Ballantyne is also a graduate of the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York and is now a University of Oregon theatre major.

He has appeared in many LCC productions, including "Celebration", "Hotel Paradiso", and is currently cast as Cardinal Wolsey in the April production of "A Man for All Seasons". His experience as a director at the Pentacle Theatre in Salem includes "The Women", "Design for Living", "A Delicate Balance" and "Cabaret".

Also needed are a tap dancer, singer and pianist. Although prepared readings are not necessary, scripts may be checked out beginning March 10 from the performing arts department office.

LAYOFFS NOT EXPECTED SAYS SCHAFER---"We've never had to lay anyone off before and we are absolutely <u>not</u> going to do it unless things get critical," said President Schafer yesterday. The President was responding in Cabinet to rumors heard by some classified employees that some staff members would be layed off this summer should LCC shorten or eliminate summer session. AFT President Evelyn Tennis told President Schafer that a few classified staff members had heard they would have unexpected "vacations" at the end of the summer if the 12-week session is shortened to eight weeks. An eight-week session has been discussed as many faculty members and administrators agree that the final four weeks of summer school are often "lax".

Dr. Schafer stressed that no layoffs are anticipated, although nothing can be completely certain until the serial and operating budget levy elections have been completed. Should one or both fail, alternatives would then be looked at, he said, adding that "we're going to keep on all staff members possible. We've never had to do it before (lay staff off) and I hope we won't have to now." The President agreed with a suggestion from Jim Snow and Sallie Torres that a regular, periodic message to the staff on the college's status would help put a lid on rumors and keep employees up to date on the situation.

Also in Cabinet, it was announced that a citizens' committee, similar to PASS which worked on the District 4-J election last year, has been formed to help Lane pass its serial and operating budget elections (May 6 and June 17), and that the state legislature is considering a reimbursement figure of a little over 7,000 FTE next year for LCC. This year's, which is causing much of the financial problems LCC is facing in coping with an overload of students, is 6,100.

GOLDMARK: 4 YES, 1 NO, 1 ABSTENTION --- Citing a need for additional technology which could enable the college to reach more students, the LCC Board of Education last night committed the institution to participate in the Goldmark project of the League for Innovation. Some \$150,000 will be allocated in the next few years for instructional sound-slide video tapes. They will be used to supplement traditional classroom teaching methods in some courses-one estimate was 10 percent -- in the next few years. It may take a couple of years before the first tapes are ready for use, with LCC faculty expected to get involved in their creation. Technical production will be done in Hollywood.

Faculty Council chairer Jim Snow told the Board that the faculty "overwhelmingly" opposed the plan. Both unions and some students--particularly the veterans group--also opposed it. Snow cited media experts who have expressed reservations about mediated instruction.

President Schafer suggested that the use of technology must be maximized to hold down costs. and that this will be one in a variety of teaching methods. He called it one alternative to such things as holding down salaries.

Board member Bob Mention said the turning away of prospective students makes the need for technology "self-evident". Catherine Lauris and Al Brauer said the system may help to reduce costs and make it possible in future years to reduce the tax burden. Mrs. Lauris repeated her desire that a way be sought to pay royalties to faculty members involved in producing the courses.

Voting Yes were Brauer, Mention, Lauris, and Steve Reid. Jim Martin voted No. John Barber abstained, and Richard Freeman was out of town.

Other business: Bob Mention said he won't run for reelection May 6. John Barber said he probably won't run either, but he hasn't made a firm decision yet.

A community committee is being organized to run the May 6 and June 17 election campaigns. Mass communication chairer John Elliott has been named by President Schafer to spearhead the campus effort.

The college budget committee will hold a series of meetings starting April 9 and ending May 7. They'll review and shape the Administration's budget proposal for the fiscal year, which begins July 1.

BOARD ELECTION---Nominating petitions for candidates for the LCC Board of Education are available at the Lane County Elections Department. They must be returned to the Elections Department by 5 p.m. Tuesday, April 1. Victors at the May 6 school election will win four-year terms without pay, starting July 1. Two seats are up for election:

At-Large--Represents Lane County, the Harrisburg Union High School District in Linn County, the Monroe Elementary District in Benton County, and those portions of the South Lane School District and the Siuslaw School District in Douglas County. Applicants must be registered voters, residents of the district, and secure 50 signatures of registered voters residing in the district.

Zone 2--Represents Junction City, Bethel, Harrisburg, Harris, Wyatt and Monroe Elementary School Districts. Applicants must be registered voters, residents of the zone, and must secure signatures on their petitions of 25 registered voters residing in the zone.

