COX TO RETIRE JULY 1---Bill Cox, whose career in vocational education covers four decades, including 16 years as director of the old Eugene Vocational School, has opted for early retirement and will resign as superintendent of college facilities July 1. Bill submitted his resignation yesterday, saying that he was retiring "with a deep feeling of gratitude for ten great years of working with the Board, administration, staff--and especially my staff--and in seeing and being involved in construction of this beautiful campus".

The position of superintendent of college facilities is currently being reviewed as part of an over-all reorganizational study of that area by the Dean of Business Operations, and no decision has been made on filling the job after Bill's retirement.

Bill was director of the Eugene Technical Vocational School from 1949 to 1965, then joined the LCC staff as Dean of Administration when the college opened. He later became Dean of Administrative Services until 1969 when he was made superintendent of facilities. He graduated from Colorado State College in 1934, taught at high schools in Colorado for a few years, then moved to Astoria High School in 1940 as its shop teacher. He joined the Vocational School as assistant director in 1945, then took over the directorship when L.L. Erdman resigned four years later.

As director, Bill saw EVS through the readjustment of the post-war years and the doldrums of the early 1950s. When the Russians launched Sputnik and the American public began demanding greater emphasis on technology, Bill pushed EVS into the space race and helped develop a strong technical curriculum that eventually even caused the school to change its name to the Eugene Technical Vocational School. Bill was also director during periods of ETVS's greatest growth, including construction of a new campus at 200 North Monroe. When the new campus was completed, it marked the first time since the school was founded in 1938 that all departments had been at the same location. Most of the aircraft program had always been housed at the Eugene Airpark on Chambers Street. In his ten years at LCC, Bill has also seen the college through its greatest years of growth and, in terms of construction, nearly to the point of being a completed campus.

After June 30, his plans include relaxing and traveling. He said he also would be available to serve as a consultant to the college on facilities matters.

BAKER'S DOZEN FILE FOR BOARD---A total of 13 persons, eight for the at-large position and three for Zone 2, have filed with the county elections department as candidates for the LCC Board of Education. Two seats on the seven-member Board are open, each for four-year terms, and each scheduled to start July 1.

The biggest surprise yesterday was the filing just before the 5 p.m. deadline of electronics teacher Rick Romanek, who is seeking the Zone 2 (Junction City) post being vacated by John Barber. Others running for Zone 2 are Judith Weller, a part-time LCC student, and Jim Pitney, a Junction City farmer.

Candidates for the at-large position include John C. (Jack) Hart Jr., a former LCC student now at the University of Oregon, Richard O. Eymann, a Marcola rancher and consultant to the college on funding and governmental affairs, William Watkins, a former LCC business manager, Larry Perry, a South Eugene High School teacher and former state legislator, Ruth Watters, a housewife, Gary Hughes, a Cottage Grove truck driver, Ernest (Steve) Woodard, a Cottage Grove forester, Gary Underwood, a Eugene fireman living in Creswell, and Robert J. Wright, who lists his occupation as plaintiff, and Bob Hoffman, an LCC business office employee.

The election is scheduled May 6, the same day LCC is also seeking a three-year serial levy.

Smith is a 1946 graduate of the University of Oregon Medical School who has gained a national reputation in the field of hyperactive children. LIONS DONATE \$\$\$\$ FOR HANDICAPPED---An \$850 remodeling project that will make the radio broadcasting training program and the KLCC studio accessible to the physically handicapped--including the blind--has been ordered for LCC by the Eugene Downtown Lions Club. The project is the second major donation by the Lions to LCC in two years. Last year the club gave the college \$1,000 to purchase two braille writers for the library and to provide books and tuition for blind students. The braille writers, worth about \$150 each, are used much as a sighted person uses a typewriter, and both are available to the public free of charge.

When completed both the KLCC studio and music library should be accessible to any LCC student, regardless of handicap. Plans call for widening the production area to accommodate wheel-chairs, installation of meters and monitoring devices that can be heard as well as read, and addition of braille labels on all dials and equipment. All records in the music library will also be identified with labels that can be read by touch. Most of the remodeling on the KLCC studio should be completed during spring term.

