BOARD TO MEET TONIGHT---Highlights include discussion of plans for the 1975-76 academic year, specifically, what happens under a tax base budget; selection of an Insurance Agent of Record; and a request for about \$4,600 from the Siuslaw project contingency fund to truck fill in to the Florence site to help stop a serious water problem. Construction has been held up because of surface water.

Some of the proposals that have been made to balance a tax base budget include cutting out catch up funds for inflation (except for office supplies), elimination of most of the Capital Outlay, reduction of part-time staff (non-scheduled) to 42 percent of this year's level, which is already reduced; reduction of contingency reserves; and reduction in funding for continuation of CETA-funded positions. Discussion on the details of the proposals starts sometime after 7:30 p.m., when the meeting is called to order. Place: Adm. 202.

WHAT IF LCC CAN'T GET A LEVY APPROVED THIS YEAR?---Al Brauer told fellow Board of Education members last night that the result would be "devastating...a loss of years of hard work...a dampening of the college's spirit..." In concrete terms, reported the administration, it would mean chopping about \$2 million from operating expenses. That would entail reduced enrollment, reduced work hours and/or terminations for about 75 people, greater emphasis on programs that cost the least to teach, and about 100 fewer classes, some larger classes, elimination or cutback in some programs, some heavier teaching loads, no wage adjustments, and no replacement of obsolete teaching equipment in occupational programs.

In other business:

- * The Board approved 19 new courses plus new programs in Banking and Finance, Aviation Management (no new courses), and addition of the name "technician" to the Auto Body and Fender program title. They'll vote at the next meeting on the proposed addition of six military science courses at no cost to LCC.

- * The Board agreed that, at Florence, the contractor should add a foot of fill to lift the new Skills Center Building out of a pervasive lake of rain water.

- * And Bill Cox attended his final Board meeting before retirement.

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WHEELCHAIR MARATHON SET---To a county accustomed to 80-mile bike-a-thons and 20-mile walk-a-thons, a new entry in the "a-thon" derby amounting to only 3 1/4 miles should barely get a second look. Except that the 3 1/4 miles is covered in a wheelchair. Civic and educational leaders, including members of the Springfield City Council and Lane Community College President Eldon Schafer, will wheel themselves over the three-mile Springfield course June 22 in an effort to raise money for the LCC Handicapped Students Association.

The Wheelchair Marathon starts at 21st and Olympic Streets about 9 a.m. and will finish at 4th and "B" Streets several hours later. As in other fund-raising marathons, participants will collect pledges for each mile covered. Proceeds will be used to purchase mobility aids for loan to temporarily disabled LCC students, sliding doors in certain areas of the campus, and toward a future Olympics for the physically handicapped.

ESTELLE SINGLETON TO GO TO EGYPT---Nursing program director Estelle Singleton will spend six weeks in Egypt this summer studying that country's nursing and health care systems. Estelle will arrive in Cairo June 18 as part of a contingent of 22 community college instructors from across the country on a federally-funded project sponsored by the League for Innovation in the Community College.

She will study hospitals and health clinics in Cairo for four weeks, then spend the remaining two weeks touring medical facilities in several other cities. The results of her study will be published and will be available for use in college health and nursing courses. She will also be available for personal appearances in classrooms here and for educational service organizations in the community. Last year Estelle made a similar study of health services in India, while John Kocher and Paul Malm studied their specialties of law enforcement and international relations in Egypt.

