DEVELOPMENT GRANTS AWARDED---Grants that will go toward the purchase of medical equipment and a telescope, and to the strengthening of a variety of scholarship and loan funds have been awarded to the LCC staff by the Development Fund. The grants, totalling \$4,000, are awarded annually by the trustees of the Fund.

Receiving awards are the financial aids office (\$750 for use by high school completion students), the student health service (two \$500 grants for a new incubator used in taking throat cultures and for support of a program of vision and hearing tests for students), the science department (\$750 for a telescope), the adult basic education program (\$400 for GED scholarships), the counseling department (\$500 to organize a job-getting skills lab), the performing arts department (\$300 for travel money for the stage band), and the mass communication department (\$300 for orientation materials for a TV broadcasting system of individualized instruction).

LCC WINS ACCREDITATION APPROVAL---The Commission on Higher Schools, which sent an accreditation team to LCC last fall, has informed the college that it is doing a good job and will be accredited for the next 10 years. In a pre-Christmas letter, executive director of the Commission James F. Bemis said that LCC's accreditation had been reaffirmed by the team and that unless LCC has drastic problems another visit should not be necessary until about 1985. The college will be expected to turn in an interim report and will be visited by a Commission representative in five years. A copy of the report is available for loan at the library.

ART SHOW OPENS---Sculptures and drawings by five LCC artists will go on display for two weeks beginning Wednesday in the gallery. A total of 10 sculptures, all for sale, will be in the exhibit, scheduled to remain until Jan. 24. No reception is planned. The artists are instructors Bill Blix and Bruce Dean and students Jeremy Donley, Dan Dykes and Geoff Hughes. All but Dean are sculptors.

College facilities hopes the new procedure will cut down on the length of the calls.

ASCENT OF MAN SERIES BEGINS, CREDITS TRANSFERABLE TO LCC---The highly-acclaimed television series The Ascent of Man begins tomorrow on KOAC (Cable 5) and will continue for the next 13 weeks. Through a special arrangement with the Division of Continuing Education, Portland Community College, and KOAC/KOAP, the three social science credits that can be earned by watching the series can be transfered to LCC. Instructors should tell their students interested in taking the course and transfering the credits to write Campus of the Air, P.O. Box 1097, Portland, Oregon 97207 for registration materials. Tuition is \$45. Credit is granted by DCE, but the course is graded by two PCC instructors. Students who wish to transfer the DCE credits to LCC should call Gerald Rasmussen, dean of instructional operations, to make arrangements. The series is broadcast weekly at 8:30 p.m. Tuesdays and repeated at 11:30 a.m. Wednesdays.

KVDO ACQUISITION, SENIOR POLICY ON BOARD AGENDA---The Board of Education will be asked to take action on the transfer of KVDO-TV from Liberty Communications to LCC tonight when the Board meets in its first session of the new year. The proposed transfer has been discussed for several months and, if approved by the Board, could lead to the formation of a consortium of community colleges to operate the station as a training ground and as a public TV outlet.

The Board will also consider a policy change that would make all classes free to persons over the age of 62, and will further discuss the possibility of seeking a serial levy in May. A decision on the serial levy must be made soon--if one is to be held the county must be notified by March 20. The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. in Adm. 202.

BOARD DELAYS TV DECISION, SCHEDULES PUBLIC DISCUSSION---After lengthy discussion last night, both pro and con, the Board of Education decided to postpone any decision on accepting or rejecting television KVDO for two weeks until another public hearing on the matter can be held. The hearing is scheduled for Jan. 22. Comment and questions about the transfer came from nearly every member of the Board and several members of the audience, centered mostly around a handfull of issues, including the following three:

* what the equipment at the KVDO studio is worth, and is it compatible with other systems including the closed circuit system at the state legislature, a proposed primary broadcast site? Liberty Communications, KVDO's owner, says the equipment is worth about a half million dollars; an assessment will be made in the near future. At present the closed circuit equipment is not compatible, but Liberty said two black and white cameras used for remote broadcasts would be included in the transfer, along with an RCA color camera for studio use.