GRANTS APPROVED---Three grants totalling nearly \$9,000 have been awarded to LCC by the Educational Coordinating Council. They were awarded under the Oregon Program of Grants for the Improvement of Instruction. Receiving approval were proposals for a biology field course using full-time student participation (\$3,146), a Management Skills Training program for department chairmen (\$3,375), and a system of Management by Objectives for Cooperative Work Experience trainees (\$2,420).

BROADCASTING SEMINAR SCHEDULED HERE---More than 200 high school and college broadcasting students are expected in Eugene April 12 for a one-day broadcasting seminar at LCC. The seminar, sponsored by the Oregon Association of Broadcasters and hosted by LCC, will focus on news gathering, programming, job entry, and sales. It will be held from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Forum Building, with a noon luncheon scheduled in the cafeteria. Luncheon speaker will be Portland attorney John Kendall, an authority on Federal Communication Commission regulations. 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COMMITTEE LOOKS AT \$19.9 MILLION BUDGET---The budget committee met last night for its first look at a \$19.9 million budget submitted for Lane Community College for 1975-76. Included in that total is \$12.7 million for support of the General Fund. The budget, described by President Eldon Schafer as one that would support this year's programs with some increases to account for lower federal support and higher inflation, is designed to provide for about 400 more full time equivalent students in 75-76 than are being served this year.

The Committee reviewed with Tony Birch and Verne Whittaker the budget development process and heard President Schafer tell them that the budget was planned for an FTE level of 7,250, which would generate about \$5 million this coming year. In addition, they learned that two new fund categories had been added---enterprise and agency---bringing the total number of funds to 7. Enterprise accounts include the bookstore, food services and the summer theatre, and the agency account includes the Special Program Activity Fund (SPAF).

The budget committee, composed of the LCC Board of Education, seven lay members and two non-voting student members, will now meet weekly through April 30 to develop a final document to be submitted to the district's voters on June 17.

Earlier, the LCC Board met in a regular business session to (a) approve a Board Policy concerning archives, (b) appoint an auditor, Gregor, Thorp, McCracken, Early, P.C., (c) select Catherine Lauris as LCC's representative to the Oregon Community College Assembly, (d) appoint 16 persons to the information advisory committee, and (e) table discussion on construction priorities guidelines.

BREAKING EVEN IN THE XEROX GAME---It is difficult to compute exactly where, but there is a point at which you start to come out ahead using the print shop instead of the Xerox copier. According to Tony Birch, that point is approximately 30. Anything more than that and it is cheaper for the college if you use Printing and Graphics. The "30" figure takes into account that the college is paying for overhead, labor, equipment and fixed payroll charges. Departments operating out of the general fund, however, only pay for materials. From a strictly departmental standpoint, then, the breakeven point is less than 30, perhaps as low as 10 or 15. From there it is cheaper to print at P&G.

Printing costs on white bond paper, by the way, are 25 cents for one page, 39 cents for two pages, and 30 cents for two back-to-back pages (figures based on 25 copies). For 100 copies it is 52 cents for one, \$1.04 for two, and 67 cents for two back-to-back. And for 500 copies it is \$2.40 for one page, \$4.80 for two, and \$2.95 for two back-to-back.