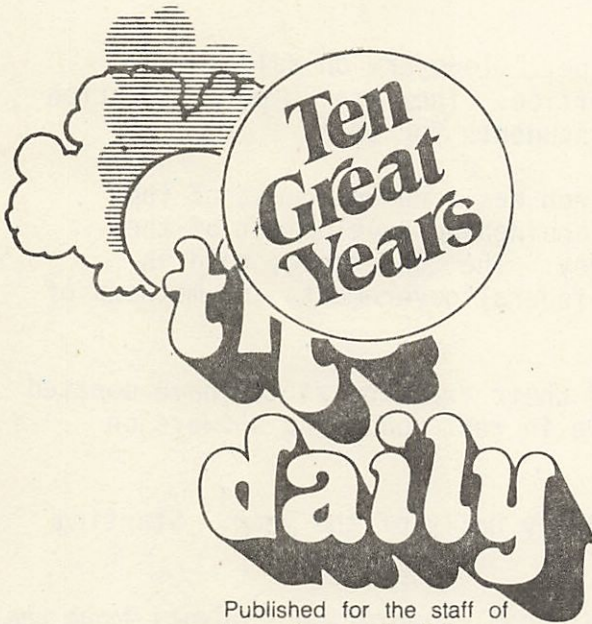

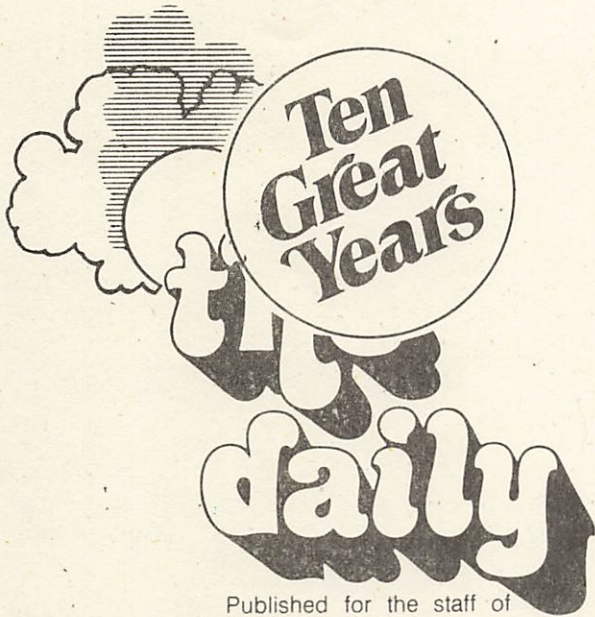

IT WAS CLOSE, BUT IT GOES IN THE RECORD BOOKS AS A WIN---Lane Community College's request for \$1.4 million outside the six percent limitation squeaked through by about six hundred votes yesterday, making it one of the many fortunate throughout the state to get operating budgets for the coming year. In fact, all community college levy requests were approved, including Linn-Benton's, 3-2 on the fourth try. LCC's budget was approved 11,771 to 11,160. About 20 percent of the electorate turned out to vote yesterday to give the nod also to most other money measures, including all Eugene requests. For the first time in its history, the Eugene city budget was passed on the first try. And the IED equalization budget passed handily.

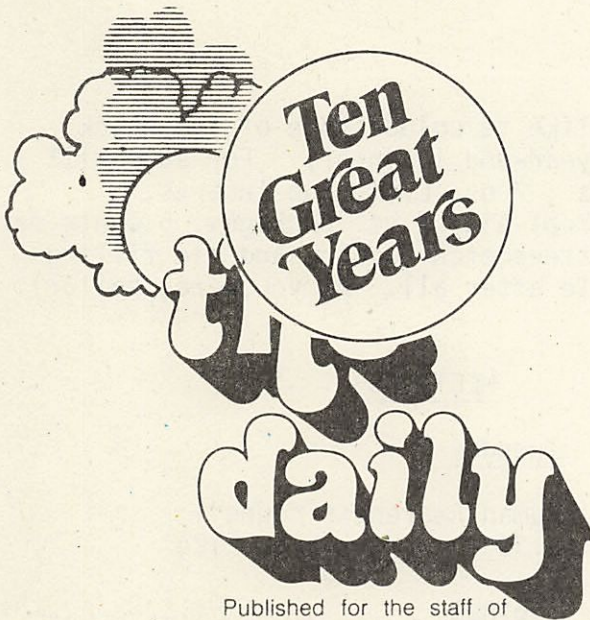

ROTC AT LANE DECLARED 4F---At least for this year, there will be no ROTC training at Lane Community College. The Board of Education refused last night to even second a motion by John Barber that two sequences of Reserve Officer Training Corps courses be added to the LCC curriculum. Major objections came from Richard Freeman and Catherine Lauris to a proposal that Military Science 121-123 and 221-223 become part of program here. LCC students have been taking ROTC courses on this campus for some time, but they have been offered through the Division of Continuing Education at \$19 per hour.

Other highlights of last night's meeting include:

- * The Board went over the proposed changes in the Institutional Bill of Rights and promised to discuss it again.

- * Approval of the formation of two new advisory committees--one for banking and finance and one for women's programming along the lines of the Evening Program Advisory Committee.

- * A look at the interim reorganization of Business Operations, that includes line officers for construction, maintenance and custodial services; personnel services, plant services, data processing, financial services, and food services. Plant services will include security, the bookstore, facilities and vehicle scheduling, courier, mailroom, warehouse, laundry, inventory clerk and switchboard. The proposed reorganization is for one year only. If it does not seem to be working at the end of a year, it will be submitted for further changes.

- * Approval of instructional goals and priorities for 1975-76, as submitted by a committee of eight. The twelve statements are of equal value and include increased emphasis on certificate programs, courses and programs for people who attend school at night and weekends, offering courses and programs that attract new and clean industry, courses for non-traditional students, vocational courses which simulate actual work situations, courses that make students more self-sufficient, courses and programs which emphasize interdisciplinary and innovative instructional modes, community enjoyment and enrichment courses, student and community-initiated courses, demonstrating human concern in all college activities, provide services to district individuals and agencies so that cost and quality are approximately equal with that of the main campus and travel is reduced to a minimum, and design learning activities so that their objectives are achieved with a minimum of staff, student and community investment.

- * Approval of a list of construction priorities.

- * Last night's meeting was the final one for John Barber and Robert Mention. They will be replaced next month by James Pitney and Larry Perry.

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MAIL NOTIFICATION DROPPED---Students applying for admission to LCC for fall term will not be notified of acceptance by mail this summer unless they are vocational students attempting to enter a program with a waiting list. Bob Marshall said the practice of notifying students of their acceptance by first class mail is being dropped to save money. About \$700 a year has normally been spent on the notification process. Students, instead, will only receive a card telling them when to register.

LCC policy has always been to accept any student who applies for admission, except in periods of budgetary crisis such as last spring term when out-of-district and out-of-state new students were denied admission. Letters, therefore, have been unnecessary. Only in cases where vocational students wish to enroll in programs where there are waiting lists is there a need for a letter. In those cases, students will be notified that they are on a list and what their chances are of being admitted.

SCHAFER TO ADDRESS GROUP---President Schafer will discuss collective bargaining tomorrow at a meeting of the Association of California Community College Administrators in Los Angeles. He will be a member of a panel presenting a "Management View of Collective Bargaining as a Personnel Procedure". Also on the panel will be the presidents of community colleges in Michigan and Seattle. President Schafer's remarks will concern the before-and-after aspects of the first year of bargaining at LCC. California does not yet have collective bargaining for its public employees.

CASEY FAST CHAIRMAN---Math instructor Casey Fast has been appointed by the Board as chairman of the mathematics department. Howard Zink is returning to the classroom.