Bob Mention says he won't seek reelection to the At-Large position. John Barber hasn't decided yet if he will seek another term as Zone 2 representative.

CONTRACT TIME---Letters are going out from President Schafer to staff members on one-year contracts to notify them that they will be re-hired for next year, subject to the level of funding provided through local elections. Employees have until April 1 to accept; after that time the offers will be considered withdrawn. The Board of Education on Wednesday night approved rehiring all present contracted staff except one.

100% Recycled Paper

PAPER CONSERVATION REPORT RELEASED---Six major recommendations for the most efficient and economical use of paper at LCC are outlined in the final report of the ad hoc committee on paper conservation. Copies of the report are available from Printing & Graphics.

In addition to the thirteen original suggestions released last December, the six new recommendations include: (1) use of the multilith in Printing & Graphics, which produces copies at a cost of 25-30 percent less than ditto or mimeograph machines; (2) eliminate data processing over-run cards in registration. Drop/Add forms, says the committee, serve the same purpose and are preferred by many departments; (3) use The Daily more extensively, particularly as a means of distributing information about meetings, activities and progress reports that are often covered currently in individual memos; (4) use The Daily for a continuing series of paper-saving tips; (5) print the final exam schedule in the quarterly schedule of classes, eliminating the end-of-term nandout; and (6), encourage the use of photo typesetting, which can cut paper needs by as much as 50 percent.

The committee rejected as unworkable at this time suggestions that involved major, campus-wide recycling, reprinting on used paper, and the use of newsprint. Its reasons are detailed in the report.

Incidentally, The Daily will be printed for at least the next month on 100 percent Recycle Bond paper. P&G has a limited supply on a trial basis. Cost figures are not in yet, but Don Johnson says that recycled paper costs a little more than so-called "new" paper. He also points out that all paper contains recycled material, sometimes as much as 50 percent.

LEVEL CHANGE WORKSHOP TOMORROW--Anyone planning on applying for a level change should attend a workshop especially designed for such things tomorrow from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Cen. 124. Hank Douda and Rick Romanek will be on hand to help with the process, hand out forms, and answer questions. The workshop is required for any staff member wishing a level change.

CABINET TO MEET TODAY---On the agenda: a progress report on budget development, discussion on elections, pay policy, legislative activity, a report on the college presidents' meeting, and a review of Monday's administrative council meeting. Time: 3 p.m. Place: Adm. 202.

"MORGENMUSIK" TO RETURN TO KLCC---"Morgenmusic", the highly-popular morning program of classical music that disappeared from KLCC in September, has returned to the station's programming log. Tom Lichty says that classical music from the baroque, romantic and early classical music periods will go out over the air from 6-9 a.m. daily.

CLASSIFIED TO VOTE ON FAIR SHARE---Whether all classified staff members included in the bargaining unit will be required to join the American Federation of Teachers, and therefore become dues-paying members, could take its first step forward Thursday when the classified staff votes on the issue. If approved by a majority of all classified employees, not just those already AFT members, then it will automatically become a negotiable item at the bargaining table this year.

Under Oregon law, a Fair Share system is allowable if requested by a majority of the bargaining unit and negotiated between labor and management. Results from an eariler AFT survey showed that a large number of classified employees wanted a Fair Share election. If approved by all concerned, then every classified staff member represented by AFT would be required to pay the \$5 monthly dues to the union--with one exception. Those who can document religious objections to union membership can pay an equivalent amount to a non-religious, non-profit charitable organization.

The election is scheduled for Thursday in the cafeteria. Voting times are 7-8 a.m., 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., and 5 p.m. to 6 p.m. Absentee ballots are available from Jane Foust in the social science department.

BERG, KELLEY, MARSTON NAMED FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT LEAVES---Lane Community College's first leaves given for professional development have been awarded to Jerry Berg, Fred Kelley, and Jay Marston. All three will take spring term off to work on projects approved by the professional development committee, and all will receive 75 percent of their contracted rate of pay while they are gone.

Jerry Berg, who teaches reading, spelling and effective learning in the Study Skills Learning Center, will use the term to continue his research and writing of a series of eight readers for students from junior high school to community college level. Tentatively called "Men and Automobiles", the series will cover transportation from the discovery of the wheel to the present and will be illustrated with photographs. Jerry has already completed a reading series called "Fast Wheels".

Completion of a dissertation on mass media and political communication in Lane County is the goal of Fred Kelley, who will take spring term away from his job as a speech and TV broadcasting instructor in the mass communication department. Fred's study is a comprehensive view of attitudes, uses of sources of information for the development of those attitudes, and general communication patterns of a selected group of county residents. He will be completing his PhD work at the University of Oregon.

