POST NO BILLS---Starting today, all posters, signs and advertisements are banned from windows and glass doors at LCC. In a memorandum circulated Friday, Jay Jones said the new policy, aimed at cleaning the clutter off all windows but particularly in the Center, Administration and Health and PE buildings, would apply to all handbills except campaign posters during student elections. Those posters may be displayed no earlier than two weeks before elections and should not exceed 22" x 28".

A priority system has been designed for allocating space on the remaining bulletin boards, with instructional posters given first consideration, followed by those for stud at activities and finally, outside activities. Other guidelines for the new policy are available from the office of student activities.

MAXWELL ASSISTS IN TEXTBOOK WRITING---LCC auto mechanics teacher Robert Maxwell is one of seven automotive instructors in the U.S. picked to develop a new innovative automotive textbook for John Wiley and Sons Publishers in New York. SPRING TERM CUTBACK---Hopes for a supplemental state appropriation to fund LCC's overenrollment this year are dimming. That necessitates spring term cutbacks to bring the budget into balance. President Schafer told the Cabinet yesterday that Dean Jack Carter is writing about 1,600 applicants for admission spring term to tell them that they may not find classes available to them.

These are students who are <u>not</u> enrolled winter term; some are new to LCC and others attended in the past. The total does not include new out-of-district, out-of-state and foreign applicants, who won't be permitted to even try to find classes to take spring term. Dean Carter says the 1,600 will be accommodated on a first-come, first-served basis after presently-enrolled students have picked over the class offerings. He thinks that 20 percent or so may be able to find classes they want.

BOARD: "WE NEED THAT EQUIPMENT", VOTES FOR SERIAL LEVY---Lane Community College, which has been without a serial levy for capital outlay and replacement of equipment for four years, will ask voters to establish a three-year serial levy at the general election May 6. At its Wednesday meeting, the Board of Education decided six-to-one to request the levy for a maximum of \$2.4 million, or about \$800,000 annually for the three years. This would be a levy of about 32 cents per thousand of assessed valuation. The Board and the college staff have discussed the possibility of seeking a serial levy for several months, deciding Wednesday that further delays in attempting to fund outlay and equipment replacement would jeopardize many programs.

A serial levy is separate from LCC's operating budget in that it collects funds for capital outlay, the replacement of material and equipment and supplies. For the past several years, at each successive budget election for funds in excess of the six percent limitation, capital outlay items have been the most vulnerable and are often the first to be cut. Consequently much of LCC's machinery and equipment needs to be replaced, and new equipment purchased to update vocational programs.

If passed, the serial levy would also ease the budget-drawing process and would significantly reduce the amount needed by LCC in an operating budget election. An operating budget election is scheduled for Sept. 16. LCC operated with a serial levy during its first five years of operation but has been without one since it expired in 1970. Since then capital outlay and equipment expenditure items have been included in the general operating budget. All Board members were in favor of separating outlay/equipment from the operating budget except for Robert Mention. Mention was the only "no" voter, citing the poor economy and a desire to hold a single, annual election as his reasons.

VOCATIONAL INSTRUCTORS OF THE YEAR ANNOUNCED---Ten current and former LCC vocational instructors have been selected by a committee of their peers as the college's Outstanding Vocational Educators of the Year. Their selection was announced last night as part of a National Vocational Education Week observance at the Board meeting. They are Carl Lemke and Bob Maxwell,

mechanics; Jack Kreitz and Betty James, business; Muriel Peterson, paradental; Sue Thompson, health and physical education; Edward Seabloom, mathematics; Rick Romenek, electronics;

INSTRUCTORS OF THE YEAR (CONT.)---Ken Brownell, home economics; and Bill Mobley, MDTA. All are current LCC teachers except Mobley, who was a welding instructor for the Manpower Development Training Act until the federal program was phased out last year. About 70 teachers were nominated by their colleagues, with the 10 finalists being selected by a committee of instructors and administrators.

OEPBS IN, GOLDMARK ON HOLD---The Oregon Educational and Public Broadcasting Service (OEPBS) appears now to be the primary agent in the transfer of Salem TV station KVDO from the private to the public sector. LCC, which will receive help from Eugene Television (KVAL), is still involved as a partner, but is no longer considered the lead institution in the proposed consortium and has no financial commitment, real or implied. As for the Goldmark proposal, the Board discussed the issue again last night and should make a decision on whether LCC will become involved in it by Mar. 15.

BRRR & SQUINT SAVE DOUGH---Lowering thermostats and flicking off lights are turning out to be more than energy conservation measures. They're helping the college stay within its tight budget. Electrical cost increases of 12% are being countered by a 9% cut since June in consumption.

