NOT EVEN CLOSE, AND DEFINITELY NO CIGAR---The Lane Community College budget committee adjourned at eleven last night little closer to a 1975-76 budget than they were at 7:30. While a general budget-cutting sentiment still survived throughout most of the committee (there was one suggestion to cut \$1 million) no one could seem to agree on the way it should be done or what should be left in and what should be taken out. As a result, committee members will come back next Wednesday, the day after the serial levy election, with one last chance to approve the budget before it has to be submitted to the county for placement on the June 17 ballot. Some highlights include:

* The committee tentatively approved adjusted budgets for instructional departments and instructional services. Departments was adjusted upward from \$5,150,740 to \$5,181,085,

and Services was cut from \$498,017 to \$495,723.

* President Schafer recommended that about \$84,000 be cut from the general fund providing that extra funds come through to extend CETA Title II's (not Title VI's, as was incorrectly reported last week) until Dec. 31, and \$50,000 from curriculum development's budget of \$150,000. That would leave about \$30,000 for on-campus curriculum development and the remainder for the first year's commitment to the Goldmark project. The committee accepted his recommendations.

* Jim Martin moved that \$1 million be cut from the budget--\$600,000 from the contingency fund and \$400,000 from capital outlay. His motion died due to lack of a second.

* Donna Sprecher said she would prefer going to the voters promising not to raise their millage. Period. Such an approach is possible, but difficult because of fluctuating assessments (some homes are going up 24 percent) and would probably result in a cut larger even than Martin's \$1 million figure.

* Chairer Jerry Brown and others were concerned that, assuming the serial levy fails, that capital outlay funds be guaranteed in the operating budget. Robert Mention agreed somewhat, but added that if it comes to that, that all areas should be reduced proportionately rather than to leave capital outlay intact and cut like mad elsewhere.

* The committee tentatively approved the enterprise account after transferring \$1,522 from the summer theatre contingency account to the theatre's transfers out account

for custodial services and utilities.

* The next meeting is scheduled for May 7 at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room. It is open to the public.

REVIEW OF CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS---The Facilities Planning Committee will meet today and tomorrow to discuss construction projects. Today, from 1-5 p.m., the committee will discuss home economics, performing arts, financial aids, language arts, art and applied design and so forth. The meeting is open. Tomorrow's, also at 1 p.m., is in Adm. 202.

PARNELL COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER---Dale Parnell, Lane Community College's first president and now chancellor of the San Diego Community College District, will deliver the commencement address at LCC's graduation exercises June 6, a Friday. Commencement is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in the performing arts theatre, breaking with a tradition of holding graduation exercises on a Sunday afternoon. Admission is free.

Parnell was superintendent of Lane IED from 1960-65 when he was named LCC's first president. He left in 1968, the year Lane moved to its new campus, to become Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State Department of Education. In 1974 he was hired as chancellor of the San Diego system. Because LCC will be 10 years old on July 1, the theme of the ceremony is "Ten Great Years". Besides Parnell, other early LCC staff members will also participate in commencement. Retiring Superintendent of College Facilities Bill Cox will hand out diplomas, and all staff members who have been with the college since the beginning will be recognized. About 200-300 students are expected to receive associate degrees or certificates of completion.

YOU'RE INVITED---LCC's tenth anniversary will be celebrated in the King Cole Room of the Eugene Hotel following graduation ceremonies on campus. The party should begin about 9 p.m. No-host bar. 

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
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

TODAY IS ELECTION DAY---At stake for LCC is a serial levy request that would raise about \$800,000 a year for three years. Thirteen persons are also running for two seats on the Board of Education, ten for the at-large position and three for Zone 2. The polls will be open until 8 p.m. today. Please vote.