* would the station be a good training ground? Mass communication department chairman John Elliott, while having some reservations and realizing that logistics could be a problem, is enthusiastic about its educational use.

* would LCC, if everything falls through, be left holding the bag? The agreement drawn up between LCC, Liberty, and Eugene Television (KVAL-TV, which has agreed to join the project) says that any contract would be void if the FCC doesn't go along with the transfer and the state legislature does not fund it. Further down the road, LCC would have pretty much of a free hand to sell the station to another non-profit educational system if things do not work out.

More discussion is scheduled in two weeks.

In other business, the Board discussed the proposed serial levy, referred to Board negotiator Lon Mills the question of insurance rate hikes for classified employees (a written recommendation will come from Mills at the next scheduled meeting), eleminated tuition for senior citizens, and made new appointments to LCC advisory committees.

BITS AND PIECES ON TGIF ...

...At the beginning of the new year, LCC's financial status was such that the college would be about \$264,000 in the hole if budget cuts and other reductions weren't made. Round figure projections set anticipated requirements at \$997,500, forcing the administrative council to come up with the following proposed spending curbs: reduction in capital outlay including match requirements, \$43,000; assessment to enterprise accounts, \$15,000; budget cuts from business operations, \$16,000; budget cuts from student services, \$20,000; Eliminate curriculum development funds, \$30,000; budget cuts from college planning, \$6,500; budget cuts from Board and president's complex, \$10,000; reduction of transfers out, \$6,000; budget cuts from instruction, \$43,000; budget cuts from Continuing Ed./ABE, \$69,000; payroll fixed cost savings on above, \$6,000, for a net of \$264,500. The cuts are just proposed and may alter as new information is received.

SENIORS TO TAKE CLASSES FREE, IF THERE ARE CLASSES TO TAKE---Persons 62 years of age and over will now be entitled to take any class--credit or non-credit--free of charge at LCC. They can, that is, if they can find one. Dean of Students Jack Carter said Friday that practically all the credit classes are filled and that students are only being accepted if they are willing to sign up for one of the few courses where there is still room.

Anyway, the Board of Education has said that all LCC courses will be opened free to senior citizens on a space available basis, adding that any senior who wishes to continue paying tuition be allowed to do so. Senior citizens will still be charged any special fees that accompany a class. Previously they had also been charged \$6 a term for credit classes and \$6 for Adult Education courses.

The new ruling is retroactive to the first of the year. Any student 62 and over who enrolled in classes that began after Jan. 1 can apply for a refund.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES MEETING SCHEDULED---The assistant director of the state Public Employee Retirement System, Jerry Liebertz, will speak tonight on the current status of the System. The meeting, open to all public employees, will be at 7:30 in the auditorium of Springfield High School, 875 N. 7th. Liebertz will also discuss projected fixed and variable investment returns for this year and changes that may be proposed during the 1975 legislative session. There will be a question and answer session if time permits.

THE COMPOSITE STUDENT---Larry Romine and the office of Academic and College Planning have drawn the composite LCC student: He is a Lane County resident, Caucasian, a freshman, single, 25 years old, and attends school full-time. That profile emerges from an analysis by the college of the 6,750 individuals who enrolled fall term for one or more credit courses. Those taking non-credit adult education courses were not included in the study.

Some other highlights of the study show that 58 percent of the credit students were male and that 64 percent were attending full time. First year students comprised 83 percent of the student body and unmarried students were more likely to attend full time. Some 65 percent of the credit students were single, while about 58 percent of the married students went to school full time.

Caucasians made up 96 percent of the student body with about one percent each of Black, Chicano, Indian and Oriental. In-district residents totaled 94 percent, with the largest delegation from any single high school coming from South Eugene, which had about seven percent of the total. The youngest credit student was 12 and the oldest was 75. The average full-time study load was 14 credit hours, average part-time load was five credit hours. Only two percent took 20 or more hours.

