in the cafeteria. Vera Cruz, a union organizer since 1950, joined Cesar Chavez and the UFWA (AFL/CIO) during the Delano grape strike in 1965. His visit is sponsored by the Chicano Student Union, Self Help Oriented People (SHOP), and the Eugene Friends of the United Farm Workers.

LCC NOTIFIED OF INSURANCE INCREASE---Greater Oregon Health Service Company has told the college that rates for employee and dependent medical insurance have gone up; if you are a classified staff member, that means it can cost you an extra \$1.40 a month to keep your benefits in order. If you are a classified employee with dependents covered under the company insurance package, it could cost you up to \$3.50 more each month. Faculty members covered under the LCCEA package will not face any increases unless they carry insurance for dependents, in which their maximum rate hike could be \$4.15.

The rates were increased, said the company, because its income has not not kept up with its claim payments. GOHS did, however, guarantee these new rates until June 30. In the matter of the classified package, LCC is committed to funding employee insurance to a maximum of \$13.75 each month for the medical benefit, but the new rates per employee are \$15.15. An employee with one dependent goes from \$28.25 to \$31.10 (for an increase to the employee of \$2.85 per month), and an employee with a family goes from \$36 to \$39.50 (for an increase of \$3.50). Dean of Business Operations Tony Birch has advised all classified employees that, because of "the timing of these matters and the need to reach certain clarifications" the rate increases will not be deducted from paychecks until the January or February check, thus, he said, "it may be necessary for the college to double or triple deduct the rate increase the first month the amount would be obtained from the employee's paycheck." Classified staff members who may want to change their insurance coverage should see Marge McGill between Jan. 10-15.

Faculty members, on the other hand, will not face deductions from their paychecks as long as they are only covering themselves under the medical package, but an mployee and spouse will cost an extra \$2.55 and an employee plus a family comes to \$4.15 more. LCCEA negotiators bargained for an extra \$7.15 monthly contribution from the college and that amount will cover the employee's portion of the GOHS hike. The faculty also directed that a little less than a dollar a month be invested to absorb future rate increases. The added spouse or family insurance costs for faculty members will be reflected in the December paycheck, so anyone wishing to change his or her coverage should see Marge McGill by Dec. 10. THERE ARE STUDENTS, THEN THERE ARE STUDENTS---Yesterday's Daily announced that students with student body cards would be admitted to all LCC basketball games and wrestling matches for \$1. That should have gone on to say that LCC students would be admitted free, and that students from other schools would be charged a dollar. On the same subject, staff members who want one can pick up a season <u>family</u> pass that will admit them and their families to all home games and matches except the Christmas Seal Classic and OCCAA tournaments.