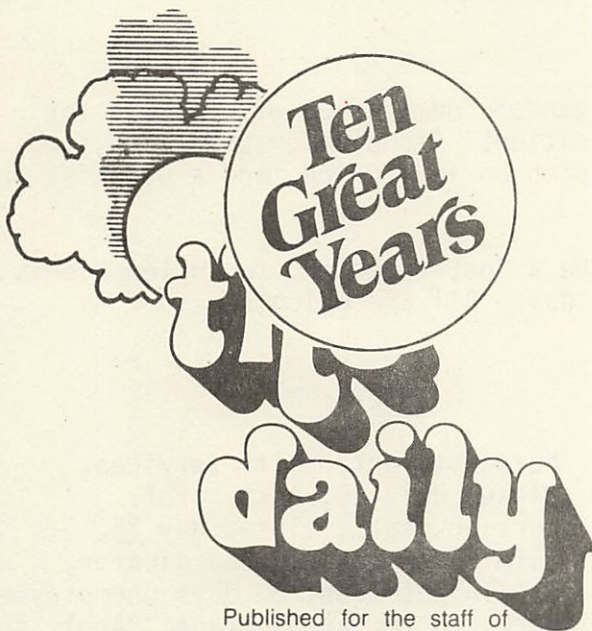

LCC GETS STATE GRANT FOR FLIGHT TECH PROGRAMS---Lane Community College has been notified it will receive a \$19,000 grant to rewrite the flight technology curriculum followed by Lane and the four other Oregon community colleges who offer flight training. Department chairman Jack Kreitz learned yesterday that the grant had been awarded by the State Department of Education to update Oregon's flight training programs to meet changing federal regulations.

The Federal Aviation Administration has given flight programs across the country until July, 1976 to meet the new requirements, which consist mostly of tougher rules. Lane has already rewritten the private pilot's curriculum, and will spend this summer working on the commercial, instrument, and instructor portions. When completed they will be adopted for use by Southwestern Oregon Community College, Portland Community College, Treasure Valley Community College and Blue Mountain Community College. Associate Dean of Instruction Jim Piercey expects the work to be completed with existing staff.

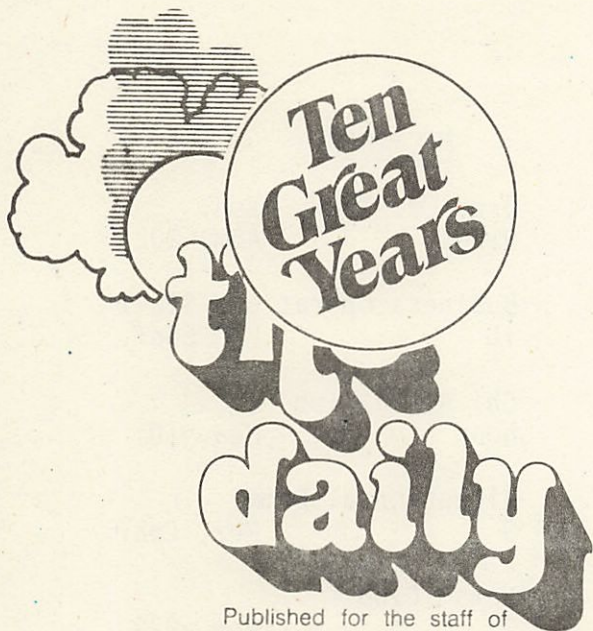

COMMITTEE TENTATIVELY APPROVES SOME OF THE BUDGET, BUT BIGGEST TO COME---The Lane Community College budget committee took its second look at LCC's proposed budget last night, and tentatively approved all that it saw. However, what it saw did not include the general fund which, at about \$12.7 million comprises the lion's share of the \$19.9 million budget.

And when the committee does get to the general fund, you can expect some cuts to be made. In a flurry of closing statements that provided a hint of the committee's mood, some members said they felt obliged to reduce the budget, in one case by as much as 20 percent, before it gets to the voters. Board member Catherine Lauris raised the 20 percent figure "to make it (the budget) believable to the voters." "No doubt every dollar in this budget is necessary," she continued, "and I would be willing, if at the end we're convinced that we don't need to cut, to go out and work for it...but we all have to make sacrifices."

Committee chairman Jerry Brown, a Junction City service station operator, thinks that salaries should be held down, and even suggested eliminating the \$1 million contingency fund to force salaries down. The contingency fund is largely used for salary increases, which are currently under negotiation. Payroll figures listed in the budget document are the amounts being paid this year. Other committee members, including Kenneth L. Parks, a Lowell businessman, Jim Martin, of the Board, and Donna Sprecher, a Eugene housewife, echoed Brown's desire to maintain the current salary level or reduce it. Mrs. Sprecher suggested a five percent cut across the board.

Language arts instructor Karen Lansdowne took issue with the practice of speaking in terms of percentages when dealing with salary increases, saying "we tend always to talk about the percentage of an increase, but don't always pay attention to what we start with. Thirteen percent on \$5,000, for instance, is not much," adding, "if you look at the number of students we're serving and the dollars spent, that's a remarkably small amount for the taxpayer. We're serving lots more than we ever expected. This college was built for 6,500 (FTE) students, and this budget is built for 7,250."