TV PICTURE STILL FUZZY---LCC's Board of Education will vote next Tuesday at 7:30 in the Board Room on the question of whether to join a consortium in acquiring Salem television station KVDO. Chairman Steve Reid couldn't make last night's session and there were some indications that his might have been the swing vote. President Schafer explained that LCC would not have to budget any money for the station immediately. The legislature would have to acquire the station from Liberty Communications of Eugene, and others in the consortium would put up initial operating money. But, at least two or so Board members apparently feel that LCC's other needs ought to be put ahead of the TV project.

STUDENT RECORDS ARE PRIVATE---Grace Cameron, supervisor of student records reminds all staff members that "according to federal law enacted Aug. 21, 1974, no person or agency, except LCC staff for official college purposes, may be granted information contained in a student's records at a post-high school institution such as LCC without written permission or consent of the student. The student is guaranteed access to the student's own records, however. A student's address, phone number, and whereabouts on campus are included in private and protected information. Questions about this law may be directed to the supervisor of student records."

CASE RETURNS FROM JOB FOR, VISIT WITH HEW---Dean of Academic and College Planning Lewis Case returned this week from Washington D.C. where he spent two weeks working for, and conferring with officials of the department of Health, Education and Welfare. For one week he read proposals for HEW's Advanced Institutional Development Program that helps colleges on the verge of becoming "great" get that way, and for the second week he met with HEW representatives on the possibility of grants for LCC and attended a Federal Affairs Programs workshop sponsored by AACJC.

For the proposal-reading work, which will eventually amount to about \$2 million for each approved college, Case received all expenses and a salary of \$100 a day, which allowed him to stay the second week for the workshop and grant study.

SCHAFER ASKS CETA PROCEDURE REVIEW---Questions raised concerning the hiring of the wife of the director of the Lane County Social Services Division for a federally-funded LCC position have led President Schafer to ask for an immediate review of procedures used in hiring Mrs. Marje Wynia last Oct. 14. Mrs. Wynia is the wife of Social Services director Bob Wynia, who also oversees the Comprehensive Education and Training Act program in Lane County. She was hired by LCC as a counselor/mental health liaison officer and her salary is paid with CETA funds. A citizens' group has questioned the hiring, claiming that LCC may have violated nepotism rules in hiring Mrs. Wynia.

At the request of Dean of Students Jack Carter, President Schafer will ask the Board of County Commissioners to request that the Department of Labor's Region X office send a representative immediately to review the events that led up to the selection of Mrs. Wynia and to provide an audit of the procedures used by the selection committee.

Lyle Swetland, whose Development Office has been in charge of processing applications for CETA funds for LCC, said "we're concerned that citizens of the college district know that LCC is doing its very best to apply the (CETA) regulations and guidelines as we understand them. If the process that we're using is not correct, not only in the case of Mrs. Wynia but in the case of all the people we hire with CETA funds, then we need to know if there are any changes that need to be made and what they are."

PARTIAL REORGANIZATION IN BUSINESS OPERATIONS---The creation of an office of personnel services, with Hank Douda assigned as its director, heads the list of reorganization moves in the office of business operations announced by President Schafer yesterday. In addition to the creation of personnel services, all budget functions presently performed by three different individuals will be transferred to the budget director, Verne Whittaker, and the director of financial services/controller (Bill Mansell) will become more involved in the direct administration of other activities performed by the current business office.