Jay Marston, a science instructor who teaches human genetics and wild foods of Oregon, will become a UofO graduate fellow in systematic botany, and will complete a photographic study of most of Oregon's useful wild flowers. Jay's project will take him throughout the state, including photographic forays into the Cascades, the Rogue River Valley, the Steens Mountains, the Eastern Oregon desert, and the Siskiyous.

Of the \$15,000 set aside in the college budget as a result of last year's faculty-Board negotiations, about \$11,000 will be used to finance the three professional development leaves. Director of personnel services Hank Douda said that the amount could creep closer to the \$15,000 should substitutes hired by the departments involved require salaries in excess of the amount already being paid Marston, Berg and Kelley.

MAINTENANCE BUILDING NEARS COMPLETION---Construction on the maintenance building is progressing on schedule and should be finished in time for occupancy by college facilities next month.

FAIR SHARE VOTE TOMORROW---All classified staff members have a chance Thursday to vote on whether a Fair Share system of dues-paying should be a negotiable item at the bargaining table this year. The polls, located in the cafeteria, will be open from 7-8 a.m., 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., and 5-6 p.m. If approved, the AFT bargaining committee will negotiate for Fair Share this year. Fair Share would require all staff members in the classified bargaining unit to either join the AFT (and pay dues), or contribute an equivalent amount each year to charity.

And it was announced that two people on leave--instructional technologist Howard Bird and former research director Marston Morgan--are expected back next year. To top it off, the Board cancelled a scheduled March 26 meeting. Next session is April 9.

CLASSIFIED STAFF LIKES FAIR SHARE---In a vote that was not even close, a majority of the classified employees decided Thursday to seek a Fair Share system of dues-paying for all members of the bargaining unit. The American Federation of Teachers bargaining team will now negotiate the matter with the Board of Education.

Results of last week's election were 112 Yes votes and 31 No. A little over 200 classified employees are in the bargaining unit, which is represented by AFT. Since the AFT became the bargaining agent for the classified staff last year, membership (and dues-paying) has been optional, a point that has generally pleased non-members and irritated those who joined. Currently, about 170 persons are AFT members, but that figure also includes some of the faculty.

If okayed by the Board all in the bargaining unit would be required to pay union dues or donate an equivalent amount to charity. Dues now are \$60 a year and AFT president Evelyn Tennis said that the union plans to keep it at that figure "for the time being".

SUMMER SCHOOL CUT FOUR WEEKS---Budgetary strains have created another casualty at LCC: the 12-week summer session. Summer school, which normally lasts until about the first week of September, will return this year to an eight-week session ending Aug. 15. It will begin June 23. Four-week sessions will be offered beginning June 23 and July 21, and a six-week session will be held from June 23 to Aug. 1.

The eight-week session should cause no problems for veterans attending on the GI Bill, said Veterans' Affairs director Barbara Harmon, because the session spans all three summer months, something that the VA requires. Current and prospective students who are veterans can be certified by the Veterans Administration for both summer and fall terms when they enroll for spring and summer classes. Certification will ensure that their benefit checks will not stop during the vacation periods before and after summer term.

DEVELOPMENT FUND DRIVE BEGINS---Funds to help replenish nearly-depleted LCC Development Fund accounts for scholarships and emergency student loans will be sought during the next two weeks during LCC's annual Community Support Campaign. The campaign, which will continue until April 14, begins today. Volunteers, led by honorary chairman Ed Cone, will be seeking about \$10,000 in gifts during the campaign. All donations are tax-deductible and may be designated for a particular activity. Besides the scholarship and emergency loan accounts, other activities needing support are the LCC Tibrary, which has been unable to purchase a satisfactory number of new books this year, the National Athletic Travel and Emergency Loan Fund, and virtually every instructional department.

WOMEN'S WORKSHOP SCHEDULED---The special problems facing women who attend community colleges will be discussed by northwest community college teachers and administrators in April during a two-day seminar at LCC. Representatives from colleges in Oregon, Washington, and Idaho will gather at Lane April 17-18 for the workshop called "Let's Put Woman in Her Place". It is sponsored by the home economics departments of LCC and the Oregon Board of Education.

The workshop, modeled after a similar conference held earlier this year in Arizona, will cover many of the problems facing women students, such as fear of the classroom, combining studies with family life, employment, and roles and attitudes. The keynote speaker will be Jan Newton, a University of Oregon economist who is researching the effects of long-term unemployment on working class families.