"STAGE DOOR" NEXT, AND LAST, PRODUCTION---"Stage Door", a comedy written by Edna Ferber and George S. Kaufman, is scheduled to open May 23 as Lane Community College's last stage production of the year. Performances are scheduled for 8 p.m. May 23, 24, 28, 29, 30, and 31 in the theatre. Tickets are \$2.50 each and all seats are reserved. Set in the 1930s, "Stage Door" is a light comedy about a group of young girls trying to become actresses in New York. It stars Karen Quanbeck as the heroine Terry Randall, with other principal roles held by Gini Blake, Karen Orendorf, Susan Anderson, JoLu Roberts, Rebekah Albert, Barbara Myrick, Chuck Robbins, and John Barker.

The director is Wayne Ballantyne, a former theatre student at LCC and a graduate of the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York. He is now majoring in theatre at the University of Oregon. Ballantyne is well-known to Lane and Marion County audiences. As a director at the Pentacle Theatre in Salem, he directed such plays as "The Women", "Design for Living", "A Delicate Balance", and "Cabaret". SERIAL LEVY DEFEATED; PERRY, PITNEY WIN---By about 2,000 votes, the serial levy request that would have provided about \$800,000 a year for equipment purchase and replacement has been defeated. About 20 percent of the electorate turned out yesterday to vote the request down, a decision that will dramatically effect the shape of the operating budget that will go to the voters in June. The budget committee will meet tonight at 7:30 to figure out what to do.

The serial levy was defeated 12,057 No to 10,094 Yes and was one of six school money measures to lose yesterday. Others were Bethel, Junction City, Siuslaw, South Lane, and the Lane IED equalization levy. Winners were Springfield, Oakridge, McKenzie, Marcola, Mapleton, Lowell, and all the special fire and water districts, except the Lane Rural Fire Protection District.

Meanwhile, Larry Perry and James Pitney were elected to the Board of Education, easily outdistancing the eleven other candidates for the two seats. Perry, a South Eugene High School teacher, received 5,605 votes in defeating an army of candidates for the at-large position. Businesswoman Ruth Watters was second with 3,177 and Dick Eymann was third with 3,039. Junction City farmer James Pitney beat LCC student Judith Weller for the Zone 2 seat, 7,102 to 5,028. Both winners will be sworn in on July 1.

BUDGET COMMITTEE TO MEET---Yesterday's vote will figure heavily in any decision the committee makes tonight--and a decision will have to be made if an operating budget is to be submitted to the county in time to be put on the June 17 ballot. At the 7:30 p.m. meeting, the committee will take one last look at the budget and listen to their own and administration proposals for trimming it. The meeting will be in Adm. 202.

LBCC HANGING ON, BUT SLIPPING---At 7:30 this morning, with nine precincts still out, Linn-Benton Community College is 398 votes behind in its effort to pass a \$2.28 million levy.

A MILLION DOLLARS LATER, LCC GETS ITS BUDGET---With little discussion other than an expressed desire to end up with a figure the voters will support, the budget committee believes it found several last night--the two most important being \$1,424,794 and \$1.56. The \$1.4 million figure will be the amount sought outside the six percent limitation when the budget goes to the voters next month. \$1.56 is the estimated tax rate, based on a 21 percent increase in the assessed valuation of District property. The current tax rate is \$1.49.

The committee voted 12-1 on Al Brauer's motion to lop off \$810,550 from the contingency and capital outlay funds that, when added with earlier cuts, would bring to \$935,430 dollars actually cut from the budget. Only Donna Sprecher voted against the motion. Earlier cuts had included about \$130,000 from such funds as summer theatre transfer, the Board of Education, innovative projects, instructional departments and so on.

The total budget was reduced from \$20,756,308 to \$19,982,400, and the general fund was cut from \$12,731,452 to \$11,797,544. Contingency was lowered from \$1,010,000 to \$600,000, and capital outlay lost \$400,550 from its original \$800,550. Several committee members urged the Board to protect the remaining \$400,000 capital outlay budget from reduction or redistribution at a later date, preferring that half a loaf for equipment purchase and replacement is better than none. They were referring to Tuesday's serial levy defeat that threw funds for such purchases back into the general fund. Brauer and others also said that the possibility for seeking another serial levy, possibly next fall, should be considered.