A complete outline of the reorganization, including a detailed explanation of who does what, is being circulated through the campus as a memo from the president. Interested staff members who do not have a copy of the memo can ask for one from their supervisor. ON SECOND THOUGHT---Tuesday's Board of Education meeting to vote on the KVDO acquisition has been postponed at the request of Don Tykeson of Liberty Communications, Inc. He said he wants to investigate alternatives to transferring the station to LCC directly. It may be that it could go to the State System of Higher Education and OEPBS, with LCC and others as partners, or to Chemeketa CC or to some other agency. Ways to strengthen the solvency of the proposed consortium are being sought. Board member and faculty concerns about LCC fiscal obligations to the consortium motivated the action.

TO COMMENCE OR NOT TO COMMENCE---The question of whether LCC should continue holding formal commencement exercises was raised yesterday at the Cabinet meeting, and will be raised again formally and informally throughout the college during the next few weeks. Commencement has been slipping in attendance during the past few years and has received criticism for everything from being held on the wrong day to high honorariums for speakers, leading college officials to question its existence and to seek the opinion of LCC staff and students. Anyone with suggestions about graduation should see his or her supervisor, or Jack Powell, or any Cabinet representative.

MORE CETA POSITIONS ON THEIR WAY TO LCC---Ten new CETA-funded clerk positions have been approved for LCC, with a possible 15 more on the way. The new positions will be funded until July 1, then will probably be extended to Dec. 1. Meanwhile 15 other applications for CETA jobs will be considered by the county at a later date.

"DRASTIC" CUTS MAY COME---Unless LCC receives some extra income, and receives it pretty soon, spring term classes may have to be cut "drastically" said President Schafer yesterday. Schafer noted that the college is being reimbursed for 6,150 FTE, but expects about 7,000 FTE by the end of the year, and the budget must be balanced during spring term. One group effort by all of Oregon's community colleges may bear fruit in a few weeks when the 13 schools find out if the legislature has approved their request for supplemental income for over-realized FTE. Meanwhile, Gov. Straub may also increase his recommended increase in community college funding (now at a mere 3 percent) for next year, but even if he does the legislature must still approve it.

LBCC BUDGET TRY FAILING---Although it was doing well in Benton County, the request by Linn-Benton CC for \$2.3 million was losing in Linn County and appeared this morning to be on the way to defeat. Meanwhile a school bond issue in Harrisburg passed, as did a proposal that the Springfield Utility Board buy PP&L's area operations.

BELLA NAMED EDITOR---Rick Bella, who began as a reporter for the Torch in December and was promoted to associate editor in early January, has now been named editor of the student newspaper to replace John Loeber. Loeber quit the post two weeks ago for financial reasons. Bella, 24, was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. but was raised in Teaneck, N.J. and has been living in Oregon since 1972. Earlier this winter he was named as one of 31 students in the western states to receive a \$50 Western Newspaper Foundation scholarship.

As editor Bella plans to stick with a consistent eight-page format for the rest of the year (the Torch has been four pages during most of the year) and will concentrate on hard news, sports, and a special center spread feature every week. The feature will be on a single theme each week, said Bella, helping "give us a personality people can look for from issue to issue." Besides Bella, the Torch has a staff of about 10.

EXHIBITS IN LIBRARY---Two exhibits--one of paintings of Indians and a collection of Indian artifacts and the other a "nature in miniature" scene--will be on display until the middle of February in the LCC library. Nez Perce and Modoc Indians are the subjects of a display loaned by LCC student Sherman Carter, who, in his boyhood, lived on the Klamath Indian Reservation.

Several watercolors and oils of notable Indians such as Chief Joseph and Captain Jack highlight the exhibit, which also features scenes of incidents taken from Carter's research of Indian history in Oregon. To accompany the paintings Carter has also provided his collection of Indian blankets, an 1873 lever-action rifle, and other artifacts.

Elsewhere in the library is a three-piece "nature in miniature" scene depicting a rural setting surro ding a miniature railroad. The scene was constructed by the Model Railroad Workshop, led by Wayne George and sponsored by the Willamalane Park and Recreation District. It is entirely hand-crafted in such detail that even the hinges on the door of the three-inch outhouse are made of leather.