The next meeting, scheduled for April 23 at 8 p.m. in the Board Room, will focus on the bookstore, food services and so forth, then will get into a review of the general fund. That meeting, like all the others, is open to the public.

BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETS, STILL LOTS TO DO---The LCC budget committee met for three hours last night, did a little cutting, and left itself with a large chunk of the general fund to look at next week, when it hopes to complete its work. Some of the highlights of last night's meeting include:

- * The committee tabled action on Schedule VI, the enterprise accounts, until it had more information. Schedule VII, the agency account, was tentatively approved.

- * Ten percent, or \$4,500 was cut from the Board of Education budget. The proposed \$1,837 for publications was reduced to \$337, and the \$19,076 proposed for fees and dues was cut to \$16,076.

- * Tentative approval was given for the President's office and for the office of instruction.

- * A detailed list of requests for serial levy funds was given to committee members, who had requested the report at the last meeting.

- * Lowell trucker Kenneth L. Parks expressed reluctance to make suggestions for specific cuts in the budget, feeling instead that the college staff could do that job better. He suggested giving the administration a sum to be cut and leaving the particular reductions to those who know what could be cut. He, like most of the 14-member committee, feels the budget is too high "to sell to the voters".

- * Sandra Rennie, a Eugene housewife, asked for a report on the status of CETA employees on campus.

- * President Schafer announced that Title VI CETA employees, who were scheduled to have their funds cut-off in July have been extended by the government until at least December 31.

The next meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in Adm. 202.

FRIDAY PERFORMANCE SET FOR "Soiree De Trois"---"Soiree De Trois", the LCC concert combining combining dance, music and design, will have two performances this weekend instead of a single Saturday performance, as was announced earlier. The concert had originally been scheduled for Saturday only, but a second program has been set for Friday. Both begin at 8 p.m. in the performing arts theatre. Tickets are \$2 each and are available at the box office. Any remaining seats will be sold at the door Friday and Saturday.

McCLAIN NEW TORCH EDITOR---Mike McClain, a first-year political science student, has been named next year's editor of the student newspaper, The Torch. McClain, 23, will replace Rick Bella, who is transferring to the University of Oregon. McClain will receive a salary of \$110 a month from the Special Program Activity Fee, a fund supported by student fees.

A 1970 graduate of Albany High School, McClain traveled and worked as a teacher's aide before enrolling at LCC this year. He joined The Torch as a reporter in the fall and has served as associate editor of the paper since last term. He was the only applicant for the position. The Torch has a staff of about 10 and a circulation of about 5,000.

VET ENROLLMENT DOWN SLIGHTLY---About 1,850 veterans are enrolled under the GI Bill of Rights this term, down about 175 from winter term, which at 2,025 was an all-time record for LCC. The spring total is still about 200 more than the previous high of about 1,600 vets who enrolled several terms in a row during the past two years. According to Barbara Harmon, more than 750 ex-GI's have already been certified for summer term.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS SATURDAY---For the second year in a row, the Oregon Special Olympics track meet for mentally handicapped children will be held at LCC. About 1,000 youngsters aged eight to 20 will be here Saturday to compete in seven events ranging from the 50 yard dash to the softball throw. Activities begin at 9 a.m. with a parade of contestants, followed at 9:25 with Gov. Bob Straub conducting opening ceremonies, and then competition until about 4 p.m. All activities are at the track or in the auxiliary gymnasium.

Campus coordinator Sue Thompson said that competition will be divided into seven age groups from eight to 20, with each category being further divided by skill level and ability. Gold, silver and bronze medals will go to the top three finishers in each event, but all who compete will also get an award. Those who qualify will be able to attend the national Special Olympics this summer in Michigan. Most states participate in the program, which is sponsored by the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation.

This year's Oregon meet is emphasizing how "unspecial" the Special Olympics are, with its sponsors hoping that it will show the needs of mentally handicapped children are no different from the needs of any other children.