Following adoption of the budget, which committee member Ken Parks described as a "good budget, one that should be supported ...all the way", and one that most everyone on the committee felt the public would support, the Board of Education formally called for June 17 as the date when the public would get its chance. On the ballot will be the request for \$1.4 million outside the six percent limitation and the \$1.56 tax rate. Most Board and committee members felt that, should that request fail, an identical budget would be submitted in September.

Some notable figures: The total proposed levy--\$5,991,460; Levy within six percent limitation--\$2,937,449; Total personnel services in the general fund--\$8,416,231; Total capital outlay--\$469,036, including \$69,036 for the Sigma VI computer; \$1,424,794, the levy request outside the six percent limitation, down from \$2,500,001; tax rate--\$1.56, down from \$2.09 originally scheduled.





ROMOSER AT WHITE HOUSE BRIEFING---Language arts instructor Ted Romoser took part in a White House briefing last Friday along with the National Education Association Board of Directors. President Ford, Secretary of Labor John Dunlop and Federal Energy Advisor Frank Zarb addressed the NEA group. Ford promised new efforts to discuss education policy with the union and said he had ordered the commissioner of education to seek teacher nominees for national committee appointments. Ford also promised to lend more administration support to funding requests for vocational education and multi-lingual programs.

Dunlop said he supported collective bargaining, and Zarb said that the "value concept" of conservation would continue. Zarb's "value concept" says that people will buy smaller cars and install storm windows only when the price of oil becomes so expensive that such moves are worthwhile. Later, Ted spoke with Zarb on oil prices and the administration's apparent desire to raise them. Said Ted to the Czar: "People can't very well vote against gas stations or auto companies, but they can vote against school budgets. When they do, fuel costs can't be cut but educational programs and teachers can be."



Losers included LCC and its serial levy; Linn-Benton, losing for the third time in trying to pass an operating levy; and Blue Mountain, losing a levy request for the first time in its 13-year history. The \$1.4 million went down 3,106 to 3,509.





BOARD NOTES---The Board of Education met last night in its first meeting since budgetforming sessions ended last week, and acted on several proposals. Among them:

- A supplemental budget of \$214,000 was adopted.

- The Facilities Planning Committee's recommended revisions to construction priority guidelines was approved in part. Left alone were recommendations that general priority be given to completing the present campus (deleting a portion that said "but not to the exclusion of off campus development") and a section that said "areas directly involved in student instruction shall have priority over support areas." Many Board members felt that those two provisions, if included in the guidelines, would tie their hands in future construction decisions. Approved were a shopping list of specifics concerning how projects would be prioritized.

- Scholarships amounting to a little less than \$7,000 were awarded to 23 high school

seniors. The tuition scholarships are worth \$300 apiece.

- Former student Sharon Nail was named to the Forestry Technician advisory committee, and students Roger Kirtland and Larry Wickizer were named to the Evening Program Advisory Committee.

- The Board supported the idea of "courtesy appointments", which would provide some liability insurance, recreational privileges, tuition waivers and so forth to persons who work at Lane but are not paid by the college or are paid by someone else. Examples include dentists and other volunteer workers who donate a great deal of time to the school.

PURCHASING OFFICE MOVES---The purchasing office will move to the new maintenance building Monday and Tuesday, and perhaps Wednesday, and at the same time will be getting a new phone number: ext. 309 or 310. Patrick Grant warns that because of the move the office will be unable to conduct much business during those days.

His system made it possible for the Apollo astronauts to beam live color telecasts to world audiences of man's first walk on the lunar surface. He holds more than 160 patents. Since forming Goldmark Communications in 1972, he has developed RTS, a new educational system; Transcan, a film-to-video tape processing method; MLS, an electronic system for music learning; and advanced technologies for the cable tv field. Previous recipients of the Trustee Award include former Presidents Dwight Eisenhower and John Kennedy, Jack Benny, Bob Hope, Edward R. Murrow, and Dr. Frank Stanton.



Judging and awarding of prizes is scheduled for sometime in May, 1976.