You doubtless have noticed the shutoff of hot water in rest rooms (scrubbing up is like reaching into an icy mountain stream); bulbsnatching from hundreds of outlets in classrooms, offices and halls; and lowering of thermostats from 70 to 68 degrees. Reducing demand on the college's electric furnace has produced the bulk of the savings. Already-heated air also is being recirculated and less fresh, cold air is being brought inside.

Largest percentage savings happened during December-January. Power use was trimmed 27 percent over the same two months a year ago. Continued conservation is expected to keep LCC within its \$222,000 electricity budget for the fiscal year.

ON CAMPUS---Dr. Ruth Burns, University of Oregon financial aids administrator, will be available to discuss financial aid applications for Fall 1975 in the Board Room tomorrow at 3 p.m. Please announce to your students.

TOP 10 TAXPAYERS---Lane County's largest companies are contributing about 18% of the \$3.3 million in local property taxes which LCC is receiving this year. The college is getting about \$612,000 from Weyerhaeuser, Pacific Northwest Bell, Pope & Talbot, Southern Pacific, Georgia Pacific, International Paper, Pacific Power & Light, Rosboro Lumber, Giustina Lumber and U.S. Plywood. The estimate was developed by I&P in cooperation with the County Department of Assessment & Taxation. It is believed that businesses, compared to owners of private homes, pay a heavy chunk of our property tax income, but it's almost impossible to get a handle on specific figures.

ANOTHER 'FIRST'---Dollar-short LCC, with the announcement that Spring Term classes must be curtailed, becomes Oregon's first community college to refuse admission to applicants. Out-ofdistrict, out-of-state and foreign applicants won't even be considered. Some 1,600 Lane County people who never attended LCC before or aren't attending this term must wait until present students have registered and then attempt to find open classes. About 80% are expected to be shut out.

TRIVIA THAT'S NOT SO TRIVIAL---Helen Haynie says The Candy Man, who fills our vending machines daily, told her that the dispenser in the gym foyer shells out 200 bars a day. And the cigarette machine near the cafeteria tables puts out 30 cartons of smokes a day.

NO RUSSIAN ROULETTE---LCC's Board of Education changed its mind last night and moved the operating budget election from Sept. 16 to Tuesday, June 17. The earlier date will still permit a second chance in September if the June vote is negative. Staff members such as George Alvergue, Social Science prof, asked for "a fighting chance" in June for teachers who otherwise would have to wait until fall to find out if they have jobs. Board member Al Brauer of Florence said he voted for the earlier date to help "reduce staff fear."

A serial levy to purchase tech-voc equipment will be placed before voters May 6. The Board voted to ask approval of \$2,729,082 at the rate of \$900,000<sup>+</sup> a year over three years. That is expected to raise \$800,000 per year because of uncollected taxes, etc. The levy would cost an estimated 31¢ per \$1,000 true cash value or an estimated \$7.75 per year in additional property taxes for the owner of a home assessed at \$25,000.

An agreement making LCC a junior partner in the acquisition of KVDO-TV was approved. LCC's only fiscal oblication would be to accept \$40,000 a year for 5 years from Eugene Television, Inc. (KVAL), and forward it on to OEPBS. The State Board of Higher Education this week nixed OEPBS's purchase of KVDO, but the word is that reconsideration is probable. The Elections Committee of the Legislature is recommending that money be allocated to buy the station from Liberty Television (KEZI) and turn it over to OEPBS.

The Goldmark proposal was discussed and scheduled for a vote at a meeting early in March, probably the 5th or 12th. Board member Catherine Lauris suggested that teachers should get royalties which might accrue to the college. Al Brauer said he'd "like to see us get in on the ground floor."

Summer term may be cut to 83 percent of last year's level, reported Associate Dean Jim Piercey. That's the equivalent of a tax base budget.

HAKANSON TO ASSUME UMPQUA PRESIDENCY---Former LCC dean of students Bud Hakanson has been hired as the new president of Umpqua Community College in Roseburg. He replaces Harry Jacoby, Umpqua's first and only president since it began in the mid-60s. Hakanson left Lane in 1970 after five years to assume the presidency of Clark College in Vancouver. His brother John is president of Clackamas Community College. AVOID SPRING RUSH---Buck Bailey's pre-graduation job counseling service should be getting underway again soon, and teachers planning on having Buck speak to their classes can avoid the spring term rush by making arrangements now. In his visits Buck briefs students on how to write resumes, and helps them with other job-getting skills. For details, call him at the placement office.
