SKILLS CENTER CLOSER---The Siuslaw Skills Center, a project that was in doubt two weeks ago, is "on" again this week after the Economic Development Administration made Lane Community College an offer it couldn't refuse. An extra \$56,500 in construction funds was offered to the LCC Board of Education Wednesday under the condition that the college match the amount and be willing to award a construction contract to R.A. Chambers of Eugene. LCC also agreed to spend an additional \$3,000 on water pipe being purchased and installed by the City of Florence, making a total of \$7,000 budgeted for that portion of the project.

Within hours after hearing of the EDA proposal by mail Wednesday the Board met in special session to accept the conditions. In four separate motions it decided by roll-call vote: \* to accept the amended grant agreement with EDA. \* to approve transfering \$223,250 from the construction budget to match the federal grant. Until Wednesday the Board had actually allocated only \$12,000 toward the Center. Addition of the \$223,250 to \$12,000 already spent and a land value credit of \$16,250 brought Lane's share of the bill to \$251,500, an even match with the government. \* to award a \$400,000 construction contract to R.A. Chambers. \* to spend the extra \$3,000 for pipe. Construction should begin on the project soon after the EDA approves the final agreement.

TOKENS' LAST HURRAH---The last of the Staff Association Bus Token Fund will be liquidated beginning tomorrow with a staff-only token sale in the bookstore. Tokens will be sold from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday and Wednesday at five for a dollar, with an \$8 limit. Proceeds will go to the Staff Development Fund. Any tokens not sold on these two days will be sold to both students and staff on Thursday.

NO BOARD MEETING WEDNESDAY---Because of the special Board meeting on Nov. 27, there will be no regular meeting of the Board Wednesday. It will meet Dec. 11.

LANE TO APPLY FOR TV LICENSE---The Board voted 5-0 Nov. 27 to authorize President Schafer to apply for a transfer of license of KVDO (Salem) to LCC. The application will be sent to the FCC. Lane is central in a much-discussed-but-only-that proposal in which KVDO would be turned over to a consortium of community colleges to operate both as an educational facility and as a public service.

IDEA PAPER DEADLINE NEAR---Next Friday will be the last day staff members can submit idea papers for Development Fund grants of up to \$1,000 each. Anyone planning on submitting a proposal should include the statement of need or purpose, method of implementation, and amount requested. A total of \$4,000 has been released for staff use by the Development Fund Board of Trustees. All proposals should be submitted to the Development office.

SPEAKERS BUREAU LIST AVAILABLE---Speakers on everything from suicide prevention to wild edible plants are available through a new Speakers Bureau list prepared by the office of information and publications. A brochure, listing 49 speakers, is available from the I&P office. It contains each speaker's topic or performance, his or her background, and campus or home phone number.

UNITED WAY DRIVE CLOSES WITH LANE AT BOTTOM---With about \$500 still to go to reach its goal of \$2,578, it appears LCC will finish the 1974 United Way Fund Drive with the worst per capita giving record of any community college in Oregon. LCC's total pledge to date is \$2,283, or about \$3.26 per staff member for a staff of 700. That, according to Lane County UW chairman J. Fitzgerald, gives Lane the worst record among Oregon's 13 community colleges.

Development director Lyle Swetland, disappointed over LCC's showing, said that "LCC's record of giving is incredible" and that officers of the old Staff Association and the LCCEF have already indicated a desire to reorganize the campus campaign next year. The last time LCC met its United Way goal was in 1971 when the goal was \$3,100. Although the fund drive technically ends today, Swetland said his office would be happy to accept late pledges until the end of the term. All donations are tax and payroll deductible.

TOURNAMENT HERE TOMORROW, SUNDAY---The "LCC Open", a U.S. Chess Federation-rated tournament, will begin in the cafeteria tomorrow with registration from 8:30-9:30 a.m. and the first of four rounds of play scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. The other rounds are 2 p.m. Saturday and 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. Sunday. Entry fees are six dollars. The tournament is open only to USCF members, but non-members can purchase an annual membership for \$10 at the door.

BOARD TO MEET TONIGHT---The Board of Education will act on an administrative recommendation to change the travel reimbursement policy tonight during its regular meeting in Adm. 202. The administration's recommendation is that Board policy set down the guidelines for reimbursement and that the actual dollar figures be placed under administrative rule, primarily to allow for flexibility to raise the amounts as inflation dictates. Included is a proposed schedule keeping mileage reimbursement at 10 cents a mile when college cars are available, and 14 cents a mile when they are not. Other proposed rates are \$23 per diem for meals and lodging (in-state) and \$35 for meals and lodging (out-of-state). The Board will also discuss the financial aids system and the possibility of a serial levy and will bring the subject back up about a reduced tuition rate of \$6 a term for senior citizens. AFT president Evelyn Tennis is expected to ask the Board to consider covering the recent Greater Oregon Health Service insurance rate hikes for classified staff members. The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m.

BOARD APPROVES SUPERVISOR, CONFIDENTIAL PAY---By a six-to-one margin, the Board of Education okayed an economic package last night that would give raises averaging 8.75 percent to a 73-member group of administrators, supervisors, and classified confidential employees. Only Jim Martin voted against the administration recommendation that gave the college's eight top administrators (not counting the president) an average 8.61 percent raise, 33 supervisors and managers an average of 8.66 percent, 22 chairpersons and coordinators a 9.96 percent hike, and 10 classified staff confidential employees an average of 9.32 percent more. The classified staff members also received the same fringe benefit package of \$7.15 a month that the faculty received earlier this year.

The new salary system does not use a salary schedule--it is, instead, based on comparative figures with Oregon's other community colleges. Therefore, LCC's dean of students will be compared with all other deans of students, supervisor to supervisor and so forth.

The Board also made a provision, on the administration's recommendation, that there was room for appeal and adjustment on an individual basis for staff members unhappy with their placement, and heard Dean of Instructional Operations Gerry Rasmussen say that the group of supervisors and others would prepare a package of non-economic matters for presentation to the Board later this winter. Because of the short preparation time, the package voted on last night was for money only--no fringe benefits were included. All raises are retroactive to July 1 and will appear in the Dec. 20 paycheck.

In other business, the Board was told that the college might end up the fiscal year with a deficit of \$231,000 if current projections come true and no action is taken to bring the budget back into line. The projections say that as much as \$66,340 may not be collected in taxes this year because of the poor economy (during periods of a depressed economy, many people delay paying their taxes until they feel they can better afford them), and that \$50,000 in federal reimbursement for vocational enrollment may not arrive. On top of that, federal contributions for other programs now appear to be coming in at a rate of \$153,800 less than expected and last year's carry-over from the budget is down \$44,286. Only an extra \$82,390 in tuition and fees helps offset the projected deficit.

President Schafer said that all areas of the college are looking at their expenditures and that they, and the administration, should know by early in winter term what, if any, needs to be cut.

Elsewhere during the lengthy meeting, the Board approved a revision in Board policy that set guidelines for travel reimbursement, but left the actual dollar amount up to the administration, and directed the administration to cut auto travel reimbursement by 10 percent as an energysaving measure. Dr. Albert Brauer, the only original member of the first Board still serving, was commended by his fellow Board members for his ten years' service, and there was discussion about making classes free to senior citizens. Currently they are charged \$6 a term.

The possibility of trying for a three or five year serial levy this spring received attention again last night (with Dr. Brauer advocating a three year levy at less than a million dollars a year) with the promise that it would be discussed again at the Board's next meeting. A proposal by Evelyn Tennis that the Board cover the recent GOHS insurance rate increases for classified staff members was tabled temporarily and will be considered at the next meeting, possibly before Christmas but definitely in January. The amount the Board would have to supply is a little over \$2,000.

It seems that EWEB already raised its rates last week before the hot water ban went into effect, so the savings will be on the new rate schedule. The Eugene Water and Electric Board, by the way, payed LCC \$35,997 last year in lieu of taxes--part of a \$1.5 million dollar payment in lieu of taxes to several public agencies in Lane County. LCC's electric bill last year was \$190,000 without the Performing Arts building and was projected as \$222,000 for this year.

COMMITTEE TO MEET HERE---The community college study committee of the Foundation for Oregon Research and Education (FORE) will meet here Jan. 7 in an all day session in the Board room. The committee is chaired by Lawrence L. Rennett (retired chairman of the Board for White Stag Mfg. Co. and senior vice president WARNACO). FORE was founded in 1971 by a group of business and education leaders to study and advise the state system of higher education and other state and local government bodies. FROM THE "BUDDY CAN YOU SPARE ME A BUCK FIFTY FOR A CUP OF COFFEE DEPT."---As a parting shot to 1974, here is today's lesson in economics, provided by a magazine called "Interim": "The U.S. Chamber of Commerce reports that the ordinary citizen Joe who earned \$10,000 in 1964 paid 13.7 percent of it in taxes. His take-home pay was \$8,626. Today Joe earns \$15,400 and pays 17.3 percent in taxes. His take-home pay is \$12,755.

"Meanwhile inflation has eroded the dollar's value by 60 percent since World War II and by approximately 10 percent in the last year alone. In 20 years, if inflation continues at the same rate, Joe will need to earn \$113,000 a year, and like Alice, he will have to run very fast just to stay in the same place. After paying taxes at the 1994 tax rate (50 percent), Joe will take home \$57,300, which will really be worth \$7,800."
